Glassblowing Program Is Announced

Students interested in the art of glassblowing will be able to get professional training at RIT's School for American Craftsmen beginning next September.


That's when the School for American Craftsmen of RIT's College of Fine and Applied Arts will open its glassblowing program to undergraduate, graduate and part-time students.

"At present there's only one other degree granting, professional glassblowing program in New York State," said Dr. Dr. Robert H. Johnston, dean of the College of Fine and Applied Arts. "And we feel there's a real growing interest in art glass in the United States and the need for a good professional program in glass is the same now as it was in pottery 15 years ago.

"There exists today a rapidly growing movement to rediscover and explore glass as an art form," Dean Johnston said, "and all available information indicates that the demand for art glass will grow rapidly."

Douglas M. Marshall, associate professor of mechanical engineering at RIT, has been named assistant dean of the Institute's College of Engineering.

Marshall will be responsible for coordinating the College's academic student advisement program, coordinating and scheduling of student registration activities, the development of freshmen programs to better acquaint them with the purposes and curriculum of the college, and the coordination of the College's visitation program with two-year junior and community colleges from which graduates transfer to RIT.

The School for American Craftsmen currently offers professional programs in Ceramics and Ceramic Sculpture, Textiles, Woodworking and Furniture Design and Metalcrafts and Jewelry.

Undergraduate students in the glass program will earn an A.A.S. (Associate in Applied Science) degree for two years' work or a B.F.A. (Bachelor of Fine Arts) degree for successful completion of four years' work.

Graduate students in the program will work toward an M.F.A. (Master of Fine Arts) degree.

Students who complete the two-year program will be prepared to work in the design studios and workshops of established craftsmen or as technicians in industry, and those who complete the fouryear program will be prepared for careers as self-employed designer--craftsmen, as designers or technicians in industry, or as teachers or administrators of crafts program.

Johnston said the new program will be directed by Mr. Thomas Kekic, presently head of the ceramics department at Nazareth College and owner of Bristol Glassworks in Bristol, N.Y.

Kekic, 28, is a graduate of Kent State (Ohio) University (B.S.) and Pratt Institute (M.F.A.). He has a national reputation as a glassblower.

Enrollment in the program for the first year will be limited to 15 students and is expected to increase by 25 per year each year thereafter.

Future development of the glass program, Dean Johnston said, could include a stained glass and monumental glass program, which would make RIT one of the few places in the world a student could study the arts of glass blowing and stained glass.
