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WHEN there are fifteen men in a town the size of this who will disregard a driving storm and drive ten miles at night to discuss questions of mutual benefit for the progress of the whole peninsula, you can lay a safe wager that the town will move.—Sunnyvale Standard.

That's what is helping Sunnyvale to push ahead as it is doing, and is an object lesson to some other towns that we know of. A town will not progress very much unless the people living therein get in and boost.—East San Jose Post.

Campbell has accomplished very much in the past through its Board of Trade and later through the efforts of the members of the Commercial League. In the absence of a regular town government these organizations are very essential to a town's growth. And it generally devolved upon a few persons to take the brunt of the hard work. This should not be so. Everyone should boost.

ONE of the most independent members of the State Legislature was J. B. Sanford of Ukiah. Mr. Sanford is a Democrat and during the session did not yield to any of the programmed plans. In making a summary of the work of the legislature in the Ukiah Despatch-Democrat, Mr. Sanford says: "The Democrats had six able men in the Senate, all of whom stood for the people, and these men were assisted by the following independent, anti-boss Republicans: Senators Boynton, Black, Bush and Bell. While these ten men were in the minority, the stand they made prevented the enactment of some of the worst laws that were proposed during the session. Palo Alto has cause to congratulate itself that Senator Black was among the few honest Legislators.—Palo Alto Tribune.

Is it possible that Senator Black was the only Santa Clara County representative that didn't take "program"? How about it Messrs. Walker, Smith, Spalding and Higgins?

THE surveyors are now engaged staking off the sidetrack for the Libby, McNeil & Libby canneries. The contract for the erection of their building has been secured by William Bates of Mountain View. The lumber is to be furnished by the Parkinson Lumber company, and the Century Paint and Roofing company will supply the roofing. The main building is to be 350 feet long by 60 feet wide. The next in size will be 250 feet long, same width, and the smallest building will be 150x60.

their employees. They will have their own water system, using, for this purpose, a twenty thousand gallon tank.

The Parkinson Bros. have contract to sell them 260,000 feet of lumber.—Sunnyvale Standard.

Another instance of how our sister town is going after things. A few rustling real estate men, backed by a progressive element, which is not afraid to offer a few acres as a bonus, is what is making things hum at the "City of Destiny." Is it asking too much of our business men and citizens to offer similar inducements, that this town may receive its share of these industrial institutions?—East San Jose Post.

Campbell needs to take this lesson to heart. As long as our citizens, and especially our business men, are content to sit idly by and do nothing toward pushing the town ahead, we may expect to see many more of our town people migrate to Sunnyvale, East San Jose, Mountain View, Palo Alto, and other pushing towns. We have already lost too many desirable citizens the past year and steps should be taken to keep all we have and to gain many more. It can't be done by a close and niggardly policy; it must come from a progressive policy, such as is being displayed by the other towns of the county. Sunnyvale, Mountain View, Mayfield and Palo Alto are going after manufacturing plants—offering sites and money to get them, if necessary. And they're getting them. These towns and the other county towns are practically all taking advance steps in the line of municipal improvements, making them more desirable places in which to live. Campbell has natural advantages; it has important fruit industries, and can stand having several more. What we need is a few all-the-year industries and this is where the Commercial League can do legitimate work. Where Campbell made its greatest mistake was in defeating the incorporation project a year ago, but it is not too late to remedy this. Morgan Hill and East San Jose have since incorporated and are growing. Those towns use to point to Campbell as an example, but now we will have to take our hats off to them. Saratoga, Milpitas, Alviso and Cupertino are about the only places that Campbell has distanced, but we are afraid that if we don't get out of the present snail-like pace those places will even pass us. To our mind the only thing that has saved a general exodus the past year has been the high school. This splendid school has been of great service in holding here parents with children to educate. After witnessing what other towns are doing, we feel like urging Campbell business men to take up the work of placing the town where it rightfully belongs—in the front rank of county towns.

Customary Loot of State Property.

The local newspapers did not give the disgraceful details of the scenes in Red Men's Hall in Sacramento after the Legislature had adjourned, says the *News Letter*. A Sacramento paper asserts that the looting which went on was the most general and barefaced that ever marked the end of a session. While the greater part of the plumbing was left undisturbed, and no attempt was made to take away some well-known door mats that were padlocked to the floor, everything else movable was taken. Detachable electrical fixtures, waste-paper baskets, files, burnished brass that could be unscrewed, all disappeared. A San Francisco reporter says he saw the chaplain walking off with a basket under either arm. The hotel keepers fared badly, losing a large quantity of silverware. The wise landlords demanded pay in advance, and watched their guests sharply. Not a Legislator could get his Laundry bundle during the last days without paying cash on delivery, and most of the saloons suspended credit.

Either the foregoing is a libel

on the legislators or else we are in a bad fix. 'Pears to us that a little common honesty would be a good thing at Sacramento.—*Post*.

For years past there has been an apparent desire upon the part of our legislators to rob the State of everything possible. If at the adjournment of a session of the legislature there should be any money left unspent they generally spend it by increased pay to committee clerks, etc,

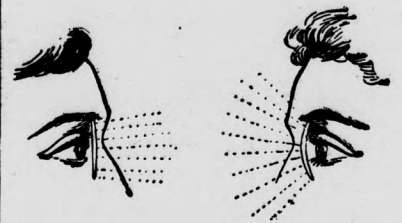
