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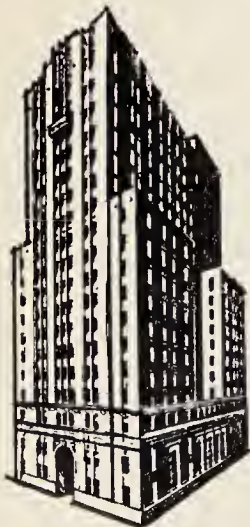
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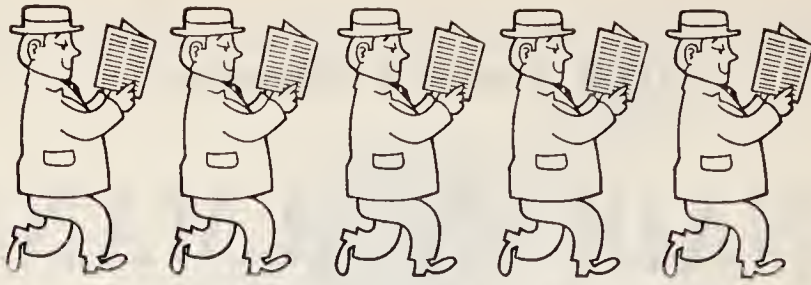
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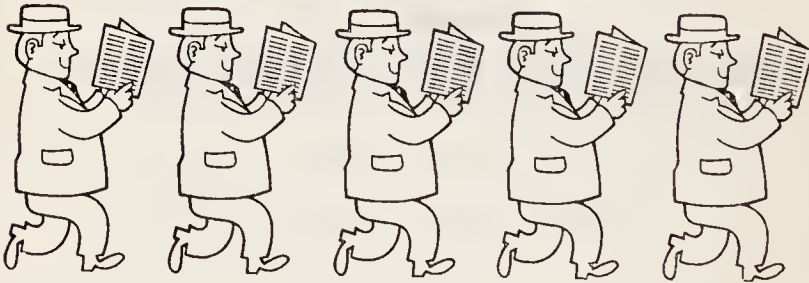

EPOCHS

Newfoundland time is one and one-half hours later than Eastern Standard Time; in the Maritime Provinces, on Atlantic time, time is one hour later; in Manitoba, on Central time, time is one hour earlier; in Alberta and Saskatchewan, on Mountain time, time is two hours earlier; in British Columbia on Pacific time, time is three hours earlier.

THE CALENDAR

The calendar is a method of identifying the passage of time and thereby regulating our civil life and religious observances.

Days, months, and years are based on astronomical periods. The day is the time it takes the earth to make one revolution on its axis, the month is associated with the period of rotation of the moon around the earth, while the year has to do with the rotation of the earth around the sun.

Many religious ideas and observances have been connected with the changes of the moon, and in ancient times the calendar took account of the moon rather than the seasons. From new moon to new moon is 29.530 days, and from one spring equinox to the next is 365.24219 days. Since the two are incommensurable, the modern calendar disregards the moon.

THE JULIAN CALENDAR

When Julius Caesar came to power, the Roman Calendar was hopelessly confused. With the advice of the Alexandrian astronomer, Sosigenes, Julius Caesar established the Julian Calendar. The length of the year was taken as 365 $\frac{1}{4}$ days, and in order to account for the $\frac{1}{4}$ day, an extra day was added every fourth year. From 45 B.C. each month has had its present number of days. In the old Roman Calendar which was based on the moon an extra month was inserted to straighten out the difference between twelve lunations, 354.37 days, and 355 days, which they called a year. This was inserted when necessary after February 23rd. In the Julian Calendar the extra day was added by repeating the sixth day before the Kalends (1st) of March, whence comes our word bissextile for leap year.

No very significant change was made till the reform of Pope Gregory XIII in A.D. 1582.

The Julian Calendar is known as the "Old Style" and after the change made by Pope Gregory as the "New Style"; the difference between the two is 13 days. The Calendar so arranged is known as the "Old Style" and is now used by the Eastern Orthodox Church in Russia, Ukraina, Syria and Palestine.

THE GREGORIAN CALENDAR

In that the Solar Year is 11 minutes, 12 seconds less than the Julian Year of 365 $\frac{1}{4}$ days, it followed in course of years that the Julian Calendar became inaccurate by several days, and in 1582 this difference amounted to 10 days. Pope Gregory XIII, at the suggestion of Aloysius Lilius, an astronomer of Naples, determined to rectify this, and devised the Calendar now known as the Gregorian Calendar. He dropped or cancelled these 10 days—October 5th being called October 15th—and made centennial years Leap years only once in 4 centuries; so that whilst 1700, 1800 and 1900 were to be ordinary years, 2000 would be Leap year. This modification brought the Gregorian year into such close exactitude with the Solar year that there is only a difference of 26 seconds, which amounts to a day in 3,323 years. This is the "New Style". The Gregorian Calendar was adopted in Italy, France, Spain, Portugal and Poland in 1582, by most of the German Roman Catholic states, Holland and Flanders in 1583, Hungary in 1587. The adoption in Switzerland began in 1584 and was not completed till 1812. The German and Dutch Protestant states generally, along with Denmark adopted it in 1700. British dominions in 1752, Sweden in 1753, Japan in 1873, China in 1912, Bulgaria in 1915, Soviet Russia in 1918, Yugoslavia in 1919, Romania and Greece in 1924, Turkey in 1927. The rules for Easter have not, however, been adopted by those oriental churches that are not subject to the Papacy.

The difference between the two "Styles" will remain 13 days until A.D. 2100.

THE JEWISH CALENDAR

The Jewish Calendar from the institution of the Mosaic Law downward was a lunar one, consisting of twelve months. The cycles of religious feasts commencing with the passover depending not only on the month but on the Moon; the 14th of the month of Abid or Nisan was coincident with the full moon; and the new moons themselves were the occasions of

regular festivals; the commencement of the month was generally determined by observations of the new moon, but twelve lunar months would make but 354½ days, the years would be short twelve days of the true year and it was necessary that an additional month, Veadar, be inserted about every third year.

The modern Jewish Calendar is based on fixed rules and not on observation. A common year may contain 353, 354 or 355 days and the Leap year 383, 384 or 385 days. The intercalary month always contains 30 days and is inserted next before the month Adar which name and place it takes. Adar itself is called second Adar or Veadar. Tishri 1 is the Jewish New Year and it cannot be a Sunday, Wednesday or Friday. Tishri 1 is not necessarily the day of new moon but is governed by a mean new moon which is calculated from the value of a mean lunation. It is complicated as compared with the Gregorian Calendar. The intercalary month is introduced seven times in every nineteen years.

The identification of the Jewish months with our own cannot be effected with precision on account of the variations existing between the lunar and solar month. The Jewish Calendar is given on page 24.

THE MOHAMMEDAN CALENDAR

The Mohammedan Calendar is called also the Calendar of Hegira (i.e. Migration) and is attributed to the primary migration of Mohammed, the Prophet of Islam, on September 20th, 622 A.D. from Mecca, his native city in the land of Hejaz, Arabia, to the city of Medina in the north of the same land. In Medina the Prophet and Founder of the Islamic Faith died and was buried.

Each year consists of 12 lunar months, and since no intercalation is made the months go round the seasons in between 32 and 33 years. In civil life there seems to be confusion as to the beginning of the month and unless both the day of week and day of the month are stated it is impossible to give an exact interpretation to a date.

The year 1380 according to the Hegira Calendar began on June 25th, 1960, the year 1381 on June 14th, 1961 Gregorian.

CALENDAR REFORM

Reform of the calendar, so that it may be balanced in structure, perpetual in form and harmonious in arrangement, has long been under discussion.

In 1937, when an enquiry was made by the League of Nations, 14 governments approved in principle of The World Calendar. World War II delayed further action. In October 1953 India put a proposal before the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations which embodied The World Calendar.

At Geneva, in July 1954, it was unanimously decided to request governments of member and non-member states to express their views on the desirability of calendar reform.

On May 16, 1955, ECOSOC decided to extend the time for sending in replies for a year.

The World Calendar comprises equal quarters in which the first month of each has 31 days and the other two 30 days each. These quarters contain exactly 91 days, 13 weeks and 3 months, with 13 Sundays and 78 weekdays, while each month has 26 weekdays. The last day of every year, December 31st, is called *Worldsday* and is placed between Saturday, December 30th, and Sunday, January 1st. In leap years, to make up the quota of 366 days, Leapyear Day, June 31st, is similarly interposed between Saturday and Sunday at the half year. The calendar is thus stabilized and has the same day-and-date arrangement every year. Christmas always falls on Monday, Dominion Day, July 1st, on Sunday with observance on Monday.

Worldsday is designed to be a world-wide holiday dedicated to international good will. Leapyear Day would also be a day of rest.

The World Calendar is sponsored by the *International World Calendar Association*, now with headquarters in Ottawa (address P.O. Box 20, Besserer St.) A. J. Hills Chairman of the Canadian Affiliate has succeeded to the Presidency. Hon C. Fraser Elliott, C.M.G., Q.C. is Honorary General

Counsel, Charles Clay, B.A., F.A.G.S., is Consultant, and J. Avery Joyce, Ph.D., F.R.G.S., Representative at the United Nations.

The Association has consultative status with the United Nations as a Non-Governmental Organization. Through its affiliates and National Committees throughout the world the Association endeavours to advance its plan of calendar reform, which through ECOSOC was referred to members and non-members of U.N.

In April, 1956 the item *World calendar reform* was withdrawn from ECOSOC by request of the Association to give time to obtain additional support.

The change-over could be effected without disturbance when the Gregorian calendar commences on a Sunday, which will occur in 1967, Canada's Centennial Year. With The World Calendar, every year commences on Sunday, January 1st.

THE WEEK

The division of the week is found only among Aryan nations and in regions into which they have penetrated. The day is, for convenience, divided into 24 equal parts and is the period of a single rotation of the earth upon its own axis.

A Solar or Astronomical day commences at midnight, and is divided into two equal portions of 12 hours each—those before noon being termed (A.M.) those after noon (P.M.).

The Chinese week consists of 5 days, which are named after iron, wood, water, feathers and earth; they divide the day into 12 parts of 2 hours each.

The Anglo-Saxons named the days of the week after the following deities; Sunday, the Sun; Monday, the Moon; Tuesday, Tuesco (God of War); Wednesday, Woden (God of Storms); Thursday, Thor (God of Thunder); Friday, Freya (Goddess of Love); Saturday, Saturn (God of Time).

The word week is from Wikon (German); = change, succession.

Dominical Letter

The Roman Calendar makers placed the letters A.B.C.D.E.F.G. against the day of the year. The letter which stands against the Sundays is known as the Dominical Letter. In Leap year since no letter is set opposite the added day one letter appears for January and February and the letter preceding for the remainder of the year.

Jan. 1 (Sun.) is C. C therefore is the Dominical letter for Jan. and Feb. Since no letter is assigned for Feb. 29, Sunday from then on comes under the letter, B, which is the letter for the remainder of the year.

Golden Number—The calendar for the phases of the moon is nearly the same every 19 years which is known as the Metonic Cycle. The Golden Number is its number in this Metonic Cycle. To find the Golden Number for 1961 add 1 to 1961 and divide by 19. The remainder, 5, is the Golden Number.

Epact is the age of the moon on some fixed day of the calendar year. (January 1 Gregorian Calendar).

Solar Cycle

In the Julian Calendar the days of the year recur on the same days of the week in 7 x 4 years; 28 years was called the Solar Cycle. It is little used now.

The Cycle of the Indiction, is a non-astronomical cycle of 15 years. Following Diocletian's reconquest of Egypt in A.D. 297 a provincial census was taken and repeated every 15 years.

Julian Period

This is a combination of the Solar Cycle of 28 years, the Metonic or Lunar Cycle of 19 years, and the Cycle of the Indiction, 15 years. These are all supposed to begin on January 1 of the Julian Calendar which was 4713 B.C. The Julian days are numbered consecutively from Greenwich mean noon on January 1, 4713 B.C.



STANDARD TIME ZONES IN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES

SOLAR, SIDEREAL AND STANDARD TIME

Apparent Time. — By apparent noon is meant the moment when the sun is on the meridian, and apparent time is measured by the distance in degrees that the sun is east or west of the meridian. Apparent time is given by the sun dial.

Mean Time. — The interval between apparent noon on two successive days is not constant, and a clock cannot be constructed to keep apparent time. For this reason *mean time* is used. The length of a mean day is the average of all the apparent days throughout the year. The *real sun* moves about the ecliptic in one year; an imaginary *mean sun* is considered as moving uniformly around the celestial equator in one year. The difference between the times that the real sun and the mean sun cross the meridian (i.e. between apparent noon and mean noon) is the *equation of time*.

Sidereal Time. — This is time as determined from the stars. It is *sidereal 0 hours* when the Vernal Equinox or First of Aries is on the meridian. In accurate time-keeping the moment when a star is on the meridian is observed and the corresponding mean time is then computed with the assistance of the Nautical Almanac or by the help of the table on page 17. (See notes, page 8). When a telescope is mounted equatorially the position of a body in the sky is located by means of the sidereal time.

Standard Time. —

Owing to the great breadth of the Dominion the difference in solar time in various parts of the country is adjusted by the creation of Standard Time Zones, one hour in width, fixed between arbitrary lines running north and south, 15° of longitude apart, the time observed in each zone being an exact number of hours slow from Greenwich.

Example: When it is 8 a.m. by Pacific Time it is 12 noon by Atlantic Time and 4 p.m. at Greenwich.

There are seven zones divided as follows, reckoning from Greenwich:

Standard Times as used by the railways in traversing these Zones are in general use. Solar time around the globe varies four minutes with each degree of longitude.

ECLIPSES DURING 1961

In 1961 there will be four eclipses, two of the sun and two of the moon.

1. A total Eclipse of the Sun on February 15th. This eclipse will be visible partially in all of Europe and North Africa and most of Asia; the path of totality begins off the east coast of France and sweeps across Southern Europe and Russia and ends in Siberia.

2. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon in the morning of March 2, visible generally in the Pacific Ocean, Australasia and Asia. The beginning will be visible in North America except the extreme eastern part, but the ending will be visible only in the extreme north-western corner of North America. Generally speaking, over the eastern part of the continent the moon will have set and the sun risen before the moon is well into the umbra.

3. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun on August 11. The central line sweeps across the South Atlantic and ends in Antarctica.

NOTES ON THE ASTRONOMICAL TABLES

The purpose of the following notes is to explain the tables and charts which are not self-explanatory and to illustrate the uses to which they may be put.

Sunrise, Sunset, Moonrise and Moonset (see tables pp. 9 to 15). These tables give Standard Times of risings and settings for the places to which they apply (i.e. E.S.T. for Toronto and Ottawa, C.S.T. for Winnipeg, P.S.T. for Vancouver). The calculations are for the upper limb (edge) of the sun and they are made for the astronomical (sea) horizon. Accordingly, the times will not be correct if the observer is below or above the level of his visible horizon at the point of sunrise or sunset.

The times of sunrise and sunset for a place other than those given in the table can be obtained with a fair degree of precision by proceeding as follows: Choose two places in the table which bracket your latitude; take the times of sunrise (or sunset) of each of these; change each to Local Mean Time by adding (or subtracting) 4 minutes of time per degree for the number of degrees of longitude by which that place is east (or west) of the standard meridian of its time zone. Then, by finding the change per degree of latitude difference, find the local Mean Time for your own latitude. Finally add (or subtract) 4 minutes for each degree of longitude which you are west (or east) of your standard meridian to obtain Standard Time.

If the place has a latitude nearly equal to that of one of the places listed (say within half a degree) the procedure may be simplified: For each degree by which the place is west (or east) of the listed place add (or subtract) 4 minutes to the tabulated value of the listed place. This gives the time of sunrise or sunset in the Standard Time of the listed place; change to the Standard Time of the required place if it is in a different time zone.

Example: Required to find the time of sunset on Jan. 1, 1961 for Quebec City (lat. 46° 48' N. long. 71° 13' W).

From tables: Ottawa 16 30, Winnipeg 16 37. Ottawa is about ¼° west of 75th meridian; Winni-

peg is about 7° west of 90th meridian. Therefore L.M.T. for Ottawa is 16 30 - 3 = 16 27, and L.M.T. for Winnipeg is 16 37 - 23 = 16 09. Difference in latitude of Winnipeg and Ottawa is about 5°. Thus sunset is earlier from the latitude of Ottawa northward by about 3½ minutes per degree of latitude and, since Quebec is about 1½° farther north than Ottawa, the L.M.T. of sunset at Quebec is 16 27 - 5 = 16 22. Since Quebec is about 3¼° east of the 75th meridian the E.S.T. of sunset at Quebec is 16 22 - 15 = 16 07.

Note: Since Montreal and Ottawa are at about the same latitude the E.S.T. of sunrise and sunset for Montreal may be taken as simply 9 minutes earlier than at Ottawa.

The times of moonrise and moonset are not easily obtained with precision for places other than those listed in the tables because of the more rapid motion of the moon. However, by using the Ottawa, Winnipeg or Vancouver values for Eastern, Central or Western Canada respectively, the errors will usually be less than half an hour.

Azimuth of the Sun at Rising and Setting (see table on page 16). Only twice a year, namely about March 21 and September 23, does the sun rise and set more or less exactly in the east and the west respectively. It is of interest and sometimes of value to know the position of sunrise and sunset at other times. The table on page 16 tabulates these positions in degrees east of north and west of north for sunrise and sunset respectively for a selection of latitudes and dates. For latitudes and dates other than those tabulated take simple proportions.

Time when the Sun is on the Meridian (see table on page 17). If Standard Time is to be obtained from a sun-dial or from a noon marker or, conversely, if direction is to be obtained by the sun from a knowledge of time, it is necessary to know the time when the sun is on the meridian, i.e., due south. The correction to the sun-dial is given for every third day in the table on page 17. (Take simple proportions for intermediate days.) Add this to

Apparent Solar Time to obtain Local Mean Time. To obtain Standard Time add (or subtract) 4 minutes per degree of longitude by which you are west (or east) of your standard meridian.

Example: At Toronto on February 3rd what is the Eastern Standard Time when a vertical peg casts a shadow due north?

It is then noon Apparent Solar Time. Correction to the sun-dial from table is +13m.51s. Therefore Local Mean Time is 12h. 13m. 51s. and since Toronto is $4\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ west of the 75th meridian, the Eastern Standard Time is 12h. 13m. 51s. + 17m. 40s. = 12h. 31m. 31s.

Sidereal Time (see table on page 17). For any given moment the local sidereal time may be obtained with an accuracy of a second or two from the table of the Ephemeris of the Sun as follows: In this table choose the date next preceding the given moment. For this date apply the correction to the sun-dial with sign reversed to the sun's apparent right ascension, then add or subtract 12 hours. The result is the Greenwich Sidereal Time (G.S.T.) for 0h G.M.T. on the tabular date. Advance this time by the G.M.T. of the required moment and by 3m 57s per day (about 10s per hour) for the interval between the tabular date and the required moment; finally retard the time by the longitude west expressed in hours, minutes and seconds.

Example: Required to find the local sidereal time for Toronto (longitude 5h, 17m 40s W.) at 22 40 E.S.T. Sept. 12.

G.M.T. of required moment is 3 40 Sept. 13. From table 0h G.M.T. Sept. 13 is 11h 23m 07s + 3m 52s + 12h = 23h 26m 59s. Therefore 3h 40m G.M.T. Sept. 13 is 23h 26m 59s + 3h 40m + $3\frac{1}{4} \times 10s = 27h 07m 36s$ G.S.T. Therefore local sidereal time is 27h 07m 36s - 5h 17m 40s = 21h 49m 56s.

Altitude of the Sun at Meridian Passage (see table on page 17). For architectural or gardening purposes it may be of value to know the maximum (i.e. noon-time) altitude of the sun at various seasons. This is obtained from the table of the sun's apparent declination which is listed for every third day. (Take simple proportions for intermediate days.) Proceed as follows: Subtract your latitude (presumed in the northern hemisphere) from 90° ; add or subtract (as indicated by the sign) the value of the sun's declination for the proper date.

Example: How high is the sun at noon on November 24th at Quebec City (latitude $46^{\circ} 48'$)? $90^{\circ} - 46^{\circ} 48' = 43^{\circ} 12'$. Sun's declination on Nov. 24 is $-20^{\circ} 27'$. Therefore sun's altitude at noon is $43^{\circ} 12' - 20^{\circ} 27' = 22^{\circ} 45'$.

References. The tables and charts in the Canadian Almanac are intended for simple astronomical observations. To make more extensive observations the following are recommended: The Observer's Handbook, The American Ephemeris and Nautical Almanac, Norton's Star Atlas and Reference Handbook.

MAGNETIC DECLINATION

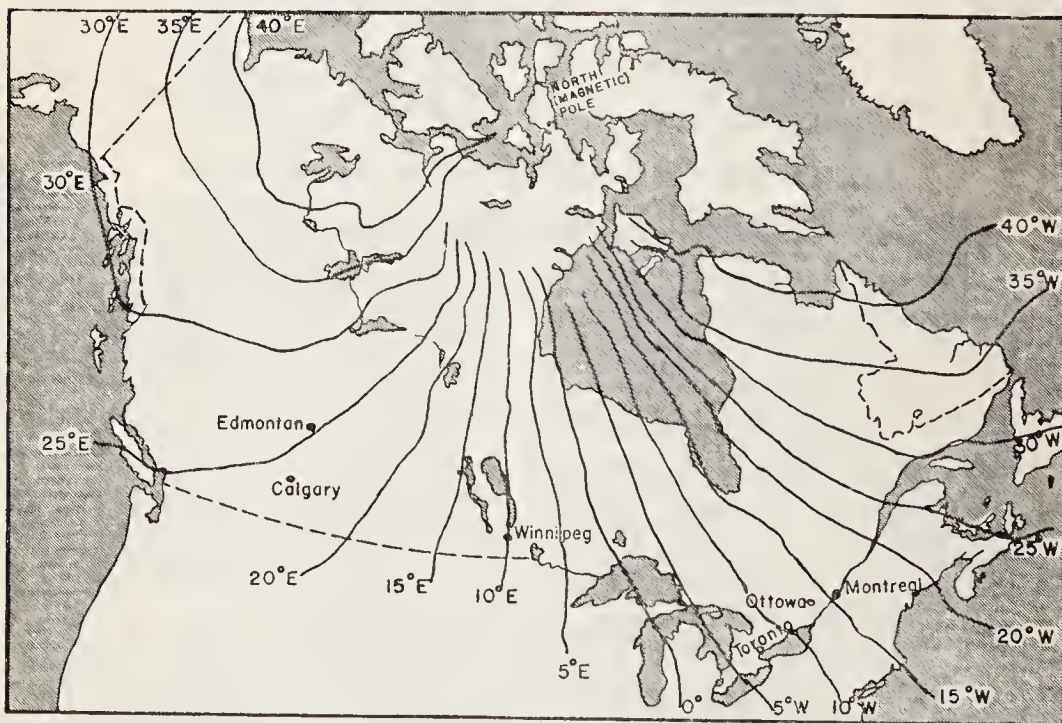


CHART OF MAGNETIC DECLINATION

A compass needle, even when unaffected by extraneous magnetic fields, does not in general point due north. The amount and direction by which its direction differs from true north is called magnetic declination or variation. The declination varies with the position of the observer and also varies slowly with time. The above chart gives the values of declination over the Dominion as of 1940. These

values may be used for 1961 unless accuracy of better than 1° is required.

Example: What is the direction of the compass needle at the southern tip of Lake Manitoba?

From the chart this point is about $\frac{1}{4}$ of the way from the line of $10^{\circ}E$ declination towards the line of $15^{\circ}E$ declination. Therefore the declination is $11^{\circ}E$, i.e., the needle points 11° east of true north.

ASTRONOMY IN CANADA

During the past fifty years Canada has established and maintained a prominent place in the field of astronomy, both professional and amateur.

Canada possesses three major astronomical observatories: the Dominion Observatory at Ottawa, the Dominion Astrophysical Observatory at Victoria, and the David Dunlap Observatory at Toronto. The Dominion observatories are operated under the Department of Mines and Technical Surveys and the David Dunlap Observatory is operated by the University of Toronto.

The Dominion Observatory at Ottawa has been operating since 1905. Its principal astronomical functions at the present time are the time service, solar research, and meteoric research. Its largest telescope is a 15-inch refractor.

The principal telescope of the Dominion Astrophysical Observatory is a 72-inch reflector completed in 1918. With this instrument much important research concerning the motion and nature of stars has been accomplished.

The David Dunlap Observatory was completed in 1935, a gift to the University of Toronto from the late Mrs. David Dunlap in memory of her husband. The large telescope at this observatory is a 74-inch reflector. Research problems include stellar motions, stellar spectroscopy, and the study of variable stars.

The telescopes at Toronto and Victoria are exceeded in size by the Mount Palomar 200-inch telescope, the Lick 120-inch telescope, the Mount Wilson 100-inch telescope, all in California, and the 82-inch telescope of the McDonald Observatory in Texas.

Radio telescopes that provide a new way of studying the heavenly bodies are now being operated by the National Research Council, Defence Research

Board, Queen's University and the University of Toronto.

As well as these major observatories where telescopic observations are made every clear night, there are a number of observatories primarily devoted to astronomical instruction. Among these are the Hume Cronyn Memorial Observatory of the University of Western Ontario at London (10-inch refractor), the Observatory of the University of Saskatchewan at Saskatoon (7-inch refractor) and the Observatory of the Royal Astronomical Society of Quebec City (16-inch reflector).

Public visiting hours at these observatories are as follows: Dominion Astrophysical Observatory at Victoria, Saturday evenings throughout the year; the Dominion Observatory, Ottawa, Saturday evenings, April to October inclusive, and during day-time, Monday to Friday, from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and 2:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. local time; David Dunlap Observatory at Toronto, Saturday evenings April 1 to October 31, and Wednesday afternoons throughout the year; Hume Cronyn Observatory at London, first Saturday evening in each month; University of Saskatchewan Observatory at Saskatoon and the R.A.S.C. Observatory at Quebec, one hour every clear evening.

There are other smaller observatories at Universities and Colleges which are reserved for student instruction.

In addition to professional astronomers there are many amateurs in Canada who follow this interesting study. Most of these are members of the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada (see Index), membership in which is open to all who are interested in the subject.

METEORS, METEORITES, AND METEOR SHOWERS

A meteor or "shooting star" appears momentarily in the sky when a particle from beyond the earth enters the earth's atmosphere at a high velocity. Most visible meteors are caused by particles smaller than a grain of wheat, and these small particles are completely vaporized in the atmosphere at a height of about 80 miles. A spectacular meteor, known as a fire-ball, is caused by a larger body which may fall to the earth's surface in one or more pieces. Particles seen thus to fall, or subsequently found by analysis to be of this nature, are called meteorites.

Meteorites may be divided into two main classes—the irons, which are almost pure nickel-iron, and the stones. Any meteorite is characterized by a dark, smooth crust caused by the fusion of the outer part.

Meteors may be observed on any clear, moonless night at an average rate of about ten an hour. At times there occur meteor showers, when meteors are seen with much greater frequency and appear to radiate from a particular part of the sky which is called the radiant. This is an effect of perspective, the radiant being the vanishing point of the parallel tracks of the meteors. Meteor showers usually repeat themselves annually, and have nearly always been associated with the orbits of comets. When the earth passes through or near the orbit of a comet it inter-

cepts straggling particles which cause meteors. The principal meteor showers for the northern hemisphere are listed below.

The study of meteors and meteorites adds to our knowledge of the nature and origin of the solar system and also to our knowledge of the earth's outer atmosphere.

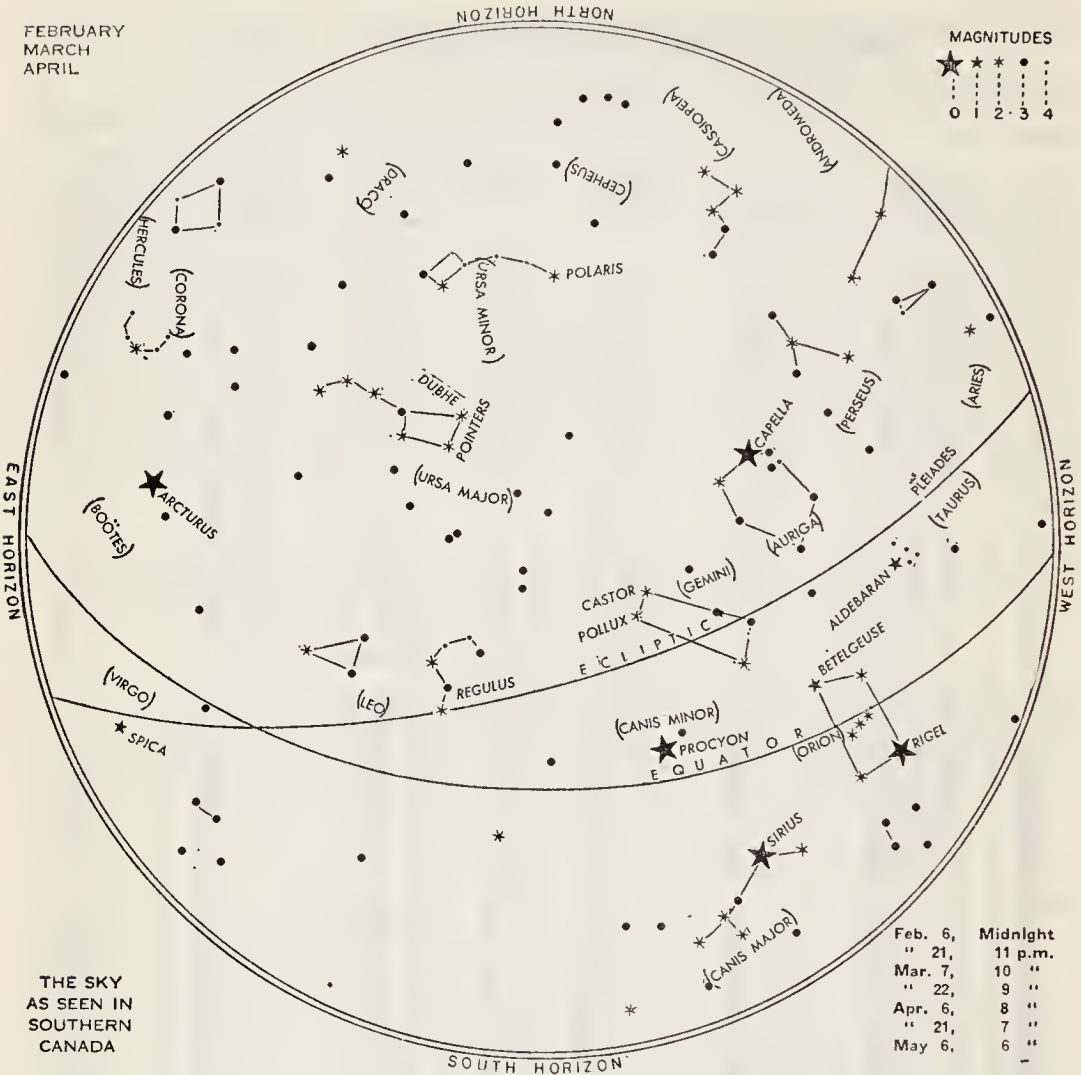

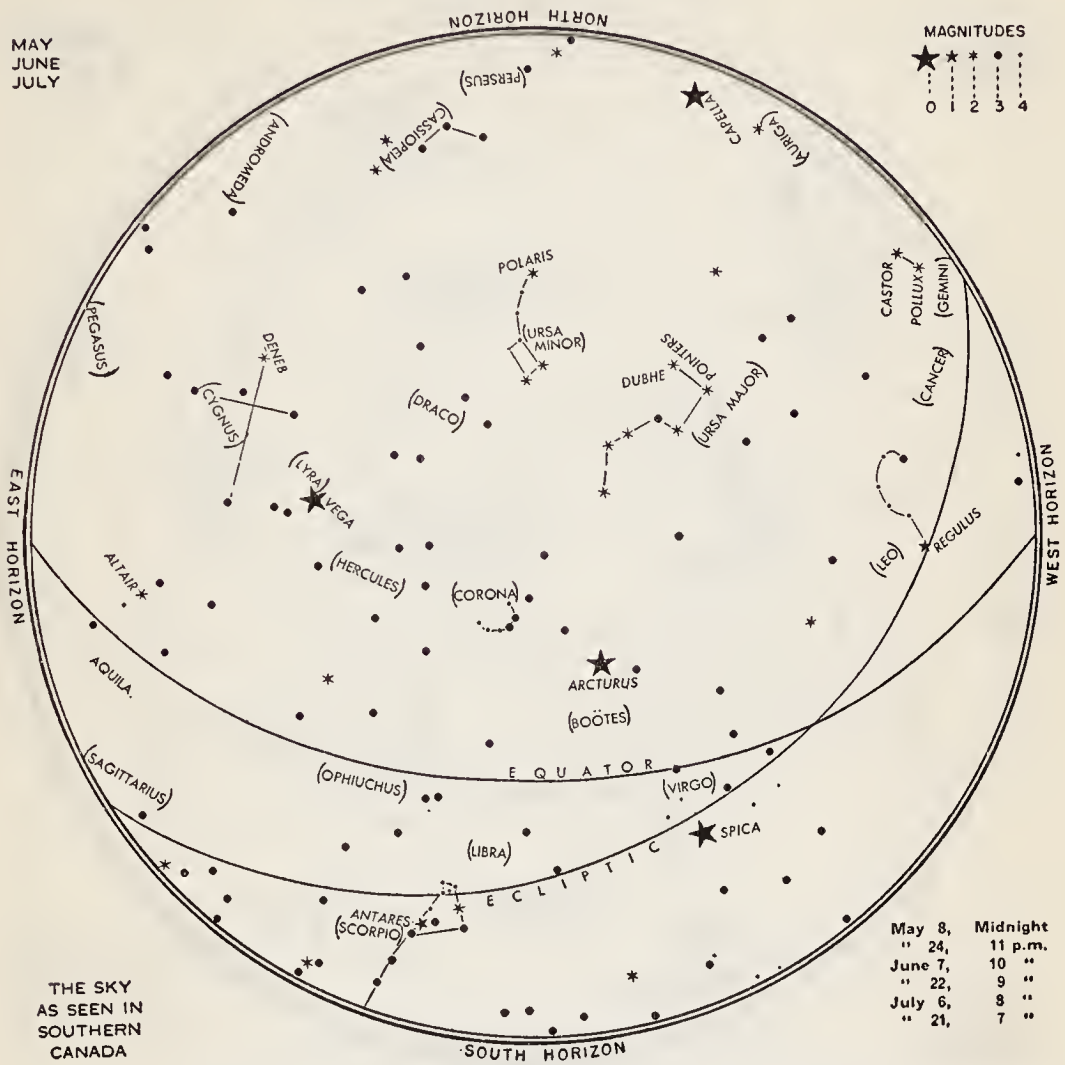

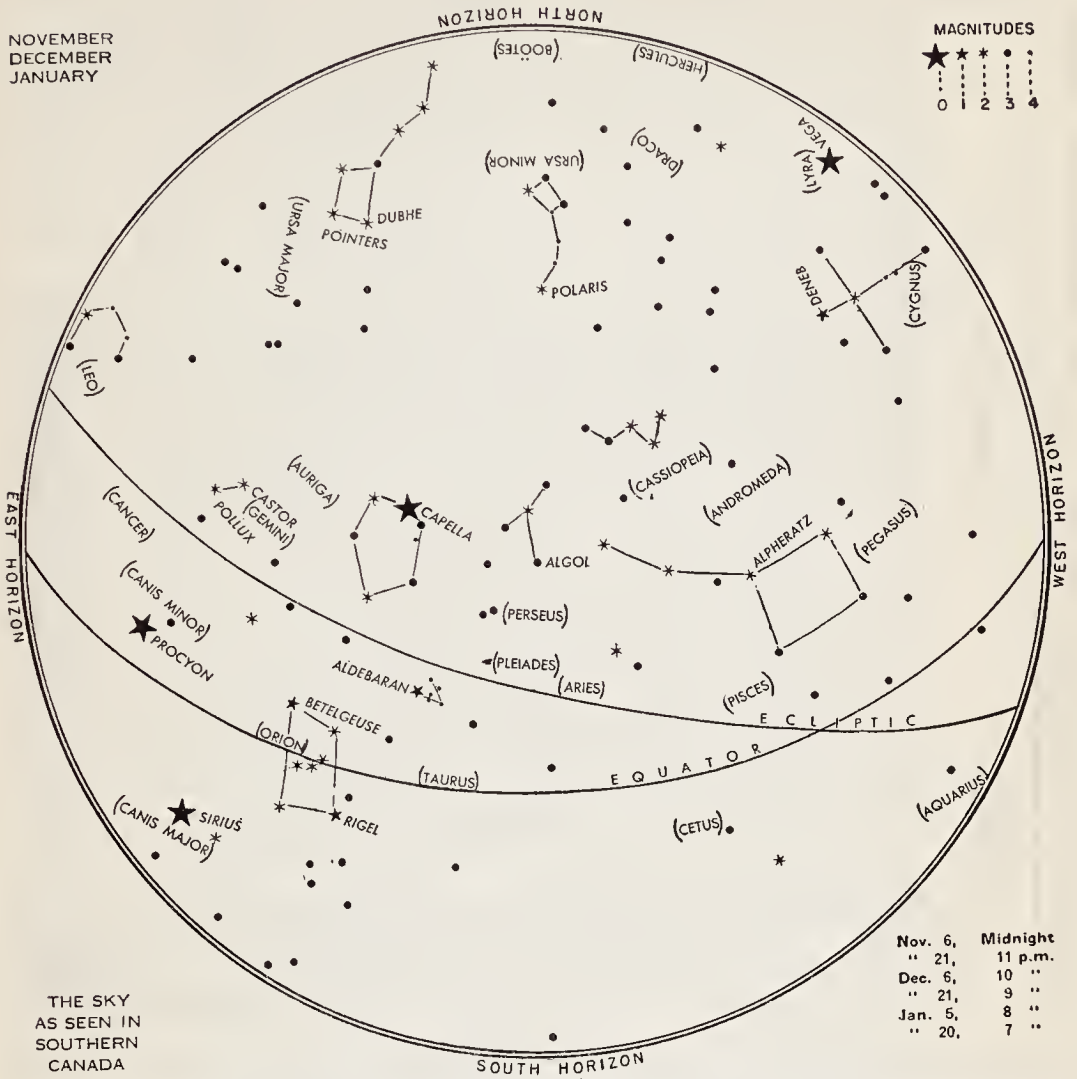

PUBLIC STATUTORY HOLIDAYS IN CANADA

DOMINION OF CANADA. — In accordance with the provisions of the Interpretation Act, the Bills of Exchange Act, the Civil Service Act, the Victoria Day Act as amended, the Dominion Day Act, and the Remembrance Day Act, the holidays to be observed throughout Canada are as follows:

BILLS OF EXCHANGE ACT

- (a) In all the provinces of Canada,
 - Sundays
 - New Year's Day
 - Good Friday
 - Labour Day
 - Thanksgiving Day
 - Easter Monday
 - Victoria Day
 - Remembrance Day
 - Christmas Day
 - " (b) In the province of Quebec in addition to the aforesaid days—
 - The Epiphany,
 - The Ascension,
 - All Saints' Day,
 - Conception Day."
- In any of the provinces any day proclaimed by the Lieutenant-Governor for a holiday, fast or thanksgiving; also any non-judicial day by virtue of a statute of the province.

In any city, town, municipality or other organized district, any day appointed as a civic holiday by the council or other administrative body.

