PRAISE FOR BRITISH TROOPS FROM GERMAN

Avlator Tells of Flight in Air From Monoplane and Biplane

Berlin, Sept. 8.-Via London, Sept. 9 -Sergeant-Major Werner, of the aviation corps, returned to-day from the flights over the French and British troops.