When New Year's Day, Christmas Day, Dominion Day fall on Sunday the following day is observed as the holiday.

By proclamations dated January 31, 1957, the first Monday immediately preceding the twenty-fifth day of May was fixed for the celebration in Canada of the Sovereign's birthday in the year 1957 and each year thereafter, and the second Monday in October in the year 1957 and each year thereafter was appointed a day of general thanksgiving.

INTERPRETATION ACT

"In every Act, unless the context otherwise requires: (1) "holiday" includes Sundays, New Year's Day, the Epiphany, Good Friday, The Ascension, All Saints' Day, Conception Day, Easter Monday, Ash Wednesday, Christmas Day, the birthday or the day fixed by proclamation for the celebration of the birthday of the reigning sovereign, Victoria Day, Dominion Day, the first Monday in September, designated Labour Day, Remembrance Day, and any day appointed by proclamation for a general fast or thanksgiving."

CIVIL SERVICE ACT

The holidays to be observed in and by the civil service are: Sundays; New Year's Day; Good Friday; Easter Monday; Victoria Day; The birthday of the reigning Sovereign, or the day fixed by proclamation by the Governor in Council for the celebration thereof; Dominion Day; Labour Day; Remembrance Day; Christmas Day.

Any day appointed by proclamation by the Governor in Council to be observed as a general fast or thanksgiving or as a holiday. R.s.c. 1952, c. 48, s. 45.

PROVINCIAL HOLIDAYS generally coincide with the Dominion list with the following additions:

- ALBERTA, Boxing Day.
- BRITISH COLUMBIA, Boxing Day.

MANITOBA, December 26th (Boxing Day); Arbour Day is not a holiday.

NEWFOUNDLAND, St. Patrick's Day (Mar. 17); St. George's Day (Apr. 23); Empire Day and Her Majesty's Birthday (the Monday before May 25); Memorial Day (July 1); General Holiday (July 12); St. John's Regatta Day (first Wednesday in August); Boxing Day (Dec. 26).

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND, Boxing Day (Dec. 26).

QUEBEC, In Quebec, Act 11 George VI, Chap. 19, passed in 1947, states that: By Holidays are understood the following days:—

Sundays; New Year's Day; The festival of the Epiphany; Ash Wednesday; Good Friday; Easter Monday; Ascension Day; St. John the Baptist's Day, being the 24th of June or the 25th of June if the 24th is a Sunday; All Saints' Day; Conception Day; Christmas Day; The celebration of the Sovereign's birthday; The first day of July, being the anniversary of Confederation or the second day of July, if the first be a Sunday; Labour Day, the first Monday of September; Any other day fixed by proclamation of the Lieutenant-Governor in Council as a public holiday or as a day of thanksgiving.

YUKON, Discovery Day (August 17).

BANKS IN CANADA AND THEIR BRANCHES

BANK OF CANADA

Following one of the recommendations contained in the report made to the Government in 1933 by the Royal Commission on Banking and Currency, headed by the Right Hon. Lord Macmillan, P.C., K.C., there was enacted by Parliament in the 1934 session, Chapter 43 of the Statutes of that year, incorporating the Bank of Canada as a central bank of issue and rediscount. The institution opened for business on March 11, 1935.

The Bank's functions are largely, though not entirely, regulative. It has the sole right of note issue.

Until May 1st, 1940, the Bank was required to maintain a reserve in gold coin and bullion of 25 per cent of the amount of its outstanding notes and deposit liabilities. On that date, under the authority of the War Measures Act, the reserve requirement was suspended by the Governor-in-Council. At present, under The Currency, Mint and Exchange Fund Act, the Bank is not required, unless the Governor-in-

Council otherwise prescribes, to maintain a fixed ratio of gold or foreign exchange to its liabilities. The Bank now owns no gold. The Bank acts as the fiscal agent of the Government of Canada and, by agreement, may also act as banker or fiscal agent of the government of any province.

The management consists of a Board of Directors composed of a Governor, a Deputy Governor and 12 Directors, the Deputy Minister of Finance by virtue of his office being a member of the Board.

In 1938 an amending Act was passed providing that all Directors be appointed by the Government and that the entire capital of \$5,000,000 shall be owned by the Government of Canada.

Since 1955, all profits of the Bank have been payable into The Consolidated Revenue Fund.

Directors, officers and employees of chartered banks and persons employed in the public service may not hold office as a Director.

THE INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT BANK

The purpose of this bank is to ensure the availability of credit to industrial enterprises which may reasonably be expected to prove successful but might not otherwise be able to get credit on reasonable terms and conditions. The Bank is not intended to compete with the Chartered Banks and other lending institutions, but rather to supplement the facilities offered by these institutions.

It may lend to firms engaged in

- (i) manufacturing, processing, assembling, installing, overhauling, reconditioning, altering, repairing, cleaning, packaging, transporting or warehousing of goods,
- (ii) logging, operating a mine or quarry, drilling, construction, engineering, technical surveys or scientific research,
- (iii) generating or distributing electricity or operating a commercial air service, or the transportation of persons, or,
- (iv) supplying premises, machinery or equipment for any business mentioned in subparagraph (i), (ii) or (iii) under a lease, contract or other arrangement whereby title to the premises,

machinery or equipment is retained by the supplier.

The Bank may accept any form of collateral security including real property, and its loans are usually for capital assistance rather than working funds, and for a period of several years, in contrast to the typical short term loans in commercial banking.

The Industrial Bank is a subsidiary of the Bank of Canada, and was created by Act of Parliament on August 15th, 1944.

The capital stock of twenty-five million was subscribed by the Bank of Canada and is fully paid. By virtue of its power to issue bonds and debentures and other provisions of its Act of Incorporation the aggregate of the total direct liabilities of the Bank, including bonds and debentures issued by the Bank, and of the total contingent liabilities of the Bank in the form of guarantees given or underwriting agreement entered into by it, shall not at any time exceed three times the aggregate amount of the paid-up capital and the Reserve Fund.

The President of the Bank is the Governor of the Bank of Canada. The Head Office is in Ottawa, and the General Manager's Office is in Montreal.

CHARTERED BANKS

Chartered banks in Canada are incorporated by Special Act of the Canadian Parliament and governed by the Bank Act (chapter 48 of the Statutes of 1953-1954), which continues the charters in force until July 1st, 1964. The Act specifies the business and powers of the banks and the types of transactions in which they may legally engage.

Banks may make loans on many types of security, or without security. They are prohibited from lending money upon the security of shares of the capital stock of a bank, and they may not lend on mortgages and hypothecs except as authorized by or under the National Housing Act 1954, the Farm Improvement

Loans Act and the Veterans Business and Professional Loans Act, although security upon real or immovable property may be taken as additional collateral for debts previously incurred by the bank.

A bank is not permitted to issue or re-issue its notes payable to bearer and intended for circulation. Notes formerly issued by the banks for circulation in Canada and outstanding are redeemable by Bank of Canada upon presentation. Notes formerly issued by the banks for circulation outside Canada and outstanding are redeemable by the issuing bank upon presentation.

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WEIGHTS, MEASURES, AND STANDARDS IN CANADA

The Weights and Measures Act, R.S.C. 1952, Chapter 292, Sections 9, 12 and 13, establishes the standards of length, weight and capacity for Canada. Multiples or fractions in addition to those shown below can be found by referring to Sections 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13. The standard measure of length is the yard; one third of the yard is the foot; the twelfth part of the foot is an inch; and the cord contains one hundred and twenty-eight cubic feet. The standard measure of weight is the pound (avoirdupois); one-sixteenth of the pound is an ounce ($437\frac{1}{2}$ grains); one seven thousandth of the pound is a grain; a cental or hundred weight is one hundred pounds; a ton is two thousand pounds; an ounce troy is four hundred and eighty grains. The standard measure of capacity, for liquids or otherwise, is the gallon that contains ten Canadian standard pounds

weight of distilled water weighed in dry air against brass weights of density 0.30346 of a pound per cubic inch with the water and air at sixty-two degrees Fahrenheit and the barometer at thirty inches. The quart contains one-fourth of the gallon; the pint contains one-eighth of the gallon; a bushel contains eight gallons; and the hundred and sixtieth part of the gallon by volume is a fluid ounce.

IMPERIAL MEASURE

The gallon, sometimes known as the "Imperial Gallon," contains 277.42 cubic inches. This compares with the American gallon of 231 cubic inches (liquid) and 268.80 cubic inches (dry). The more common comparison between liquid gallons places the Canadian about 20% greater in volume than the U.S. The common conversion fraction is 6 to 5 in favour of the Canadian gallon.

FRUIT, VEGETABLES AND HONEY ACT AND REGULATIONS

Chapter 62 of the Statutes, 1935

The provisions of this Act are intended to promote orderly marketing throughout the fruit, vegetable and honey industries and to assist in the settlement of disputes through the medium of an Arbitration Board. The Act is applicable to interprovincial or foreign trade only.

There follows a brief summary of the provisions of the Act and Regulations:

1. Establishment of grades or standards of quality for fruits, vegetables and honey.

2. Prescribes conditions relative to inspection, grading, marking of packages, shipment, and sale of fruit, vegetables and honey produced within or without Canada.

3. Establishment of standard packages for various kinds of fruits, vegetables and honey.

4. Provides for the detention of fruit, vegetables, honey or packages in respect of which an offence under the Act or Regulations has been committed.

5. Prescribes penalties for contravention of any provisions of the Act or Regulations.

6. Licensing of brokers, commission agents and dealers, handling fruits and vegetables in interprovincial and international trade.

7. Provides for a commercial fruit and vegetable inspection service at both shipping point and destination for which appropriate fees are charged for certificates issued.

8. Registration of honey packers and persons assembling honey and to prescribe fees for honey inspection certification and licensing.

9. Provides for the inspection and certification of imported produce for which a fee is charged for customs clearance purposes or to assist in determining if contract stipulations have been met.

10. The compulsory inspection and certification of fruits, vegetables and honey exported out of Canada for which a fee is charged.

11. Provides for amendment and addition to regulations through Ministerial Order.

THE CANADA GRADES FOR SHELL EGGS

The grade of an egg is determined by three factors—interior quality, shell appearance and weight.

Canada Grade A1—excellent interior quality; shell clean, normal in shape and sound in construction; (an optional grade).

Canada Grade A—A very good interior quality, shell clean, practically normal in shape and sound in construction.

The weight divisions for Canada Grade A1 and Canada Grade A—

Extra Large Size—each egg weighs at least two and one-quarter ounces.

Large Size—each egg weighs at least two ounces

Medium Size—each egg weighs at least one and three-quarter ounces, but less than two ounces.

Small Size—each egg weighs at least one and one-half ounces, but less

than one and three-quarter ounces.

Pee wee Size—each egg weighs less than one and one-half ounces. (This size does not apply to Canada Grade A1).

Canada Grade B—standard for interior quality less than Canada Grade A; shell must be reasonably clean and may be slightly abnormal in shape, but of sound construction; each egg weighs at least one and three-quarter ounces.

Canada Grade C—standard for interior quality less than Canada Grade B; shell may be dirty but not cracked; no minimum weight. (Canada Grade A Small Size or Canada Grade A Pee wee Size may be packed in this grade.)

Canada Grade Cracks—meets standards for at least Canada Grade C, except shell is cracked, but contents not leaking.

2b. Aerogrammes

In addition to the regular air mail services above described, a further service is provided through the use of Aerogrammes which may be sent to all countries, at 10 cents each. Aerogrammes may not be registered.

2c. International Air Parcel Post

For postage rates, regulations and destinations to which International Air Parcel Post service is available enquire at Post Office.

2d. "Other Articles" Air Mail

An "Other Articles" air mail service for "Printed Matter", "Commercial Papers", "Samples", "Newspapers", and "Literature for the Blind" is available from Canada to other countries.

Rates of postage are as follows:

1. Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Republic of Ireland, Bermuda, Mexico, Central and South America and the West Indies —10c each ounce
2. Europe —15c each ounce
3. All other countries —20c each ounce

3. Business Reply Envelopes and Cards.

At the larger post offices firms sending out letters enquiries and order forms to the Canadian public may enclose an addressed business reply envelope having printed on the face of the envelope the words "Business Reply Envelope, no postage stamp necessary if mailed in Canada, 6c. postage will be paid by", and the name and address of the firm, and bearing a return postage impression.

Similarly business firms may send out business reply cards, postage being collected from the business firm, upon return of the card, at the rate of 5c. each.

4. Special Delivery of Letters and Parcels

LETTERS.—Special Delivery letters bearing in addition to regular postage ordinary postage stamps of the value of 10 cts., and the words "Special Delivery" legibly written on the address side of the envelope, may be accepted in Canada for Special Delivery at any post office in Great Britain the United States, United States Possessions and Territories and within the letter carrier delivery area of the following places in Canada.

PARCELS. The special delivery fee on parcels mailed in Canada for delivery at the above cities in Canada is 20c.

5. Registration

The scale of Registration Fees in addition to the Postage on all classes of matter except parcel post, to addresses in Canada is as follows:—

Indemnity up to \$25.00, fee.....	20c.
“ “ \$50.00, fee.....	30c.
“ “ 75.00, fee.....	35c.
“ “ 100.00, fee.....	40c.

In the case of registered articles posted in Canada addressed to places in the United States or to other Postal Union Countries, the registration fee is as follows:—

United States: Indemnity not exceeding....	\$25.00.....	20c.
Other Postal Union Countries: Indemnity not exceeding....	\$ 8.17.....	20c.

An acknowledgment of receipt may be obtained by the sender of a registered article on payment of a special fee of 10 cents, in addition to the postage and registration fee, if the Acknowledgment of Receipt is asked for when the registration article is posted, or for 20 cents if asked for afterwards.

INDEMNITY FOR REGISTERED ARTICLES

Indemnity will be paid, provided the loss of the registered article is reported to the Department within one year of the date of posting, upon receipt of certain sworn statements of the persons concerned.

Canada.—In the case of registered articles posted in Canada for delivery in Canada, indemnity covers not only loss, but also rifling and damage. Indemnity is provided at scale of charges shown above.

SECOND CLASS MATTER

6. Transient Newspapers

Transient newspapers and periodicals include all newspapers and periodicals published in Canada, other than *Canadian newspapers sent from the office of publication and British, Canadian and foreign newspapers posted by newsdealers.* When addressed to any place within the Dominion, the United States or Mexico, and, when published in Canada, and addressed to any place in Great Britain, or to places within the Empire, France, Spain and North and South America they must be prepaid at the following rate by Postage Stamps:— 2c for the first four oz., and 1c for each additional 4 oz., or fraction of 4 oz. to each separate address.

To countries other than those mentioned above the rate is 2c for first 2 oz. and 1c for each additional 2 oz., or fraction thereof, to each separate address.

Transient newspapers and periodicals not published in Canada are subject to the ordinary printed matter rate of 2c for first 2 oz. and 1c for each additional 2 oz. or fraction thereof, to each separate address for all countries except Canada, U.S.A. and Mexico.

7. Newspapers and Periodicals

Printed and published in Canada and posted from the office of publication.

Special rates of postage, dependent upon the frequency of publication and the circulation per issue apply to mailings of authorized newspapers and periodicals made by publishers. For particulars, consult local Postmaster.

8. British and Foreign Newspapers posted by Newsdealers in Canada

British and foreign publications as well as Canadian publications, if authorized by the Department may be posted by newsdealers in Canada to subscribers in Canada at the rate of 4 cents per lb. They cannot however be posted at that rate for local delivery at places where there is a letter carrier service. Newsdealers may also post recognized Canadian newspapers and periodicals to regular subscribers in Great Britain and places within the Empire (except Australia), at the bulk rate of 4 cents per pound.

THIRD CLASS MATTER

9. Printed Matter, Circulars, Samples, Miscellaneous Matter

Third class matter, described as under, may pass between places in the Dominion of Canada or outside of Canada upon prepayment of 2c for first 2 oz.; 1c each additional 2 oz.

DEFINITION OF THIRD CLASS MATTER

Matter (other than newspapers and periodicals), wholly in print without reference to process, such as circulars, catalogues, calendars, hand-bills, books,

pamphlets, printed forms, maps, paper patterns, prints, drawings, etc., the following partly-written and partly-printed matter:—militia and school returns, customs manifests, voters' lists, school or college examination papers and educational exercises passing between colleges and extra-mural students, etc. To come within the class of Third Class Matter the material printed upon must be either paper, cardboard or parchment.

REGULATIONS RE UNSEALED PACKAGES

No letter or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter may be sent or enclosed in any such package or thing mentioned, and the same must be sent in covers open at the ends or sides, or otherwise so put up as to admit of the contents being, if necessary, easily withdrawn for examination by the officers of the Post Office to ensure compliance with this provision (if enclosed in sealed envelopes notched at the ends or sides, or with the corners cut off, letter rate of postage will be charged).

DEFINITION OF CIRCULARS

Circulars are communications in print, or produced by a multiplying process easy to recognise, but not direct from a typewriting machine, which are issued in identical terms to several individuals. A circular may, without becoming liable to a higher rate of postage, have a written date and signature, and may have the name of the addressee repeated in writing inside Reproductions or imitations of hand or typewritten matter, in order to be accepted as circulars, must be handed in at the post office wicket, in a number not less than twenty identical copies, separately addressed. Failure to comply with either of these conditions will subject the article to letter rate of postage.

PAPER FOR BLIND

Writing paper specially prepared for the use of the blind transmitted from an Institution for the Blind in Canada (recognized as such by the Post Office Department, Ottawa) to blind persons for their own use is allowed to pass free of postage.

LIMIT OF WEIGHT, ETC.

The limit of weight for a packet of third class matter is 6 lbs. 9 oz. and in no case must the length and girth combined exceed 6 feet.

10. Books, Limits of Weight, etc.

A Book Packet may contain any number of separate books. Limit of weight for printed books, sewn or bound is 11 lb. Limit of size, (domestic)—in no case must the combined length and girth exceed 6 feet. For all other countries no packet may exceed 3 feet in the combined length, breadth, and depth, but the greatest dimension must not exceed 2 feet, unless in the form of a roll when the length and twice the diameter must not exceed 3 feet 3 inches, but the greatest dimension must not exceed 2 feet 8 inches.

Book packets must be put up in such a way as to admit of contents being easily examined and must not contain any letter or sealed enclosure.

Books for the use of the blind are allowed to pass free of postage.

Printed or written *requests for return* are recognized on books, third class matter, samples and packages of merchandise addressed to places within the Dominion, or in the United States and same will be *returned direct to the sender*, subject to the payment by the sender, on delivery to him through the Post Office, of the full amount of postage to which the article was in the first place liable, together with any charges rated thereon on account of any deficiency in the original prepayment.

Printed matter should be fully prepaid at the time of posting and will not be forwarded unless at least partly prepaid.

11. Samples, Canada, U.S.A. and Mexico

Samples of Merchandise and Goods not having saleable value and not exceeding 1 lb. in weight, may be posted in Canada, to be forwarded to any place in the Dominion, U.S.A., or Mexico, on prepayment of a rate of 2c for the first 2 oz. and 1c for each additional 2 oz. or fraction thereof under the following regulations:

Size limit: Canada 18 in. x 8 in. x 4 in., or if in the form of a roll 18 inches in length by 6 inches in diameter. Other countries: length, breadth and depth combined, 3 ft. but greatest dimension must not exceed 2 ft. Roll length and twice diameter 3 ft. 3 in. but greatest dimension must not exceed 2 ft. 8 in.

Samples must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, &c., which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen, or such like material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened.

There must be no writing upon or in any packet of samples, except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender, a trade mark or number and the price of the articles, or such words as may be necessary to indicate precisely the origin and nature of the merchandise.

Articles of saleable value even when intended to serve as samples, or goods sent for sale or in execution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or any article sent by one private individual to another, which are not actually trade samples, are not admissible.

Liquids (except intoxicating liquors), oils, etc., may be sent by mail in the Dominion if put up carefully in strict accordance with the directions given in the Postal Guide and ascertainable at any post office.

12. Samples for Great Britain and Foreign Countries

Samples of Merchandise, when addressed to places in Great Britain and other countries, must not exceed 1 lb. in weight, and should be fully prepaid. Size limit, length, breadth and depth combined, 3 ft. but greatest dimension must not exceed 2 ft. Roll length and twice diameter 3 ft. 3 in. but greatest dimension must not exceed 2 ft. 8 in.

Samples of liquids (except intoxicating liquors), oils, glass, etc., are admitted as samples provided they are put up in strict accordance with the directions given in the Postal Guide.

13. Commercial Papers, British and Foreign Post

Commercial papers mailed in Canada, for delivery in Canada, are liable to the letter rate of postage up to a weight of 16 ozs. and 1c per 2 oz. or fraction thereof, after. To all other countries the rate is 1 cent per 2 ozs. but each packet must have a minimum prepayment of 6 cents covering a weight of 10 ozs., commercial papers should be fully prepaid. Size limit,

breadth and depth combined, 3 ft. but greatest dimension must not exceed 2 ft. Roll length and twice diameter 3 ft. 3 in. but greatest dimension must not exceed 2 ft. 8 in. The weight must not exceed 4 lbs. 6 ozs.

"Commercial Papers" are understood to comprise all papers or documents written or drawn wholly or partly by hand (except letters or communications of the nature of letters or other papers or documents having the character of an actual and personal correspondence,) documents of legal procedure, deeds drawn up by public functionaries, copies of extracts from deeds under private seal and (whether written or printed on stamped or unstamped paper) way wills, bills of lading, invoices and other documents of a mercantile character, documents of insurance and other public companies, also open letters and post cards of ancient date which have already fulfilled their original purpose, also copies thereof.

Parcel Post packets totally unpaid will be sent to the Undeliverable Mail Office.

Parcels must be prepared for mailing in such manner that the contents can be easily examined.

It is desirable that the sender's address should appear inside the parcel and on the cover. This must be kept distinct from the address proper.

Redirected parcels or other articles posted in Canada prepaid at parcel post rates are chargeable with new postage at the rate which would have been chargeable had they been originally mailed from the office of redirection to the new address, except in cases where the forwarding address is within the province to which the parcel was originally addressed when no redirection charge is to be made.

The limit of weight for a Parcel Post packet is 25 pounds. Limit of size, 3 feet in length, width or depth, but the combined length and girth must not exceed 6 feet. For Special Delivery, see note 4.

Parcel Post packets cannot be registered but can be insured (Insurance is free up to \$50. For fees and regulations for insurance of parcels, see paragraph No. 17 "Insurance".)

Parcels up to and including 12 ounces in weight are subject to a minimum charge of 5c covering a weight of 4 ounces, plus 1c for each ounce in excess of 4 ounces.

Parcels over 12 ounces but not exceeding one pound in weight are liable to the one pound rate to the Province of destination.

Parcels are liable to 1c an ounce on excess weight over even pound until the next pound rate or group rate is reached.

*The Maritime Provinces, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P.E.I., are considered as one Province. Consult local Postmaster for rate on parcels to Post Offices served by Air Stage Services.

15. Parcel Post to Great Britain and Other Countries

Closed parcel mails are exchanged by direct service between Canada and the following countries: Argentina, Australia, Bahamas, Bermuda, Barbados, Belgium, Brazil, British Guiana, China, Cuba, Denmark, Dominica, Republic of Ireland, Fiji, Finland, Great Britain and Northern Ireland, France, Germany, Grenada, Hong Kong, Italy, Jamaica, Japan, Leeward Islands, Mexico, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, St. Lucia, St. Pierre and Miquelon, St. Vincent, Sweden, Trinidad and Tobago, Union of South Africa and Venezuela.

Parcels may also be sent to and received from any country with which the British Post Office maintains a parcel post service.

Parcels for the Union of South Africa, British West Indies, Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Netherlands Antilles, Haiti, and Central and South American countries may be forwarded via New York, and when intended for transmission by that route should be legibly marked "Via New York".

For rates enquire at Post Office.

Parcels for, or sent via, Great Britain, pass exclusively in the mails conveyed by ships on the direct route between Canada and the United Kingdom.

Parcels for Argentina, Australia, Bahamas, Barbados, Bermuda, British Guiana, Brazil, Cuba, Dominica, Fiji, Grenada, Jamaica, Leeward Islands, New Zealand, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, St. Kitts, Trinidad and Tobago, Union of South Africa and Venezuela, are forwarded direct from Canada and via the United States according to rate of prepayment.

LIMIT OF WEIGHT AND SIZE

General limit of weight—20 lbs.

For parcels addressed to countries where limit of weight is restricted to 11 lbs. or 15 lbs., enquire at Post Office.

Limit of size—3½ feet in length, width or depth, but in no case may the length and girth combined exceed 6 feet.

Every parcel must be fully prepaid by postage stamps or postage meter impressions.

A Parcel must not contain a letter or any writing in the form of a letter, or any explosive, combustible, or dangerous articles, or intoxicating liquor.

For each Parcel a Customs Declaration 91B must be securely affixed to the parcel to which it relates.

Non-adhesive Customs Declaration 15B and Despatch Note 16B must also accompany parcels to most countries. Enquire at Post Office.

Parcels must be handed to the Postmaster; in no case should they be dropped into a letter box or other receptacle for mail matter. Parcels to Great Britain may be insured. See par. No. 17. "Insurance".

RATES TO GREAT BRITAIN AND NORTHERN IRELAND FOR CIVILIANS

The parcel post rates to the United Kingdom are 1 lb. 25c, 2 lb. 45c, 3 lb. 60c, 4 lb. 80c, 5 lb. 95c, 6 lb. \$1.10 7 lb. \$1.30, 8 lb. \$1.45, 9 h. \$1.65, 10 lb. \$1.80. Over 10 lb. up to 15 lb. \$2.25 and over 15 lb. up to 20 lb. \$3.25.

16. Parcel Post for United States

General merchandise (parcel post) addressed to places in the United States or its possessions (except the Philippine Islands) is liable to postage at the rate of fourteen cents a pound up to 10 lbs.; over 10 lbs. and up to 15 lbs., \$1.75 per parcel.

Parcels up to and including 12 ounces in weight are subject to a minimum charge of 5c covering a weight of 4 ounces, plus 1c for each ounce in excess of 4 ounces.

Over 12 ounces, full pound parcel post rates apply.

Parcels must have a Customs Declaration attached and should be open to inspection (unsealed), but sealed parcels may be accepted providing sender's name and address is shown by printed label or rubber stamp and nature of contents indicated.

17. Insurance of Parcel Post

Parcels posted in Canada for delivery in Canada may be insured up to \$50.00 without insurance fee, if so requested by the sender.

If the sender desires to insure such parcels in excess of \$50 up to \$100, the regular insurance fee of 12 cents to cover the additional insurance must be prepaid.

FOR DELIVERY IN UNITED STATES

6 cents for insurance exceeding \$5 and not exc'd'g \$25.

FOR DELIVERY IN OTHER COUNTRIES

Parcels posted in Canada for delivery in Australia, Bahamas, Barbados, Belgium, Bermuda, British Guiana, Denmark, Dominica, Finland, France, Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Grenada, Ireland (Republic of), Italy, Jamaica, Japan, Leeward Islands, Netherlands (The), New Zealand, Norway, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Sweden, Trinidad and Tohago —also parcels intended for transmission via England addressed to foreign countries to which Great Britain extends insurance may be insured against loss, riding or damage while in the custody of the postal service at the following rates: 12 cents for insurance not exceeding \$50.

30 cents for insurance exceeding \$50 and not exceeding \$100.

Particulars as to articles which cannot be accepted for insurance or insured against damage, may be ascertained from the local Postmaster.

18. C. O. D. Service in Canada only

Parcels may be sent C.O.D. within Canada wherey charges due the sender up to \$100.00 may be collected from the addressee and remitted to the sender by post office money order. C.O.D. parcels must be mailed at an accounting post office but may be addressed to any post office in Canada or to any rural route. A C.O.D. tag, procurable at all accounting post offices, must be used. Rural routes are for this purpose considered as accounting post offices. C.O.D. fees are as follows: 10c if not more than \$2.00 is to be collected; 15c if more than \$2.00 but not more than \$50.00 is to be collected; 30c if more than \$50.00 is to be collected. C.O.D. fee must be paid by postage stamps affixed by the sender, or by meter impression and is in addition to the ordinary postage. The sender of a C.O.D. parcel may include postage and C.O.D. fee in the amount to be collected. It is forbidden to send articles C.O.D. which have not been ordered or requested by the addressee and articles may not be examined before payment of the C.O.D.

The charges on C.O.D. articles may be increased, decreased or cancelled upon request of sender, made through Postmaster at office of mailing.

19. Prohibited Articles

All explosive, dangerous or destructive substances intoxicating liquors, glass bottles or glass in any form liable to break, and all matter subject to speedy decay, all obscene or immoral books, publications, pictures, etc., libellous post cards and letters the covers of which bear words of an offensive character, and letters and circulars relating to illegal lotteries or other fraudulent schemes. Enquiry should be made at the Post Office in regard to transmitting game, raw furs, skins, plumage, etc., hy mail.

21. Domestic Money Orders

Post Offices in Canada preceded by a number of four or five figures lower than 25,000 or having one letter and three figures are authorized to carry on complete Post Office money order business.

Post Offices at which Money Orders are issued for payment in Canada only for amounts under \$16.00 are distinguished by "†".

The fees on Money Orders issued in Canada for payment in Canada, Anguilla, Antigua, Bahamas, Barbados, Bermuda, British Guiana, British Honduras, Caicos Islands, Cayman Islands, Dominica, Grenada, Jamaica, Montserrat, Nevis, St. Christopher (St. Kitts), St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Tohago, Trinidad, Turks Islands, and Virgin Islands are as follows:—

States and dependencies can be obtained at any Post Office authorized to transact money order business.

22. Foreign Money Orders

The fees on Money Orders issued in Canada for payment in Great Britain, Republic of Ireland and Commonwealth countries not included in the above are as follows:

In the case of Mexico and Poland, exchange in terms of United States dollars is to be collected in addition to the foreign fee.

23. International Reply Coupons

International Reply Coupons may be purchased in Canada for 15c each and are exchangeable in any country of the Universal Postal Union for stamps representing the postage payable on the first unit of

weight of a letter transmitted in the International Mails. An International Reply Coupon is exchangeable at any Canadian post office for 6c in Canadian postage stamps.

24. British Commonwealth Reply Coupons

British Commonwealth Reply Coupons exchangeable for stamps representing the postage on a single rate letter from any country within the British Commonwealth to Canada, can be purchased at any post office, for 6c each for prepaying replies to letters.

Persons receiving British Commonwealth Reply Coupons may exchange them at any Canadian post office for 5c in Canadian Postage.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS

Savings business may be transacted at approximately 1500 Post Offices. Any person may deposit any sum from \$1.00 provided the total deposit standing in his name in the books of the Bank does not exceed \$10,000.00, exclusive of interest. Deposits may be made in the joint names of two or more persons with survivorship privileges. Some Trust Companies receive funds and deposits for guaranteed investments, and the loaning of such trust funds is restricted by law to securities authorized by the Trustee Act. The loaning of company funds is not so restricted.

The principal function of Loan Companies is the loaning of funds on first mortgage security, the money thus made available for development purposes being obtained mainly by the sale of debentures to the investing public and by Savings Department deposits

1-2 ELIZABETH II, CHAP. 49

A brief summary follows. A copy of the Act may be procured from The Registrar, Trade Marks Office, Ottawa, Ont. It is suggested a competent attorney be consulted. The names of a number of such appear in these pages.

This Act came into force July 1, 1954, and repeals The Unfair Competition Act.

INTERPRETATION

In these regulations: "the Act" means the Trade Marks Act; "applicant" means the original applicant or the transferee last recognized under rule 58; "Journal" means the Trade Marks Journal; "trade mark agent" means a person whose name is on the register of trade mark agents.

TRADE MARK

Trade Mark means a mark that is used by a person for the purpose of distinguishing or so as to distinguish wares or services manufactured, sold, leased, hired or performed by him from those manufactured, sold, leased, hired or performed by others; a certification mark; a distinguishing guise, or a proposed trade mark.

CERTIFICATION MARKS

A certification mark may be adopted and registered only by a person who is not engaged in the manufacture, sale, leasing or hiring of wares or the performance of services such as those in association with which the certification mark is used.

DISTINGUISHING GUISE

(1) a shaping of wares or their containers, or
 (2) a mode of wrapping or packaging wares, the appearance of which is used by a person for the purpose of distinguishing or so as to distinguish wares or services manufactured, etc., by him from those . . . of others.

CONFUSING MARK OR NAME

For the purposes of this Act a trade mark or trade name is confusing with another trade mark or trade name if the use of such first mentioned trade mark or trade name would cause confusion with such last mentioned trade mark or trade name in the manner and circumstances described in section 6.

UNFAIR COMPETITION

No person shall make a false or misleading statement tending to discredit the business, wares or services of a competitor; direct public attention to his wares, services or business in such a way as to cause or be likely to cause confusion in Canada, at the time he commenced so to direct attention to them, between his wares, services or business and the wares, services or business of another; pass off other wares or services as and for those ordered or requested; make use, in association with wares or services, of any description that is false in a material respect and likely to mislead the public as to (i) the character, quality, quantity or composition, (ii) the geographical origin, or (iii) the mode of the manufacture, production or performance of such wares or services; or do any other act or adopt any other business practice contrary to honest industrial or commercial usage in Canada.

PROHIBITED MARKS

No person shall adopt in connection with a business, as a trade mark or otherwise, any mark as designated in section 9 of the Act (q.v.).

REGISTERABLE TRADE MARKS

A trade mark is registrable, subject to certain conditions, if it is not

- (a) a word that is primarily merely the name or the surname of an individual who is living or has died within the preceding thirty years;
- (b) whether depicted, written or sounded, either clearly descriptive or deceptively misdescriptive in the English or French languages of the character or quality of the wares or services in association with which it is used or proposed to be used or of the conditions of or the persons employed in their production or of their place of origin;
- (c) the name in any language of any of the wares or services in connection with which it is used or proposed to be used;
- (d) confusing with a registered trade mark; or
- (e) a mark of which the adoption is prohibited under the terms of the Act.

A trade mark that is not registrable by reason of paragraph (a) or (b) above is registrable if it has been so used in Canada by the applicant or his predecessor in title as to have become distinctive at the date of filing an application for its registration.

PERSONS ENTITLED TO REGISTER TRADE MARKS

16 (1)

Any applicant who has filed an application in accordance with section 29 for registration of a trade mark that is registrable and that he or his predecessor in title has used in Canada or made known in Canada or has duly registered in his country of origin, in association with wares or services is entitled, subject to this Act, to secure its registration in respect of such wares or services, unless at the date on which he or his predecessor in title first so used it or made it known it was confusing with

- (a) a trade mark that had been previously used in Canada or made known in Canada by any other person;
- (b) a trade mark in respect of which an application for registration had been previously filed in Canada by any other person; or
- (c) a trade name that had been previously used in Canada by any other person.

16 (2)

Any applicant who has filed an application in accordance with section 29 for registration of a trade mark that is registrable and that he or his predecessor in title has duly registered in his country of origin and has used in association with wares or services is entitled, subject to section 37, to secure its registration in respect of the wares or services in association with which it registered in such country and has been used, unless at the date of filing of the application in accordance with section 29 it was confusing with

- (a) a trade mark that had been previously used in Canada or made known in Canada by any other person;

- (b) a trade mark in respect of which an application for registration had been previously filed in Canada by any other person; or
- (c) a trade name that had been previously used in Canada by any other person.

16 (3)

Any applicant who has filed an application in accordance with section 29 for registration of a proposed trade mark that is registrable is entitled, subject to sections 37 and 39, to secure its registration in respect of the wares or services specified in the application, unless at the date of filing of the application it was confusing with:

- (a) a trade mark that had been previously used in Canada or made known in Canada by any other person;
- (b) a trade mark in respect of which an application for registration had been previously filed in Canada by any other person; or
- (c) a trade name that had been previously used in Canada by any other person.

APPLICATIONS FOR REGISTRATION

An applicant for the registration of a trade mark shall file with the Registrar an application containing

- (a) a statement in ordinary commercial terms of the specific wares or services in association with which the mark has been or is proposed to be used;
- (b) in the case of a trade mark that has been used in Canada, the date from which the applicant or his named predecessors in title, if any, have so used the trade mark in association with each of the general classes of wares or services described in the application;
- (c) in the case of a trade mark that has not been used in Canada but is made known in Canada, the name of a country of the Union in which it has been used by the applicant or his named predecessors in title, if any, and the date from and the manner in which the applicant or such predecessors have made it known in Canada in association with each of the general classes of wares or services described in the application;
- (d) in the case of a trade mark that is the subject in another country of the Union of a registration or an application for registration by the applicant or his predecessor in title on which the applicant bases his right to registration, particulars of such application or registration and, if the trade mark has neither been used in Canada nor made known in Canada, the name of a country in which the trade mark has been used by the applicant or his named predecessor in title, if any, in association with each of the general classes of wares or services described in the application;
- (e) in the case of a proposed trade mark, where the application is not accompanied by an application for registration of a person as a registered user, a statement that the applicant intends to use such trade mark in Canada;
- (f) in the case of a certification mark, particulars of the defined standard that the use of the mark is intended to indicate and a statement that the applicant is not engaged in the manufacture, sale, leasing or hiring of wares or the performance of services such as those in association with which the certification mark is used;
- (g) the address of the applicant's principal office or place of business in Canada, if any, and if the applicant has no office or place of business in Canada, the address of his principal office or place of business abroad and the name and address in Canada of some person or firm to whom any notice in respect of the application or registration may be sent, and upon whom service of any proceedings in respect of the application or registration may be given or served with the same effect as if they had been given to or served upon the applicant or registrant himself.
- (h) unless the application is for the registration only of a word or words not depicted in a special form, a drawing of the trade mark and such number of accurate representations of the trade mark as may be prescribed; and
- (i) a statement that the applicant is satisfied that he is entitled to use the trade mark in Canada in association with the wares or services described in the application.

The Registrar shall refuse an application for the

registration of a trade mark if he is satisfied that (a) the application does not comply with the requirements of section 29;

(b) the trade mark is not registrable; or

(c) the applicant is not the person entitled to registration of the trade mark because it is confusing with another trade mark for the registration of which an application is pending, and where the Registrar is not so satisfied, he shall cause the application to be advertised in the manner prescribed.

Within one month from the advertisement of the application, any person may, upon payment of the prescribed fee, file a statement of opposition with the Registrar.

REGISTRATION OF TRADE MARKS

When an application for registration of a trade mark other than a proposed trade mark is allowed the Registrar shall thereupon register the trade mark and issue a certificate of its registration.

When an application for registration of a proposed trade mark is allowed, the Registrar shall give notice to the applicant accordingly and shall register the trade mark and issue a certificate of its registration upon receipt of a declaration that the applicant, his successor in title or a person approved as a registered user under subsection (7) of section 49 has commenced the use of the trade mark in Canada in association with the wares or services specified in the application.

If the applicant for registration of a proposed trade mark fails to file the declaration referred to in subsection (2) within six months after the notice by the Registrar referred to in subsection (2), his application shall be deemed to be abandoned.

Registration of a trade mark shall be made in the name of the applicant or his transferee; the day on which registration is made shall be entered on the register, and the registration takes effect on that day.

AMENDMENT OF THE REGISTER

The Registrar may, on application by the registered owner of a trade mark made in the prescribed manner, make certain amendments to the register and justify an extension of time.

TRANSFER

A trade mark, whether registered or unregistered, is transferable, and deemed always to have been transferable, either in connection with or separately from the goodwill of the business and in respect of either all or some of the wares or services in association with which it has been used.

INDUSTRIAL DESIGNS

Summarized from the Industrial Design and Union Label Act

REGISTRATION

Address Applications to Commissioner of Patents, Ottawa

The proprietor applying for the registration of any design shall deposit with the Minister a drawing in triplicate and description in duplicate of the same, together with a declaration that the same was not in use to his knowledge by any other person than himself at the time of his adoption thereof. Drawings not to exceed 13 x 8 inches wide

A design may be registered if it is not identical with or does not so closely resemble any other design already registered as to be confounded therewith.

Certificate of Registration when issued shall be sufficient evidence of the design, of the originality of the design, of the name of the proprietor, of the person named as proprietor being proprietor, of the commencement and term of registry, and of compliance with the provisions of this Act.

If the author of any design shall, for a good and valuable consideration, have executed the same for some other person, such other person shall alone be entitled to register it.

EXCLUSIVE RIGHT

The registration gives exclusive right for the design.

DURATION

Exclusive right shall be valid for a term of 5 years, but may be renewed, before, or within 3 months after the expiration of the said term of 5 years, for a further period of 5 years or less on payment of the fee prescribed for extension of time: Provided that the whole duration of the exclusive right shall not exceed 10 years in all.

REGISTERED USER

A person other than the owner of a registered trade mark may be registered as a registered user thereof for all or any of the wares or services for which it is registered.

The use of a registered trade mark by a registered user thereof in accordance with the terms of his registration as such in association with wares or services manufactured, sold, leased, hired or performed by him, or the use of a proposed trade mark as provided in subsection (2) of section 39 by a person approved as a registered user thereof, is in this section referred to as the "permitted use" of the trade mark.

The permitted use of a trade mark has the same effect for all purposes of this Act as a use thereof by the registered owner.

FEES

The following fees shall be payable on application to the Registrar under this Act:

An application to amend the registration of a trade mark by extending the statement of wares or services in respect of which the trade mark is registered.....	15.00
An application to amend the registration of a trade mark solely by correcting or changing the address of the registered owner or a registered user or the name or address of the representative for service of either.....	1.00
An application to vary the registration of a person as a registered user of a trade mark..	5.00
Any other application to amend the registration of a trade mark.....	5.00
A request to the Registrar to recognize the transfer of a trade mark.....	5.00
An application for renewal of the registration of a trade mark.....	15.00
An application for extension of time.....	5.00
An application for transmission of an original file to the Exchequer Court of Canada.....	5.00

ASSIGNMENTS

Designs are assignable in law and either as to the whole interest or any undivided part thereof, by an instrument in writing which shall be recorded on payment of the fees prescribed by the Act. A proprietor may grant and convey an exclusive right to make, use and vend and to grant to others the right to make, use and vend such design within and throughout Canada or any part thereof for the unexpired term of its duration or any part thereof. Such exclusive grant and conveyance shall be called a license, and shall be recorded in like manner and time as assignments.

PROTECTION

In order that any design may be protected, it shall be registered within one year from the publication thereof in Canada, and after registration, the name of the proprietor shall appear upon the article to which his design applies by being marked, if the manufacture is a woven fabric, on one end thereof, together with the letters Rd., and if the manufacture is of any other substance, with the letters Rd., and the year of registration at the edge or upon any convenient part thereof.

The mark may be put upon the manufacture by making it on the material itself, or by attaching thereto a label with the proper marks thereon.

RIGHT OF ACTION

A proprietor of a registered design may maintain action for unwarranted use of the design and penalties are provided for improper application of design, etc.

FOREIGN APPLICATIONS

An application for the registration of an industrial

design filed in this country by any person who has previously, regularly filed an application for the registration of the same industrial design in a foreign country which by treaty, convention or law affords similar privilege to citizens of Canada, shall have the same force and effect as the same application would have if filed in this country on the date on which the application for the registration of the same industrial design was first filed in such foreign country; provided the application in this country is filed within six months from the earliest date on which any such foreign application was filed.

ALTERATION

The registered proprietor of any registered industrial design may apply to the Exchequer Court of Canada for leave to add to or alter any such industrial design in any particular not being an essential particular, and the Court may refuse or grant leave on such terms as it may think fit.

FEES

Fees payable in advance are as follows:

On every application to register a design, including certificate	\$5.00

For each copy of any drawing and for each copy of any drawn copy of an industrial design,—the reasonable expense of preparing the same.	
On every application for the renewal of the rights	

for an industrial design filed under Sect. 10 (2) an additional fee of \$5.00
 If an application is denied, fees will be returned less \$2.00.

TIMBER MARKING ACT

Address communications to the Commissioner of Patents, Ottawa.

Every person engaged in the business of lumbering or the getting out of timber, and of the floating or rafting of the same on the inland waters of Canada, within the provinces of Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick, shall, within one month after he engages therein, select a mark or marks, and cause such mark or marks to be registered in the manner herein provided.

The person who registers such timber mark shall thereafter have the exclusive right to use the same, to designate the timber got out by him and floated or rafted as aforesaid; and he shall put the same in a conspicuous place on each log or piece of timber so floated or rafted.

Marks may be cancelled and shall be assignable in law.

No person, other than the person who has registered the same, shall mark any timber of any description with any mark registered under the provisions of this Act, or with any part of such mark.

Penalties are provided for failing to select, register and use proper marks and for marking timber with a mark registered by another.

FEES

On every application to register a timber mark, including certificate	\$2.00
For each certificate of registration not already provided for	0.50
For each copy of any drawing, the reasonable expenses of preparing the same.	
For recording any assignment	1.00

PATENTS IN CANADA

The Patent Act, Chap. 203, R.S., 1952.

A synopsis of the principal provisions of The Patent Act are given below:—

For a copy of the Act apply to the Commissioner of Patents, Ottawa, who receives all applications and has charge of all records.

As it is difficult for an applicant to properly comply with the regulations of the Patent Office unless he is conversant with the process of obtaining a patent, any person contemplating obtaining a patent is advised to consult one of the patent solicitors whose cards appear in this volume.

DEFINITION OF INVENTION

The Act defines 'invention' as any new and useful art process, machine, manufacture or composition of matter, or any new and useful improvement in the same.

WHO MAY OBTAIN PATENTS

Subject to the various provisions of the Act, any inventor or legal representative of an inventor, of an invention which was:

- (a) not known or used by others before he invented it, and
- (b) not described in any patent or in any publication printed in Canada or in any other country more than two years before presentation of the petition, and
- (c) not in public use or on sale in Canada for more than two years prior to his application in Canada

may obtain a patent granting him an exclusive property in such invention.

Any inventor or legal representative of an inventor who applies in Canada for a patent for an invention for which application for patent has been made in any other country by such inventor or his legal representative before the filing of the application in Canada, shall not be entitled to obtain in Canada a patent for that invention unless his application in Canada is filed:

- (a) before issue of any patent to such inventor or his legal representative for the same invention in any other country; or
- (b) if a patent has issued in any other country within twelve months after the filing of the first application by such inventor or his legal representative for patent for such invention in any other country.

No patent shall issue for an invention which has an illicit object in view, or for any mere scientific principle or abstract theorem.

APPLICATIONS FOR PATENTS

An applicant for a patent shall state in his application, if resident in Canada, his address in Canada. If not so resident, the name and address of some person resident in Canada who has been nominated to represent the applicant or patentee for all purposes of the Act including the service of any proceedings taken under any provision of the Act. This representative may be changed if necessary.

Each application for a patent shall be completed and prepared for examination within twelve months after the filing of the application, and in default thereof, or upon failure of the applicant to prosecute the same within six months after any examiner's action thereon of which notice shall have been given to the applicant, such application shall be deemed to have been abandoned, but it may be reinstated within twelve months after the date on which it was deemed to have been abandoned, if the failure to prosecute the application within the time specified was not reasonably avoidable. An application so reinstated shall retain its original filing date.

TREATY OR CONVENTION RIGHTS

Section 29 (1), provides that an application for a patent filed in Canada by any person entitled to protection under the terms of any treaty or convention relating to patents to which Canada is a party who has, or whose agent or other legal representative has, previously regularly filed an application for a patent for the same invention in any other country which by treaty convention or law affords similar privilege to citizens of Canada, shall have the same force and effect as the same application would have if filed in Canada on the date on which the application for patent for the same invention was first filed in such other country, provided the application in this country is filed within twelve months from the earliest date on which any such application

was filed in such other country or from the thirteenth day of June, 1923.

No patent shall be granted on an application for a patent for an invention which had been patented or described in a patent or publication printed in Canada or any other country more than two years before the date of the actual filing of the application in Canada, or which had been in public use or on sale in Canada for more than two years prior to such filing.

JOINT APPLICATIONS

Section 33 (1), new in 1947, provides that:

(1) Where an invention is made by two or more inventors, and one of them refuses to make application for a patent or his whereabouts cannot be ascertained after diligent enquiry, the other inventor or his legal representative may make application, and a patent may be granted in the name of the inventor who makes the application, on satisfying the Commissioner that the joint inventor has refused to make application or that his whereabouts cannot be ascertained after diligent enquiry.

Where an applicant has agreed to assign a patent when granted to another person or to a joint applicant and refuses to proceed with the application; or where disputes arise between joint applicants as to proceeding with the application, the Commissioner may grant a patent to either one of the parties. Procedure is also outlined when a joint applicant retires or is added.

ASSIGNMENTS—APPLICANTS NOT INVENTORS

A patent may be granted to any person to whom an inventor has assigned or bequeathed by his last will his right to obtain it and the assignee may register such an assignment, after which the application cannot be withdrawn without the consent of the assignee.

IMPROVEMENTS MAY BE PATENTED

Any improvement to a patented invention may be patented.

TERM OF PATENT

The term limit for the duration of patents issued by the Patent Office under this Act is 17 years from the date on which the patent is granted and issued but if the application for the patent was filed prior to August 1, 1935, the term is 18 years from the date on which the patent is granted and issued.

REFUSAL OF PATENTS

Where a patent is refused, the applicant may any time within 6 months' appeal the decision to the Exchequer Court. (Sec. 44)

GOVERNMENT OWNED PATENTS

Sections 20, 21, and 22 are new in 1947, dealing with secret patents and patents relating to Atomic Energy. Section 20 (1) provides that:

20 (1) Any officer, servant or employee of the Crown or of a corporation which is an agent or servant of the Crown, who, acting within the scope of his duties and employment as such, invents any invention in instruments or munitions of war, shall, if so required by the Minister of National Defence, assign to such minister on behalf of Her Majesty all the benefits of the invention and of any patent obtained or to be obtained for the invention; and any other person who invents any such invention may so assign

to such minister on behalf of Her Majesty all the benefits of the invention and of any patent obtained or to be obtained for the invention.

Provision is made that an inventor, other than those mentioned in the preceding section, shall be entitled to compensation. Persons making assignments or having knowledge thereof are deemed to have information entrusted in confidence. Other provisions deal with secrecy. Subsection (15) provides that:

The Governor in Council, if satisfied that an invention relating to any instrument or munition of war, described in any specified application for patent not assigned to the Minister of National Defence, is vital to the defence of Canada and that the publication of a patent therefor should be prevented in order to preserve the safety of the State, may order that such invention and application and all the documents relating thereto shall be treated for all purposes of this section as if the invention had been assigned or agreed to be assigned to the Minister of National Defence.

INFRINGEMENT

Anyone infringing a patent shall be liable to the patentee and to all persons claiming under him for all damages sustained by the patentee or by any such person by reason of such infringement; and the Court may issue an injunction restraining the opposite party from the further use, sale, etc., of the article.

Provision is made that a person who, previous to the granting of the patent has purchased, constructed or acquired any invention shall have the right of using and selling the article, etc.

IMPEACHMENT

If any person has reasonable cause to believe that any process used or proposed to be used or any article made, used or sold or proposed to be made, used or sold by him might be alleged by any patentee to constitute an infringement of an exclusive property or privilege granted thereby, he may bring an action in the Exchequer Court of Canada against the patentee for a declaration that such process or article does not or would not constitute an infringement of such exclusive property or privilege.

PRIORITY OF INVENTIONS

No patent or claim in a patent shall be declared invalid or void on the ground that, before the invention therein defined was made by the inventor by whom the patent was applied for it had already been known or used by some other inventor, unless it is established either that,

(a) before the date of the application for the patent such other person had disclosed or used the invention in such manner that it had become available to the public; or that

(b) such other person had, before the issue of the patent, made an application for patent in Canada upon which conflict proceedings should have been directed; or that

(c) such other person had at any time made an application in Canada which by virtue of section twenty-nine of this Act had the same

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force and effect as if it had been filed in Canada before the issue of the patent and upon which conflict proceedings should properly have been directed had it been so filed.

PATENTED ARTICLE TO BE MARKED OR STAMPED
Every patentee under this Act shall, if possible, stamp or engrave on each patented article sold or offered for sale by him notice of the year of the date of the patent applying to such article, thus—Patented, 1935, or as the case may be.

When, from the nature of any patented article it cannot be so stamped or engraved the patentee shall, if possible, affix to it, or to every package wherein one or more of such articles is or are enclosed, a label marked with the like notice.

When any patented article or material is, from its nature or character such that it cannot be so stamped or engraved and cannot, reasonably, be packaged or labelled the patentee shall, in all descriptive or advertising matter published by him and relating to such patented article or material, insert the like notice.

**ABUSE OF RIGHTS UNDER PATENTS
NOT WORKING A PATENTED INVENTION**

The Attorney General of Canada or any person interested may at any time after the expiration of three years from the date of the grant of a patent apply to the Commissioner alleging in the case of that patent that there has been an abuse of the exclusive rights thereunder and asking for relief under this Act.

The exclusive rights under a patent shall be deemed to have been abused in any of the following circumstances:—

(a) If the patented invention (being one capable of being worked within Canada) is not being worked within Canada on a commercial scale, and no satisfactory reason can be given for such non-working;

Provided that, if an application is presented to the Commissioner on this ground, and the Commissioner is of opinion that the time which has elapsed since the grant of the patent has by reason of the nature of the invention or for any other cause been insufficient to enable the invention to be worked within Canada on a commercial scale, the Commissioner may make an order adjourning the application for such period as will in his opinion be sufficient for that purpose;

(b) If the working of the invention within Canada on a commercial scale is being prevented or hindered by the importation from abroad of the patented article by the patentee or persons claiming under him, or by persons directly or indirectly purchasing from him, or by other persons against whom the patentee is not taking or has not taken any proceedings for infringe-ment;

(c) If the demand for the patented article in Canada, is not being met to an adequate extent and on reasonable terms;

(d) If, by reason of the refusal of the patentee to grant a licence or licences upon reasonable terms, the trade or industry of Canada or the trade of any person or class of persons trading in Canada, or the establishment of any new trade or industry in Canada, is prejudiced and it is in the public interest that a licence or licences should be granted;

(e) If any trade or industry in Canada, or any person or class of persons engaged therein, is unfairly prejudiced by the conditions attached by the patentee, whether before or after the passing of this Act, to the purchase, hire, licence, or use of the patented article, or to the using or working of the patented process;

(f) If it is shown that the existence of the patent, being a patent for an invention relating to a process involving the use of materials not protected by the patent or for an invention relating to a substance produced by such a process, has been utilized by the patentee so as unfairly to prejudice in Canada the manufacture, use or sale of any such materials

LICENSE WHERE INVENTION NOT BEING WORKED

If a case of abuse is established the Commissioner may order a grant to an applicant of a licence on such terms as the Commissioner may think expedient; or if he is satisfied that an invention is not being worked

on a commercial scale within Canada, he may under certain circumstances order the grant of an exclusive licence to an applicant able to provide capital for the working of the patent; or he may order the patent to be revoked

In granting an exclusive licence a royalty shall be arranged payable to the patentee.

CAVEATS

Any Intending applicant for a patent who has not yet perfected his invention and is in fear of being despoiled of his idea, may file in the Patent Office a document setting forth a description of his invention so far as it has proceeded, with or without plans, at his own will, and the Commissioner, on payment of the prescribed fee shall cause that document, which shall be called a "caveat," to be preserved in secrecy with the exception that he shall deliver copies thereof whenever required by the applicant or by any judicial tribunal. The secrecy of the document shall cease when the applicant obtains a patent for his invention.

If application is made by any other person for a patent for any invention with which such "caveat" may in any respect interfere the Commissioner shall forthwith give notice of such application by mail to the person who has filed such "caveat", and such person shall, within three months after the date of mailing the notice, if he wishes to avail himself of the "caveat", file his petition and take the other steps necessary on an application for a patent, and if, in the opinion of the Commissioner, the applications are conflicting, like proceedings may be had in all respects as are by this Act provided in the case of conflicting applications.

Unless the person filing a "caveat" makes application within one year from such filing the Commissioner shall be relieved from the obligation of giving notice and the "caveat" shall thereafter remain as a simple matter of proof as to novelty or priority of invention, if required.

PATENTS ISSUED OUT OF CANADA

The Commissioner shall upon the request of any person who states in writing the name of the inventor, if available, the title of the invention and the number and date of a patent said to have been granted in another country inform such person whether an application for a patent of the same invention is pending in Canada or not.

JURISDICTION OF EXCHEQUER COURT

54. The Exchequer Court of Canada shall have jurisdiction, on the application of the Commissioner or of any person interested, to order that any entry in the records of the Patent Office relating to the title to a patent be varied or expunged.

PATENT ATTORNEYS

A register of attorneys shall be kept in the Patent Office containing the names of all attorneys entitled to represent applicants for patents.

FORFEITED APPLICATIONS

75 (2) A forfeited application may be restored and a patent granted thereon on application to the Commissioner within six months from the incurrance of the forfeiture, on payment with the application for restoration, in addition to the fee payable on the grant of the patent, of a further fee of thirty dollars and the restored application shall be subject to amendment and re-examination.

THE CANADIAN LAW OF COPYRIGHT

WHAT IS COPYRIGHT? Copyright, as its name implies, is merely the right to restrain copying. By the terms of the Canadian Copyright Act, which came into force on January 1st, 1924, copyright subsists in every original literary, dramatic, musical, and artistic work. The work must be original and its author must, at the date of its making, be a British subject, a citizen or subject of a foreign country which has adhered to the Berne Convention, or be resident within the British Dominions; and if in the case of a published work the work was first published within British dominions or in a country which has adhered to the Berne Convention. A work is deemed to be first published in such a country if published there and in some other country simultaneously. The last word is interpreted as allowing fourteen days interval between the publication in the two countries.

Publication means the issue of copies to the public. It does not include the performance in public of a dramatic or musical work, the delivery in public of a lecture, the exhibition in public of an artistic work, or the construction of an architectural work of art. Nor does the issue of photographs and engravings of works of sculpture and architectural works of art constitute publication of such works.

Copyright is defined by the Act as the sole right to produce or reproduce the work or any substantial part thereof in any material form whatsoever, to perform, or in the case of a lecture to deliver, the work or any substantial part thereof in public; if the work is unpublished, to publish the work or any substantial part thereof. Copyright as conferred by the statute includes the sole right to produce, reproduce, perform, or publish translations of the work, the sole right to convert from a dramatic work to a non-dramatic work, to convert from a non-dramatic work or an artistic work to a dramatic work, by way of performance in public or otherwise, to make records, perforated rolls, cinematograph films or other contrivances by means of which the work may be mechanically performed or delivered; to reproduce, adapt and publicly present the work by cinematograph, to communicate it by radio communication, and to authorize any of these acts.

ORIGINALITY. The originality required by the statute relates to the expression of thought. The form in which the work is clothed should be original although the idea or concept upon which the work is based need have no originality whatsoever. Originality in copyright law means that the work must be in a form created by its author and must not be copied from any other work. An illustration of this principle may be furnished in simple terms by reference to copyright in paintings. An artist may paint a particular scene, let us say, in the Laurentian mountains. A second artist may set up his easel on exactly the same spot as the first artist and may paint exactly the same scene, as he sees it. Whatever similarity the two works may have is irrelevant. The second work is an original work and entitled to copyright. If, however, the second artist does not go to the scene itself, but paints his canvas from a view of the first artist's canvas, the second artist not only infringes the first artist's copyright, but is not entitled to copyright in his own work. The same principle, of course, applies to photographs.

In order to understand this principle it will be useful to refer to copyright in compilations and anthologies. An author may decide to write, as an example, a history of the Roman Empire. He cannot know that history other than by reading the sources, original and secondary. From these he compiles a work based upon the works of others, but to which he has lent an original character by his own mental labours, and is therefore entitled to copyright in that work. A second author may go to the same original and secondary sources and compile a like work. He is entitled to copyright in it and does not infringe the copyright of the first compiler provided he uses the first compiler's work fairly and only for checking the accuracy of his own without copying any substantial part of it.

LITERARY WORKS. Literary works are those which are expressed in print or writing such as books, maps, plans, tables and compilations. Copyright in a work includes the title of the work if that title is original and distinctive, but the mere taking of a title apart from any substantial part of a work does not constitute infringement. It is only when the title has become so far identified with a work as to mean that work and that work alone in the minds of the public, that such a taking can be restrained on the ground that the second work is passed off on the public as and for the first work.

DRAMATIC WORKS. Dramatic works include any piece for recitation, choreographic work, or entertainment in dumb show, the scenic arrangement or acting form of which is fixed in writing or otherwise, and any cinematograph production where the arrangement or acting form or the combination of incidents represented give the work an original character. Copyright subsists not only in the actual words of the work but in the dramatic incidents created. In order to be protected as a dramatic work there must be some dramatic action. On this basis a dance step or piece of dramatic action may be protected by a written description of the acts of the performer. In that case there is a double copyright, one in the writing itself as a literary work and the other in the reproduction of the dance or drama, which is thus fixed in writing.

MUSICAL WORKS. Musical works are defined as any combination of melody and harmony, or either of them, printed, reduced to writing or otherwise graphically produced or reproduced. There is, therefore, no copyright in an impromptu until its notation has been fixed in writing or print by the composer. There then exists the right to restrain either its copying in printed form or its public performance.

ARTISTIC WORKS. Artistic works include works of painting, drawing, sculpture and artistic craftsmanship, and architectural works of art and engravings and photographs. Engravings include etchings, lithographs, woodcuts, prints and other similar works not being photographs. An architectural work means any building or structure having an artistic character or design in respect of such character or design, or any model for such building or structure, but the protection is confined to the artistic character and design and does not extend to processes or methods of construction.

INDUSTRIAL DESIGNS. Certain works fall within the definition of artistic works but will not be subject to copyright owing to certain conditions. These are such works as are designs capable of being registered under the Industrial Design and Union Label Act, and used or intended to be used as models or patterns to be multiplied by any industrial process. Designs which do not meet that definition are not industrial designs but artistic works and are subject to artistic copyright. A design is deemed to be used as a model or pattern to be multiplied by an industrial process when it is reproduced or intended to be reproduced in more than fifty single copies not together constituting a set or is to be applied to (1) printed paper hangings, (2) carpets, floor cloths or oil cloths manufactured or sold in lengths or pieces, (3) textile piece goods or textile goods manufactured or sold in lengths or pieces or (4) lace, not made by hand.

LITERARY OR ARTISTIC MERIT. In no case need the subject of copyright possess any degree of literary or artistic merit. It would be highly improper if copyright were to depend on the opinion of any court as to the presence or absence of such an elusive quality, depending solely on individual taste, value, or discretion. The writer of doggerel verse or the mystery novel is entitled to the same copyright as the winner of the Nobel prize in literature, and the author of the comic strip cartoon receives no less protection than do those whose works are hung in the galleries of the nation. In this regard the applicable maxim is *De gustibus non disputandum*.

IMMORAL WORKS. There is one minor qualification to the above remarks. The courts will not protect

immoral, indecent, obscene, or blasphemous works. What falls within the scope of these terms is impossible of definition and must depend upon the susceptibilities and sensibilities of any court adjudicating upon the matter. Thus, thirty years ago Elinor Glynn's *Three Weeks* was held to be an obscene work disentitled to protection. Within the present decade Judge Wolsey, in the United States, promulgated his now famous decision holding that Joyce's *Ulysses* was not an immoral work. *Tempora mutantur nos et nutamur in illis!* It may safely be said in principle that a work which is not purely pornographic but is honest work endeavouring to create an atmosphere, to depict life or to delineate the author's or artist's concept of things as they are or ought to be, would not be held to be immoral and would be entitled to copyright.

OWNERSHIP OF COPYRIGHT. The author of the work is, in general, the first owner of the copyright. The author is the person who actually writes, draws, paints, carves, models, fabricates, or composes the work, unless he is a mere amanuensis or workman. A person who suggests the idea of a work is not its author or even joint author. A ghost writer, therefore, is the author of the biography which he writes and the possibly famous person of whom he writes and who supplies the facts and recollections upon which the biography is based is not entitled to any share in the copyright—unless, of course, there is an agreement to the contrary. It should always be remembered that copyright is a property right and, therefore, contracts can be made respecting its ownership and disposal.

A work of joint authorship is one produced by the collaboration of two or more authors in which the contribution of one author is not distinct from the contribution of the other author or authors. Joint authors, in general, own copyright in equal shares.

In the case of photographs the person or corporation owning the original negative from which the photograph is made is deemed to be the author and therefore the owner of the copyright. The same principle applies in the case of the owner of the original plate from which any records, perforated rolls and other contrivances for mechanically reproducing sounds were derived.

Where a plate or other original of an engraving, photograph or portrait is ordered and made for valuable consideration and pursuant to the order, then, in the absence of agreement to the contrary, the person giving the order and not the author of the work is the first owner of copyright. This is an important principle. In the case of a portrait painter, the subject who gives the order and pays for the portrait receives not only the finished portrait for which he pays, but the copyright in his portrait as well. In the case of photographs the same principle applies. But where the photographer takes photographs on speculation and then endeavours to sell them to the subject, it is the photographer who owns the copyright.

Where the author of the work is in the employment of some other person under a contract of service or apprenticeship and the work was made in the course of his employment by that person, the person by whom the author was employed is, in the absence of any agreement to the contrary, the first owner of the copyright. Where, therefore, a writer on a newspaper or magazine holds a position on the staff of that publication for which he is paid a salary, and writes, let us say, feature articles, the copyright in those articles belongs to the owner of the publication. If, however, an independent or free lance writer is retained to write a series of articles for which the owner of the publication contracts to pay him a certain sum of money, the copyright in those articles belongs to the writer and not to the owner of the publication, because the writer is under a contract for service and not a contract of service.

Where an article or other contribution to a newspaper, magazine or similar periodical, is written by a staff writer acting in the course of his employment and there is no agreement to the contrary, although the copyright in the article resides in the owner of the publication, the writer nevertheless has reserved to him a right to restrain its publication otherwise than as part of a newspaper, magazine or similar periodical. Thus a staff writer may contribute to his newspaper or magazine a series of twenty or

thirty articles. It is then decided to publish those articles in book form. The owner of the publication cannot publish without the author's consent, and the author, not being the owner of the copyright, cannot publish without the consent of the owner of the publication. The only way publication can occur is by mutual agreement, and in such case it is presumed that the author will make his bargain to his best advantage.

There is a distinct cleavage between the intangible right known to the law as copyright, and the ownership of the physical embodiment in which that right resides. This is of particular importance in the case of artistic works. Many painters and sculptors are unaware of the fact that when they sell one of their works they do not necessarily part with the right to reproduce it or, in other words, to issue copies of it to the public. It must also be said that many purchasers of artistic works, particularly art galleries, national and otherwise, take an arbitrary view of the rights they acquire when they purchase an artistic work. Copyright is something entirely apart from the piece of canvas and pigment composing a painting and from the mass of bronze, marble or other material forming a work of sculpture. The sale of the physical object and the transfer of property therein do not of themselves transfer copyright. Copyright is a separate and distinctly existing right and can only be transferred by contract, express or implied. For this reason authors, artists, composers, sculptors and other creators of original works would be well advised to ensure that every sale of their works is made in accordance with a written memorandum. If such a procedure were generally adopted the present habit indulged in by art galleries of selling photographs and other reproductions of artistic works in their possession without compensation to the artist would promptly cease.

But, since the practice of selling photographs is to the publicity advantage of both gallery and artist, artists would be well advised to enter into an agreement with galleries to continue to issue photographs on a royalty basis.

TERM OF COPYRIGHT. The general term of copyright in works published and performed in public during the author's lifetime is the life of the author and fifty years after his death. In the case of a literary, dramatic or musical work or an engraving in which copyright subsists at the time of the death of the author, but which has not been published nor performed, nor in the case of a lecture, been delivered in public before that date, copyright subsists till publication or performance or delivery in public, whichever may first happen, and for a term of fifty years thereafter. It will thus be seen that copyright in unpublished works may extend almost indefinitely.

In case of works of joint authorship copyright subsists during the life of the author who dies last and fifty years after his death. The term of copyright in photographs is fifty years from the making of the original negative. In the case of records, perforated rolls, and other mechanical contrivances for the reproduction of sound, the term is fifty years from the making of the original matrix, plate, or negative.

Copyright in Government publications is fifty years from the date of first publication. This term is provided by statute, but one would be well advised to remember that the Crown may well claim a prerogative right of copyright in perpetuity.

In all cases of published works the term of copyright is subject to a statutory right for any person to reproduce the work on statutory terms at any time after the expiration of twenty-five years or, in the case of works in which copyright subsisted on June 4, 1921, thirty years, from the death of the author. The statutory terms require notice of intention to publish and the payment of royalties calculated at 10 per cent of the published price of the work.

ASSIGNMENT AND LICENCE. Creators of original works may assign their copyright either wholly or partially and either generally or subject to territorial limitations and either for the whole term of the copyright or for any part thereof, and may grant any interest in the right by way of licence. No such assignment or grant is, however, valid unless it is in writing signed by the owner of the copyright or by his duly authorized agent. The owner of copyright may, therefore, split the right into as many component parts as he desires. He may assign

or license the right to publish, to produce or to reproduce his work on one or a million occasions. He may allow reproduction in one or a dozen countries or in one or a thousand cities. He may assign or license to different persons the right to reproduce a work of art by photography and by colour process. He may license its reproduction to one person for a calendar and to another for a Christmas card. In fact there is hardly any limit that can be placed upon the dealings which a copyright owner may have in his copyright if he can find someone who desires a particular part of the right and is willing to pay for it.

Where part of the copyright is assigned, the assignee becomes the owner of that part of the right. If, therefore, the composer of a musical work assigns the right of public performance, the assignee can restrain everybody else from performing the work in public. He cannot, however, restrain the author or the person to whom the author may assign that particular part of the copyright from issuing printed copies of the *musical score* to the public.

An assignee or licensee is wise to register his assignment or licence in the Copyright Office at Ottawa.

DROIT MORAL. The moral right of an author is recognized by the Canadian Copyright Act which provides that, independently of the copyright and even after the assignment, he shall have the right to claim authorship of the work and to restrain distortion, mutilation or other modification in the work which would be prejudicial to his honour or reputation. The statute does not say who is to decide what amount or what quality of distortion, mutilation or modification would be prejudicial to an author's honour or reputation. This is a subject which has received wide treatment in the European and South American countries. There is no corresponding section in the British Copyright Act and, despite the quarter of a century during which the section has found its place in the Canadian statute, no case has been heard by the courts in which this section was invoked. It is interesting to speculate whether the reason for such lack of interest in the section lies in the honesty and integrity of Canadian publishers, performers and owners of other reproducing media or in the apathy and indifference of Canadian authors, artists, and composers.

FORMALITIES. Copyright under the Canadian Copyright Act is automatic and the author of a work need comply with no formality whatsoever in order that he shall possess copyright in his work. The statute contains provisions for registration of copyright but these are permissive only and no registration need take place. There is one minor point on which registration might possibly benefit the author but it is involved in such legal technicalities that it need not be discussed further. It may safely be said that an author is perfectly protected if he entirely neglects to register his copyright.

BERNE CONVENTION. Once a work is made, copyright subsists not only in Canada but throughout the British Commonwealth and all countries which have adhered to the Berne Convention. By arrangement with the United States, Canadian authors are entitled to apply for copyright in that country but their copyright is not automatic. It must be registered and all other requirements of the United States Copyright Act complied with including publication within the United States if the work is a literary work in the English language.

INFRINGEMENT. Infringement consists in doing without the consent of the owner of the copyright anything the sole right to do which is by the Copyright Act conferred on the owner of the copyright. It will thus be seen that it is infringement, without the consent of the owner of the copyright, to issue copies of a work to the public, to perform it in public, to reproduce it in any manner, to make a translation of it, to convert a novel into a dramatic work, to convert a dramatic work into a novel, and so on. But it must be emphasized that copyright is not an absolute monopoly, but is only the right to restrain copying, and if some other person produces a similar work independently of the owner of the copyright, there will be no infringement.

Importation of infringing works constitutes infringement as well as their being made in the country. There are effective provisions in the Copyright Act and in the Customs Tariff Act for preventing importation of infringing copies.

The making of only one copy of a work will constitute infringement and it need not be an exact copy. A colourable imitation is sufficient. There must, however, be a substantial part of the work taken or a substantial part of the work performed in public. In one case the reproduction of the march *Colonel Bogey* consisting of so much as was played in twenty seconds was held to be an infringement. In another case dealing with the musical work *Walking my Baby back Home* sufficient was played to allow the court to recognize the tune, although the evidence was so conflicting that the plaintiff claimed that thirty-two bars had been played and the defendant claimed only five bars had been played.

There are specific provisions relative to infringement in cases of making records and other mechanical contrivances for the reproduction of sounds. They are somewhat complicated but, in general, they provide that the making of such contrivances shall not constitute infringement if similar contrivances have previously been made by, or with the consent of, the owner of the copyright, and the person who makes them gives notice of his intention to make them and pays the stipulated royalty of two cents per perforated roll or playing surface.

LAWFUL USE OF COPYRIGHT. By statute there are certain lawful uses of copyright and no person is permitted to complain if the use of his work is made under the following circumstances:

1. Any fair dealing with any work for the purpose of private study, research, criticism, review or newspaper summary. The use must be fair. Thus in one Canadian case an entire article was printed in a newspaper as the basis upon which a criticism was printed following it. The court held that this was not fair dealing.

2. The author of an artistic work who is not the owner of copyright therein may use any mould, cast, sketch, plan, model or study made by him for the purpose of the work, provided that he does not thereby repeat or imitate the main design of the work.

3. Paintings, drawings, engravings, or photographs may be made of a work of sculpture or artistic craftsmanship if permanently situated in a public place or building. The same thing may be done in connection with any architectural work of art so long as such drawings, etc., are not in the nature of architectural drawings or plans.

4. Short passages from copyright published literary works which are not themselves published for the use of schools may be published in a collection mainly composed of non-copyright matter *bona fide* intended for the use of schools and so described in the title and in any advertisements issued by the publisher. But no more than two of such passages from works by the same author may be published by the same publisher within five years and in each case the source from which such passages are taken must be acknowledged.

5. A newspaper may publish a report of a lecture delivered in public, unless the report is prohibited by a conspicuous notice affixed before and maintained during the lecture.

6. The reading or recitation in public by one person of any reasonable extract from any published work. Note the limitation to "one person." This precludes the public performance by more than one actor of even a small scene in a dramatic work.

7. Any musical work may be performed without motive of gain by the directors at any agricultural, agricultural-industrial exhibition or fair which received a grant from or is held under Dominion, provincial or municipal authority.

8. Any church, college or school and any religious, charitable or fraternal organization may perform any musical work without payment if done in furtherance of a religious, educational, or charitable object.

9. A report of an address of a political nature delivered at a public meeting may be published in a newspaper.

REMEDIES FOR INFRINGEMENT. In case of infringement the owner of copyright has two remedies. He may sue the infringer in the civil courts for damages incurred by him, as well as the profits made by the infringer, and may ask for the delivery to him of all infringing copies. Such an action is to be brought within three years after the infringement takes place. In addition, the owner of the copyright may prosecute the infringer criminally for his acts. This should

give the copyright owner little, if any, personal satisfaction and no gain would accrue to him other than the satisfaction of personal animus. The first remedy is the proper one and is that which ought to be followed.

WORKS MADE BEFORE 1924. Copyright as we now know it came into effect with the new Canadian Copyright Act on January 1, 1924. But copyright subsisted in many works in Canada at that date, and in such cases they received copyright under the new Act by virtue of a special transition section. It would be difficult to express in any moderate space the principles upon which copyright subsisted in Canada prior to 1924. There was in existence a Canadian Copyright Act prior to that date which required registration and any work registered under that Act would naturally be the subject of copyright. But copyright might also have subsisted in certain works prior to 1924 which were not registered under that Act. We may state the position shortly as follows:

1. Copyright subsisted at the effective date (January 1, 1924) in all works then unpublished whatever their nature.

2. Literary works published in the British Dominions were the subject of copyright whether registered or unregistered either in Canada or at Stationers' Hall in London.

3. Dramatic works were protected as literary works in their printed form, but so far as their performing right was concerned copyright subsisted during the life of the author and seven years after his death, or forty-two years from the date of first performance of the work. If the work fell within that definition on the effective date copyright subsisted in that work provided it had not been first performed in a foreign country to which the Imperial International Copyright Act did not extend.

4. Musical works enjoyed copyright in printed form as literary works, whether registered or unregistered and so far as concerned their performing right were treated the same as dramatic works.

5. Artistic works were protected prior to 1924 only if they were registered under the then existing Canadian Copyright Act.

6. Mechanical contrivances for reproducing sounds, if made before January 1, 1924, are by special provision treated as if the present Copyright Act had been in force at the time they were made.

The above is not intended to be an exhaustive statement of the law of copyright prior to the commencement of the present Copyright Act. It is,

however, of the utmost importance when considering works in existence before January 1, 1924 to understand what was their status at that effective date because the new Act contains a transition section which conferred copyright under the new Act upon all works in which copyright subsisted at the effective date. The first thing to decide, therefore, is whether a work was or was not the subject of copyright on January 1, 1924. If it was, no matter what the nature or term of the copyright to which it was then entitled, it is now entitled, generally speaking, to copyright as established by the new Copyright Act.

FUTURE LEGISLATION. The Report on Copyright of the Royal Commission on Patents, Copyright, Trade Marks and Industrial Designs was published on August 1st, 1957. Many radical changes in the law on copyright are proposed, but no bill has as yet been presented to Parliament. The above summary therefore sets out the law presently applicable until such time as a new Statute is enacted.

It is a matter of no little difficulty to endeavour to explain the principles of the law of Copyright within the short compass of this article. Many subjects have obviously been left untouched and there will naturally remain many pitfalls for the unwary. The intention of this article is to give to the author, artist, sculptor and composer, a very broad and general idea of the rights he possesses in his original creations. Those rights ought to be protected and their owners will find that an appreciation and understanding of those rights and an insistence upon their recognition will earn them respect in this commercial world, while at the same time according to them some measure of reward for their labours. Those labours have produced and are producing great works for the benefit and enjoyment of mankind and as a famous jurist said nearly two centuries ago, "It is wise in any state to encourage letters and the painful researches of learned men. The easiest and most equal way of doing it, is, by securing to them the property of their own works. Nobody contributes, who is not willing; and though a good book may be run down and a bad one cried up, for a time; yet sooner or later, the reward will be in proportion to the merit of the work. A writer's fame will not be the less, that he has bread, without being under the necessity of prostituting his pen to flattery or party, to get it. He who engages in a laborious work, which may employ his whole life, will do it with more spirit, if, besides his own glory, he thinks it may be a provision for his family."

ESTATE TAX AND SUCCESSION DUTIES IN CANADA

ESTATE TAX ACT

NOTE:—The following are some of the principal provisions of the *Estate Tax Act*, as passed by the House of Commons of Canada, August 12, 1958, applicable to estates of persons who died on or after January 1, 1959, and as amended on July 7, 1961. The information hereunder is only partial, is not interpretative, and legal advice should be sought in specific cases.

PART I—ESTATE TAX

DIVISION A—LIABILITY FOR TAX

2. (1) An estate tax shall be paid upon the aggregate taxable value of all property passing on the death, at any time after the coming into force of this Act, of every person domiciled in Canada at the time of his death.

(2) The aggregate taxable value of the property passing on the death of a person is the aggregate net value of that property computed in accordance with Division B minus the deductions permitted by Division C.

DIVISION B—COMPUTATION OF AGGREGATE NET VALUE

Property Included in Computing Aggregate Net Value

3. (1) There shall be included in computing the aggregate net value of the property passing on the death of a person the value of all property, wherever situated, passing on the death of such person, including . . .

(a) all property of which the deceased was, immediately prior to his death, competent to dispose;

(b) property disposed of at any time by the deceased as a *donatio mortis causa*;

(c) property disposed of by the deceased under a disposition operating or purporting to operate as an immediate gift *inter vivos*, whether by transfer, delivery, declaration of trust or otherwise, made within three years prior to his death;

(d) property disposed of by the deceased under a disposition whenever made, of which actual and *bona fide* possession and enjoyment was not, at least three years prior to the death of the deceased,

(i) assumed by the person to whom the disposition was made or by a trustee or agent for that person, and

(ii) thereafter retained to the entire exclusion of the deceased and to the entire exclusion of any benefit to him, whether by contract or otherwise;

(f) property held jointly by the deceased and one or more other persons, to the extent of the beneficial interest therein arising or accruing by survivorship or otherwise on the death of the deceased;

(g) property transferred to or acquired by a purchaser or transferee under the terms of an agreement made by the deceased at any time providing for the transfer or acquisition of such property on or after his death, to the extent that the value of such property

exceeds the value of the consideration, if any, in money or money's worth paid to the deceased thereunder at any time prior to his death;

- (j) any annuity or other interest purchased or provided by the deceased, either by himself alone or in concert or by arrangement with any other person, to the extent of the beneficial interest therein arising or accruing by survivorship or otherwise on the death of the deceased;
- (k) any superannuation, pension or death benefit payable or granted
- (i) out of or under any fund or plan established for the payment of superannuation, pension or death benefits to recipients, or
 - (ii) out of the revenue of Her Majesty in right of Canada or a province or under or subject to any Act of the Parliament of Canada or of the legislature of a province, on or after the death of the deceased in respect of such death.
- (l) property disposed of by any person on or after the death of the deceased
- (i) under any disposition made voluntarily in recognition of services rendered by the deceased as an employee of that person or as an employee of any other person, or
 - (ii) under the term of any agreement made by the deceased for valuable consideration given by him providing for the disposition of such property on or after his death, whether or not such agreement is or was enforceable according to its terms by the person to whom such property was so disposed of;
- (m) any amount payable under a policy of insurance effected on the life of the deceased (whether or not to a preferred beneficiary within the meaning of any statute or law relating to insurance applicable to such policy), where such policy was, immediately prior to the death of the deceased,
- (i) owned, either alone or jointly or in common with any other person,
 - (a) by the deceased,
 - (b) by a person as a trustee under any trust, the terms of which trust were subject to alteration by the deceased, or
 - (c) by a corporation controlled by the deceased, the whole or any part of the amount payable under which policy was payable to the spouse or child of the deceased, the estate of the deceased, or any person in trust exclusively or otherwise for the benefit of the spouse or child of the deceased or the estate of the deceased, or
 - (ii) owned, either alone or jointly or in common with any other person except the deceased or a person described in clause (b) of subparagraph (i), by a corporation controlled by the deceased, the whole or any part of the amount payable under which policy was payable to the corporation and no part of the amount payable under which policy was payable as described in clause (c) of subparagraph (i), in which case there shall be included only that part of the amount so payable to the corporation that exceeds
 - (a) the income of the corporation from a business carried on by it (other than a business of an investment or financial nature that was not the making of loans, trading or dealing in stocks, bonds, mortgages, hypothecs, bills, notes or other

similar property, or trading or dealing in land) for the last complete fiscal period of the corporation prior to the death of the deceased and for each of the four immediately preceding fiscal periods of the corporation during which it carried on any such business,

minus

- (b) any losses sustained by the corporation in any of the fiscal periods of the corporation referred to in clause (a) from any such business carried on by it.

Property not Included in Computing Aggregate Net Value

4. (1) (NOTE: This subsection provides that there shall not be included in aggregate net value the value of any property or part thereof disposed of pursuant to a *bona fide* sale by the deceased for full consideration in money or money's worth.)

Deductions Allowed in Computing Aggregate Net Value

5. (1) There may be deducted in computing the aggregate net value of the property passing on the death of a person

- (a) the value of
 - (i) any debts incurred by the deceased, and
 - (ii) any encumbrances created by him, *bona fide* and for full consideration paid or agreed to be paid to the deceased for his own use or benefit, to the extent that such debts and encumbrances were outstanding immediately prior to his death; and
- (b) reasonable funeral expenses and surrogate, probate and other like court fees in respect of the death of the deceased (but not including solicitors' charges or the expenses of administering property or executing any trust created by the deceased).

6. Notwithstanding section 5, no deduction may be made under that section

- (a) for any debt incurred or encumbrance created, to the extent that such debt or encumbrance cannot, by due process of law, be realized out of property passing on the death of the deceased.

DIVISION C—COMPUTATION OF AGGREGATE TAXABLE VALUE

7. (1) For the purpose of computing the aggregate taxable value of the property passing on the death of a person, there may be deducted from the aggregate net value of that property computed in accordance with Division B such of the following amounts as are applicable:

- (a) \$60,000 in the case of
 - (i) a deceased male person survived by a spouse, or
 - (ii) a deceased female person survived by a spouse who, at the time of the death of such person, was infirm and by a child who, at that time, was under twenty-one years of age or was twenty-one years of age or over and wholly dependent upon such person or spouse, or both, for support by reason of being infirm;
- (b) \$40,000 in the case of a deceased person in the case of whom no deduction may be made under paragraph (a);
- (c) an amount equal to
 - (i) \$10,000, in the case of a deceased person in the case of whom a deduction may be made under paragraph (a), or
 - (ii) \$15,000, in the case of a deceased person not survived by a spouse,

for each surviving child who, at the time of the death of such person, was under twenty-one years of age or was twenty-one years of age or over and wholly dependent upon such person or the spouse of such person, or both, as the case may be, for support by reason of being infirm;

(d) the value of any gift made by the deceased whether during his lifetime or by his will, where such gift can be established to have been absolute and indefeasible, to

- (i) any organization in Canada that, at the time of the making of the gift, and of the death of the deceased, was an organization constituted exclusively for charitable purposes, all or substantially all of the resources of which, if any, were devoted to charitable activities carried on or to be carried on by it or to the making of gifts to other such organizations in Canada all or substantially all of the resources of which were so devoted, and no part of the resources of which was payable to or otherwise available for the benefit of any proprietor, member or shareholder thereof, or
 - (ii) Her Majesty in right of Canada or a province, a Canadian municipality or a municipal or other public body in Canada performing a function of government,
- (e) the value of any gift made by the deceased during his lifetime where such gift can be established to have been absolute, to have taken effect during his lifetime, to have been part of his ordinary and normal expenditure and to have been reasonable having regard to the amount of his income and the circumstances under which the gift was made;
- (f) the value of
- (i) any pension under or subject to the *Pension Act*, the *Civilian War Pensions and Allowances Act*, the *War Veterans' Allowance Act* or section 64, 78 or 112 of the *Royal Canadian Mounted Police Act*.

DIVISION D—COMPUTATION OF TAX

8. The tax payable under this Part upon the aggregate taxable value of the property passing on the death of a person (hereinafter in this section referred to as the "amount taxable") is

- (a) 10% of the amount taxable if the amount taxable does not exceed \$5,000,
- (b) \$500 plus 12% of the amount by which the amount taxable exceeds \$5,000 if the amount taxable exceeds \$5,000 and does not exceed \$10,000,
- (c) \$1,100 plus 14% of the amount by which the amount taxable exceeds \$10,000 if the amount taxable exceeds \$10,000 and does not exceed \$15,000,
- (d) \$1,800 plus 16% of the amount by which the amount taxable exceeds \$15,000 if the amount taxable exceeds \$15,000 and does not exceed \$20,000,
- (e) \$2,600 plus 18% of the amount by which the amount taxable exceeds \$20,000 if the amount taxable exceeds \$20,000 and does not exceed \$40,000,
- (f) \$6,200 plus 20% of the amount by which the amount taxable exceeds \$40,000 if the amount taxable exceeds \$40,000 and does not exceed \$60,000,
- (g) \$10,200 plus 22% of the amount by which the amount taxable exceeds \$60,000 if the amount taxable exceeds \$60,000 and does not exceed \$100,000,
- (h) \$19,000 plus 24% of the amount by which the amount taxable exceeds \$100,000 if the amount taxable exceeds \$100,000 and does not exceed \$150,000,
- (i) \$31,000 plus 26% of the amount by which the amount taxable exceeds \$150,000 if the amount taxable exceeds \$150,000 and does not exceed \$200,000,
- (j) \$44,000 plus 28% of the amount by which the amount taxable exceeds \$200,000 if the amount taxable exceeds \$200,000 and does not exceed \$275,000,
- (k) \$65,000 plus 30% of the amount by which the amount taxable exceeds \$275,000 if the amount taxable exceeds \$275,000 and does not exceed \$350,000,
- (l) \$87,500 plus 32% of the amount by which the amount taxable exceeds \$350,000 if the

amount taxable exceeds \$350,000 and does not exceed \$450,000.

9. (1) There may be deducted from the tax otherwise payable under this Part upon the aggregate taxable value of the property passing on the death of a person,

- (a) in the case of a person who was domiciled in a prescribed province at the time of his death,
 - (i) the part of the tax otherwise payable that is applicable to
 - (a) such of the property passing on the death of that person as was situated in that or any other prescribed province, and
 - (b) such of the property (other than real property) passing on the death of that person as was situated outside Canada, the successor to which property was, at the time of the death of that person, domiciled in or resident in that prescribed province, multiplied by
 - (ii) one-half; and
- (b) in the case of any other person,
 - (i) the part of the tax otherwise payable that is applicable to such of the property passing on the death of that person as was situated in a prescribed province, multiplied by
 - (ii) one-half.

(2) There may be deducted from the tax otherwise payable under this Part upon the aggregate taxable value of the property passing on the death of a person, the lesser of

- (a) the amount of any gift tax paid under the *Income War Tax Act*, the *Income Tax Act* or the *Income Tax Act* in respect of any gift made by that person during his lifetime, the value of the property comprised in which has been included in computing the aggregate taxable value of the property passing on his death, or
 - (b) the part of the tax otherwise payable that is applicable to the property comprised in the gift mentioned in paragraph (a).
- (3) There may be deducted from the tax otherwise payable under this Part upon the aggregate taxable value of the property passing on the death of a person the lesser of
- (a) the amount of any estate, legacy, succession or inheritance duties, or any combination of such duties, paid in respect of the death of that person to the government of a country other than Canada or in respect of any property situated in that country passing on the death of that person, or
 - (b) the part of the tax otherwise payable that is applicable to the property on or in respect of which the amount mentioned in paragraph (a) was paid.
- (4) There may be deducted from the tax otherwise payable under this Part upon the aggregate taxable value of the property passing on the death of a person the amount, if any, by which
- (a) the tax otherwise payable, exceeds
 - (b) one-half of the amount, if any by which the aggregate net value of the property passing on the death of that person, computed in accordance with Division B, exceeds \$50,000.

DIVISION E—RETURNS, ASSESSMENT, PAYMENT AND APPEALS

Returns

11. (1) A return of information in the case of the death of any deceased shall, without notice or demand therefor, be filed with the Minister (of National Revenue) in prescribed form and containing prescribed information,

- (a) by the executor of the estate of the deceased, within six months after the death of the deceased, or
- (b) in any case where no person described in paragraph (a) has filed a return within the time specified in that paragraph, by each

successor to any property passing on the death of the deceased, within ninety days after the time specified in that paragraph, unless in the case of that successor the Minister has waived such return.

Assessment

12. (1) The Minister shall, with all due dispatch, examine each return of information relating to the deceased and assess the amount of the tax payable under this Part in respect of the death of such deceased, the amount payable by each person liable to pay any amount as tax under this Part in respect thereof and the interest and penalties, if any, payable by each such person.

Payment of Tax: Liability of Executor

13. (1) The executor of the estate of a deceased, whether or not any notice of assessment has been sent to him by the Minister, is, from and after the death of the deceased, liable to pay as tax under this Part, and shall, within the time specified in paragraph (a) of subsection (1) of section 11 for filing a return of information relating to the deceased, pay to the Receiver General of Canada as tax under this Part, the part of the tax payable under this Part in respect of the death of the deceased that is applicable to the property under his control.

Objections to Assessments

22. (1) Any person who, being an executor of the estate of a deceased or a successor to any property passing on the death of a deceased, objects to an assessment made by the Minister . . . may, within ninety days after the day of mailing of any notice of assessment sent by the Minister pursuant to section 12, serve on the Minister a notice of objection to that principal assessment or subsidiary assessment, as the case may be, in duplicate and in prescribed form, setting out the reasons for the objection and all facts relevant thereto.

PART II—ESTATE TAX IN RESPECT OF PERSONS DOMICILED OUTSIDE CANADA

34. (1) In the case of the death, at any time after the coming into force of this Act, of any person domiciled outside Canada at the time of his death, an estate tax shall be paid . . . upon the aggregate value of all taxable property . . . being property situated in Canada at the time of his death, the value of which would, if that person had been domiciled in Canada at the time of his death, be required by this Act to

be included in computing the aggregate net value of the property passing on his death.

36. The tax payable under this Part upon the aggregate value of the property taxable on the death of any person is 15% of the aggregate value of that property.

37. (1) There may be deducted from the tax otherwise payable under this Part upon the aggregate value of the property taxable on the death of any person,

- (a) the part of the tax otherwise so payable that is applicable to any of the property taxable on the death of that person, on or in respect of which property any provincial duty has been paid in respect of the death of that person,

multiplied by

- (b) one-half.

(2) There may be deducted from the tax otherwise payable under this Part upon the aggregate value of the property taxable upon the death of any person the amount, if any, by which

exceeds

- (a) the tax otherwise payable,

- (b) the amount, if any, by which the aggregate value of the property taxable on the death of that person exceeds \$5,000.

(3) In this section,

- (a) "provincial duty" means any succession duty imposed under an Act of the legislature of a province; and

- (b) "tax otherwise payable" means, where that expression is used in subsection (1), the tax otherwise payable under this Part before making any deduction under subsection (2), and where that expression is used in subsection (2), the tax otherwise payable under this Part after making any deduction under subsection (1).

Transfer of Property

46. (1) The executor of the estate of any deceased shall, before transferring, delivering or paying over any property passing on the death of the deceased to any successor to any such property, pay the amount payable by him pursuant to or by virtue of section 13 as tax under this Act in respect of the death of the deceased or as interest or penalties in respect thereof, or furnish security satisfactory to the Minister for the payment of such amount.

ALBERTA

Under agreement with the Dominion Government Alberta has vacated the succession duty field for a period of five years from April 1, 1947, although duties are payable on properties passing in estates for persons who died prior to that date. This agreement has now been extended to April 1, 1962. For list of exemptions from duty and rates of duty on such properties please apply to the Succession Duties Office, Dept. of the Attorney General, Edmonton.

BRITISH COLUMBIA

Under agreement with the Dominion Government British Columbia vacated the succession duty field for a period of five years from April 1, 1947, although duties are payable on properties passing prior to that date. For list of exemptions from duty and rates of duty on such properties please refer directly to the Assessor and Collector of Probate and Succession Duties, Parliament Buildings, Victoria, B.C.

This agreement was extended for an additional period of five years ending March 31st, 1957 and has been further extended to March 31st, 1962.

A Probate Fees Act applies to all estates where the date of death is subsequent to April 1, 1947, on any property passing under a Will or Intestacy, and any enquiries thereto should be directed to the Assessor and Collector of Probate Fees, Parliament Bldgs., Victoria, B.C.

MANITOBA

The Succession Duty Act, being Chapter 201 of the Revised Statutes of Manitoba, 1940, in so far as is applicable to the cases of persons who die on or

to the fact that the summaries given below apply only after the first day of April, 1947, is hereby suspended but otherwise shall remain in full force and effect.

The suspension effected by paragraph (1) shall not be deemed to be a repeal of the Act therein mentioned, but that Act shall, to the extent herein provided, be inoperative and remain suspended until such time as the suspension herein enacted is terminated.

(a) by an order-in-council to that effect, or

(b) by an Act of the Legislature;

and the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council is hereby authorized to make an order terminating such suspension effective on, from, and after, such date as may be fixed in the order.

This Act shall come into force on assent, but shall be retroactive and shall be deemed to have been in force on, from, and after, the first day of April, 1947.

For list of exemptions from duty and rates of duty on such properties please apply to Administrator of Succession Duties, Revenue Bldg., Winnipeg.

*NEWFOUNDLAND

The Death Duties Act, Chapter 34 of The Revised Statutes of Newfoundland, 1952, contains the following provisions:

Estates certified of less than \$5,000 shall pay no duties. This provision applies to estates of persons dying on or after June 1st, 1948.

Insurance money to an amount not exceeding \$20,000 payable to a preferred beneficiary shall not form part of the estate of such deceased person where the preferred beneficiary is the widow of the deceased, or his dependent child under twenty years of age (or older if physically or mentally incapable of

self-support). "Preferred beneficiary" is defined in the Life Insurance Act. The provisions in this paragraph apply only to estates of persons dying on or after June 1st, 1948 (see table).

Death duties are not payable on estates of members of any Allied forces or members of the Mercantile Marine of any Allied forces who died on active service or within twelve months from wounds or disease incurred on active service.

NEW BRUNSWICK

A new agreement, effective April 1, 1952, extends the former agreement with minor changes.

A further Agreement effective April 1st, 1957, extends the last agreement to April 1st, 1962.

NOVA SCOTIA

Under agreement with the Dominion Government Nova Scotia has vacated the succession duty field for a further period of five years from April 1, 1957 (duties are payable on properties passing prior to April 1, 1947). For list of exemptions from duty and rates of duty on such properties apply to Collector of Succession Duties, Dept. of Municipal Affairs, Halifax.

ONTARIO

The Succession Duty Act, being Chapter 378 of The Revised Statutes of Ontario, 1950

AGGREGATE VALUE

"Aggregate Value" which determines the normal rates of duty means the value at the death of the deceased of the property wherever situate passing on his death together with the value of all lifetime dispositions wherever made, where such dispositions are made on or after the first day of July, 1892, less allowable debts, reasonable funeral expenses, Surrogate Court fees, solicitors fees for obtaining probate or letters of administration to the extent of \$100.00 and less the exemptions authorized by section 4 and specified below.

ESTATES EXEMPT FROM SUCCESSION DUTY

1. An estate, the aggregate value of which does not exceed \$5,000.00.

2. An estate, the aggregate value of which does not exceed \$20,000.00, where the only persons who participate are the following, or some of them, and any one of the persons mentioned in (a), (b), (c) or (d) does not receive more than \$10,000.00.

(a) Any brother or sister of the deceased;

(b) Any descendant of a brother or sister of the deceased;

(c) Any brother or sister of the father or mother of the deceased;

(d) Any descendant of a brother or sister of the father and mother of the deceased.

(e) The persons mentioned, or referred to, in 3, below, and any lineal ancestor of the deceased.

NOTE: Where the aggregate value does not exceed \$20,000.00, but a collateral receives over \$10,000.00, the present additional rate only will apply but the present base rate will not apply.

3. An estate, the aggregate value of which does not exceed \$50,000.00, where the only persons who participate are the following, or some of them: the grandfather, grandmother, father, mother, husband, wife, child, son-in-law or daughter-in-law of the deceased.

NOTE: See provisions of Section 74 of the Child Welfare Act, 1958. "Child" is defined in Section 1(d) of the Succession Duty Act.

DEPENDANTS' ALLOWANCE AND INDIVIDUAL DEPENDANT ALLOWANCE

The Succession Duty Act was amended in 1959 by the Succession Duty Amendment Act to bring into the Act exemptions in favour of the widow, dependant children and infirm husband of the deceased parallel to those in the new Dominion Estate Tax Act.

Section 2, subsection 1, of the Succession Duty Amendment Act, 1959, enacts a new subsection (1a) of Section 6 of the Succession Duty Act. Clause (a) of Section 6 (1a) provides that no duty shall be levied on a dependant, when the total of the benefits to all dependants does not exceed the total of their individual exemptions. This total of individual exemptions has been defined as "Dependants' Allowance".

"Dependants' Allowance" means,

(i) where the deceased is survived by a wife and no dependent children, \$60,000,

(ii) where the deceased is survived by a wife and a dependent child or children, an amount equal to the sum of \$60,000 and \$10,000 for each dependent child,

(iii) where the deceased is survived by an infirm husband one dependent child, \$70,000,

(iv) where the deceased is survived by an infirm husband and more than one dependent child, an amount to the sum of \$60,000 and \$10,000 for each dependent child, or

(v) where the deceased is not survived by a spouse but is survived by a dependent child or children, an amount equal to the product expressed in dollars of \$15,000 and the number of dependent children.

The following are examples of the operation of this Clause:

1. A man dies leaving an estate of \$80,000 survived by a widow and two dependent children. Here the dependants' allowance is \$80,000 and no duty is payable, if the estate passes wholly to these dependants or any one of them.

1a. A man dies leaving an estate of \$150,000 with a widow and two dependent children; he leaves \$80,000 among these three dependants. Here no duty is payable on the benefits to the dependants but the rest of the estate passing to other persons is dutiable as at present.

1b. A man leaves an estate of \$150,000 again with a widow and two dependent children to whom he leaves the whole estate. Here duty is payable on the whole estate as at the present time, unless Clause b of Section 6(1a) applies.

2. A woman dies leaving an infirm husband and four dependent children. Her estate is \$100,000. Here no duty is payable if the estate goes wholly to these dependants or to any one of them.

3. A man or woman dies leaving five dependent children, and no surviving spouse, leaving an estate of \$75,000. Here no duty is payable if the estate is divided among these children or goes to any one of them.

Clause b of Section 6 (1a) provides that where the benefit to a "dependant" does not exceed the amount of his "individual dependant allowance" no duty shall be payable by him.

The amounts of the "individual dependants' allowance" are:

(i) in the case of the wife of the deceased, \$60,000,

(ii) in the case of the infirm husband of the deceased where the deceased is survived by a dependent child, \$60,000,

(iii) in the case of a dependent child of the deceased where the deceased is survived by a wife or infirm husband, \$10,000

or
(iv) in the case of a dependent child of the deceased where the deceased is not survived by a spouse, \$15,000,

EXEMPTIONS FROM SUCCESSION DUTY, WHETHER OR NOT THE ESTATE AS A WHOLE IS EXEMPT.

By section 3 of The Succession Duty Act the following are exempt from duty but the property and dispositions with respect to which there are exemptions are nevertheless included for the purposes of arriving at the "Aggregate Value":

- (a) Any property situate in Ontario passing on the death to any one person where the value of all the property so passing to such person does not exceed \$500.00;
- (b) Any person to whom there is a transmission, with respect to such transmission, where the value of all the transmissions to such person, does not exceed \$500.00;
- (c) Any person to whom a disposition is made, with respect to such disposition, where the value of all the dispositions to such person does not exceed \$500.00;
- (d) Any property situate in Ontario passing on the death of the deceased to any one person where such property consists wholly of an annuity not exceeding \$100.00 or of an estate or interest for life or for a term in any property, the yearly income from which does not exceed \$100.00;
- (e) Any person to whom there is a transmission, with respect to such transmission, where all the property in respect of which there are transmissions to such person consists wholly of an annuity not exceeding \$100.00 or of an estate or interest for life or for a term in any property the yearly income from which does not exceed \$100.00;
- (f) Any person to whom a disposition is made, with respect to such disposition, where all the property in respect of which dispositions to such person are made consists wholly of an annuity not exceeding \$100.00, or of an estate or interest for life or for a term in any property the yearly income from which does not exceed \$100.00;
- (g) Any property situate in Ontario passing on the death of the deceased to any member of the stranger class or where there is a transmission to such member or a disposition to such member and where the value of all such property, transmissions and dispositions does not exceed \$1,000, provided that such member of the stranger class was in the employ of the deceased for a period of at least five years immediately prior to his death; or
- (h) Where the deceased was domiciled outside Ontario at the date of his death,
 - (i) any interest of the deceased in any contract of insurance within the meaning of The Insurance Act,
 - (ii) any money payable as a result of the death of the deceased under any contract of insurance within the meaning of The Insurance Act, or
 - (iii) any interest by way of annuity or otherwise accruing or arising on the death of the deceased under any contract of insurance within the meaning of The Insurance Act.

NOTE: By further provisions in section 3, the total amount in respect of which no duty shall be levied under clauses a, b and c shall not exceed \$500.00;

The total amount in respect of which no duty shall be levied under clauses d, e and f shall not exceed an annuity or yearly income of \$100.00; and

Where by reason of clauses d, e and f no duty is levied, clauses a, b and c shall not apply.

SPECIAL REMISSION OF DUTY

Section 46 of the Act provides as follows:

Where the deceased dies from wounds inflicted, accident occurring or disease contracted within twelve months before death while in the active naval, military or air service of Her Majesty, the Treasurer may, if he thinks fit, remit the whole or any part of the duty for which the husband, wife, father, mother, child, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, brother or sister of the deceased is liable.

NOTE: If any remission is made under section 46 the property, transmission or disposition with respect to which such remission is made must nevertheless be included in the aggregate value.

FURTHER EXEMPTIONS

By section 4 of the Act there are exemptions with

respect to the following and the property and dispositions concerned shall not be included in the aggregate value nor included for the purpose of determining any rate of duty.

- (a) Any disposition for religious, charitable or educational purposes to any religious, charitable or educational organization which carries on its work solely in Ontario;
- (b) Any property devised or bequeathed by the deceased for religious, charitable or educational purposes to any religious, charitable or educational organization which carries on its work solely in Ontario;
- (c) Any disposition for religious, charitable or educational purposes to any religious, charitable or educational organization which carries on its work both in and outside Ontario to the extent of that portion in value of the property in respect of which the disposition is made as is in the same ratio to the whole that its expenditures for carrying on its work in Ontario bear to its total expenditures during such period as the treasurer may determine;
- (d) That portion of any property devised or bequeathed by the deceased for religious, charitable or educational purposes to any religious, charitable or educational organization which carries on its work both in and outside Ontario as is in the same ratio to the whole that its expenditures for carrying on its work in Ontario bear to its total expenditures during such period as the treasurer may determine.
- (e) Any property devised or bequeathed by the deceased to and any disposition to the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the Dominion of Canada, the Province of Ontario, or any municipality in Ontario;
- (f) Any disposition for necessities or education to or for any member of the family of the deceased where it is shown to the satisfaction of the Treasurer that such member was dependent in whole or in part on the deceased for such necessities or education;
- (g) Any disposition where actual and bona fide enjoyment and possession of the property in respect of which the disposition is made, was assumed more than five years before the date of death of the deceased by the person to whom the disposition is made, or by a trustee for such person, and thenceforward retained to the entire exclusion of the deceased or of any benefit to him whether voluntary or by contract or otherwise; 1951, c. 84, s. 3.
- (i) Any non-commutable annuity, income or periodic payment effected in any manner other than by will or testamentary instrument and paid for by the deceased during his lifetime and paid to or enjoyed by the wife or dependent father or mother or any dependent brother, sister or child of the deceased after the death of the deceased, to the extent of \$1200.00 per annum with respect to any one person and to the extent of \$2400.00 per annum in the aggregate;
- (j) Any property devised or bequeathed by the deceased to and any disposition to the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, the Canadian Red Cross Society or any Patriotic Organization or Institution in Canada which receives the written approval of the Secretary of State of Canada: and
- (k) Any property passing on the death of the deceased to any religious, charitable or educational organization for religious, charitable or educational purposes carried out in any Province of Canada other than Ontario which is shown to the satisfaction of the Treasurer to allow the same exemption on property, given, devised or bequeathed to any religious, charitable or educational organization for religious, charitable or educational purposes carried out in Ontario.

NOTE—Notwithstanding anything set out above, with respect to "Further Exemptions", Clauses (a), (b), (c) and (d), in so far as they apply to religious organizations shall apply to such organizations as if the word "Canada" were substituted for the word "Ontario" wherever it appears in such Clauses.

The original enactment with respect to the above appears in the 1949 Amendments to the Act. A similar amendment was made in 1952 with respect to educational organizations. These amendments favor, to a considerable extent, religious and educational organizations throughout Canada so far as exemption from Ontario Duty is concerned.

Surtax Rate for Preferred Class 15%.

Section 2 of the Succession Duty Amendment Act, 1953, provides that the resultant duty, in the case of preferred beneficiaries, will not reduce what is left below \$50,000, or below the preferred beneficiaries' share of the \$50,000, as the case may be.

An additional "notch" provision was enacted in 1959 to cover the new exemptions in favour of the widow, dependent children, and infirm husband of the deceased.

Section 2 (1) of the Succession Duty Amendment Act, 1959, enacts Section 6 (1b) of the Act. Clause (a) of subsection (1b) provides that where the duty levied against all "dependants" is greater than the amount by which their total benefits exceed the "dependants' allowance", then the duty payable by each dependant is reduced proportionately so that the duty shall not reduce the total of the benefits to "dependants" below the dependants' allowance.

Clause (b) provides that the duty shall not reduce the benefits going to an individual dependant below the amount of his individual dependant allowance.

For the purposes of the Ontario Succession Duty Act, the term "child" shall mean,—

- (i) legitimate child of the deceased,
- (ii) person adopted by the deceased,
- (iii) person to whom the deceased or the spouse of

the deceased stood in *loco parentis* during the infancy of such person and the deceased while married to such spouse shall be deemed to have stood in *loco parentis* to a legitimate child of such spouse and to a person adopted by such spouse.

- or
- (iv) legitimate lineal descendant of any person mentioned in subclause i, ii, or iii.

SCHEDULE OF RATES—COLLATERAL CLASS

Any lineal ancestor of the deceased, except the grandfather, grandmother, father or mother.

A brother or sister of the deceased or any descendant of such brother or sister; and a brother or sister of the father or mother of the deceased or any descendant of any such brother or sister.

Surtax Rate for Strangers, 25%.

Under Section 76 of the Child Welfare Act, 1958.

1. where duty is levied under the Succession Duty Act on the death of an adopted child,

(a) on property passing on his death to or for the benefit of the adopting parent or the kindred of the adopting parent; or

(b) on the adopting parent or the kindred of the adopting parent,

such duty is payable at the same rate and to the same extent as if the adopted child had been born in lawful wedlock to the adopting parent.

2. Where duty is levied under the Succession Duty Act on the death of an adopting parent or the kindred of an adopting parent,

(a) on property passing on the death of such parent to or for the benefit of the adopted child or any issue of the adopted child; or

(b) on the adopted child or issue,

such duty is payable at the same rate and to the same extent as if the adopted child had been born in lawful wedlock to the adopting parent.

MAKING RETURNS

Section 12 provides that every person to whom or for whose benefit any property situate in Ontario passes on the death of the deceased or to whom there is a transmission or to whom a disposition is made shall make returns to the Succession Duty Department. Such returns shall be made within three months after the death of deceased or within such further period as Treasurer may allow.

Section 12 also provides that the applicant for probate, administration or other grant shall, at the time of making application, make and file with the Succession Duty Department an affidavit containing,—

(a) an inventory of all the property passing on the death of the deceased and particulars of all dispositions and such inventory shall show the value of such property and dispositions; and

(b) the name of every person who benefits by any property passing on the death of the deceased or to whom a disposition is made, the place of residence of such person and the degree of relationship in which such person stands to the deceased.

NOTE—The terms “disposition” or “dispositions” where used under the above caption—“Making Returns” mean lifetime disposition or lifetime dispositions made by the deceased and do not include any disposition which he may have made by will.

WHEN AND HOW DUTY PAYABLE

Where an annuity, term of years, life estate, income or interest in expectancy is not involved, the duty levied shall be payable within six months from the death of the deceased and for default there shall be added to such duty, interest at the rate of 5% per annum from date of death till payment.

In the case of an annuity, term of years, life estate or income which is not an interest in expectancy, the duty with respect to such shall be payable in a number of equal annual instalments equal to;—

(a) the number of years

(i) of expectancy of life of the person who benefits, or

(ii) for which such annuity, term of years or income is to run, as the case may be; or

(b) ten,

whichever is the lesser and such instalments shall commence one year after the death of the deceased and for default in payment of any of such instalments, there shall be added thereto interest at the rate of 5% per annum from the date on which such instalment became payable, until payment.

Duty with respect to any interest in expectancy may be paid as provided in paragraph 1.

The duty on any interest in expectancy, where an annuity, term of years, life estate or income is not involved, if not sooner paid, shall be due when such interest comes into possession and payable within three months thereafter and in case of default there shall be added to such duty, interest at rate of 5 per cent per annum from the date of coming into possession until payment.

In the case of an annuity, term of years, life estate or income which is an interest in expectancy, the duty with respect to such, shall, if not sooner paid, be

payable in a number of equal annual instalments as set out in Paragraph 2 above and such instalments shall commence one year after the date when such annuity, term of years, life estate or income commences to be enjoyed and for default in payment of any of such instalments, there shall be added thereto interest at the rate of 5% per annum from the date on which such instalment became payable, until payment.

ALLOWANCE FOR DUTY PAID IN OTHER JURISDICTIONS

For the purpose of avoiding double taxation on residents in Ontario an allowance shall be made for duty levied and paid on personal property situate in the jurisdictions mentioned below where the deceased owner died domiciled in Ontario, where such property passes to Ontario residents and where duty is levied on such residents, by Ontario, with respect to the transmission of such property. The allowance made by Ontario in such circumstances will be the amount of duty levied on such property by the foreign jurisdiction; provided however that if the duty levied on such property by the foreign jurisdiction exceeds the duty levied by Ontario with respect to the transmission of such property, the allowance will be the amount of the Ontario Duty.

The jurisdictions concerned are as follows:

(a) The United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland;

(b) The Union of South Africa;

(c) The Commonwealth of Australia;

(d) Eire;

(e) The Dominion of New Zealand;

(f) The other Provinces of the Dominion of Canada, save and except Newfoundland;

(g) The District of Columbia; and

(h) Each of the States of the United States of America.

The allowance to be made by Ontario, as aforesaid, shall apply where the deceased died on or after June 21st, 1946 and with the object of relieving Ontario citizens as far as possible, in this respect, the allowance shall be applicable whether or not the foreign jurisdictions, or any of them, make similar provisions in converse cases.

RE 1951-1960 AMENDMENTS

There were a few amendments made to The Succession Duty Act in 1951. Among these was a very important re-enactment which provided that no duty would attach to the disposition mentioned below and that such disposition would not be included in the aggregate value nor included for the purpose of determining any rate of duty. The disposition in question is as follows;—

Any disposition where actual and bona fide enjoyment and possession of the property in respect of which the disposition is made, was assumed more than five years before the date of death of the deceased by the person to whom the disposition is made, or by a trustee for such person, and thenceforward retained to the entire exclusion of the deceased or of any benefit to him whether voluntary or by contract or otherwise.

In addition to the 1951 Amendment referred to above, there was another amendment made to the Act in 1952 which provides that

any person may make payment not exceeding \$1500.00 under any pension fund, plan or scheme of general application to employees of whom the deceased was one, without the consent of the Treasurer, where payment is made to or for the benefit of any member or members of the family of the deceased, and notice of the making of payment shall be transmitted forthwith to the Treasurer.

The 1953 amendment referred to above in relation to preferred rates was designed to take care of a situation where the aggregate value was say, \$51,000., all going, e.g. to the widow. The duty at the applicable rates would be more than \$1000. The amendment in such cases, automatically reduces the duty to \$1000., thus leaving a clear \$50,000.

The 1954 amendments were of a technical nature for the purpose of correcting doubts as to meaning.

In 1955, however, there was an amendment permitting banks, credit unions, trust companies and others to pay \$500.00 out of money on deposit without consent, but upon notice to the Treasurer, where the deceased died domiciled in Ontario.

In 1957 clause (h) of Section 3 of the Succession Duty Act was re-enacted, as well as subsection 1 of

Section 24 of the Succession Duty Act.

In 1958 subsection 2 of Section 9 was amended in raising the amount which an insurance company might pay out without the consent of the Treasurer from \$1,500 to \$2,500.

In 1959 amendments were made in the Succession Duty Act:

1. To bring into the Succession Duty Act exemptions in favour of the widow, dependent children and infirm husband of the deceased parallel to those in the new Dominion Estate Tax Act.
2. To amend the existing definition of "child" in the Act so that the definition of "dependant child" will correspond more closely to the definition of dependant child in the Estate Tax Act, and also to remove certain anomalies in the existing definition.
3. To increase from \$10,000 to \$20,000 the size of an estate in which collaterals (brothers, sisters, nephews and nieces, etc.) will pay no duty, unless one collateral receives more than \$10,000 and provide that in that case the present additional rate only, and not the existing "base" rate will apply.
4. To increase from \$1,500 to \$2,500 the amount which may be paid without the Treasurer's consent out of a pension fund or similar fund to a member of the deceased's family.

In 1960 the following amendments were made:

1. Subclause iii of clause d of section 1 was amended to widen the definition of child.
2. Clause h of subsection 1 of section 4 was repealed.
3. Subsection 3 of section 9 was amended increasing the amount which may be paid without the Treasurer's consent out of money on deposit with banks, credit unions, trust companies and others from \$500.00 to \$1,500.00.
4. Subsection 3a was added to section 9 permitting any employer of the deceased to pay as on or account of salary, wages or other remuneration owed to the deceased, or on account of commissions for services rendered by the deceased, an amount not exceeding \$1,500.00 without the consent of the Treasurer. This subsection only applies where the deceased died domiciled in Ontario and notice of the payment must be sent to the Treasurer.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Under agreement with the Dominion Government Prince Edward Island vacated the succession duty field for a period of five years from April 1, 1947, although duties are payable on properties passing prior to that date. This agreement was renewed for an additional five years from April 1, 1952 and was further renewed for an additional five years on 15th July, 1957.

QUEBEC

EXEMPTIONS FROM DUTY

Since December 20th, 1951, where the aggregate value of the property transmitted in the direct line, ascending or descending, between consorts, between father- or mother-in-law and son- or daughter-in-law, and between stepfather or stepmother and stepson or stepdaughter, does not exceed \$50,000.00 the following exemptions are granted:

(a) in all cases, an exemption from all succession duties on ten thousand dollars;

(b) in addition, an exemption from all succession duties on an amount of fifteen hundred dollars for each child, in the first degree, under twenty-five years of age, domiciled in this Province, left by and surviving the deceased.

Estates not exceeding \$1,000.00 in value and passing to immediate collaterals are duty free.

When the aggregate value of the property transmitted to a stranger in blood to the deceased, who has been in the employ of the deceased for at least five years, does not exceed one thousand dollars, no duty shall be exigible on such property or on the transmission thereof.

In estates which devolved since February 22nd, 1949, legacies, gifts and subscriptions for religious, charitable or educational purposes, as well as the proceeds of life insurance policies payable to churches and cemetery associations, are tax free regardless of the domicile of the benefiting institutions.

RATES OF DUTY

On property transmitted in the direct line, ascending or descending, between consorts, between father- or mother-in-law and son- or daughter-in-law, between stepfather or stepmother and stepson or stepdaughter, and on transmission between the same persons, the rates of duty shall be as follows:

In Estates the aggregate value of which:

Does not exceed \$10,000—Nil.

Exceeds \$10,000, not exceeding \$50,000—1% plus 1/25 of 1% for each full \$1,000.

Exceeds \$50,000, not exceeding \$100,000—1% plus 1/20 of 1% for each full \$1,000.

Exceeds \$100,000—5% plus 1/100 of 1% for each full \$1,000.

Provided, however, that the total so obtained shall not exceed 15% where aggregate value of Estate exceeds \$1,000,000.

Provided further that in addition to the above duty, a further duty is payable (on estates of which aggregate value exceeds \$10,000) as follows; Where the whole amount passing to one person:

Does not exceed \$50,000—1%.

Exceeds \$50,000, does not exceed \$300,000—1% plus 1/100 of 1% for each full \$1,000.

Exceeds \$300,000—3% plus 1/200 of 1% for each full \$1,000.

Provided, however, that the total rate so obtained shall not exceed 10%.

Higher duties provided in the case of collaterals, strangers, etc.

In 1945 an agreement was made between the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec providing for the avoidance of double taxation in regard to Succession Duties.

SASKATCHEWAN

Under agreement with the Dominion Government Saskatchewan has vacated the succession duty field as of April 1, 1947—for as long as The Dominion-Provincial Taxation Agreement continues in force—although duties are payable on properties passing prior to that date. DESCENT AND DISTRIBUTION OF PROPERTY PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

A CONDENSED SUMMARY OF THE LAW OF INTESTATES ESTATES

All real and personal property which is vested in any person without a right in any other person to take by survivorship shall, on his death, whether testate or intestate, and notwithstanding any testamentary disposition, devolve to and become vested in his personal representative from time to time as trustee for the persons by law beneficially entitled thereto and subject to the payment of his debts, and so far as such property is not disposed of by deed, will, contract or other effectual disposition, the same shall be administered, dealt with and distributed as if it were personal property not so disposed of.

"A husband who, if The Devolution of Estates Act had not been passed, would be entitled to an interest as tenant by the curtesy in the real property of his wife, may, by deed or instrument in writing executed, and attested by at least one witness and delivered to the personal representative, if any, or if there is none, deposited in the office of the Registrar of the Supreme Court at Osgoode Hall, within six months after his wife's death, elect to take such interest in the real and personal property of his wife as he would have taken if the said Act had not been passed, in which case the husband's interest therein shall be ascertained in all respects as if the said Act had not been passed, and he shall be entitled to no further interest thereunder.

The real and personal property of every man dying intestate and leaving a widow whether or not he leaves issue shall, where the net value of such real and personal property does not exceed \$5,000.00, belong to his widow absolutely and exclusively. The term "net value" means the value of the real and personal property after payment of the charges thereon and the debts, funeral expenses and expenses of administration, including succession duty.

Where the estate of the husband consists in whole or in part of real property, then notwithstanding anything set out above or anything hereinafter set out with respect to the benefits to the widow, such benefits shall not accrue to her and she shall only be entitled to her dower unless she elects to take her distributive share, as set out herein, in lieu of dower. The term "dower" means the right of the widow, for her life to one-third of the rents and profits from the real estate owned by her husband at his death.

By the provisions of The Devolution of Estates Amendment Act, 1952, the 1918 Enactment, as it stood in our present Devolution of Estates Act, (Chapter 103-R.S.O.-1950) was repealed and it was further provided that any real property which but for the provisions of the 1918 Enactment, would have vested in the persons beneficially entitled thereto, shall be deemed to have vested in such persons notwithstanding such provisions.

The Devolution of Estates Amendment Act, 1953, was passed so that an illegitimate child or the mother of an illegitimate child, under certain circumstances, shares in the estate.

Subject to what is set out above, the estate of a person dying intestate is distributed as set out below, according to the Devolution of Estates Act, being Chapter 103 of The Revised Statutes of Ontario, 1950. It will be noted that where the widow takes a share, the net value of the estate is presumed to be in excess of \$5,000.00. Where there is no widow to take a share, the net value of the estate is immaterial.

DISTRIBUTION

If the Intestate die leaving,—

1. A widow only, the widow gets \$5,000.00 plus interest thereon at 4% from date of death until payment and two-thirds of the residue. Remaining one-third of the residue equally to the next of kin of the deceased husband and those who legally represent them. For example, if the next of kin were a father, mother, brother and sister, or any of these and if there were children of a deceased brother or sister, the said one-third would be divided equally among all of these, save that the children aforesaid would take per stirpes and not per capita,—that is they would take equally the share which their father or mother would have taken had he or she survived the

intestate. If there are no kindred to inherit, the said remaining one-third of residue would go to the Crown.

2. Widow and one child or legal representatives of child, \$5,000.00 and interest as above and half residue to widow. The other half to child or equally among legal representatives.

3. Widow and children and legal representatives of deceased children—\$5,000.00 and interest as above and one-third of residue to widow. The other two-thirds equally among the children and the legal representatives of deceased children, the latter taking per stirpes.

4. Widow and father or mother or brother or sister, \$5,000.00 and interest as above and two-thirds of the residue to widow. The remaining one-third of residue to the father or mother or brother or sister.

If the intestate die leaving,—

1. A husband only,—half to the husband and remaining half among next of kin of deceased wife and those who legally represent them and in same proportions as mentioned in No. 1 above. If there are no kindred to inherit, the said remaining one-half would go to the Crown.

2. A husband and child or legal representatives of child,—one-third to husband. The remaining two-thirds to child or equally among legal representatives.

3. A husband and children and legal representatives of deceased children,—one-third to husband. The remaining two-thirds equally among the children and the legal representatives of deceased children,—the latter taking per stirpes.

4. Husband and father or mother or brother or sister,—one-half to the husband. The remaining half to the father or mother or brother or sister.

If the intestate die without leaving a spouse, but leaving,—

(a) a child or legal representatives of child,—all to child or equally among the legal representatives.

(b) Children and legal representatives of deceased children,—equally among all,—the legal representatives taking per stirpes.

(c) Children by two spouses,—equally among all.

(d) Child and grandchild of a deceased child,—half to child and half to grandchild who takes by representation.

If the intestate die without spouse or issue but leaving,—

(a) A father, mother, brother and sister or any of these and children of a deceased brother or sister,—equally among all,—the said children sharing per stirpes.

(h) A father or mother, or brother or sister,—all to the one who survives.

(c) A grandparent or grandparents,—all to him or her or equally among these.

(d) Brother or sister of the whole blood and brother or sister of the half blood, equally among the two.

(e) Posthumous brother or sister and mother, equally among the two.

(f) Brother and grandfather,—all to brother.

(g) Grandniece or grandnephew and niece or nephew,—all to niece or nephew.

(h) Brother and aunts or uncles,—all to brother.

(i) Uncles or aunts children and brother or sisters grandchildren,—equally among all.

(j) Grandparent and uncle or aunt,—all to grandparent.

(k) Uncle and deceased uncle's or aunt's child,—all to uncle.

(l) Nephew or niece by brother or half-brother and nephew or niece by sister or half-sister,—equally among the two.

(m) Children of deceased brothers or sisters or children of deceased brothers and sisters,—equally per capita.

Note—Child Welfare Act, 1958, (1); For all purposes the adopted child, upon the adoption order being made, becomes the child of the adopting parent and the adopting parent becomes the parent of the adopted child as if the adopted child had been born in lawful wedlock to the adopting parent.

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Where the intestate dies without lawful heirs, all of his estate will go to the Crown."

THE QUEEN AND ROYAL FAMILY

THE HOUSE OF WINDSOR

In 1917 the late King George V., by Proclamation, changed the name of the Royal Family from the House of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha to the House of Windsor.

THE QUEEN.—Elizabeth the Second, (Elizabeth Alexandra Mary, of Windsor) by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom, Canada and Her other Realms and Territories Queen; Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith. Succeeded to the throne February 6th, 1952. Her Majesty, the elder daughter of the late King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, was born at 17 Bruton Street, London, W.1., on April 21st, 1926, married November 20th, 1947, H.R.H. the Duke of Edinburgh, K.G., K.T., G.B.E. As Heir Presumptive succeeded to the Throne on the death of her father, George VI, February 6, 1952, and was crowned June 2, 1953, at Westminster Abbey.

THE LATE GEORGE VI.—George VI succeeded to the Throne December 11th, 1936; and was crowned at Westminster Abbey, May 12th, 1937. Second son of King George V and Queen Mary, he was born at York Cottage, Sandringham, on December 14th, 1895, married, April 26, 1923, Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon, daughter of the Earl and Countess of Strathmore. As Heir Presumptive succeeded to the Throne on the abdication of Edward VIII.

QUEEN ELIZABETH, THE QUEEN MOTHER, born August 4th, 1900, daughter of the 14th Earl of Strathmore; married, April 26th, 1923.

The Lord Chamberlain's Department has the general supervision of the Royal Household "abovestairs," and also various duties toward the Sovereign and the Court. In Central London and the town of Windsor, he acts as the licenser of theatres. The Lord Chamberlain's sanction is necessary for the production of a play in any theatre in England at which a charge for admission is made.

THE QUEEN'S CIVIL LIST

Until George III. came to the throne in 1760, the income of the sovereign was derived chiefly from Crown lands and certain landed property. In the feudal ages these lands constituted a princely patrimony. In later times this Crown property was greatly reduced by lavish grants to royal favorites, so much so that at the accession of Queen Anne, Parliament endeavored to save the remnant by an Act (1 Anne, c. 8) which prohibited alienation of Crown lands, and enacted stringent provisions in regard to the length of the term for which they might be leased and the rents reserved.

Queen Anne, George I. and George II. derived the larger part of their income from their life-interest in the Crown property, but when George III. came to the throne he surrendered his life-interest in the Crown lands. It was turned over to the nation in return for a fixed Civil List of £800,000, subsequently increased to £900,000. George IV., William IV., Queen Victoria and Edward VII., on their accessions, surrendered their life interest in the Crown lands in return for a Civil List. The same course has been taken by each subsequent monarch on coming to the throne.

Certain hereditary revenues have also been surrendered to the Exchequer.

In 1910 the King's Civil List was fixed at the yearly sum of £470,000.

By the Civil List Act of 1937, the civil list for King George VI was fixed at £410,000 subject to certain

abatements while the revenues of the Duchy of Cornwall were vested in His Majesty.

The Civil List Act, 1952, fixed the Civil list for Queen Elizabeth II at £475,000, allocated as follows:

This sum is subject to a reduction equal to a proportion of the net revenues of the Duchy of Cornwall, so long as the Duke of Cornwall is a minor.

In addition to the Civil List as above, provision is made for other members of the Royal Family on a per annum basis as follows:—

Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother, £70,000.
The Duke of Edinburgh, £40,000.
The Princess Margaret, £15,000.
The Duke of Gloucester, £35,000.
The Princess Royal, £6,000.

The revenue of the estates of the Duchy of Lancaster (which have been attached to the Crown since 1399), is paid over to the Keeper of Her Majesty's Privy Purse.

THE UNITED KINGDOM GOVERNMENT

The House of Commons, as now constituted (1959) has 630 elected members, with distribution of seats as follows: England 511, Wales and Monmouth, 36; Scotland, 71; Northern Ireland, 12.

The maximum duration of a Parliament is five years. Members receive a salary payment of £1,750 per annum, and travelling facilities between London, home and constituency on Parliamentary duties.

The House of Lords (July 1959) was composed as follows: Peers of royal blood, 4; Archbishops, 2; Dukes, 21; Marquesses, 27; Earls, 134; Viscounts, 105; Bishops, 24; Barons, 556; Baronesses, 4. Scottish representative peers, 14; Irish representative peers, 1;

total 892 of whom 13 are minors, making the actual number in the House of Lords, 879.

Peers receive no salary. They are re-imbursed the cost of such railway fees between their places of residence and London as they incur in attending Parliament; they are also re-imbursed other expenses, within a maximum of £3-3s. for each day's Parliamentary attendance.

No title attaches to office in Cabinet or Administration. The title Right Honourable is given to all Privy Counsellors. These are appointed for life, and every member of the Cabinet who is not already of the Privy Council is made a Privy Counsellor.

THE GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS

THE OFFICE OF PRIME MINISTER

Until comparatively recent times the office of Prime Minister was not recognized officially. In 1905 the Prime Minister was given precedence, by Royal Warrant, next after the Archbishop of York and over every member of the Government except the Lord Chancellor. There was no salary attached to the office of Prime Minister until the passing of the Ministers of the Crown Act in 1937, and the holder usually combined with it some other appointment, such as First Lord of the Treasury, which carried a salary.

THE TREASURY

Great George Street, S.W.1.

The Treasury is the Department which deals with all matters of public finance, home and overseas; gives sanction for expenditure by the spending departments, civil and military, and is responsible for personnel questions throughout the Civil Service. The Treasury presents the estimate of all the Civil Departments to Parliament, but, after presentation, the responsibility for defending them in Parliament rests with the Parliamentary Heads of the Departments. The control of the Treasury is nominally in the hands of the Lords Commissioners consisting of the First Lord of the Treasury (who is also the Prime Minister), the Chancellor of the Exchequer and five Junior Lords. The Prime Minister and first Lord is not primarily concerned in the day-to-day aspects of Treasury business nor are the Junior Lords and the Parliamentary Secretary who are Government Whips in the House of Commons. The higher departmental direction of Treasury business devolves on the Chancellor of the Exchequer, who is assisted at Ministerial level by the Financial Secretary and the Economic Secretary.

The Home Office has the control of the London police force, and also the oversight of the police forces in the counties and county boroughs. Generally speaking, the Department is responsible for the internal peace of the country and for Civil Defence and Fire Service organization. Prisons, executions, aliens, and all matters connected with the post-judicial execution of the criminal law, come within the purview of the Home Office.

The Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs is the Minister of the Crown responsible, subject always to the collective responsibility of the Cabinet, for the conduct of the foreign relations of the United Kingdom Government. He is the channel of communication between other government departments and private individuals in this country and foreign governments, and has, in addition, a number of duties of a formal nature. In 1925, responsibility for United Kingdom's relations with the Dominions (as they were then known) was transferred from the Secretary of State for the Colonies to a newly created Office of Secretary of State for Dominions Affairs. The two posts were held by the same individual Minister until 1930. The title was changed in 1947 to Secretary of State for Commonwealth Relations. In August 1947, responsibility for the conduct of relations with India and Pakistan was transferred to the Secretary of State for Commonwealth Relations from the Secretary of State for India, the latter post being abolished.

The Commonwealth Relations Office is now the Department which, under the Secretary of State, conducts the United Kingdom Government's relations with the Governments of the other Members of the Commonwealth (Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, India, Pakistan, Ceylon, Ghana, the Federation of Malaya and the Federation of Nigeria) the Federation of Rhodesia and Nyasaland, the self-governing Colony of Southern Rhodesia, and the Irish Republic (which, though no longer a Member of the Commonwealth, is not treated as a foreign country). It maintains High Commissioners' Offices in the other Commonwealth countries and an Embassy in Dublin. The staff for both the C.R.O. and its overseas posts is drawn from the Commonwealth Relations Service.

In addition the Secretary of State for Commonwealth Relations is responsible for the administration of the High Commission Territories in South Africa (Basutoland, the Bechuanaland Protectorate and Swaziland).

State grants for education have been paid in various forms since 1833. In 1839 the Committee of Council for Education was established. In 1944 an Education Act was passed by Parliament setting up a Ministry of Education in place of the Board of Education that had been established in 1899. Among its many reforms, the Act re-organised the local administration of education; provided for raising the age of compulsory school attendance to fifteen; laid down the principle of free secondary education for all; and required local education authorities to secure the provision in their area of adequate facilities for further education.

The Judicial Committee of the Privy Council was, until recently, the final court of appeal on certain legal issues arising in any Commonwealth country except the United Kingdom. In 1949 Canada abolished the right of appeal to the Privy Council, and in 1950 South Africa, India and Pakistan did likewise, so that appeals may come now only from Australia, New Zealand and Ceylon, and from their dependencies and those of the United Kingdom.

INCOME TAX RATES AND DEATH DUTIES IN GREAT BRITAIN, 1960-1961

The standard rate of Income Tax in the United Kingdom (Great Britain and Northern Ireland) for the year 1960-1961 imposed by the Finance Act, 1960, is 7s. 9d. in the pound.

Age Exemption.—Single persons aged 65 and upwards and married couples where either spouse is over 65 are exempt from Income Tax if their total incomes do not exceed £275 or £440 respectively; certain marginal provisions apply to incomes immediately above the limits of £275 or £440.

Earned Income and Analogous Allowances.—Two-ninths of the first £4,005 and one-ninth of the next £5,940 of earned income; where total income does not exceed £300 a deduction of two-ninths of total income is allowed; persons aged 65 and upwards whose total income does not exceed £830 are allowed a deduction of two-ninths of total income; certain marginal provisions apply to incomes immediately above the limits of £300 or £830.

Personal Allowance.—Married man £240, other persons £140. Additional allowance for wife's earned income, 7/9ths of that income up to a maximum of £140. Additional allowance of £40 to widows and widowers entitled to child allowance but not to housekeeper allowance.

Child Allowance.—£100 for a child under 11 years of age, £125 for children of 11 to 16, and £150 for children over 16 if receiving full-time education, or, in certain circumstances, full-time vocational training.

Housekeeper Allowance.—£75 for a widower's or widow's housekeeper; an unmarried person's widowed mother or other female relative taking care of children; or, in certain circumstances, a female person employed or maintained to take charge of children.

Dependent Relative Allowance. Where incapacitated by old age or infirmity not exceeding £75. In certain other circumstances not exceeding £40.

The income remaining after deduction of these reliefs is known as the taxable income; the first £60 of taxable income is charged at 1/9 in the £, the next £150 at 4/3 in the £, the next £150 at 6/3 in the £ and the remainder at the standard rate. Where the taxable income includes earned income of the wife, the amounts of taxable income chargeable at the reduced rates of 1/9, 4/3 and 6/3 in the £ may in certain circumstances be increased to £120, £300 and £300 respectively. Certain relief from tax is given in respect of life insurance premiums paid, in accordance with statutory provisions.

A portion of the tax payable by individuals for years 1941-42 to 1945-46 has been earmarked as a Post War Credit to be made available to the Taxpayer at a date to be determined. The Post War Credit for all five years is now being made available to men taxpayers aged 63 and over and to women taxpayers aged 58 and over. It is also available to persons falling within certain categories of hardship defined by regulation, to persons who hold credit as beneficiary of a deceased person and to a trustee in bankruptcy of a bankrupt holder.

SURTAX

On incomes of individuals in excess of £2,000 a further charge or tax is imposed, called the Surtax, which is payable as a deferred instalment of Income

Tax on the 1st January following the year of assessment. Thus Surtax in respect of the year 1959-60 will be payable on the 1st January 1961. In computing the income on which Surtax is charged deduction is allowed of the personal allowances (other than the earned income allowance) which are given for Income Tax, to the extent that they exceed the basic single person's allowance of £140. The additional rates charged on these incomes begin at 2s.0d. in the £ on the first £500 of the excess over £2,000, and rise by steps to the rate of 10s.0d. in the £ payable on the excess over £15,000.

PROFITS TAX

The tax introduced in 1937 as the National Defence Contribution has, as from 1 January, 1947, been renamed the Profits Tax. The Profits Tax is imposed on the profits of all trades or businesses (excluding professions); as from 1st January, 1947 it applies only to corporate bodies and unincorporated societies and as from that date investment income is included in computing profits. As from 1st April, 1960, the rate of tax is 12½% on both distributed and undistributed profits. If the profits are less than £2,000, no tax is payable. If the profits exceed £2,000 but are less than £12,000, an abatement is allowed.

DOUBLE TAXATION RELIEF

Relief from United Kingdom income tax (including surtax) and profits tax is allowed in respect of taxes of a similar nature in Commonwealth or foreign countries.

As between the United Kingdom and Canada there is a special arrangement, signed on 5th June 1946, under which certain classes of income derived from one country by a resident of the other country are exempt from tax in the former country. Where both countries continue to tax, full relief for the double taxation is given by the country of residence of the taxpayer. The United Kingdom has similar arrangements with the United States and a number of other countries.

Where no such arrangement is in operation, a person resident in the United Kingdom is entitled to full relief in respect of tax paid in the country in which income arises. This new relief supersedes a previously existing scheme in respect of taxes paid in Commonwealth or foreign countries.

An abatement may be allowed of 45% of that part of the duty which relates to agricultural property and to certain business assets.

An agreement between the United Kingdom and Canada for avoidance of double death duties was signed on 5th June, 1946.

BIRTH, MARRIAGE AND DEATH CERTIFICATES—GREAT BRITAIN

A certificate of any birth, death or marriage registered in England and Wales since 1837 can be obtained from the Registrar General, General Register Office, Somerset House, London, W.C.2. Applicants should state the date and place of the event as fully as possible and give all names in full, including, in the case of a birth, the mother's maiden surname. Where full particulars are given, the fees are 7s. 6d. for a full birth, death, or marriage certificate, or 9d. for a short birth certificate, which omits the parents' names.

A Canadian Postal Money Order made payable to the Registrar General, London, and crossed " & Co." should be enclosed and 1s. 3d. should be added to the

fee if the certificate is required to be sent by Air Mail

Scotland—A certificate of any birth, death or marriage registered since 1855 may be obtained from the Registrar General, General Registry Office, New Register House, Edinburgh 2. When full particulars are given the fees are 5s. 3d. for a full birth, death or marriage certificate, or 9d. for a short birth certificate.

Canadian Postal Money Orders should be made payable to the Registrar General, Edinburgh, and if the certificate is required to be returned by Air Mail the sum of 1s. 3d. should be added to the fee.

BRITISH CUSTOMS DUTIES ON IMPORTS

Under the British Import Duties Act, 1958, customs duties at various rates are applied to a very wide range of goods.

Duty is also chargeable under other enactments, the main classes of goods liable being Beer, Hydrocarbon Oils, Spirits, Sugar, Tobacco and Wine.

Goods (except Hydrocarbon Oils) of Canadian origin, which fulfil the conditions of Commonwealth Preference referred to below, are admitted either free of duty or at a preferential rate.

Schedules of rates of duty are included in the "Customs and Excise Tariff of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland," published periodically by H. M. Stationery Office, York House, Kingsway, London, W.C. 2, with amendments.

COMMONWEALTH PREFERENCE

The general conditions governing admission of imported goods to Commonwealth Preference are that the goods must be shown to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of Customs and Excise to have been (a) consigned to the United Kingdom from the Commonwealth preference area and (b) grown, produced or manufactured in the Commonwealth preference area.

Full information is given in Customs Notice 27A which may be obtained from the Secretary, Customs and Excise, King's Beam House, Mark Lane, London, E.C.3, from any Collector of Customs and Excise in the United Kingdom or from United Kingdom Commercial Representatives overseas; also from the Department of Trade and Commerce, International Trade Relations Branch, Ottawa, Ontario.

IMPORT LICENCES

Under the Import of Goods (Control) Order, 1954, no goods (other than most goods consigned from the Channel Islands) may be imported into the United Kingdom except under the authority of a licence granted by the Board of Trade. Separate licences are not, however, required for limited lists of goods consigned from all countries or specified countries respectively which have been included in the Open General Licence.

Details of the goods covered by this Open General Licence are published from time to time in the Board of Trade Journal and in "Notices to Importers" issued by the Tariff and Import Division of the Board of Trade, Horse Guards Ave., London, S.W.1.

PURCHASE TAX

The United Kingdom Purchase Tax is a single-stage sales tax charged at *ad valorem* rates on specified classes of goods. In general, liability to tax arises when the goods pass from the wholesaler to the retailer. Manufacturers and wholesale merchants dealing in chargeable goods must be registered. This enables them to deal with one another freely in the goods, or to export them without liability to tax. Tax becomes chargeable when the goods are sold by the registered manufacturer or wholesaler to an unregistered person, generally the retailer, or where there is no retail stage, to the public.

Purchase Tax is levied on chargeable goods imported into the United Kingdom, with the exception of goods imported for a registered wholesale merchant or a registered manufacturer as stock for his business or as materials. Such imported goods would become chargeable with tax (in the same way as goods of

United Kingdom origin) if subsequently sold by the registered trader to an unregistered person.

The tax was first imposed by the Finance (No. 2) Act, 1940, and came into operation on 21st October, 1940, at two rates—16½% and 33½% of the wholesale value of the goods.

The groups of goods chargeable with Purchase Tax and the Statutory exemptions from the tax are defined in the Second Schedule to the Finance Act 1958, as amended. At present (June 1960) there are four rates ranging from 5% to 50% of the wholesale value.

Latest information about chargeable goods is contained in Notice No. 78, and about the tax generally in Notice No. 77, obtainable from the Commissioners of Customs and Excise, King's Beam House, Mark Lane, London E.C. 3.

THE ROYAL NAVY

THE ADMIRALTY

The Admiralty, which has charge of the Royal Navy, is administered by Lords Commissioners who form the Board of Admiralty. The Head of the Department, who is a Minister of the Government, is known as the First Lord of the Admiralty. The other Lords Commissioners supervise the work of the departments into which the Admiralty is divided. The First Sea Lord and Chief of Naval Staff is the principal naval adviser to H.M. Government.

The Royal Marines are administered by the Commandant-General, Royal Marines, under the direction of the Board of Admiralty.

The Women's Royal Naval Service is administered by the Director, W.R.N.S., under the direction of the Board of Admiralty. H.M. Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother, is Commandant-in-Chief.

ORGANIZATION

A large proportion of the ships of the Royal Navy is distributed amongst the following Fleets and Squadrons:—

The Home Fleet, based on the U.K.

The Mediterranean Fleet, based on Malta.

The Far East Fleet, based on Singapore and Hong Kong.

The Arabian Seas and Persian Gulf Squadron.

The West Indies Squadron.

The South Atlantic and South America Squadron.

Many other ships are used for training purposes and local duties in Home Waters and the remainder, not required for operational service, form the Reserve Fleet.

The Royal Navy maintains a large number of shore establishments in the U.K., and to a lesser degree abroad. There are dockyards at the following places:

Home: Portsmouth, Chatham, Devonport and Rosyth.

Abroad: Gibraltar and Singapore.

In addition to the Commanders-in-Chief of the Fleets and establishments abroad, there is a Commander-in-Chief in charge of each of the Home Ports (Portsmouth, Chatham and Devonport) and of the ships and establishments in his Command. Flag Officer, Scotland is in charge of ships and establishments in Scotland.

There is a Flag Officer at the head of the Submarine Service and another is in charge of the Fleet Air Arm at home. There is also a Flag Officer, Aircraft Carriers.

PERSONNEL

Active Service. At the beginning of the financial year 1960-61 Active Service personnel in the R.N. totalled 100,650 made up as follows:

Reserves. The Royal Navy maintains a wide variety of Reserve Forces. Among them are the following:

The Royal Fleet Reserve, which consists of regular Naval ratings and Royal Marine Other Ranks who have completed the active service portion of their engagement, or whose discharge by purchase was conditional on their joining the Royal Fleet Reserve.

The Royal Naval Reserve, which draws its members from the Merchant Navy and the fishing fleets and from civilian volunteers.

*Queen Alexandra's Royal Naval Nursing Service.

The Royal Marine Forces Volunteer Reserve

The Women's Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve

These consist of civilians—many with previous Naval or Marine service—who volunteer to serve in the R.N. or R.M. in time of an emergency and who undertake part-time training.

The Royal Naval Minewatching Service, which is a civilian organization administered by the Admiralty.

There are other reserves of men and women who served during or since the last war.

STRENGTH OF THE FLEET

Operational Fleet—4 aircraft carriers, 5 cruisers, 20 destroyers, 34 frigates, 1 fast minelayer, 1 ice patrol ship, 31 submarines, 37 minesweepers, 4 coastal craft, 7 landing vessels, 2 despatch vessels, 1 Cdo carrier.

Trials and Training—1 guided weapon trials ship, 3 destroyers, 17 frigates, 14 minesweepers, 3 coastal craft, 3 submarines, 1 landing vessel.

Fleet support and auxiliaries—1 destroyer depot ship, 2 submarine depot ships, 1 coastal minesweeper headquarters ship, 1 repair ship, 6 survey ships, 1 minelayer, 6 controlled minelayers, 20 boom defence vessels, 2 submarine support ships, 5 harbour accommodation ships, 1 escort maintenance ship, 1 minecounter support and trial diving ship.

In construction—1 cruiser, 4 guided missile destroyers, 17 frigates, 5 submarines, 2 minesweepers, 1 coastal craft, 1 boom defence vessel.

In Reserve, Extended refits, etc.—4 aircraft carriers, 5 cruisers, 29 destroyers, 49 frigates, 2 fast minelayers, 19 submarines, 152 minesweepers, 23 coastal craft, 9 landing vessels, 1 netlayer, 1 destroyer depot ship, 6 maintenance ships, 30 boom defence vessels, 4 degaussing vessels, 2 controlled minelayers, 1 survey ship, 1 submarine depot ship.

ENTRY INTO THE R.N.

Officers. The main form of officer entry into the R.N. is through Cadetships to the Britannia Royal Naval College, Dartmouth. These cadetships are awarded according to candidates' educational qualifications and in tests of personal qualities. Training, board, accommodation and uniform etc. are free.

Chaplains, Doctors, Dentists and Instructor Officers are offered short service commissions on completion of their professional training, with opportunities of obtaining a permanent commission.

The majority of Fleet Air Arm pilots and observers also serve on short service commissions. These officers enter for a period of 12 years on the Supplementary List with the opportunity of obtaining a permanent commission on that list or of resigning on completion of 8 years with a gratuity of £1,500. The gratuity of an officer leaving after 12 years is £4,000. There is also a 5-year commission, with £675 gratuity, for aircrew employed on helicopter duties only.

Ratings. Ratings may engage for 9 years service in the R.N. followed by 3 years in the R.F.R. and may volunteer to serve 22 years to qualify for a pension and terminal grant.

Entry into the R.N. as a rating is open to those between the ages of 15 and 28.

Good opportunities are offered to ratings to become officers.

Entry regulations and promotion prospects for the Royal Marines are broadly similar to those of the R.N. Members of the W.R.N.S. enrol for four years and may re-engage for further periods.

Cost

The gross estimate of the cost of the naval services for the financial year 1960-61 was £456,746,000 or £21,339,000 more than provided for the previous year.

THE BRITISH ARMY

HISTORICAL

Parliament's consent to the maintenance of an army was established in the seventeenth century as a result of a struggle between the Commons and the Stuarts. The standing army became a national institution under Charles II, and the Mutiny Act, passed at the accession of William III, in 1689, formed the basis of army discipline. The Mutiny Act, after enlargement and change from time to time, is now replaced by the Army Act, constitutional control being assured by the Army and Air Force (Annual) Act, which until the passing of the Army Act, 1955, and the Revision of the Army and Air Force Acts (Transitional Provisions) Act, 1955, was passed by Parliament to maintain the Army Act in force for one year. The Army Act, 1955, came into force on 1st January 1957 and may be annually renewed by Order in Council for five consecutive years before a further Act of Parliament is required.

ORGANIZATION

The British Army is made up of (a) the Regular Army and the Royal Army Reserve, and (b) the Territorial Army.

The Secretary of State for War is the President of the Army Council. Other members of the Army Council are responsible for operations, organization, personal matters, logistics and finance.

The British Army at home and overseas is divided into commands, of which the more important are commanded by generals or lieutenant-generals, who control a number of districts or areas and the fighting formations in their localities.

In war the largest single formation is an Army Group, commanded by a General and consisting of two or more corps which each consist of a varying number of divisions. Additional supporting and administrative units are held in Corps Troops for allocation in support of Brigade Groups as required.

Divisional headquarters are capable of commanding a varying number of brigade groups of any type, according to the situation. The number of brigade groups under a divisional headquarters will not normally exceed four.

The basic fighting formation of the British Army is the brigade group. There are three types of brigade groups, armoured, infantry, and parachute, each of which consists of a number of units of all arms permanently allocated. They contain sufficient administrative units to cater for their normal day to day needs. Brigade groups are normally under command of a divisional headquarters but are capable, when necessary, of operating direct under corps control.

Besides the major fighting arms—Royal Armoured Corps, Royal Artillery, Royal Engineers and Infantry—there are a number of technical and specialist corps.

THE REGULAR ARMY

The Regular Army comprises officers and other ranks commissioned or enlisted for full-time service.

Officers may hold Regular, Short Service or National Service commissions. The normal regular engagement for men is a 22 year engagement with the right on giving the prescribed notice, to leave the Colours on completion of six years service and thereafter at each successive three year point of the engagement. Men in certain categories (which include those enlisted while serving as national service men) have the additional right to leave the Colours on completion of three years service provided they give the prescribed notice. A man who terminates his Colour service is required to serve in the regular reserve for periods of three to six years according to the point at which he terminates his Colour service.

Men between the ages of 18 and 26 years (doctors up to 30 years of age) called up for service under the

National Service Acts are required to complete two years whole-time service in the Regular Army and three and a half years' part-time service in the Army Emergency Reserve or the Territorial Army. National service men may be appointed to commissions for all or part of their national service liability.

RESERVE FORCES

The Regular Army Reserve of Officers is composed of retired Regular Army Officers and volunteer members who are liable for reserve service up to ages which vary according to their rank and corps; and also of National Service and certain other officers who have completed their active list service but who have a liability for service under the Navy, Army and Air Force Reserves Act, 1954 and 1959, up to 30th June 1964 or the age of 45 years whichever is earlier.

The Royal Army Reserve is a reserve of warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men and comprises the Regular Reserve, the Army Emergency Reserve and the Army General Reserve. The Regular Reserve consists of men who engage or are transferred for a period in this Reserve, having completed a period of service with the Colours. Members of the Royal Army Reserve are liable to be called out by Royal Proclamation for service in any part of the world in the case of imminent danger or great emergency.

The Army General Reserve is comprised of national service men who have completed their whole time and part time service. Members of this Reserve are unpaid and have no liability for training. Reserve liability ends on attaining the age of 45 years.

The role of the Army Emergency Reserve is to provide certain communications, technical and administrative services required in an emergency. It consists of volunteers and part-time national service men and is organized partly in units and partly in general pools.

THE TERRITORIAL ARMY

The Territorial Army is virtually an all volunteer, part-time force. It does, however, require a small permanent staff of regular officers, men and women posted for terms of duty from units of the Regular Army. Territorial Army units are brought up to establishment strength with allotted national service men who do not, however, take any part in Territorial activities in peace. Each Territorial Unit is based on and draws its recruits from a particular area of the country.

The Territorial Army can only be called out on permanent service in the event of actual or apprehended attack, but in the event of war may be sent anywhere at home or abroad.

WOMEN'S CORPS

Queen Alexandra's Royal Army Nursing Corps is a corps of officers and soldiers who, under the direction of its Matron-in-Chief, nurse Army personnel and their families in all parts of the world. Its officers also train other ranks of the corps and of the Royal Army Medical Corps in nursing duties.

The Women's Royal Army Corps provide officers and other ranks for a wide range of trades and employments in all theatres releasing men for combatant duties in the Army.

THE CADET FORCES

The Cadet Forces consist of the Basic and Army Sections of the Combined Cadet Force (C.C.F.), which also has Royal Navy and Royal Air Force Sections, and the Army Cadet Force (A.C.F.). Both are entirely voluntary and cater for boys between 14 and 18 years, the C.C.F. in school contingents and the A.C.F. in units raised both by schools and by geographical areas.

THE ROYAL AIR FORCE

The Royal Air Force is administered by the Air Council which consists of:

The Secretary of State for Air (President of the Air Council).

The Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State (Vice-President),

The Chief of the Air Staff,

The Air Member for Personnel,

The Air Member for Supply and Organisation,

The Permanent Under-Secretary of State (Secretary).

Additional members:

The Vice-Chief of the Air Staff.

Deputy Chief of the Air Staff.

The Secretary of State is responsible to Her Majesty the Queen and Parliament for all the business of the Air Council.

THE AIR MINISTRY

The Air Ministry is organised in five departments, as below:

The Department of the *Chief of the Air Staff* (C.A.S.).

The Chief of the Air Staff is the senior Air Member of Council and principal adviser of the Secretary of State on all the Service aspects of the administration of the Royal Air Force. He is responsible for all questions of Air Force policy and planning, for advice on the conduct of air operations for all training other than technical training, and for the fighting efficiency of the Royal Air Force. He is assisted by the Vice-Chief of the Air Staff, the Deputy Chief of the Air Staff, and the Assistant Chiefs of the Air Staff, each of whom is responsible for certain duties.

The Department of the *Air Member for Personnel* (A.M.P.).

The Air Member for Personnel is responsible for the personnel policy and administration, other than training and establishments, of the R.A.F., its reserves and auxiliaries, and the Women's R.A.F. and the Air Training Corps. This includes questions of manpower; conditions of service for all types of R.A.F. and W.R.A.F. personnel; discipline; ceremonial, honours and awards; appointments; exits, promotions and postings; and casualties. He is also responsible for the welfare of R.A.F. and W.R.A.F. personnel including the religious, educational and medical services.

The Department of the *Air Member for Supply and Organisation* (A.M.S.O.).

The Air Member for Supply and Organisation is responsible for the organisation of the Royal Air Force; for the provision of equipment, stores and foodstuffs; for transportation; and for works, buildings and land; and technical training and technical services of the R.A.F.

The Department of the *Permanent Under-Secretary of State* (P.U.S.).

The Permanent Under-Secretary of State is the Accounting Officer of the Air Ministry and as such is responsible for financial advice and for the control of all expenditure; for accounting to Parliament for the expenditure of public money and stores; and for the negotiation and placing of contracts. He is also Secretary of the Air Council and in that capacity is responsible for the efficient working of the Air Ministry as a Department of State, for Parliamentary and legal business and for public relations.

The *Meteorological Office* is organised as part of the Air Ministry. It is responsible for meteorological research and for supplying meteorological information to all users, including units of the Royal Air Force.

UNITED KINGDOM COMMANDS

The *Commands of the R.A.F.* in the United Kingdom are as follows:

Bomber Command, its function is defined by its title; it also controls photographic reconnaissance units.

Fighter Command. Responsible for the control of offensive and defensive fighter operations; also for operational control of Royal Aux. Air Force units and the Royal Observer Corps.

Coastal Command. Responsible for the safeguarding of sea communications in the Atlantic and British

home waters in conjunction with the Royal Navy; also for meteorological reconnaissance, and air/sea rescue.

Transport Command. Responsible for providing mobility to the strategic reserve and the study, development and training of all air transport operations, including airborne assaults; the organisation and control of air transport operations in support of the R.A.F. and other services; and for operations along the trunk routes, including flight delivery of aircraft between theatres.

Flying Training Command. Responsible for the training of flying personnel. Also controls the Royal Air Force College, Cranwell, the R.A.F. Flying College, Manby (a specialist Flying Training Unit for officers of all the Commonwealth Air Forces, which combines certain aspects of the work of the discontinued Empire Flying School, the Empire Air Navigation School and the Empire Air Armament School), the Air Training Corps and Royal Air Force Section of the Combined Cadet Force, and various schools for the training of instructors in flying, navigation and the use of weapons.

Technical Training Command. Responsible for the training of ground personnel. Also controls the R.A.F. Technical College, in which the specialist training of technical officers is carried out.

Maintenance Command. Responsible for the storage and issue of the whole range of equipment used by the R.A.F.

Signals Command. Responsible for the greater part of the signals organization of the Royal Air Force, and for development of methods and equipment.

OVERSEAS COMMANDS

Overseas Commands are forces of various types of Squadrons and Service Units assigned to specific areas. The main overseas Commands of the R.A.F. are the Middle East Air Force, the Far East Air Force, and the 2nd Tactical Air Force. (This latter Force until September 1, 1951, was called the British Air Forces of Occupation, Germany, but following the decision that the operational resources of B.A.F.O. should be placed at the disposal of the Supreme Commander, Allied Powers in Europe, the role of the Command became primarily that of a tactical air force. It was therefore considered appropriate to restore the historical name of 2nd Tactical Air Force. On January 1, 1959 the Command was re-named Royal Air Force, Germany [2nd Tactical Air Force].)

N.A.T.O. The forces of the R.A.F. committed to N.A.T.O. are the 2nd Tactical Air Force, the Canberra light-bomber force in Bomber Command, Coastal Command and maritime aircraft in Malta.

Women's Royal Air Force. Following the decision that the Women's Forces were to be continued on a voluntary basis as a permanent feature of the Forces of the Crown, provision was made under the Army and Air Force (Women's Service) Act, 1948, which was brought into operation on 1st February, 1949, for women to be commissioned and enlisted in the Royal Air Force and its reserves and auxiliaries. Women officers and airwomen accepted, under the new conditions, for the Royal Air Force are fully integrated into that force and are not organised as a separate corps.

The Air Force Act applies to such women in the same way as it applies to men, subject to adaptations and modifications made by Order in Council.

The Royal Auxiliary Air Force and the R.A.F. Volunteer Reserve are voluntary organisations in which men and women render part-time service while continuing to follow their civilian occupations.

The Royal Observer Corps is a uniformed civilian body which is a vital part of Fighter Command's raid reporting and fighter control system. The duties of the members, who serve on a spare-time basis in peace, include the identification and plotting of aircraft flying over Great Britain and monitoring radio activity in nuclear war.

The Air Training Corps gives boys of 14 and over experience in gliding and air matters, with special advantages if they join the Royal Air Force.

BRITAIN'S AUXILIARY AND NATIONAL SERVICES

A list of Civil Defence organizations, which were active during World War II, with descriptions, names and addresses of directors, etc., was included in the Canadian Almanac for 1945 and previous years.

CIVIL DEFENCE

Civil Defence (established 1949) is part of Britain's plan to improve defensive measures by enrolling volunteers to form the nucleus of a national auxiliary service.

The Services concerned are the Civil Defence Corps, The Auxiliary Fire Service, the Industrial Civil Defence Service, the National Hospital Service Reserve and the Special Constabulary.

The first four train recruits (men and women) as part-time volunteers in peace-time for service if war should break out. The Special Constabulary provides training for recruits to assist the regular Police in peace as well as to establish additional trained reinforcements in emergency.

The Civil Defence Corps is a Crown service for which the Home Secretary and the Secretary of State for Scotland are responsible. Its local organization is a function of the local authorities. Each division (outside the County of London which has its own arrangements in conjunction with the Metropolitan Boroughs) comprises five sections: Headquarters, Warden, Rescue, Ambulance and First Aid and Welfare. In Scotland, where there is no separate Ambulance and First Aid Section, ambulance services are provided by the National Hospital Service Reserve, and casualty collecting is a Warden duty.

Civil Defence Staff College and training schools have been established for training Civil Defence Officers and Instructors. The National Hospital Service Reserve (recruited by the Ministry of Health

and Dept. of Health for Scotland) concentrates the available medical and nursing man-power on the hospitals in co-operation with the St. John Ambulance Brigade (the St. Andrew's Ambulance Assoc. in Scotland) and the British Red Cross.

THE BRITISH COMMONWEALTH OF NATIONS

The Commonwealth consists of eleven members; Australia, Canada, Ceylon, India, New Zealand, Pakistan, the Union of South Africa, Ghana, the Federation of Malaya, Nigeria and the United Kingdom. Geographically the Commonwealth includes all territories in which the government of any of these countries exercises authority, that is, colonies, protectorates, etc. Its total area is 12,349,250 sq. miles, and its total estimated population 697,270,000.

The Imperial Conference held in 1926 stated that the United Kingdom and the Dominions were "autonomous communities within the British Empire, equal in status, in no way subordinate one to another in any aspect of their domestic or foreign affairs, though united by a common allegiance to the Crown, and freely associated as members of the British Commonwealth of Nations." The Statute of Westminster, 1931, abolished certain formal inequalities between the Parliament of the United Kingdom and the Parliaments of the Dominions.

THE UNITED KINGDOM

Consisting of England, Wales, Scotland, and Northern Ireland, is governed directly by Parliament, which is also supreme over the Crown Colonies. *Prime Minister*—Rt. Hon. Harold Macmillan, M.P.

NORTHERN IRELAND has its own Parliament for domestic matters. *Premier*, Viscount Brookeborough. *Governor*, Lord Wakehurst, K.C.M.G. (For Cabinet Ministers, see *Index*).

The new Malta constitution, promulgated under the authority of the Malta (Letters Patent) Act, 1959, came into force on 15th April, 1959. The constitution is contained in two instruments—the Malta (Constitution) Order in Council, 1959 (dated 24th March, 1959), and the Malta Royal Instructions, 1959 (dated 30th March, 1959).

The Order in Council provides for the office of Governor, and institutes an Executive Council to consist of three *ex officio* members (Chief Secretary, Legal Secretary, Financial Secretary) and nominated members, of whom at least three must hold public office. The names of the nominated members were announced by the Governor on 15th April; three official and four unofficial members have been appointed, all of whom are Maltese.

The Governor has power to enact ordinances, which are subject to disallowance by Her Majesty; Her Majesty reserves to herself ultimate power to make laws for the peace, order and good government of Malta.

The remainder of the Order in Council is concerned with the judicature, the public service, and finance. The English and Maltese languages are confirmed as the official languages, and full freedom of conscience and religious worship are reiterated in Section 49.

The Royal Instructions contain mainly administrative provisions, but Section 5 sets out a list of ordinances which may not be enacted without the prior permission of the United Kingdom Government.

IMPERIAL AND COMMONWEALTH CONFERENCES

During the celebration of the Golden Jubilee of Queen Victoria in 1887, the first Colonial Conference was held at London. The principal subjects discussed were defence, postal arrangements, and cable services. Delegates were present from the United Kingdom, Newfoundland, Canada, New South Wales, Tasmania, the Cape of Good Hope, South Australia, New Zealand, Victoria, Queensland, West Australia, and Natal.

In 1894, the Canadian Government convened a Colonial Conference at Ottawa, chiefly to consider preferential tariff arrangements within the Empire. Representatives were present from The United Kingdom, Canada, New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, South Australia, Tasmania, New Zealand, Cape Colony, and Fiji.

Further Colonial Conferences were held* in 1897, 1902, and 1907. At the 1907 meeting, the name Imperial Conference was adopted for future use.

In 1909, a special Conference on Naval and Military Defence took place.

A Conference on Copyright, subsidiary to the Imperial Conference, was held in 1910.

An Imperial Conference in 1911 discussed the organization of Imperial Conferences and of the Colonial Office, treaty arrangements, establishment of an Imperial Court of Appeal, migration, naturalization, cables, and shipping, and recommended the appointment of a Royal Commission to report on the natural resources of the Empire.

In 1917, the Imperial War Cabinet discussed the conduct of the war and possible peace arrangements, while the Imperial War Conference considered post-war problems, recommended full representation of India at future Imperial Conferences, and proposed that a special Imperial Conference be held after the war to consider constitutional relations, "based upon a full recognition of the Dominions as autonomous nations of an Imperial Commonwealth and of India as an important portion of the same".

Further meetings of the Imperial War Cabinet and Imperial War Conference took place in 1918.

In 1921, a Conference of Prime Ministers and Representatives of the United Kingdom, the Dominions and India was held, which discussed questions of foreign policy, defence, migration, nationality, air services and shipping, wireless communications, and the position of Indians in the Empire.

The Imperial Conference of 1923 discussed foreign policy, defence, and various other subjects, and made recommendations on treaty procedure. An Imperial Economic Conference took place simultaneously. These were the first meetings attended by delegates from the recently formed Irish Free State.

In 1926, an Imperial Conference defined the position of Great Britain and the Dominions as that of "autonomous communities within the British Empire, equal in status, in no way subordinate one to another in any aspect of their domestic or external affairs, though united by a common allegiance to the Crown, and freely associated as members of the British Commonwealth of Nations". This Conference also defined the position of Governors-General as representatives of the Crown, not of the United Kingdom Government, made further recommendations on treaty procedure and the general conduct of foreign policy and proposed the appointment of special bodies to inquire into the question of the operation of Dominion legislation and the question of merchant shipping legislation. In addition, it discussed foreign relations defence, migration, and various economic matters.

A Conference on the Operation of Dominion Legislation and Merchant Shipping Legislation, held in 1929 as a result of the recommendation of the Imperial Conference of 1926, drew up proposals which resulted in the Statute of Westminster and in decentralization of legislation on merchant shipping.

The Imperial Conference of 1930 adopted these proposals and discussed numerous other matters relating to defence, nationality, foreign relations, and economic policy.

In 1932, an Imperial Economic Conference met at

Ottawa and concluded trade agreements among the countries represented. Other economic matters were also considered, and a recommendation was made for the appointment of a committee to consider means of facilitating economic consultation and co-operation.

As a result of this recommendation, the Imperial Committee on Economic Consultation and Co-operation met in 1933 and issued a report on existing Commonwealth bodies concerned with economic co-operation, and the principles which should be adopted in this field.

In 1935, during the celebration of the Silver Jubilee of King George V, an informal Prime Ministers' Meeting took place to discuss foreign affairs and other matters of common concern.

An Imperial Conference met in 1937 and discussed questions of foreign relations, defence, and economic affairs.

The outbreak of the Second World War prevented the holding of further formal conferences, though in 1939 cabinet ministers from Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and South Africa conferred with United Kingdom ministers on means of co-ordinating their countries' war activities.

In 1944, a Prime Ministers' Meeting was held to discuss war and post-war questions.

A Commonwealth Telecommunications Conference, 1945, recommended the transfer to public ownership of the external telecommunications services of the countries represented.

Another Prime Ministers' Meeting in 1946 discussed draft peace treaties, the future of Germany, methods of consultation among Commonwealth countries, defence liaison arrangements, and economic and welfare co-operation in Southeast Asia and the South Pacific.

In 1947, a Conference was held at Canberra among representatives of Australia, the United Kingdom, Canada, New Zealand, South Africa, India, Pakistan, and Burma, to exchange views on the peace settlement with Japan.

A Prime Ministers' Meeting in 1948 discussed international relations, defence, economic affairs, and methods of consultation among Commonwealth governments.

In 1949, a Prime Ministers' Meeting was held to consider the possibility of India's remaining a member of the Commonwealth after becoming a republic. At the close of the meeting a declaration was issued by the Prime Ministers, in which the Government of India affirmed India's desire to continue her membership of the Commonwealth, and her acceptance of the King as the symbol of the free association of its independent member nations and as such the Head of the Commonwealth; while the Governments of the other countries of the Commonwealth accepted and recognized India's continuing membership.

In 1950, a Meeting on Foreign Affairs was held at Colombo among Commonwealth ministers dealing with that subject. It recommended the establishment of a Consultative Committee by Commonwealth governments interested in Southeast Asia, to encourage its economic improvement and thereby foster political stability. In addition, the Conference considered the situation created by the emergence of a Communist government in China, reviewed the recommendations of the Canberra Conference, 1947, on a peace settlement with Japan, and examined the situation in Western Europe.

The Consultative Committee on Co-operative Economic Development in South and Southeast Asia held its first meeting at Sydney, Australia, in May, 1950, and has met at frequent intervals since that time. The meeting of October, 1954, took place at Ottawa. The membership of the Committee was at first limited to Commonwealth countries, but has since been broadened to include others. Under the auspices of the Committee, the governments of South and Southeast Asia have drawn up programmes for economic development, to be financed in part by themselves and in part by assistance from other countries. A technical assistance scheme was also established.

In January, 1951, a Prime Ministers' Meeting was held to review the international situation. It dis-

cussed particularly the situation in the Far East, the Middle East, and Europe. Economic problems caused by shortages of raw materials were also discussed.

In June, 1951, the defence ministers of the United Kingdom, Australia, New Zealand, and the Union of South Africa, and a representative of Southern Rhodesia, met to consider certain defence problems in regions of common concern, including the Middle East. The Canadian Government was represented by an observer.

In September, 1951, a meeting of Commonwealth ministers concerned with supply and production discussed problems of the distribution of raw materials and manufactured goods.

There was a Commonwealth Economic Conference in 1952, at which the delegations were headed by Prime Ministers. This Conference agreed to seek the co-operation of the United States and European countries in a plan incorporating international action for the progressive removal of import restrictions by both creditor and debtor countries and the restoration by progressive stages of the convertibility of sterling when conditions permitted. It was also agreed that development in the sterling area should be concentrated on projects contributing to the improvement of the area's balance of payments with the rest of the world; and the United Kingdom undertook to try to provide additional capital for Commonwealth development by facilitating the financing of such projects, and to make sterling available for loan by the International Bank for certain projects.

After the Coronation in 1953, there was a Prime Ministers' Meeting which discussed foreign affairs and economic developments. Relations with the Soviet Union, the Korean negotiations, and the position in the Middle East received particular attention.

A Prime Ministers' Meeting in 1955 surveyed international affairs. It was agreed that Pakistan, which was planning to adopt a republican form of government, should continue to be a full member of the Commonwealth. Regional meetings on defence matters were held during the Prime Ministers' Meeting.

A Commonwealth Prime Ministers' Meeting in 1956 reviewed the current state of international affairs, discussing in particular recent developments within the Soviet Union and the situation in the Middle East, the Far East and South East Asia. The Prime Ministers expressed their agreement that Ceylon should continue a member of the Commonwealth after the proposed adoption of a republican constitution.

A Prime Ministers' Meeting in 1957, at which Ghana was represented for the first time, discussed international questions of common concern. The Prime Ministers agreed on the need to strengthen and improve the United Nations; noted the progress of discussions on disarmament and agreed that economic and social progress must be the foundation for stability in the Middle East, but that solutions for the immediate problems of Arab-Israeli tension, the Arab refugees and the Suez canal should be sought by all practicable means. Proposals for the creation of the European free trade area and the European common market were discussed.

Finance Ministers and other delegates representing eleven Commonwealth countries met in September,

1957, at Mount Tremblant, Quebec, where they agreed to recommend to their governments that a full scale Commonwealth Trade and Economic Conference should be held the following year.

The Commonwealth Trade and Economic Conference met in Montreal from September 15 to 26, 1958. It was attended by delegations from all the Commonwealth countries—the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, India, Pakistan, Ceylon, Ghana, The Federation of Malaya, and the Federation of Rhodesia and Nyasaland. The following Colonial territories were represented in an advisory capacity to the United Kingdom delegation: Nigeria, The West Indies, Kenya, Tanganyika, Uganda, Sierra Leone and Hong Kong. The central theme of the Conference was "an expanding Commonwealth in an expanding world". Decisions were taken and understandings were reached under the following headings: Trade, Commodity Problems, Agriculture, Finance, Development, Education, Telecommunications, and Consultation.

Periodic meetings of Commonwealth Finance Ministers have been held since the Second World War to consider economic problems, chiefly related to the Sterling area. Such Conferences were held in London in 1949 and 1952, in Canberra in 1954, and in Washington, U.S.A. in 1956.

In addition to these major conferences among heads of governments and the subsidiary meetings arising directly out of them, there have been numerous conferences of experts in special fields. These include the following: Imperial Statistical Conference, 1920; Imperial Entomological Conference, 1920; British Empire Forestry Conference, 1920; Imperial Customs Conference, Ottawa, 1923; British Empire Forestry Conference, Ottawa, 1923; Imperial Mycological Conference, 1924; Imperial Entomological Conference, 1925; Imperial Education Conference, 1927; Imperial Agricultural Research Conference, 1928; Conference on Cable and Wireless Communications, 1928; British Empire Forestry Conference, Australia and New Zealand, 1928; Empire Survey Officers' Conference, 1928; Conference of Empire Meteorologists, 1929; Empire Survey Officers' Conference, 1931; Conference of British Commonwealth Statisticians, Ottawa, 1935; British Empire Forestry Conference, South Africa, 1935; Empire Survey Officers' Conference, 1935; Conference of Empire Meteorologists, 1935; British Commonwealth Scientific Conference, 1936; Commonwealth Telegraph Conference, Sydney, 1942; British Commonwealth Scientific Conference, 1946; Conference of Commonwealth Meteorologists, 1946; British Commonwealth Conference on Nationality and Citizenship, 1947; Commonwealth Conference on Social Insurance, 1947; British Empire Forestry Conference, 1947; British Commonwealth Survey Officers' Conference, 1947; Conference of British Commonwealth Statisticians, Australia, 1948; British Commonwealth Survey Officers' Conference, 1951; British Commonwealth Scientific Conference, Australia, 1952; British Commonwealth Forestry Conference, Canada, 1952 and Australia and New Zealand, 1957.

The Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (formerly the Empire Parliamentary Association) consists of representatives of the Commonwealth parliaments, and has branches in the countries represented. It was organized in 1911 and has held frequent meetings in various Commonwealth countries; in 1952 it met at Ottawa.

WORLD ORGANIZATIONS

THE UNITED NATIONS

The United Nations is a world organization for the maintenance of peace and security and for the promotion of the welfare of humanity. The Charter was signed on June 26, 1945 and came into force on October 24, 1945.

Through a series of conferences, at Dumbarton Oaks (August-October 1944), at Yalta (February 1945) and at San Francisco (April-June 1945), the Charter of the United Nations was produced.

The main organs of the United Nations are: the General Assembly, the Security Council, the Economic and Social Council, the Trusteeship Council, the International Court of Justice, the Secretariat. Subsidiary organs are established as and when required.

The *General Assembly* is composed of representatives of 82 Member States with one vote each. It is the only organ of the United Nations on which all Members are represented. It is a deliberative body where the Members have the opportunity to exchange views and state their problems. The Assembly in November 1950 decided that if the Security Council, because of lack of unanimity of the permanent members, fails to exercise its primary responsibility for maintaining international peace and security in any case where there appears to be a threat to peace, breach of the peace, or act of aggression, the Assembly may consider the matter immediately with a view to making recommendations to Members for collective measures, including, in the case of a breach of the peace or act of aggression, the use of armed force when necessary to restore peace. Decisions are taken by a two-thirds majority on important questions and a simple majority on other questions. The Assembly deals with its work through seven Main Committees on which all Members have the right to be represented: First Committee (Political and Security, including the regulation of armaments); Special Political Committee; Second Committee (Economic and Financial); Third Committee (Social, Humanitarian, and Cultural); Fourth Committee (Trusteeship, including non-self-governing territories); Fifth Committee (Administrative and Budgetary); Sixth Committee (Legal). In addition, the UN Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East and the Office of the UN High Commissioner for Refugees, among other bodies, report to the General Assembly. The Assembly has also established procedural, standing and other *ad hoc* committees. C. S. A. Ritchie is Canada's permanent representative at United Nations headquarters in New York.

The *Security Council* is composed of five permanent members, China, France, the United Kingdom, the United States and the Soviet Union. In addition, there are six non-permanent members elected by the General Assembly for a term of two years. The principal function of the Security Council is to examine questions endangering the maintenance of international peace and security, and to adopt and apply means to solve dangerous international situations or disputes. Each member of the Security Council has one vote. Decisions on procedural matters are made by an affirmative vote of five members. On all other matters an affirmative vote of seven members, including the concurring votes of the five permanent members, is required (unless, in certain circumstances, a permanent member abstains from voting). Thus, the negative vote of one permanent member is sufficient to prevent the taking of a substantive decision. This is the "veto" power.

The Charter provides that a *Military Staff Committee*, consisting of the Chiefs of Staff of the permanent members of the Security Council or their representatives is to advise and assist the Security Council on all questions relating to the Council's military requirements for the maintenance of international peace and security, the regulation of armaments or possible disarmament.

On 11 January 1952 the General Assembly established the Disarmament Commission to replace the Atomic Energy Commission and the Commission for

Conventional Armaments and to combine the work of both. The Disarmament Commission, since 1959 has been composed of all the members of the United Nations.

The *Economic and Social Council* is composed of representatives of eighteen Member States elected by the General Assembly for a term of three years. Its function is to study and report on social and economic problems throughout the world, and to suggest means for their solution. Its decisions are taken by a simple majority vote. It is authorized to enter into agreements with specialized agencies for the purpose of bringing them into relationship with the United Nations. Such agreements are subject to approval by the General Assembly and the appropriate body of the specialized agency concerned. Agreements with the following agencies are in force: International Labour Organisation (ILO); Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO); United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO); World Health Organization (WHO); International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO); International Bank for Reconstruction and Development; International Finance Corporation; International Monetary Fund; Universal Postal Union (UPU); International Telecommunication Union (ITU); World Meteorological Organization (WMO); and Inter-Governmental Maritime Consultative Organization (IMCO). An agreement has also been authorized with the International Trade Organization (ITO) if and when that body comes into existence. Though establishment of ITO and the bringing into operation of the Havana Charter, on which it was to be based, have not taken place, one of the main objectives of that Charter has been embodied in an international commercial treaty, known as the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT). Provision has been made for the establishment of a permanent Organization for Trade Cooperation (OTC) to administer GATT.

An International Atomic Energy Agency, to promote the peaceful uses of atomic energy, was formally established in July 1957. The Agency's working relationship with the United Nations has been determined in an agreement approved by the UN General Assembly and the Agency's General Conference in the autumn of 1957. This agreement provides that the Agency shall report annually to the General Assembly, and in addition submit reports to the Security Council "when appropriate" and to the Economic and Social Council on matters within its competence.

The Economic and Social Council is aided in its work by several expert bodies, called commissions and sub-commissions, which keep international problems in their respective fields under review. These bodies cover such questions as transport and communications, statistical, human rights, social, population, status of women, narcotic drugs and international commodity trade. The Council has also set up regional economic commissions for Europe, for Asia and the Far East, for Latin America, and for Africa. The United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) also reports to the Council.

The *Trusteeship Council* consists of Members of the United Nations administering territories under trusteeship, those permanent members of the Security Council which do not administer trust territories, and as many other Members elected by the General Assembly for three-year terms as may be necessary to ensure that the total number of members in the Trusteeship Council is equally divided between those which administer trust territories and those which do not. Its decisions are taken by a simple majority vote.

The Trusteeship Council examines reports on Trust Territories annually submitted by the administering authorities; accepts petitions and examines them in consultation with the authorities; and provides for special or periodic visits to the Trust Territories.

The *International Court of Justice* is the principal judicial organ of the United Nations. It consists of fifteen members elected for a term of nine years by the General Assembly and by the Security Council voting independently.

The *Secretariat*, under a Secretary-General appointed by the General Assembly upon the recommendation of the Security Council, serves the United Nations. It is organized into a number of administrative units. Four of these are known as Offices of the Secretary-General because the work they perform engages the Secretary-General's responsibility in a more direct and personal way. These are the Executive Office of the Secretary-General, the Office of Legal Affairs, the Controller's Office and the Office of Personnel. There are also two Under-Secretaries for Special Political Affairs. Three of the units are Departments. These are the Department of Political and Security Council Affairs, the Department of Economic and Social Affairs and the Department of Trusteeship and Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories. In addition, there is an Office of Public Information, an Office of Conference Services and an Office of General Services.

The permanent headquarters of the United Nations is situated in New York, N.Y.

UNITED NATIONS OFFICE OF PUBLIC INFORMATION

New York, N.Y.

The Office carries out the information program of the United Nations. It provides facilities for the diffusion of information about the United Nations by press, radio, television, film, photographs and other media. It also helps develop information activities to supplement the services of existing agencies on as wide a geographical basis as possible, and cooperates with governments and non-governmental organizations in spreading knowledge of the United Nations and its related agencies in schools and other educational institutions. It provides information services for the correspondents accredited to the United Nations.

Booklets, pamphlets and other publications on all phases of United Nations activities are produced in many languages by the Office. It also facilitates the sale of United Nations publications, in local currencies, through sales agents throughout the world. To "ensure that peoples in all parts of the world receive as full information as possible about the United Nations", the Office has established information centres and offices in many of the principal capitals of the world.

Publications issued for the public may be obtained from the Queen's Printer, Ottawa.

INTERNATIONAL CIVIL AVIATION ORGANIZATION

The International Civil Aviation Organization came into being on April 4, 1947, when the required number of states (26) had ratified the Convention on International Civil Aviation.

The principal function of the organization is to ensure that international civil aviation may be developed in a safe and orderly manner and that international air transport services may be established on the basis of equality of opportunity and operated soundly and economically.

The principal organs of the organization are the Assembly, composed of all 77 member states, which meets twice in three years; the Council, comprising of 21 members, which meets at short intervals; and the Secretariat, which is recruited on a broad international basis.

There are five subordinate bodies:

1. the Air Navigation Commission
2. the Air Transport Committee
3. the Legal Committee
4. the Joint Support of Air Navigation Services Committee

5. the Finance Committee

INTERNATIONAL LABOUR ORGANIZATION

HEADQUARTERS: GENEVA, SWITZERLAND

The International Labour Organization was set up in 1919 under the Peace Treaties concluding the First World War, to promote social justice and improve labour conditions through international action. It is an inter-governmental organization of 80 countries. Its organs are the International Labour Conference which normally meets annually; the International Labour Office; and the Governing Body which meets several times a year. National delegations to the Conference comprise, in addition to Government representation, direct representation of organized employers and workers from each member country. Since establishment, the International Labour Conference has adopted 114 conventions or draft treaties, many of which have been ratified by a considerable number of countries, as well as 112 formal recommendations: these instruments deal with a broad range of social and labour subjects.

The Office is the secretariat of the Organization. It lends expert assistance to Member Governments on request, and issues reports and other publications on social and labour affairs in various areas. The

Director-General is David A. Morse, a citizen of the U.S.A.

GOVERNING BODY

The Governing Body is the international executive of the Organization. It is made up of one Government representative from each of the ten member countries of chief industrial importance; of one Government representative from ten other member countries, of ten workers' representatives and ten employers' representatives, members in the three latter categories being elected by the Conference. Canada holds one of the non-elective Government seats, as one of the countries of chief industrial importance, the Canadian Government member being the Assistant Deputy Minister of Labour.

WESTERN EUROPEAN UNION

The Brussels Treaty, signed in 1948 by Belgium, France, Luxembourg, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom, provided for collective self-defence and for collaboration in economic, social and cultural matters.

On May 6, 1955, this Treaty was extended to include the German Federal Republic and Italy and was revised to make it a more effective focus of European integration. The resulting organization was named "Western European Union".

It consists of a Council, meeting either at Ministerial level or, more frequently, at Ambassadorial level at the seat of the Organisation in London; of an Agency for the Control of Armaments, set up to ensure that the undertakings given by the German Federal Republic not to manufacture certain armaments are observed, and to control the level of armaments of all seven Member states on the mainland of Europe; of a Standing Armaments Committee

which deals with the production and standardisation of armaments. Until 1st June 1963 when they were transferred to the Council of Europe, the Organization included a number of social and cultural committees set up to further collaboration between the Seven on such questions. There is also a Western European Union Parliamentary Assembly, which usually meets twice a year, composed of delegated members from the parliaments of all seven countries.

International secretariats serve the Council of W.E.U., the Agency for the Control of Armaments, and the Standing Armaments Committee.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR ELECTORS IN DOMINION AND PROVINCIAL ELECTIONS

ELECTIONS FOR THE DOMINION HOUSE OF COMMONS

According to the Canada Elections Act, and subject to certain exceptions, the general rule as to the qualifications of electors at a Dominion election is that every person in Canada, man or woman, is qualified to vote and entitled to be registered as an elector on the list of electors for the polling division in which such person ordinarily resides at the time of the issuing of the writ ordering a Dominion election in the electoral district if such person (a) is of the full age of 21 years, or will attain the full age of 21 years on or before polling day at the appropriate pending election; (b) is a Canadian citizen or other British subject; (c) has been ordinarily resident in Canada for the twelve months preceding polling day at the appropriate pending election, and (d) at a by-election only, has continued to be ordinarily resident in the electoral district until polling day. Among persons disqualified are prisoners, and persons under restraint owing to mental disease.

Whenever an election is ordered an entire new list of electors is prepared, according to the Canada Elections Act, under the general direction of the Chief Electoral Officer, and supervision of a returning officer who is appointed for each electoral district. There are two classes of polling divisions which are called Urban and Rural. Generally speaking urban polling divisions are those comprised in cities and towns of over 5,000 population, the other polling divisions are rural. In urban polling divisions, a pair of enumerators, representing different political interests, is appointed for each polling division. They make a house-to-house visitation immediately after the issue of the writ for the appropriate pending election, to secure the necessary information to complete a list of electors for their polling division. In rural polling divisions, the list is similarly prepared by one rural enumerator. Writs for a Dominion election are issued about two months before the date fixed for polling day, except at by-elections when such writs may be issued about 6 weeks before polling day.

PROVINCIAL ELECTIONS FOR LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

ALBERTA

A person is qualified to be registered as an elector and to vote, who

- (a) on the day on which the writ was issued was a Canadian citizen or British subject,
- (b) is of the full age of nineteen years or will attain the full age of nineteen years on or before polling day,
- (c) had, on the day on which the writ was issued resided in Alberta for at least twelve months immediately prior to that day, and
- (d) was, on the day on which the writ was issued ordinarily resident in the electoral division and polling subdivision in which he or she seeks to vote.

BRITISH COLUMBIA

Every person, male or female, is entitled to vote who is not disqualified by the Provincial Election Act or any other provincial law, who is 19 years old and entitled within British Columbia to the privileges of a natural born Canadian citizen or British subject, has resided in the Dominion for twelve months, and in the Province for six months immediately preceding the date of his application for registration as a voter; and is a resident of the electoral district in which he seeks registration as a voter at the date of his making application under this Act to be registered as a voter.

MANITOBA

Persons entitled to be placed on the list of voters

include every person, male or female, who is a British subject by birth, naturalization, or by marriage, in case of a woman, 21 years old and resident in Manitoba for 12 months and in the electoral district for which the list is being made for at least three months immediately preceding date of the writ of election.

Among those disqualified except as otherwise provided are judges, amended as to Indians by Chapter 18, Statutes of Manitoba, 1952, prisoners, mental patients and persons disqualified as a result of corrupt practices at provincial elections.

NEW BRUNSWICK

Among those qualified to vote at a provincial election are persons, whether male or female, married or unmarried, 21 years old on or before polling day, if British subjects and not otherwise legally disqualified, resident in the province for twelve months immediately preceding the date of the issue of the election writ and ordinarily resident in the electoral district at the date of the issue of the writ for the pending election or by-election. Among those disqualified are Judges, County Magistrates, prisoners and mental patients.

NEWFOUNDLAND

The Election (Amendment) Act, 1955, provides: Every man and every woman is qualified to vote in the proper polling division who (a) is of the full age of twenty-one years; (b) is a Canadian citizen or other British subject; (c) has been ordinarily resident in the province for twelve months immedi-

ately preceding the day of the election and (d) is ordinarily resident in the electoral district on the day of the election. A person shall not be deemed to have gained a residence in the province or in an electoral district thereof if that person has come into the province for temporary purposes only without the intention of making the province and some place in the electoral district his home. A member of Her Majesty's Forces stationed in the province shall not be deemed to be resident therein unless, during the twelve months immediately preceding the date when he became a member of Her Majesty's Forces, he was resident in the province. Every person held in custody under warrant of commitment in any penitentiary or gaol and every person lawfully committed to an institution for the treatment of mental illness is disqualified from voting.

NOVA SCOTIA

Every person, whether married or unmarried, may vote if a British subject of the full age of twenty-one years who has resided in Nova Scotia for at least twelve months immediately preceding the date of the writ of Election. Definition of residence is similar to that for Federal elections.

ONTARIO

Qualifications for voters are, generally speaking, every man and woman who at the time of voting is 21 years old, a British subject not otherwise disqualified by the Election Act or otherwise, and has been for twelve months preceding the day of polling a resident of Ontario and who resided in the electoral district at the date of the issue of the writ of election.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Every person male or female may vote for Assemblyman if of the full age of 21 years on the day of the election and not otherwise disqualified; and who is a Canadian citizen and resident in P.E.I. for at least twelve months and in the electoral district for at least two months immediately preceding the issue of writ of election; or who is the holder of a freehold estate or in the bona fide use and occupation of any dwelling-house, warehouse, shop, etc., or any farm or piece of land of the value of at least \$100.00 providing that he or she has owned or possessed or has been in the use or occupation of a property for six months next before the date of the election. To vote for Councillor, a property qualification of \$325 is essential. A person who is qualified for councillor also is entitled to vote for Assemblyman.

An amendment, assented to 10th April, 1954, provided that, subject to residence qualifications, every person who, being a Canadian citizen whether or not a minor, served in a theatre of war outside Canada during any time when Canada is or was at war, in any of the armed forces or auxiliary war services of Her Majesty or Her Allies, or in the Merchant Marine, or in the Red Cross Corps, or in the Corps of Canadian Fire Fighters, if such person has resided in the district in which he or she seeks to vote at least twelve months previous to the teste of the writ, shall be entitled to vote in the electoral district in which he resides on the date of the election at an election to be held for the election of a Councillor to sit in the Legislative Assembly.

Enquiries concerning the Election Act should be addressed to the Provincial Secretary's Office, Provincial Building, Charlottetown.

QUEBEC

Section 47 of the Quebec Election Act (1945) as amended to date provides: Every person is qualified as an elector and may be entered on an electoral list who fulfils the following five conditions:

1. Has been domiciled in the Province for at least two years before the date fixed for the enumeration;
2. Is domiciled in a polling-subdivision on the first day fixed for the enumeration;
3. Is of the full age of twenty-one years on or before the polling-day;
4. Is of Canadian citizenship;
5. Is not affected by any disqualification from voting contemplated by this act.

Section 2, par. g, provides: g. A person on active service in the armed forces of Canada retains the domicile which he had at the time of his entry into the service, unless he has subsequently established another domicile outside of the Province.

Among those disqualified are judges, returning-officers and urban revisors appointed under the Quebec Election Act, interdicted persons, insane persons hospitalized in asylums or nursing homes, persons who have taken an oath of allegiance to any foreign power, or have become naturalized elsewhere, and persons who have been disqualified from voting by the Legislative Assembly, or against whom a judgment or sentence entailing disqualification from voting has been rendered by a court of competent jurisdiction, so long as such disqualification lasts, or found guilty of any infraction or crime punishable by two years' imprisonment or more and have not fully served the sentence pronounced against them.

SASKATCHEWAN

Every British subject may vote for the Legislative Assembly who is of the full age of 18 years and has resided in Saskatchewan for at least six months immediately prior to the date of the issue of the writ, and in the electoral division where desiring to vote on the day of the issue of the writ. Any person may be registered as a voter who attains the full age of 18 years on or before polling day. Among those disqualified are Judges, prisoners, patients in mental hospitals, and anyone guilty of corrupt practices. Enquiries should be addressed to the Chief Electoral Officer, Legislative Building, Regina.

NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

A person is entitled to vote at an election of members to the Council of the Northwest Territories if he is a Canadian citizen or other British subject, has attained the age of twenty-one years, and has been ordinarily resident in the Territories for a period of at least twelve months immediately prior to the date of the election.

Among persons disqualified are persons undergoing punishment as inmates in any penal institution and persons under restraint owing to mental diseases.

Enquiries should be addressed to the Chief Electoral Officer, Ottawa.

YUKON TERRITORY

Every person shall be qualified to vote who is a Canadian citizen of the full age of twenty-one years and has resided in the Yukon Territory for at least twelve months immediately prior to the date of the election and has resided in the electoral district in which he seeks to vote for at least one month immediately prior to the date of the election.

Enquiries should be addressed to the Chief Electoral Officer, Ottawa.

LIQUOR CONTROL IN CANADA

We give below a brief summary of the methods of controlling the sale of intoxicating liquors in the various Provinces.

The names and personnel of the various Liquor Control Boards are given under each Province. See index "Liquor Board, Commission, or Control."

ALBERTA

Spirits, wines and beers are sold in Government stores.

Beer in unopened bottles may be sold by licensed hotels to persons over twenty-one years of age, and who are not disqualified under the Act.

Beer by the glass or open bottle may be sold by Licensed Hotels and Clubs for consumption on the premises.

Clubs which qualify may be issued a Liquor License, authorizing the service of all liquors for consumption on the premises.

Liquor, including bottled beer, may be sold by licensed dining lounges and licensed lounges in hotels and restaurants, for consumption on the premises.

Licensees may only purchase beer from Government Warehouses and Liquor Stores.

BRITISH COLUMBIA

The sale of liquor in sealed packages is made in Government Liquor Stores.

Under the Government Liquor Act, 1953, subject to certain conditions, the Board may issue licenses to Dining-lounges, Dining-rooms, Lounges, and Public Houses.

Under the terms of the Act, in accordance with prescribed regulations, the Board may also issue licenses to Hotels, Clubs and Military Messes; Restaurants; Railway-Cars and Steamships and Resorts.

MANITOBA

Alcoholic beverages are sold in licensed Restaurants, Dining-rooms, Cabarets, Beverage Rooms, Cocktail Rooms, and Beer Parlours. Persons resident in the province, travellers and transients over the age of twenty-one years and not otherwise prohibited, may purchase from Liquor Commission stores for consumption in a residence—in any one day—(a) 24 dozen bottles of beer; (h) 12 gallons of wine; and (c) 12 bottles of spirits.

Beer may be purchased also at Brewery Retail Stores located on brewery premises in Greater Winnipeg and from Beer Vendors located in many of the hotels throughout the province.

Beer parlours, beverage rooms and cocktail rooms must be vacated within 30 minutes after the hour at which sale of liquor must cease.

NEW BRUNSWICK

Intoxicating liquor is sold only in sealed packages and only at the Government stores. It is not rationed and permits are not required.

NEWFOUNDLAND

The importation, manufacture, and sale of alcoholic liquors are regulated by the Board of Liquor Control.

The holder of a licence to manufacture alcoholic liquor shall not be granted a hotel, restaurant or tavern licence.

All alcoholic liquor sold in the hotel lounge shall be dispensed at the bar in such a manner that it may be viewed by persons using the lounge.

All liquor sold upon licensed premises shall be consumed thereon.

All liquor served in licensed premises shall be dispensed from the original container in which the liquor is purchased from or under the authority of the Board.

Every person employed in serving liquor shall be in possession of a waiter's licence which may be granted by the Board.

A non-resident permit, valid for one month, may be issued only to a person not ordinarily resident in Newfoundland. The Board shall not sell spirits to any person except upon presentation of a permit and the signing of a sale slip by the person requesting the spirits.

NOVA SCOTIA

Liquor can only be sold in sealed packages through the Government stores. A permit is required for spirits, wine and beer.

By local option vote, beer and wine by the glass or open bottle may be served with meals during meal time by hotels which have been licensed to do so, in those areas which voted for the privilege. In the same manner, beer by the glass or open bottle may be sold for consumption on the premises in taverns, the operators of which have been licensed to do so. In the case of a hotel, the tavern premises must be so constructed as to be entirely separate from the hotel proper.

ONTARIO

In Ontario spirituous liquor is sold by the bottle in Government stores operated by The Liquor Control Board. Those desiring to purchase such liquor must secure a liquor permit which authorizes the purchase

and consumption in the residence of the holder of the permit. Wine may be purchased from Liquor Control Board Stores, Ontario Wine Stores, for consumption in the residence of the purchaser. Beer is procurable from certain Liquor Control Board Stores, Breweries and Brewers' Retail Stores for consumption in the residence of the purchaser.

Under the liquor licence laws of Ontario, liquor may be sold by the glass under a "Lounge Licence" and with meals under a "Dining Lounge Licence" in the municipalities of Toronto, Windsor, Hamilton, London, and Ottawa and in such other municipalities wherein the municipal electors have decided in favor of them by vote. Beer may be served by the glass in licensed "Public Houses" and beer and wine may be served with meals in licensed "Dining Rooms" and "Restaurants". Clubs, railway trains and steamships may be issued licences for the sale of spirits, wine and beer. In clubs, the sale is restricted to members and their guests.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Intoxicating liquors in sealed packages may be obtained on Individual or Temporary Permits from retail vendors under the Prince Edward Island Temperance Act.

Chairman of the Temperance Commission is B. J. Haywood, Charlottetown, P.E.I.

QUEBEC

Spirits and wines are sold and delivered by the Quebec Liquor Commission stores only.

Spirits and wines so obtained may be sold to the public, by hotels, cafés and clubs under licenses, provided these are consumed on the premises.

Beer is obtained directly from the breweries and may be sold to the public by inns, taverns and restaurants under licenses, provided it is also consumed on the premises.

A grocery store duly licensed may sell beer at such store on condition: that not less than one bottle be sold; that beer be not consumed in that store or dependency thereof.

Municipalities may declare by by-law that no alcoholic liquor of any description may be sold within their territory.

SASKATCHEWAN

Beer, Wine and Spirits are sold in stores throughout the province operated by the Liquor Board under authority of The Liquor Act. No purchase permit required and no limitation on quantity.

Alcoholic Beverages are also sold in premises licensed by the Liquor Licensing Commission which agency has authority to grant Dining Room, Cocktail Lounge and Club licenses permitting the holder of the license to serve spirits, wine and beer; Restaurant and Beverage Room licenses permitting the holder to serve wine and beer only; and Beer Parlour licenses permitting the sale of beer to men only. Licensees holding a license to sell beer by the glass may also be granted a license to sell beer in closed packages to be consumed off the premises.

Premises meeting the requirements of The Liquor Licensing Act and Regulations and granted licenses by the Commission purchase all spirits, wine and beer from the Liquor Board.

NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

The Northwest Territories Act, Chapter 331 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1952, authorizes the Commissioner in Council of the Northwest Territories to make ordinances respecting intoxicants.

Under the Liquor Ordinance of the Northwest Territories liquor stores have been opened at Yellowknife, Fort Smith, Hay River, Inuvik and Norman Wells, and beer parlours and cocktail lounges have been licensed at various places in the Territories.

YUKON TERRITORY

The Yukon Act, Chapter 53 of the Statutes of Canada, 1952-53, authorizes the Commissioner in Council of Yukon Territory to make ordinances respecting intoxicants.

By virtue of Territorial Ordinance, liquor stores have been opened at Dawson, Mayo, Whitehorse, Haines Junction and Watson Lake and beer taverns and cocktail lounges have been licensed at various places in the Territory.

THE VICTORIA CROSS

THE VICTORIA CROSS was instituted by Queen Victoria at the close of the Crimean campaign, 1856. It is a Maltese cross, made of gun metal, with a Royal Crest in the centre and underneath it an escroll bearing the inscription "For Valour", and is awarded, irrespective of rank, to members of any branch of Her Majesty's services, either in the Imperial Forces or those of any British dominion, colony, dependency or protectorate, the Mercantile Marine, nurses or staffs of hospitals, or to civilians of either sex while serving in either regular or temporary capacity during naval, military, or air force operations. It is awarded only "for most conspicuous bravery or some daring or pre-eminent act of valour or self-sacrifice or extreme devotion to duty in the presence of the enemy." For additional conduct of similar bravery, a Bar is added. The ribbon was formerly red for the Army and blue for the Navy, but is now crimson for all services. An annuity of £10 a year accompanies the decoration, plus £5 a year for every Bar granted; payable to ranks below commission ranks from the date of the act which concerns the award. Navy, Army and Royal Air Force regulations provide for the annuity to be increased to the maximum of £75, including any other pension from public funds where officers and other ranks are incapable of earning a livelihood by reason of age or infirmity occasioned by a cause outside the recipient's control. Since June 17th, 1943, the financial responsibility has been assumed by the Canadian Government, and the pound sterling is deemed to have a value of 500 in Canadian currency where this is concerned.

HONOURS (CANADA)

For some years after Confederation awards were made of a few hereditary honours and some knight-hoods and companionships in orders of chivalry, and this policy continued until the end of the first Great War.

On May 22, 1919, during the premiership of the Rt. Hon. Robert L. Borden, a resolution adopted by the House of Commons requested His Majesty to refrain from granting titular honours to Canadian citizens in the future. This policy was reversed in 1933 when, during the premiership of the Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, the Canadian Government recommended a number of such awards, which were duly granted on New Year's Day, 1934. Although titular honours were again conferred in 1935, the new administration which took office later that year under the premiership of the Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King revived the previous policy of the Government of 1919, and no titular honours have been recommended or awarded since that time.

On July 24, 1942, a Special Committee on Honours and Decorations reported to the House as follows:

"As a result of their deliberations your Committee desire to make the following recommendations:

- (1) That His Majesty's subjects domiciled or ordinarily resident in Canada be eligible for the award of Honours and Decorations, including awards in the Orders of Chivalry, which do not involve titles.
- (2) That His Majesty's Government in Canada consider a submission to His Majesty the King, of proposals for the establishment of an Order limited in number but not involving a title, for which His Majesty's subjects domiciled or ordinarily resident in Canada shall alone be eligible."

During the second Great War a large number of decorations were awarded to members of the armed forces and to civilians for war service; in 1943 the Canada Medal was instituted but no awards were made. On July 1, 1946 the last Canadian honours list terminated decorations for war service for civilians. No awards in orders of chivalry have since been given to Canadian civilians. Recommendations are made from time to time for the award to civilians of decorations in recognition of exceptional bravery.

HONOURS (UNITED KINGDOM)

The Order of Baronets, the lowest hereditary rank, was instituted in 1611; a Baronet is designated "Sir John Smith, Baronet"—the abbreviation Bt. is used in Court Circulars and has been generally adopted in lieu of "Bart." Taking precedence of Baronets are members of The Most Honourable Privy Council, who are addressed "Right Honourable."

The Most Noble Order of the Garter, instituted 1349.—K.G.

The Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle, instituted 1687.—K.T.

The Most Illustrious Order of St. Patrick, instituted 1788.—K.P.

The Most Honourable Order of the Bath, instituted in 1399, and revived in 1725, is divided into three classes—Knights Grand Cross, G.C.B.; Knights Commanders, K.C.B.; and Companions, C.B.

The Order of Merit, O.M., carries no title.

The Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, instituted in 1861, is divided into three classes,—Knights Grand Commanders, G.C.S.I.; Knights Commanders, K.C.S.I.; Companions, C.S.I.

The Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, instituted in 1818, has also three classes—Knights Grand Cross, G.C.M.G.; Knights Commanders, K.C.M.G.; Companions, C.M.G.

The Most Eminent Order of the Indian Empire, instituted 1877, has three classes,—Knights Grand Commanders, G.C.I.E.; Knights Commanders, K.C.I.E., Companions, C.I.E.

The Order of the Crown of India, C.I., carries no title.

The Royal Victorian Order, instituted in 1896, has five classes—Knights Grand Cross, G.C.V.O.; Knights Commanders, K.C.V.O.; Commanders, C.V.O.; Members 4th and 5th classes—M.V.O. Ribbon; blue with red and white edges.

The Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, instituted in 1917, has five classes—Knights (or Dames) Grand Cross, G.B.E.; Knights Commanders, K.B.E.; Commanders, C.B.E.; Dames Commanders D.B.E.; Officers, O.B.E., and Members, M.B.E. Ribbon (Military) Rose pink, pearl grey edging, vertical pearl stripe in centre; O.B.E. (Civil) Rose pink, pearl grey edging and no central vertical stripe.

Knights Bachelors are gentlemen unconnected with any order who have received the honour of Knighthood, and are entitled to the prefix "Sir" and to "Kt." after name. They rank immediately after Knights Commanders of the British Empire.

The Companions of Honour, C.H., instituted in 1917 rank immediately after Knights (Dames) Grand

Cross of the Order of the British Empire. Membership is limited; carries no title.

In all Orders of Knighthood the Knights Grand Cross and the Knights Commanders have the

prefix "Sir" with the initials of their class following the name. Companions and Members bear no title, but have the letters C.B., C.M.G., M.V.O., as the case may be, attached to their names.

4. The Solicitor General to be styled "Honourable" while in office.

5. Senators of Canada to be styled "Honourable," while in office and to be discontinued thereafter.

6. The Speaker of the House of Commons to be styled "Honourable" during tenure of office.

7. The Chief Justice of Canada, the Judges of the Supreme and Exchequer Courts of Canada, and the Chief Justices and Judges of the undermentioned Courts in the several Provinces of Canada:—

Ontario—The Supreme Court of Ontario.

Quebec—The Court of Queen's Bench, the Superior Court, and the Circuit Court of the District of Montreal.

Nova Scotia—The Supreme Court of Nova Scotia.

New Brunswick—The Supreme Court of New Brunswick.

Manitoba—The Court of Queen's Bench and the Court of Appeal.

British Columbia—The Court of Appeal and the Supreme Court of British Columbia.

Prince Edward Island—The Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island and the Chancery Court.

Saskatchewan—The Supreme Court of Sask.

Alberta—The Supreme Court of Alberta.

This precedence to be given to the Chiefs of Staff on occasions when they have official functions to perform, otherwise the Chiefs of Staff to have equal precedence with Deputy Ministers with their relative position to be determined according to the respective dates of their appointments to office. The relative precedence of the Chiefs of Staff, Deputy Ministers and other high officials of the public service to be determined from time to time by the Secretary of State of Canada in consultation with the Prime Minister.

The arms are those of England, Scotland, Ireland and France, with a "difference" to mark them as Canadian, namely on the lower third of the shield, a sprig of maple on a silver shield. The crest is a lion holding in its paw a red maple leaf, a symbol of sacrifice. The supporters are, with some slight distinctions, the lion and unicorn of the Royal Arms; the lion upholds the Union Jack, and the unicorn the ancient banner of France.



The motto—A MARI USQUE AD MARE— "From sea to sea"— is an extract from the Latin version of verse 8 of the 72nd Psalm— "He shall have dominion also from sea to sea, and from the river unto the ends of the earth."

There is a tradition, that the Fathers of Confederation derived the designation "Dominion" from this verse.

PETITIONS TO THE HOUSE OF COMMONS

A petition to the House of Commons must be presented by a Member, and such Member shall be answerable that the petition does not contain "impertinent or improper matter". One person may petition the House of Commons. Petitions may be either written or printed. When there are three or more petitioners, the signatures of at least three shall be subscribed on the sheet containing the prayer of the petition.

Long usage both here and in the United Kingdom has sanctioned the rule that every petition should commence with the superscription "To the Honourable the House of Commons of Canada in

Parliament assembled". Then should follow the formula "The Petition of the undersigned — humbly sheweth". The subject matter of the petition then follows in the third person throughout and each paragraph should commence with the word "That".

The conclusion should be the "prayer", briefly and clearly expressing the particular object which the petitioners have in view in coming before Parliament. The petition should close with the formal words "And your petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray".

REMUNERATION PAID TO MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS

Members of the House of Commons of Canada receive a sessional allowance at the rate of \$8,000.00 per annum; in addition they receive an expense allowance of \$2,000.00 per annum. The Prime Minister receives, in addition to his sessional and expense allowances as a member, a salary of \$25,000.00 and a motor car allowance of \$2,000.00 per annum. Ministers of the Crown receive, in addition to the sessional and expense allowances as a member, a salary of \$15,000.00 and a motor car allowance of \$2,000.00 per annum, except in the case of a Minister without portfolio who receives a salary of \$7,500, plus the sessional and the expense allowance provided to all members; the Leader of the Opposition receives a salary of \$15,000.00 plus a motor car allowance of \$2,000.00 per annum, in addition to his sessional allowance of

\$8,000.00 and expense allowance of \$2,000.00 per annum.

The Speaker of the House of Commons receives his annual sessional allowance of \$8,000.00, expense allowance of \$2,000.00, a salary of \$9,000.00 and a motor car allowance of \$1,000.00. He is entitled to \$3,000.00 per annum in lieu of residence.

The Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons receives, in addition to his annual sessional allowance of \$8,000.00, a salary of \$6,000.00, and an allowance in lieu of apartments of \$1,500.00 and the expense allowance granted to all members of \$2,000.00.

The Deputy Chairman of Committees receives in addition to his annual sessional allowance of \$8,000.00 an annual allowance of \$2,000.00 and an expense allowance of \$2,000.00.

Parliamentary Secretaries to Ministers of the Crown receive, in addition to their sessional allowance of \$8,000.00, a salary of \$4,000.00 per annum and an expense allowance of \$2,000.00.

The expense allowance of \$2,000.00 granted to members of the House of Commons is not subject to income tax except in the case of Ministers of the Crown and the Leader of the Opposition.

The Governor General receives a salary of \$48,667.00. The estimates include an item for office salaries, printing, stationery and other allowances, and for travelling expenses.

The salary of the Lieutenant-Governors of the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec is \$10,000; of Prince Edward Island \$8,000; of the other provinces \$9,000.

PARLIAMENTARY REPRESENTATION

The Parliament of Canada comprises the Senate, being the Upper House, and the House of Commons.

THE SENATE

Senators are appointed for life; must be Canadian citizens or British subjects and 30 years of age; must own lands worth net \$4,000 in the province which they represent, and must be worth \$4,000 above all debts. They must be residents of the province for which appointed or of the electoral division in the Province of Quebec.

The Speaker is appointed by the Governor-General. The Senate as originally constituted at Confederation consisted of 72 members. Through the addition of new provinces and the general growth of Canada it now has 102 members, the latest change in representation having been made March 31, 1949, with the admission of Newfoundland to Confederation. By provinces, representation is as follows: Newfoundland 6, Prince Edward Island 4, Nova Scotia 10, New Brunswick 10, Quebec 24, Ontario 24, Manitoba 6, Saskatchewan 6, Alberta 6, British Columbia 6: total 102.

THE HOUSE OF COMMONS

The members of the House of Commons are elected by the people. The ordinary legal limit of duration for each Parliament is five years, sitting at least once a year. The Speaker is elected by the House.

By virtue of Section 51 of the British North America Acts, 1867 to 1952, and pursuant to rules laid down therein, a redistribution measure is enacted by Parliament after each decennial census to adjust the representation in the House of Commons.

The Representation Act, 1952, increased the membership in the House of Commons from 262 to 265, effective at the general election held August 10, 1953.

Accordingly representation in the House of Commons for the 24th Parliament is as follows: Alberta 17; British Columbia 22; Manitoba 14; New Brunswick 10; Newfoundland 7; Nova Scotia 12; Ontario 85; Prince Edward Island 4; Quebec 75; Saskatchewan 17; Mackenzie District, N.W.T. 1; and the Yukon Territory 1; making a total of 265.

THE FARMERS' CREDITORS ARRANGEMENT ACT

Registrar of the Appeal Court, J. S. Larose, Department of Justice, Ottawa.

This Act was passed by Parliament July 24, 1943, and proclaimed as coming into force December 15, 1943, replacing The Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Act, 1934.

The legislation is designed with a view to effecting compromises or rearrangements of the debts of farmers with the object of retaining them on the land as efficient producers and also to simplify the operation of the Bankruptcy Act with respect to farmers generally. The compromise provisions are available only to farmers in the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. The simplified bankruptcy provisions are available to farmers in all ten provinces.

AUDITOR GENERAL'S OFFICE

The Auditor General's Office originated in 1878 (41 Vict. Chap. 7) and functions under the Financial Administration Act (R.S.C. 1952, Chap. 116). Its duties include examinations of accounts relating to the Consolidated Revenue Fund and to public property, and the Auditor General is required to report to the House of Commons the results of the examinations. The Auditor General's Office also audits the accounts of various Crown corporations and other public instrumentalities.

GENERAL BOARD OF IMMIGRATION APPEALS

The Immigration Appeal Board, constituted under the authority of Section 12 of the Immigration Act,

commenced its functions on March 1st, 1956. Under new regulations, effective October 1, 1959, the General Board of Immigration Appeals is empowered to deal with all appeals where the person ordered deported claims to be a Canadian citizen and with all other appeals where the person ordered deported is not seeking admission at a port of entry upon arrival in Canada.

INDIAN AFFAIRS BRANCH

The Indian Affairs Branch is responsible for administering the Indian Act, R.S.C. 1952, c. 149 as amended. Among its many important responsibilities are the management of Indian Reserves and surrendered lands; the administration of Indian Trust Fund education; the social and economic development of the Indian population; Indian treaty obligations; the enfranchisement of Indians and the administration of the estates of deceased and mentally incompetent Indians.

Administration is carried out through a headquarters staff at Ottawa and 89 field administrative units, or Agencies, each Agency being responsible for one or more reserves and bands. The Agencies are grouped into nine Regions, each under the supervision of a Regional Supervisor, except in the case of the British Columbia Region which is under the direction of an Indian Commissioner.

According to statistics compiled December 31, 1959, the Indian population was 179,093, the majority being located on some 2,217 reserves throughout Canada.

The Branch operates 379 day schools, 25 seasonal schools, 9 hospital schools and 66 residential schools, the latter being conducted in co-operation with various religious denominations interested in the education of Indians.

In 1959-60, the enrolment in Indian schools was 32,402, including 1,244 children of non-Indian status. In addition, some 9,479 Indian children are educated in non-Indian schools.

DEPARTMENT OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS

The Department of External Affairs was constituted in May, 1909 (8-9 Edward VII, Chap. 13) and placed originally under the Secretary of State. It has charge of the administration of all external affairs pertaining to Canada, as enacted between the Government of Canada, and the Government of any other country. DEPARTMENT OF NATIONAL HEALTH
AND WELFARE

The Department of National Health and Welfare was established in October 1944, under the Department of National Health and Welfare Act. It comprises a Health Branch, a Welfare Branch and an Administration Branch serving the other two.

The Department has charge of all matters relating to the promotion or preservation of the health, social security and social welfare of the people of Canada over which the federal parliament has jurisdiction. It administers the acts listed below and is also responsible for the following: administration of the National Health Program under which grants are made available to the provinces for the development and extension of health services; the federal aspects of emergency health and welfare services; the provision of health, medical and hospital services to the Indians and Eskimos across Canada as well as to other elements of the population in the Yukon and Northwest Territories; the provision of assistance and consultative services to the provinces upon request on blindness control, child and maternal health, mental health, dental health, nursing, medical rehabilitation, nutrition and hospital design; the inspection and medical care of immigrants and seamen and the administration of marine hospitals; the supervision of public health facilities on railway, water and all other forms of transportation; the enforcement of regulations of the International Joint Commission relating to public health; the promotion and conservation of the health of civil servants and other government employees; the collection, publication and distribution (subject to the provision of the Statistics Act) of information relating to public health, improved sanitation and social and industrial conditions affecting the health of Canadians.

DEPARTMENT OF NATIONAL REVENUE

From Confederation on July 1, 1867, until May 17 1918, Customs and Inland Revenue Acts were administered by two separate government departments known as the Department of Customs, constituted by statute (31 Vic. Chap. 43), and the Department of Inland Revenue constituted by statute (31 Vic. Chap. 49). On May 18, 1918, by Order in Council these two Departments were amalgamated and combined under the name of the Department of Customs and Inland Revenue and under one Minister of the Crown.

On April 1, 1921, the name Inland Revenue was dropped and the Department of Customs and Excise constituted (11-12 Geo. V. 26).

The collection of Income Tax was placed under the control of the Minister of Customs and Excise on April 1, 1924, and by the Department of National Revenue Act (17 Geo. V. Chap. 34) the name was changed to the Department of National Revenue.

POST OFFICE

A postal service has been in operation since the earliest days of settlement on the North American continent. At Confederation a uniform system was introduced by the Post Office Act of 1867 (31 Vic. Chap. 10), (Chap. 161, R. S. 1927), (15 George VI, Chap. 57, R. S. 1951). At the end of the fiscal year 1959-60 there were 11,497 post offices, urban and rural. The amount on deposit in the Post Office Savings Banks was \$29,372,461 and the gross revenue from the sale of postage stamps etc., \$193,659,715. At the end of the fiscal year 1959-60 there were 5,575 rural mail routes in operation serving approximately 616,800 householders.

CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION

The Civil Service Commission was first established in 1908 under the provisions of the Civil Service Amendment Act, 1908 (S.C., 1907-08, Chapter 15) which introduced the principle of selection by order of merit as established by competitive examination. The Act did not, however, apply to positions outside of Ottawa. The Civil Service Act, 1918 (S.C., 1918, Chapter 12—now the Civil Service Act, R.S.C., 1952, Chapter 48, as amended) placed the entire service under the Commission. The classification system administered by the Commission is designed to provide an orderly means of designating the various positions and of achieving uniformity in the salary rates for work at equal levels of difficulty and responsibility.

DEPARTMENT OF TRADE AND COMMERCE

The Department of Trade and Commerce was created in 1887, but did not come into operation until 1892, when it assumed responsibility for the administration of six commercial agencies in the British West Indies, British Guiana and Norway. The Canadian Trade Commissioner Service, as such, dates from 1907, being expanded until 1939, when it comprised 37 trade commissioners and 24 assistant trade commissioners. There are now 150 trade commissioners and assistant trade commissioners, including agricultural, fisheries and timber specialists, in 62 offices in 48 countries, and at head office in Ottawa.

DOMINION BUREAU OF STATISTICS

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics was established under the Statistics Act of 1918 to form a central statistical department. It now operates under the Statistics Act of 1948 (revised in 1953) which defines its duties as follows: (a) to collect, compile, analyse, abstract and publish statistical information relative to the commercial, industrial, financial, social, economic and general activities and conditions of the people; (b) to collaborate with all other departments of the government in the collection, compilation and publication of statistical records of administration according to any regulations; (c) to take the census of Canada as provided in this Act; and (d) generally to organize a scheme of co-ordinated social and economic statistics pertaining to the whole of Canada and to each of the provinces thereof. The Bureau is organized in fifteen functional divisions, comprising an Administration Division, Mechanical Tabulation Division, twelve statistical or subject divisions and an Information Services Division.

As Canada's central statistical agency the Bureau compiles and publishes over 500 publications that cover a wide range of statistical information. Titles and descriptions of these publications appear in the Bureau's list of current publications, which may be obtained free on application. It contains a detailed subject and commodity index to assist in the ready location of specific data in the various publications. Business losses incurred by the corporation in the five previous years and in the immediately following year.

Charitable donations up to 10% of income.

Dividends received from taxable Canadian corporations.

*At \$3,000 the Old Age Security Tax of 3% of taxable income reaches its maximum of \$90.

In addition to the above, there is a Surtax of 4% on investment income (excluding rental income from real property) in cases where investment income exceeds the greater of:

(a) \$2,400 or

(b) the total personal exemptions

Personal Exemptions

\$2,000 for married status.

\$1,000 for single status.

\$250 for each dependent eligible for family allowance.

\$500 for each dependent not eligible for family allowance.

\$500 additional if taxpayer has attained age of 65 before year end.

Other Deductions

Other deductions which are allowed under certain circumstances in determination of taxable income include:

Union and professional membership dues.

Charitable donations up to 10% of net income.

Medical expenses in excess of 3% of net income with exception of those for which taxpayer is reimbursed under Hospital Insurance and Diagnostic Services Act.

In lieu of the three types of deductions set out above, an individual may deduct a round amount of \$100.

Contributions made by an employee under a

registered pension fund or plan in respect of current services up to \$1,500 annually.

Contributions under a registered Retirement Savings Plan up to the lesser of \$2,500 or 10% of earned income of the annuitant for the year, excepting where he is also covered by a registered Pension Plan, in which case the deduction for the combined contributions must not exceed the lesser of \$1,500 or 10% of earned income.

Business losses incurred by an individual in the five previous years and in the immediately following year.

An individual may reduce his tax (excluding Old Age Security Tax) by an amount equal to 20% of the dividends received from taxable Canadian corporations.

PAYMENT

Corporations—

One-twelfth of the estimated tax is payable by monthly instalments commencing six months before the fiscal year end and ending three months after the fiscal year end. One-third of the remainder is payable in each of the subsequent three months.

Tax return to be filed within six months from end of the fiscal year.

Individuals—

Tax deductions made by employer from salaries or wages—otherwise quarterly payments based upon estimated tax. Tax return must be filed by April 30 of the year following.

Limitations of space prevent complete reproduction of The Income Tax Act, which contains numerous exceptions and limitations to the content outlined above. It is, therefore, recommended that the reader refer to the Act in specific cases. Copies of the Act may be obtained from the Queen's Printer, Department of Public Printing and Stationery, Ottawa.

INCOME TAXES

(Imposed by Provincial Legislation)

CORPORATIONS

At present, the provinces of Ontario and Quebec levy taxes from corporations operating within their territorial limits. The other provinces have entered into tax rental agreements with the Government of Canada and receive in return a share of the tax collected under the Canadian Income Tax Act.

The provinces of Ontario and Quebec impose taxes based upon paid-up capital, places of business and net income. For the most part, the income taxes imposed by these provinces are allowed as a deduction from income tax otherwise payable to the Government of Canada.

INDIVIDUALS

The province of Quebec imposes a tax on the income of individuals resident in or carrying on business in Quebec. The Federal government allows a credit of 13% of the Federal income taxes payable for income taxes deemed payable in Quebec. None of the other provinces in Canada is presently imposing a tax on personal income.

ROYAL CANADIAN MOUNTED POLICE

Honorary Commissioner, HER MAJESTY QUEEN ELIZABETH II

In 1873 the North West Mounted Police was constituted (36 Vic. Chap. 35) to provide Police protection in the unsettled portions of the North West. In 1904 the title "Royal" was given to the Force. In 1920 the Dominion Police was amalgamated with this Force and the name changed to "Royal Canadian Mounted Police." The headquarters was moved from Regina to Ottawa and the Force may now be called upon to perform duties in any portion of the Dominion. In 1928 the Royal Canadian Mounted Police absorbed the Saskatchewan Provincial Police and in 1932 the Provincial Police Forces of Alberta, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island were absorbed in like manner. During the year 1932, the Force also assumed the administration of the Preventive Service Branch of the Department of National Revenue. On August 1, 1950, the duties of the Newfoundland Rangers and certain members of the Newfoundland Constabulary were taken over by the R.C.M.P., and on the 15th of the same month the British Columbia Provincial Police were similarly absorbed. These arrangements were made by agreements between the respective Provincial Governments concerned and the Federal Government. The term of engagement in the Royal Canadian Mounted Police is five years. Recruits are trained at Regina, Saskatchewan and Rockcliffe (near Ottawa), Ontario. At a recent date the Force had 221 horses, 33 Police Service dogs, 219 Sleigh dogs, 1,443 cars, 148 trucks, 53 motorcycles, 16 aircraft, and 71 ships and boats. The strength including special constables, civilian employees and reserves was 7,950.

CANADA'S ARMED SERVICES

THE ROYAL CANADIAN NAVY

ROLE AND ORGANIZATION

The primary role of the Royal Canadian Navy is anti-submarine warfare. Because of the prospect of long-range submarines capable of launching nuclear missiles hundreds of miles off-shore against coastal and inland targets, the RCN and the RCAF have placed primary emphasis on the development of forward operational systems and new techniques for locating and dealing with hostile submarines.

The Royal Canadian Navy comes under the central authority of the *Chief of the Naval Staff at Naval Headquarters in Ottawa*. The Flag Officer, Atlantic Coast, at Halifax, N.S., and the Flag Officer, Pacific Coast, at Esquimalt, B.C., exercise operational and administrative command of ships and establishments within the Atlantic and Pacific Coast Commands. The Flag Officers in the Atlantic and Pacific Commands also hold the additional appointments of Maritime Commander Atlantic and Maritime Commander Pacific respectively. As such, each is responsible for anti-submarine operations involving RCN and RCAF forces in his command. The Naval Comptroller organization was established in 1956 to assist in the effective control of the use of manpower, material and financial resources of the Navy. The recruiting and training of officers and men of the Royal Canadian Navy (Reserve) is conducted mainly through 21 Naval Divisions across Canada under the overall command of the Commanding Officer, Naval Divisions, with Headquarters at Hamilton, Ont. There are naval missions in London, England, and Washington, U.S.A., to maintain liaison with the Royal Navy and the United States Navy. As a result of Canada's NATO commitments, officers of the Royal Canadian Navy serve on the Staffs of: the Supreme Allied Commander, Atlantic, at Norfolk, Va., in the United States; the Commander-in-Chief, Eastern Atlantic Area, at Northwood in the United Kingdom; and the Commander-in-Chief, Western Atlantic Area, at Norfolk, Va. The Flag Officer, Atlantic Coast, holds the appointment of Commander, Canadian Atlantic Sub-Area.

The strength of the RCN on March 31, 1960, was 20,675 officers and men in the Regular Force and 3,311 in the Reserve Force.

Operations at Sea, 1959—By the end of 1959 the Royal Canadian Navy had 62 warships in commission, and two Royal Navy submarines under its operational control. This compared with 47 ships in commission and six in refit at the end of 1958.

HMCS CAPE BRETON, the RCN's second mobile repair ship joined the fleet late in 1959.

On the Great Lakes, two frigates from the Atlantic Command provided sea training during the summer months for naval reservists from across Canada. More than 500 new entry seamen of the RCN (Reserve) passed through the Great Lakes Training Centre, at Hamilton, Ont., during the peak months of July and August.

In 1959 two Algerine coastal escort ships were transferred to the Belgian Navy under terms of Mutual Aid.

The reserve fleet was reduced to five ships through disposal of surplus vessels and commissioning of others.

An announcement was made that a 22,000-ton tanker supply ship would be built for the RCN, and that the United States Navy submarine "Burrfish" would be obtained on loan for five years. The "Burrfish" is to be renamed "HMCS Grise". Construction has also begun on six new "Repeat" Restigouche class destroyer escorts.

On May 4, 1960, the RCN marked its 50th anniversary of service to Canada. Throughout the year celebrations were held across Canada to mark the anniversary.

The opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway permitted major warships to enter the Great Lakes for the first time. RCN and USN ships escorted the Royal Yacht Britannia to the Lakes; eight RCN and 11 other NATO warships attended the Canadian National Exhibition.

Major shore training establishments are maintained at HMCS STADACONA, Halifax, N.S.; HMCS NADEN, Esquimalt, B.C.; HMCS CORNWALLIS near Digby, N.S.; and HMCS SHEARWATER near Dartmouth, N.S.

Trade and specialist training is conducted in various schools and training centres.

Royal Canadian Navy (Reserve) Naval Division, commanded by reserve officers, are responsible for specialized training in one or other of the various phases of naval activity.

ROYAL CANADIAN SEA CADET CORPS

Admiral of the Sea Cadets, H.R.H. The Duke of Edinburgh

Organized December 16th, 1895 by the Navy League of Canada, Sea Cadet Corps were subsequently organized in various centres across Canada and, up to and including June 1st, 1941, these Cadet Services were operated by the Navy League in association with the Department of National Defence, Army. Following June 1st, 1941 this association was transferred to the Navy, since which time the Royal Canadian Navy has assumed the responsibility of certain jurisdiction, training and supervision of Sea Cadet Corps, and the operation of summer training camps, with the Navy League being responsible

for administration and general operation of Corps and the providing of both summer camps and Corps training quarters.

THE ROYAL CANADIAN SEA CADETS

Royal Canadian Sea Cadets, sponsored by the Navy League of Canada and supervised by the Royal Canadian Navy, comprised 161 authorized corps in 1959. These were divided into seven Sea Cadets areas, supervised by 16 naval officers, responsible to the Commanding Officer, Naval Divisions. The strength of the Corps on December 31, 1959 was, 1,007 Sea Cadets officers and 9,189 Sea Cadets.

THE CANADIAN ARMY

ORGANIZATION

Army Headquarters at Ottawa, is organized into three separate Branches. The General Staff Branch deals with all matters affecting the fighting efficiency of the Army, the Adjutant-General Branch deals with all problems affecting the soldier as an individual and the Quartermaster-General Branch is responsible for the supply of the Army. The senior appointment at Army Headquarters is the Chief of the General Staff, who through the Heads of the three Branches directs all the activities of the Canadian Army.

For command and control, Canada is divided into four Commands and ten Areas each with its own headquarters.

The Canadian Army comprises the Canadian Army (Regular) and the Reserves. The Canadian Army (Regular) consists of four Infantry Brigade Groups and those units required for command and control, training, administration and logistic support.

The Reserves include the Canadian Army (Militia), the Regular Reserve, the Supplementary Reserve, the Canadian Officers' Training Corps, the Cadet Services of Canada and the Reserve Militia.

The strength of the Canadian Army (Regular), as of 31 Mar. '60 was 47,185 officers and men and the strength of the Canadian Army (Militia) was 40,010.

OPERATIONS

In fulfilment of our military obligation under the North Atlantic Treaty, Canada has continued to provide ground forces, one Infantry Brigade Group, for the defence of Western Europe. The Headquarters for the Brigade Group is at Soest.

Canadian membership in the International Supervisory Commissions of Viet Nam and Cambodia resulted in the Canadian Army providing 65 officers and men for Truce Supervisory duty in Indo China.

Canada, as a member of the United Nations, may be called to provide, at short notice, military forces for service under, or in support of, the United Nations. The Canadian Army provides 8 officers to the United Nations Military Observer Group in India and Pakistan and 18 officers to the United Nations Truce Supervision Organization in Palestine as well as contingents totalling 1150 officers and men to the United Nations Emergency Force in Egypt and the United Nations Force in the Congo.

The Canadian Army is responsible for the conduct of those aspects of National Survival and Civil Defence operations which were assigned to the Department of National Defence by the Civil Defence Order, PC 656/59.

EQUIPMENT

The Canadian Army Equipment Development

Program continues to concentrate on those fields particularly suited to Canadian capabilities and in which there are special Canadian needs. Canadian Army participation in materiel and non-materiel standardization programs with the United States, the United Kingdom and NATO continues. Additional agreements reached with allied armies affecting procedures and equipment enhanced their capability for cooperative operations.

A new sub-machine gun manufactured in Canada, the 9mm C1, is being issued to replace the World War II 9mm Sten sub-machine gun in the regular Army.

TRAINING

The policy of training is determined at Army Headquarters. General Officers Commanding Commands implement the training policy within their Commands, except for that conducted at Army and corps schools, which are under the direct supervision of Army Headquarters.

French- and English-language training which is available to all ranks of the Canadian Army was conducted by Commands and AHQ.

Trade and specialty training is given at corps schools and units. Where feasible, the facilities of civilian schools are used to supplement training at Army establishments.

The training of the Airborne/Air Transportable Elements of the Field Force (Canada) continued throughout 1960.

THE RESERVES

Funds were provided to permit an average of 40 days training for all ranks of the Militia during 1959, of which 7 days was for summer training by attachment to Regular Army units, camps or headquarters. In the summer of 1959 a total of 10,989, all ranks were attached for summer training.

THE REGULAR OFFICER TRAINING PLAN (ROTP)

The Regular Officer Training Plan is in effect at the three Canadian Services Colleges and at all Canadian universities and affiliated colleges which have contingents of the COTC. Training consists of military studies, drill and physical training during the academic year; the summer term is devoted to practical training at military establishments.

THE CANADIAN OFFICERS' TRAINING CORPS (COTC)

In addition to the Regular Officer Training Plan, units of the Canadian Officers' Training Corps are maintained at Canadian universities to produce officers for the reserve components of the Army. University graduates who have been members of the Canadian Officers' Training Corps are also eligible for commissions in the Canadian Army (Regular). Members of the COTC undertake the same training as members of the ROTP.

ROYAL CANADIAN ARMY CADETS

Colonel-in-Chief: The Prince Phillip, Duke of Edinburgh

Address—Directorate of Militia and Cadets, Army Headquarters, Ottawa, Ont.

The Army Cadet organization stems from the "Drill Associations" formed in Colleges and Schools during and after the American Civil War, 1861-1866. Such corps were first authorized by an Amendment to the Militia Act, dated 9th June, 1862.

In 1942, the Department of National Defence expanded the Army Cadet organization, regularized the training, clothing and equipment, and began

affiliating corps with the Canadian Army Militia.

In 1956 the establishment for Army Cadets was raised to 75,000.

The strength of the Royal Canadian Army Cadets as of 31 March 1960 was 65,239, enrolled in 493 cadet corps.

Cadet summer camps are located at Aldershot, N.S., Farnham, P.Q., Camp Borden, Ont., Ipperwash, Ont., Clear Lake, Man., Dundurn, Sask., Banff, Alta., and Vernon, B.C.

THE DEFENCE RESEARCH BOARDS

The Defence Research Board was established on April 1, 1947 by an amendment to the National Defence Act.

The Board consists of a full time chairman and vice-chairman, five ex-officio members and nine appointed members. The ex-officio members are the Chiefs of Staff of the three Armed Services, the Deputy Minister of National Defence, the President of the National Research Council and a representative of the Department of Defence Production. The remaining members are selected from universities and industry

because of their scientific and technical backgrounds appointed by the Governor in Council for three year terms. (*For Officers see Index, Dept. of National Defence.*)

The organization consists of Headquarters staff, an operational research group and nine field research stations and liaison offices at London, England, and Washington, U.S.A. Advisory committees assist the Board.

To assist co-ordination at the highest level the Chairman of the Board has the status of a Chief of

Staff, and is a member of the Chiefs of Staff Committee and of the Defence Council. Thus the Defence Research Board has been described as a fourth service. Its fundamental purpose is to correlate special scientific requirements of the Armed Forces.

The activities of the Defence Research Board are concerned primarily with naval, armament, telecommunications, arctic, special weapons, operational, medical, aeronautical and materials research problems of specific interest to Canadian defence. To conduct this programme of research the Defence Research Board operates nine specialized research and development establishments.

Research on naval problems is carried out at the Naval Research Establishment, Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, and at the Pacific Naval Laboratory, Esquimalt, British Columbia. The principal emphasis at each station is on problems related to submarine detection and tracking.

Research and development of weapons and armament is undertaken by the Defence Research Board in co-operation with the Armed Services at various establishments.

Research on telecommunications is carried out in the Defence Research Telecommunications Establishment.

Research dealing with problems in arctic operations is conducted at the Defence Research Northern Laboratory, Fort Churchill, Manitoba.

The Board continues to support those fields of research which are of foremost interest to the Canadian Armed Services, and the programme is under continual review to ensure that cognizance is taken of all changes in emphasis in defence requirements.

Close liaison is maintained between the Defence Research Board and the Department of Defence Production to ensure that research and development activities are closely integrated with production.

THE ROYAL CANADIAN AIR FORCE

The Royal Canadian Air Force officially sets April 1, 1924, as its birthday. The foundations were laid during the First World War when nearly 22,000 Canadians flew as members of the British Air Forces.

Air Force Headquarters at Ottawa conducts the planning and policy administration and training of the Regular and Reserve Forces of the RCAF. Organization is divided into four categories—(a) Policy, Plans, Operations and Training (b) Logistics (c) Personnel (d) Management and Finance.

The Royal Canadian Air Force of to-day is administered by Air Force Headquarters at Ottawa through the following major formations: Air Defence Command, St. Hubert P.Q.; 5 Air Division, Vancouver, B.C.; 1 Air Division, Metz, France; Air Materiel Command, Rockcliffe, Ont.; Maritime Air Command, Halifax, N.S.; Air Transport Command, Trenton, Ont.; Training Command, Winnipeg, Man.

The role of the R.C.A.F. is to provide operational forces for:

- (a) The air defence of Canada;
- (b) Maritime defence, in conjunction with the R.C.N.
- (c) Canada's air force contribution to NATO forces in Europe;
- (d) Airlift and support for armed forces operations;
- (e) Air search and rescue and co-ordination of marine search and rescue in Canada and approaches thereto.

The organization included 29 flying squadrons of the RCAF Regular and 11 flying squadrons of the Reserve. The Reserve squadrons performed an emergency and rescue role. Nine of the Regular squadrons contributed to the air defence of the Canada-U.S. Region; 12 squadrons were assigned to the air defence of Western Europe; 4 squadrons were required for RCAF transport operations at home and abroad; 3 maritime squadrons operated in conjunction with other forces for the defence of Canada's East and West Coast; and one reconnaissance squadron carried out aerial photography and reconnaissance in the Canadian North.

The strength of the Royal Canadian Air Force on March 31, 1960 was 51,737 officers and men in the Regular Force and 3,792 in the Auxiliary Air Force.

Air Defence Command is now operating three radar systems as an integral part of North American Air Defence Command (NORAD). These three systems are the Distant Early Warning Line (DEW); the Mid Canada Line (MCL); and the Pinetree Line. The RCAF Ground Observer Corps, which acts as a supplement to the radar system, totals 2,500.

RCAF Reserve—The active sub-components of the RCAF reserves are designated as the Auxiliary and the Primary Reserve.

There are eleven Auxiliary Flying Squadrons. The squadrons are maintained to train a reserve of transport aircrew and operate in an emergency transport role. The RCAF maintains 13 Auxiliary Medical Units, 14 Aircraft Control and Warning Squadrons and 8 Technical Training Units.

ROYAL CANADIAN AIR CADETS

Air Cadet activities in Canada are sponsored and administered by the Air Cadet League of Canada. The League is a voluntary civilian organization created solely for this purpose and was formed in 1940 to provide preliminary aviation training for potential members of the Royal Canadian Air Force. In peacetime the object of Air Cadet training is to produce better citizens through air-age education. The Royal Canadian Air Force works jointly with the League

and provides training personnel, syllabi and equipment.

During the war, the Royal Canadian Air Cadets reached a peak enrolment of 30,000. The newly authorized peacetime strength ceiling is 25,500 and the strength in Jan. 1960 was approximately 24,300 enrolled in 331 squadrons across Canada. Air Cadet Training is carried out in more than 230 communities, both large and small, from Newfoundland to British Columbia.

THE CANADIAN SERVICES COLLEGES

Royal Military College of Canada, Kingston, Ont.

Royal Roads, Victoria, B.C.

Collège Militaire Royal de Saint-Jean,
Saint-Jean, Que.

The Royal Military College of Canada was founded in 1876 at Kingston, Ont. Royal Roads was established in 1941 near Victoria, B.C., as a school for naval officers. In September, 1948, both Colleges were constituted as the Canadian Services Colleges

to provide a joint educational and training program for the three Armed Forces of Canada. Collège Militaire Royal de Saint-Jean was opened in 1952 at Saint-Jean, Quebec, as the third member of the Canadian Services Colleges.

The role of the Canadian Services Colleges is to provide education and Service training for officer cadets to fit them to become commissioned officers, after graduation, in the Regular Forces of the Royal Canadian Navy, Canadian Army or the Royal Canadian Air Force. Courses of instruction are

designed to develop character, to provide a balanced and liberal education leading to degrees in Arts, Science and Engineering which can be granted by the Royal Military College of Canada, and to provide a broad basic military education. The tri-service program at Royal Military College, Royal Roads and Collège Militaire Royal de Saint-Jean recognizes the fundamental qualities common to the training of officers whether for the Navy, Army, or Air Force, and thereby, seeks to weld a common understanding in matters of National defence.

On entry into one of the Canadian Services Colleges, applicants are enrolled as Regular Force subordinate officers in the Service of their selection. Provision is made for the entry of a limited number of Dominion Cadets, the sons of persons who were killed, died or are severely incapacitated as a result of service in a component of the Canadian Forces, or

the Canadian Merchant Marine during hostilities. Dominion Cadets enter the Reserve Force of the Service of their choice and receive free tuition during their first academic year at a Service College. On graduation from the four year course, subordinate officers are promoted to Commissioned rank.

Educational requirements are senior matriculation for admission to the first year at all Royal Military Colleges of Canada and Royal Roads, and junior matriculation for entry to the preparatory year at College Militaire Royal de Saint-Jean.

Candidates must have reached their 16th, but not their 21st, birthday on the first day of January preceding entrance with the exception of junior matriculation candidates for Collège Militaire Royal de Saint-Jean who must have reached their 16th but not their 20th, birthday on the first day of January preceding entrance.

THE SUBSISTENCE ALLOWANCE

Granted whenever rations and quarters are not provided. A married man living with his family uses his subsistence allowance for their maintenance as well as his own.

MARRIAGE ALLOWANCE

Men, \$30 per month; Officers, \$40 per month, subject to a reduction of \$10 a month where permanent married quarters are occupied or \$2.50 a

month where temporary married quarters are occupied. All ranks may draw this allowance upon marriage provided the initial training period has been completed and the age of 21 has been attained by men and 23 by officers.

SEPARATED FAMILY'S ALLOWANCE

An officer or man, in receipt of Marriage Allowance, while separated from his dependents for any various reasons, (i.e. movements of dependents prohibited, illness of dependents, lack of suitable accommodation) on being moved other than temporarily, may be

entitled to Separated Family's Allowance at a rate and for a period which depend on the circumstances (i.e. rank, age, reason for separation, whether or not he has children, whether or not his family is accommodated in married quarters, whether or not he is provided with quarters and rations).

FOREIGN ALLOWANCES

Officers and men posted for duty to a country outside of Canada are entitled to allowances which vary with rank, appointment, and location in order to compensate for additional living expenses incurred.

ISOLATION ALLOWANCE

Isolation Allowance, at rates which depend on the specific location, are paid to personnel serving at isolated posts in Canada. The maximum rates are \$175 a month if accompanied by dependants and \$100 a month if unaccompanied.

OUTFIT ALLOWANCE AND CLOTHING CREDITS

Officers receive a single payment of \$450 on appointment and Warrant Officers Class 1—\$270.00. Men

receive a free issue of clothing when they join and thereafter a monthly clothing credit or allowance of \$7.00 (Women \$8.00).

AIRCREW ALLOWANCE

An allowance of \$75 a month is paid to an officer or man undergoing flying training. For qualified aircrew this allowance can be increased to \$150 depending on rank, if filling an appointment requiring active and continuous flying duties, and to \$100 depending on rank for maintaining proficiency.

SUBMARINE ALLOWANCE

An officer or man undergoing submarine training or filling an appointment in a submarine receives from \$65 to \$115 per month depending on rank.

RISK ALLOWANCE

An officer or man actively engaged or undergoing training as a parachutist, or on flying or submarine duties and not entitled to Aircrew Allowance or Submarine Allowance is paid Risk Allowance at the rate of \$30 per month.

CANADIAN FLAGS AND BADGES

FLAG OF GOVERNOR GENERAL

In 1930 King George V approved the design of a Flag for the Governor General of Canada that would be symbolic of the position of the Governor General as the Sovereign's personal representative. The Flag so approved is of the following description: "On a blue field, the Royal Crest,—the Imperial Crown proper, thereon a lion statant-guardant or, 'crowned proper—subscribed 'CANADA' in black on a yellow scroll."

THE UNION FLAG

This flag may be flown on land by Canadian citizens. With the shield of the Provincial coat of arms it is the official flag of the Lieutenant-Governor of that province. The Union Flag may be flown on selected forts, armories, drill halls and other buildings occupied by the Canadian Army in Canada. (Refer also to paragraph "The Canadian Red Ensign"). The Union Flag is known generally as the "Union Jack".

THE CANADIAN RED ENSIGN

This flag, with the Shield of the Arms of the Dominion of Canada in the fly, was authorized by Admiralty Warrant of the 2nd February, 1892, to be flown by Canadian registered merchant vessels. Following the authorization of a new Coat of Arms for the Dominion of Canada in 1921, it was provided by Order in Council (P.C. 843, 26th April, 1922) that the Shield of the Arms of Canada appearing on the fly of the Canadian Red Ensign should be the Shield of the new Canadian Coat of Arms. In 1934, by Chapter 89 (1) of the Shipping Act, Chapter 44, Statutes of Canada, 1934, statutory provision was made for the flying of the Canadian Red Ensign on ships of Canadian registry.

The Canadian Red Ensign or the Union Flag (Jack) is flown at Army Headquarters, at selected forts, armories, drill halls and other buildings within commands at the discretion of the officer commanding the command, and by the Canadian Army when stationed outside of Canada. The use of the Union Jack should be the exception and not the rule.

At units, camps and stations, in Canada and the United States, where both the Stars and Stripes and the Canadian Red Ensign or Union Jack are flown, the Canadian Red Ensign or Union Jack should be half-masted on such occasions as the Stars and Stripes is half-masted.

The Canadian Red Ensign as a National Flag

By Order in Council (P.C. 134, 26th January, 1924) the display of the Canadian Red Ensign was authorized from "all buildings owned or occupied by the Canadian Government and situated without Canada."

On Sept. 5, 1945, Order in Council P.C. 5888 was issued as follows:

"That, until such time as action is taken by Parliament for the formal adoption of a national flag, it is desirable to authorize the flying of the Canadian Red

Ensign on Federal government buildings within as well as without Canada, and to remove any doubt as to the propriety of flying the Canadian Red Ensign wherever place or occasion may make it desirable to fly a distinctive Canadian flag;

"Therefore, His Excellency the Governor General in Council, on the recommendation of the Prime Minister, is pleased to order and doth hereby order that the Red Ensign with the shield of the Coat of Arms of Canada in the fly (hereinafter referred to as "the Canadian Red Ensign") may be flown from buildings owned or occupied by the Federal government within and without Canada.

"His Excellency in Council, on the same recommendation, is further pleased to declare and doth hereby declare that it shall be appropriate to fly the Canadian Red Ensign within and without Canada wherever place or occasion may make it desirable to fly a distinctive Canadian flag.

"Nothing herein shall be deemed to alter in any way the provisions now in force with respect to the flying of the Blue Ensign with the shield of the Coat of Arms of Canada in the fly on Canadian Naval vessels and other government vessels, nor with respect to the Flying of the Canadian Red Ensign on Canadian Merchant vessels."

THE CANADIAN BLUE ENSIGN

This flag, with the Shield of the Arms of the Dominion of Canada in the fly, is used on the Jack staff of all ships and vessels of the Royal Canadian Navy and has also been adopted as the official flag for vessels in the Canadian Government Service. Ships operated by provincial government departments, ships and yachts attached to Royal Yacht Clubs in Canada, and merchant ships carrying a specified number of naval reservists as part crew, may wear the Canadian Blue Ensign on authority of a Warrant to do so, issued by the Minister of National Defence.

WHITE ENSIGN

Under agreements made between the Canadian Government and the Government of the United Kingdom at the Imperial Conference 1911, Ships of War of the Dominion of Canada hoist at the stern the White Ensign as a symbol of the authority of the Crown.

NAVAL BOARD FLAG

In 1943, approval was given to a flag to be flown by the Naval Board of Canada. The design is: The Admiralty anchor in gold in the centre of the flag, on red and blue, bisected diagonally with the blue portion nearest the staff, and the red portion uppermost. The flag may be flown both day and night from Naval Headquarters and shall be flown both day and night in H.M.C. ships and establishments when (i) two or more members are present in their official capacities, or (ii) His Excellency The Governor General of Canada is embarked.

This flag, if flown at Naval Headquarters, shall

only be struck at Naval Headquarters when the Board as a whole is absent.

THE R.C.A.F. ENSIGN

This was approved by King George VI, July 5, 1940. The flag is light blue. In the upper quarter next to the flagstaff the Union Jack and in the centre of the fly two roundels, white upon dark blue, and upon the centre of the white roundel a red maple leaf. Royal Canadian Air Force Orders provide that the Royal Canadian Air Force Ensign is to be flown daily at all Royal Canadian Air Force formations, units and detachments.

THE ROYAL CANADIAN NAVAL BADGE

It consists of an oval-shaped shield of deep blue upon which is a fouled anchor in gold. The shield is encircled by a wreath of ten golden maple leaves, five on each side, and is surmounted by the Royal Crown, of St. Edward's design.

THE CANADIAN ARMY BADGE

This badge was approved in 1947 by King George VI. It is for the use of the Canadian Army as a whole and has replaced the Coat of Arms on army stationery, publications, etc. The following is a description of the approved design: It consists of three hard red maple leaves, conjoined on one stem, upon two crusader's swords, points upwards, blades in natural colour, i.e. blue, and grips, guards and pommels in gold. Above, is the Crown properly coloured. In accordance with the wish of Her Majesty the Queen, the Crown was changed in 1954 from the "Tudor" design to the "St. Edward's" design.

THE R.C.A.F. GENERAL BADGE

This was approved by King George VI in February, 1943. The official description of the badge is: within a dark blue circular band edged with gold and inscribed in gold the motto "PER ARDUA AD ASTRA," a light blue roundel. In front of the whole a gold eagle flying forward with head lowered and to its left with wings extended beyond the circular band. Beneath, a dark blue riband edged gold and inscribed in gold with the words "ROYAL CANADIAN AIR FORCE." The whole is surmounted with the Royal Crown, of St. Edward's design.

NOVA SCOTIA FLAG

The official flag of the province of Nova Scotia is the blue cross of St. Andrew on a white field, with the Royal Lion mounted thereon. The flag was originally authorized by Charles I in 1625. In 1929, on petition of Nova Scotia, a Royal Warrant of King George V was issued, revoking the modern Arms and ordering that the original Arms granted by King Charles I be borne upon shields, banners and otherwise according to the laws of Arms. Since that time, the Nova Scotia Flag has been in continual use.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC FLAG

The official flag of the Province of Quebec was adopted by a Provincial Order-in-Council No. 72 on January 1, 1948. The flag thus adopted is generally known as the "fleurdelisé" flag. It is a white cross on a sky blue ground, with the fleur-de-lis in an upright position on the blue ground in each of the four corners of the flag.

FISHERY REGULATIONS, GAME LAWS, CLOSED SEASONS, LICENCES, &c.

The Canadian Government has the sole legislative authority over the fisheries of Canada, both coastal and inland, under which laws are made for the protection and conservation of the fisheries in all the provinces. The provinces, however, have property rights in the non-tidal fisheries. Over a period of years various arrangements have been made between the Dominion and the provinces dividing the administrative (but not the legislative) authority over fisheries. Under these arrangements the Federal Government not only legislates but also administers the fisheries in all Canadian tidal waters except those of Quebec. In the non-tidal waters of Canada the Federal Government administers the fisheries of the Yukon, Northwest Territories, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland. The non-tidal fisheries of the other provinces are administered by the provincial authorities who enforce, on behalf of the Federal Government, the Federal laws regulating the fisheries as such.

Fisheries in National Parks of Canada are under the administration of the National Parks Service of the Federal Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources, Ottawa.

For further information as to fisheries regulations apply to the Department of Fisheries, Ottawa, or, in the case of National Parks, to the National Parks Service, Ottawa. For information as to fishing licence fees in any area apply to the administrative authority indicated above.

GAME LAWS

Migratory birds are protected under a Federal law known as the Migratory Birds Convention Act, administered by the Canadian Wildlife Service, Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources, Ottawa, in conjunction with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and in co-operation with the provincial game authorities. This Act is based upon the Migratory Birds Treaty with the U.S.

With this exception, and except in National Parks, game laws are under the administration of the various provinces and territories.

A Federal law, the Game Export Act, passed in 1941, prohibits the export of game from any province or territory without permit from the province or territory. It has been proclaimed for all provinces and territories except Prince Edward Island.

Details as to closed seasons, licences, etc., are not given here, owing to the fact that regulations for the ensuing months are, in some cases, not available when this volume goes to press and where available are often subject to changes before the opening of the season.

The northern portion of the Province of Ontario is divided into 11 Districts and the southern portion into 43 Counties. The union of the following counties, Leeds-Grenville, Northumberland-Durham, Prescott-Russell and Stormont-Dundas and Glengarry reduces the county administrations to 38 distinct units for local government. The districts, unlike counties, are not organized for municipal purposes and as a result, the 229 incorporated municipalities contained therein are not united for municipal administration.

With the exception of the 25 cities, the 13 municipalities comprising the municipality of metropolitan Toronto and the 8 separated towns which are located within counties, the remaining 662 local municipalities in counties are united for administration in the counties of which they form part. This relationship is for the purpose of the administration of inter-related interests such as education, roads, welfare and administration of justice. Members of the County Councils are composed of the Reeves of all the local municipalities within the county and in certain cases the deputy Reeves.

The 8 separated towns are: Brockville, Gananoque, Ingersoll, Prescott, Riverside, St. Mary's, Smiths Falls, Trenton.

POLICE VILLAGES

In addition to the organized villages listed elsewhere in the Ontario section of the Canadian Almanac, there are some 171 police villages.

A police village is run by a Board of Trustees elected by the residents. The Board of Trustees runs its local affairs, but cannot levy any taxes or make by-laws which involve the borrowing of money. It has to send in a requisition to the authorities of the township of which it is part for any finances it requires, such as for local improvements or lighting or village constabulary.

METROPOLITAN TORONTO

The municipality of Metropolitan Toronto, by act of legislature, Bill 80 controls the following utilities: in 13 autonomous, contiguous municipalities and urban townships certain roads in Metropolitan Toronto, Toronto Transit Commission, Metropolitan School Board, Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board, Works Department, Police Department.

The areas affected are: City of Toronto, Township of York, Township of North York, Township of East York, Township of Scarborough, Township of Etobicoke, Village of Forest Hill, Town of Leaside, Town of Mimico, Town of New Toronto, Village of Long Branch, Town of Weston, Village of Swansea.

IMPROVEMENT DISTRICTS

In 1943 The Municipal Act was amended to provide for the incorporation of Improvement Districts having the municipal status of towns, townships or villages, administered by three trustees appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council.

DATES OF MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS

Municipal elections in Ontario are held at various dates provided for by The Municipal Act, Chapter 266, R.S.O., 1937, sections 64-71 as amended.

Section 64 provides that the nominations shall be held at noon on the last Monday in December except when the last Monday is Christmas day in which case nominations shall be held on the preceding Friday, and the date for polling shall be the first Monday in January; unless council under authority of section 65, not later than November 1st, passes a by-law fixing dates during the period November 15th to January 2nd both inclusive for nominations and elections, said dates to be other than a Sunday or the 24th, 25th or 31st of December and provided the day fixed for nominations is not less than seven days prior to the day fixed for polling in force until repealed, but no appeal or amendment after 1st of November of any year.

In addition, when new municipalities are erected, the Municipal Board may set the date for the holding of their first elections

SUPREME COURT OF ONTARIO

The Supreme Court consists of two branches: The Court of Appeal and the High Court of Justice.

Appeals may be taken from the High Court of Justice, County, District and Division Courts to the Court of Appeal and, in certain cases, from the Court of Appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada.

BANKRUPTCY

Supreme Court Judges have jurisdiction.

MATRIMONIAL CAUSES

Actions for divorce must be brought in the Supreme Court of Ontario, and are conducted according to rules passed by the Rules Committee from time to time. The Court has power to grant divorce, annul a marriage, grant alimony and provide for custody and maintenance of the children.

The Court of Appeal hears appeals from the decisions of the High Court and of the lower courts.

REGISTRATION OF BILLS OF SALE, ETC.

Bills of Sale and Chattel Mortgages must be registered in the Office of the Clerk of the County or District Court of the County or District in which the property sold or mortgaged is situated at the time of the execution thereof. The time for registration in the County is five days from the date of execution and ten days from that date in a District. In the provisional County of Haliburton, registration must be within ten days with the Clerk of the County Court of the County of Victoria at Lindsay.

Hire receipts and Conditional sale agreements must be filed with County or District Court Clerk of County or District in which purchaser or hirer resided at time of hiring or sale. But this does not apply to a contract respecting manufactured goods, including pianos, organs or other musical instruments which, at the time possession is delivered have the name and address of seller or lender painted, printed, stamped or engraved thereon or plainly attached thereto, nor to a contract respecting household furniture other than pianos organs or other musical instruments.

Mechanics Liens must be registered in the Registry Office of the Registry Division, or the Land Titles Office, of locality in which the land affected is situated.

In most villages and rural municipalities, municipal elections in the Province of Quebec are held on the Monday following the second Wednesday in January, unless varied by By-law.

In most cities and towns, voting takes place on the 1st juridical day of February, unless varied by special charter.

SEAT OF GOVERNMENT—WHITEHORSE

The Yukon was created a separate Territory in June, 1898. Provision is made for a local Government composed of a Chief Executive, styled Commissioner, also an Elective Legislative Council of five members with a three year tenure of office. The Commissioner administers the Government under instructions from the Governor-General in Council or the Minister of Northern Affairs and National Resources. The Commissioner in Council has power to make ordinances dealing with the imposition of local taxes, sale of liquor, preservation of game, establishment of territorial offices, maintenance of prisons and municipal institutions, issue of licences, incorporation of companies, solemnization of marriage, property and civil rights, administration of justice, and generally all matters of a local nature in the Territory.

SEAT OF GOVERNMENT—OTTAWA

The Northwest Territories comprise all that part of Canada north of the Sixtieth Parallel of North Latitude, except the portions thereof within the Yukon Territory and the Provinces of Quebec and Newfoundland, and the islands in Hudson Bay, James Bay and Ungava Bay, except those islands within the Provinces of Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec. For administrative purposes the Territories were subdivided into the provisional districts of Mackenzie, Keewatin and Franklin by Order in Council of 16th of March, 1918. The Northwest Territories Act, Chap. 331, R.S.C., 1952 as amended provides for the government of the Northwest Territories by a Commissioner (who is Deputy Minister of the Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources) under instructions given from time to time by the Governor in Council or the Minister of the Department. The Act also provides

for a Council consisting of nine members, one of whom is Deputy Commissioner. Of the nine, four are elected by the people of Mackenzie District to represent four constituencies in that District, and five are appointed by the Governor in Council. Legislative powers are exercised by the Commissioner in Council on such matters as direct taxation within the Territories in order to raise revenue, maintenance of municipal institutions, licenses, solemnization of marriages, property and civil rights, administration of justice, education, public health and generally all matters of a local nature. The administration of the Territories under the Northwest Territories Act and the ordinances passed by the Commissioner in Council is carried on by the Northern Administration Branch of the Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources.

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CANADIAN GOVERNMENT ANNUITIES

The Government Annuities System was set up in 1908 to encourage persons resident or domiciled in Canada to save for their old age by the purchase of deferred annuities and to enable older citizens to stretch out their accumulated savings by the purchase of immediate annuities. Canadian Government Annuities are payable for life and may be guaranteed for a period of years certain. Under deferred annuities, premiums are returned with interest if the annuitant dies before the annuity commences. The maximum amount of annuity obtainable is \$1,200.00 a year. It may be obtained with an income reduction of \$55.00 a month at 70, thus fitting in with the Old Age Security Act, in which event the maximum is the actuarial equivalent of \$1,200 a year.

Individual contracts are in most instances eligible

for registration as Retirement Savings Plans to get tax exemption on premiums in accordance with Section 79B of the Income Tax Act.

Employers may operate their pension plans through the purchase of Government Annuities for, or on behalf of, their employees. There are 1,223 such pension plans in operation, covering 205,201 working employees. In addition, there are 116,057 individual deferred annuity contracts in force. Annuity in the annual amount of \$43,403,649 is being paid under 81,228 individual contracts and group certificates.

The premiums are moderate and annuities may be purchased through Canadian Government Annuities offices in 50 communities across Canada, or directly from Head Office.

Founded in 1880 by the Marquis of Lorne for the
custody of diploma works of the Royal Canadian
Academy and the formation of a national art collec-
tion, the National Gallery was incorporated in 1913
by Act of Parliament and placed in the care of five

trustees responsible to the Minister of Public Works. A new Act of 1951 transferred it to the Department of Citizenship and Immigration and increased the number of trustees to nine.

The Gallery houses a permanent collection of European, British and Canadian paintings, sculptures, prints and drawings, and holds temporary exhibitions as well. As part of its nation-wide program it organizes travelling exhibitions of the art of other countries, and sends shows of Canadian painting to all parts of the world, Radio broadcasts, lecture-tours, the distribution of colour reproductions and the lending of films, slides and reproductions are some of the means by which the Gallery extends its services across Canada.

In addition, the National Gallery maintains an Industrial Design Division, to encourage good design in Canadian manufacture by means of awards and scholarships, and to stimulate public interest through exhibitions. It has its own library, and keeps a photographic file of original Canadian designs.

THE NATIONAL MUSEUM OF CANADA, OTTAWA

The National Museum of Canada originated in the Geological Survey of Canada which was founded in 1842 by Sir William Logan. Formerly the Victoria Memorial Museum, authority to designate it as the "National Museum of Canada", was given by Order-in-Council P.C. 2615 of January, 1927.

In 1957 the Museum was divided into two branches—the Natural History Branch which carries out scientific research and is responsible for exhibits in the field of natural history, and the Human History Branch which has the same responsibilities in the field of human history.

NATURAL HISTORY BRANCH

The Natural History Branch deals with the sciences of Botany, Zoology, Palaeontology, and Geology. Its study collections are open to research by properly qualified students. They include over 260,000 sheets of vascular plants besides 90,000 cryptograms, 27,500 mammals, 44,000 birds, 17,000 specimens of amphibians and reptiles, smaller collections of fishes, and numerous marine invertebrates. There is an outstanding collection of dinosaurs and other fossil vertebrates. Scientific and educational publications on this material are available for distribution.

Folk-song collections include phonographic recordings of 4,500 Indian, 14,000 French-Canadian, and 5,000 British-Canadian songs. The large collections of this division, housed in 78 galleries, illustrate man's life, skills and arts through many centuries and in many lands—from the stone ages through the historical periods. The Near Eastern galleries document his earliest attempts to achieve an ordered, sedentary existence particularly in Egypt, Mesopotamia and neighbouring lands. Objects from Crete, Cyprus, Greece and Italy demonstrate the important pre-classical and classical heritage. The fine collection of Greek vases is particularly significant. The cultural history of Europe through the mediaeval and into the modern period is set forth in arms and armour, sculpture, ceramics, silver and glass, furniture, textiles, and costumes. Canada's cultural past is illustrated by textiles, furniture and wood carving in the main building and by paintings, prints and memorabilia in the Sigmund Samuel Canadiana Collection housed in a separate building at 14 Queen's Park. The Far Eastern collection is of great importance with stress laid on Chinese bronzes, ceramics, jades, lacquers and tomb groups. The Ethnological collection is very large, illustrating the cultures of the American aborigines in North, Central and South America but containing important materials from all over the world.

Continually changing Special Exhibitions utilize both loan materials and objects from the Division's own collections to focus public attention on particular aspects of man's culture.

EARTH SCIENCES DIVISION

This division occupies three galleries.

The mineralogy gallery contains an unusually complete series of minerals from all parts of the world, as well as a special collection of Canadian minerals; collections of cut gems, crystals, meteorites, rocks; and a special series to illustrate the mineral association found in deposits of gold, silver, lead, zinc, uranium and nickel, as well as certain non-metallic series. Among the popular exhibits are a reconstructed crystal cave and a collection to show the fluorescence of minerals.

A gallery of physical geology was opened in 1957. It contains exhibits devoted to geological processes such as glaciation and rock formation, and it also has the six-foot diameter Bickell Globe that divides to show the earth's interior. A new gallery of Applied Geology is being constructed.

The gallery of Canadian animals features a reasonably complete collection of well-displayed mammals and birds. Numerous habitat groups and special displays explain life histories and other features of interest. Opened in 1960 is a gallery which shows the life habits and adaptations of reptiles from all areas of the world, as well as a comprehensive display of the amphibians and reptiles of Canada. The recently-huilt gallery of fishes has a colourful systematic series, plus several excellent habitat groups and models of commercial fishing equipment. Displays in the gallery of foreign animals include representatives of most groups of mammals, birds and insects. The four galleries in the palaeontology section contain many rare and unique specimens. The systematic collection of invertebrates, is currently under re-construction. The dinosaur gallery features many complete skeletons and type specimens from the Cretaceous of Western Canada. A recent addition to the gallery of fossil mammals and fishes is an exhibit of bones recovered from the tar pits of Peru by a museum expedition.

The scope and authenticity of the gallery displays is made possible by the continuous study of the vast library and research collections maintained in the departmental laboratories. The collections are also used by scholars the world over, being especially rich in birds, mammals, spiders, aquatic insects, Cretaceous dinosaurs and lower Paleozoic invertebrates.

This also includes special training for ministers and professional workers as well as volunteer workers in the church, supervision of Vacation Church Schools, Youth Caravans, Religious Education in Schools, Family Life, Summer and Winter Training Schools, Institutes, Camps, Conferences and Residential Christian Training Centres. The Board provides for curriculum and programme materials, and Leadership Education for all phases of Christian Education work. It provides evaluation service in visual aids and has shared in the supervision of the "Sunday School in the Home by Mail and Air." Since the organization of The United Church of Canada there has been a steady growth of Christian Education activity.

There is no central organization of the Mennonites who are divided into fifteen independent groups consisting of a number of congregations, with from 25 to 2,500 members in each and about 900 ministers.

In 1948 about 1,700 Mennonites, including children, emigrated from Manitoba to an unsettled country in Paraguay, South America. In the same year about 2,000 Refugee Mennonites entered Canada, and several thousand more since.

The Mennonites maintain schools of higher education: The Mennonite Collegiate Institute at Gretna, Man.; The Academy at Rosthern Sask; Two Bible Colleges at Winnipeg; and about 12 Bible Schools at different places.

Several periodicals are published in the interests of the Mennonites in Canada.

THE SYNAGOGUE IN CANADA

There is no federation of synagogues in Canada. Each synagogue is autonomous, is responsible to no superiors, affiliated with no hierarchy. Any group of Jews may form a synagogue, which does not necessarily require the services of a rabbi, any individual being eligible to lead in the recital of prayers.

There are three tendencies evident in Judaism—orthodox, conservative and reform. The orthodox tendency parallels the fundamentalist movement in Christianity; the reform tendency is modernism in Judaism; the conservative tendency is the middle movement.

Several synagogues in Canada are affiliated with the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, the federation of reform synagogues. Several other Canadian synagogues are affiliated with the United Synagogue of America (conservative). Most of the Canadian congregations are orthodox and are not affiliated with any parent organization, which in any case has no authority over its constituent members.

DIGGING UP AMERICA

by Frank C. Hibben

Archaeological diggings in Alaska, Central and South America, and the United States, described by the Professor of Anthropology at the University of New Mexico, author of *The Lost Americans*. CANADIAN CUSTOMS AND EXCISE

EXCISE TAXES AND REGULATIONS

Excise Taxes and Regulations as at December 31, 1960

Whenever goods mentioned in Schedules One and Two of this Act are imported into Canada or taken out of warehouse, or manufactured or produced in Canada and delivered to a purchaser thereof, there shall be imposed, levied and collected, in addition to any other duty or tax that may be payable under this Act or any other statute or law, an excise tax in respect of goods mentioned

(a) in Schedule One, at the rate set opposite to each item in the said Schedule computed on the duty paid value or the sale price as the case may be;

(b) in Schedule Two, at the rate set opposite to each item in the said Schedule.

For the purpose of determining the excise tax payable under this Part

(i) in calculating the sale price of goods manufactured or produced in Canada there shall be included the amount charged as price for or in respect of (i) the wrapper, package, box, bottle or other container in which the goods are contained, and (ii) any other goods contained in or attached to such wrapper, package, box, bottle or other container; and

(ii) in calculating the duty paid value of imported goods that, when imported, are wrapped, packaged, put up in boxes or bottles or otherwise prepared for sale, there shall be added to the value of the goods as determined in the manner prescribed in this Part the value, similarly determined, of the wrapper, package, box, bottle or other container in which the goods are contained, and such wrapper, package, box, bottle or other container shall be deemed to be subject to the same rate of duty as the goods contained therein.

The same provision is made for the sales tax.

Schedule I

1. Automobiles adapted or adaptable for passenger use, with seating capacity for not more than ten persons each.....7½ per cent

Provided that the tax on automobiles shall apply on the total price charged for such automobiles, which price shall include all charges for accessories, optional equipment, advertising, financing, servicing, warranty, or any other charges contracted for at the time of sale, whether charged for separately or not;

Provided further, that the tax shall not apply to automobiles imported under Customs Tariff items 702,704, 705a, 706, 707 and 708.

2. Articles, materials or preparations of whatever composition or in whatever form, commonly or commercially known as toilet articles, preparations or cosmetics, which are intended for use or application for toilet purposes, or for use in connection with the care of the human body, including the hair, nails, eyes, teeth, or any other part or parts thereof, whether for cleansing, deodorizing, beautifying, preserving or restoring, and to include shaving soaps and shaving creams, antiseptics, bleaches, depilatories, perfumes, scents and similar preparations.....10 per cent

4. Devices commonly or commercially known as lighters, which produce sparks, flame or heat, whether or not in combination with other articles, on the separate or combined value as the case may be...10 per cent

6. (a) Phonographs, record playing devices, radio broadcasting receiving sets or any combination of the foregoing and tubes therefor; any apparatus or device that enables a person to hear programmes of music distributed by any means whatever or radio broadcasting programmes distributed by any means whatever; but this paragraph does not include any article coming within paragraph (b) of this section.....15 per cent

(b) Television receiving sets and tubes therefor; any apparatus or device that enables a person to see or to see and hear, television programmes distributed by any means whatever or television radio broadcasting programmes distributed by any means whatever.....15 per cent

7. Coin, disc or token operated slot machines and vending machines; coin, disc or token operated games or amusement devices of all kinds.....10 per cent

9. Tobacco pipes; cigar and cigarette holders; cigarette rolling devices.....10 per cent

11. Cigars.....15 per cent

12. Matches.....10 per cent

13. (a) Clocks and watches adapted to household or personal use, except railway men's watches, and those specially designed for the use of the blind, and alarm clocks where the sale price by the Canadian manufacturer or the duty paid value of those imported does not exceed ten dollars.....10 per cent

(b) Articles of all kinds made in whole or in part of ivory, jet, amber, coral, mother of pearl, natural shells, tortoise shell, jade, onyx, lapis lazuli, or other semi-precious stones.....10 per cent

(c) Articles commonly or commercially known as jewellery, whether real or imitation, including diamonds and other precious or semi-precious stones for personal use or for adornment of the person; goldsmiths' and silversmiths' products except gold-plated or silver-plated ware used in the preparation or serving of food or drink.....10 per cent

Schedule II

Cigarettes, manufactured tobacco and Canadian raw leaf tobacco:—(a) For each five cigarettes or fraction of five cigarettes contained in any package.....2½ Cents

For each pound of manufactured tobacco, including snuff but not including cigars and cigarettes, contained in any package.....80 cents

Sundry Taxes

Playing cards. For every fifty four cards or fraction of fifty four cards in each package imported or manufactured in Canada.....per pack 20 cents

Wines. Wines of all kinds containing not more than seven per cent of absolute alcohol by volume.....per gallon 25 cents

Wines of all kinds, except sparkling wines, containing more than seven per cent of absolute alcohol by volume but not more than forty per cent of proof spirit.....per gallon 50 cents

Champagne and all other sparkling wines.....per gallon \$2.50

SALES TAX

A Sales Tax is collected of 11 per centum on the sale price of all goods produced or manufactured in Canada, including the amount of excise duties when the goods are sold in bond, the tax to be payable by the producer or manufacturer at the time of the sale thereof by him, and of a like tax upon the duty paid value of imported goods the tax to be payable by the importer, or transferee who takes the goods out of bond at the time when the goods are imported or taken out of warehouse for consumption. Note—This tax is not payable on certain exemptions (see below and page 824.)

EXEMPTIONS

(1) The said consumption or sales tax shall not be payable in the following cases, that is to say:

(a) on goods exported; or

(b) on sale by a licensed manufacturer or producer to another licensed manufacturer or producer of goods to be used in the production of articles for sale; or

(c) on goods imported by a licensed manufacturer if the goods are partly manufactured goods; or

(d) imported by a licensed wholesaler on importation; or

(e) sold by a licensed manufacturer to a licensed wholesaler; or

(f) sold by a licensed wholesaler to a licensed manufacturer if the goods are partly manufactured goods; or

(g) sold by a licensed wholesaler to another licensed wholesaler: Provided that if a licensed wholesaler sells goods to another licensed wholesaler at a price less than the value upon which the tax would be computed under paragraph (c) of the last preceding subsection, the vendor shall forthwith become liable to pay the tax upon the difference between such value and his sale price.

(h) used in the manufacture or production of goods in Canada.

Goods exempt from Sales Tax are indicated in the Tariff under Schedule A; also see list of goods exempt page 824.

SALES TAX LICENCES

Every manufacturer or producer shall take out a licence, for the purpose of this Part.

The Minister may nevertheless direct that any class of small manufacturer or producer selling his product exclusively by retail shall be exempt from payment of consumption or sales tax on goods manufactured or produced by him and persons so exempted shall not be given a licence.

Such exemption may be withdrawn by the Minister. A bona fide wholesaler or jobber may be granted a licence provided fifty per cent of his sales for the three months immediately preceding his application were exempt from Sales Tax under the provisions of this Act.

Upon the cancellation or expiration of the licence granted to any licensed wholesaler, the tax imposed by section eighty-six shall be forthwith payable upon all goods then in the possession of the said licensee, which have been purchased free of tax by virtue of the said licence; the tax shall be paid at the rate in force when the said licence is cancelled or expires and is not renewed and shall be computed in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (c) of subsection one of section eighty-six.

SCHEDULE EXCISE ACT BEER

Beer. Upon all beer or malt liquor, per gallon 38 cents Subject to an allowance for loss in production based on the duty assessed on beer or malt liquor produced, of

- (a) five per cent when yeast sediment is included, or
- (b) three per cent when yeast sediment is not included.

SPIRITS

On every gallon of the strength of proof distilled in Canada, except as hereinafter otherwise provided, thirteen dollars, and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof and for any less quantity than a gallon.

2. (a) On every gallon of the strength of proof used in the manufacture of patent and proprietary medicines, extracts, essences and pharmaceutical preparations, one dollar and fifty cents and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof and for any less quantity than a gallon;
2. (b) On every gallon of the strength of proof used

in the production of such chemical compositions as are from time to time approved by the Governor in Council, fifteen cents, and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof and for any less quantity than a gallon;

- (3) upon spirits sold to any druggist licensed under this Act, and used exclusively in the preparation of prescriptions for medicines and pharmaceutical preparations, the duty of excise shall be, on every gallon of the strength of proof, one dollar and fifty cents and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof and for any less quantity than a gallon;
- (4) spirits used solely in the manufacture of vinegar by a manufacturer of vinegar licensed under this Act shall be subject to no duty or excise.
- (5) spirits distilled from wine produced from native fruits and used in any bonded manufactory for the treatment of domestic wine are subject to no duty of excise.
- (6) spirits used directly in the manufacture of toilet preparations or cosmetics on which excise tax is applicable under schedule 1 of the Excise Tax Act, are subject to no duty of excise.

Upon imported spirits when taken into a bonded manufactory, in addition to any of the duties otherwise imposed, upon every gallon of the strength of proof, thirty cents, and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof and for any less quantity than a gallon.

CANADIAN BRANDY

On every gallon the strength of proof, eleven dollars, and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof and for any less quantity than a gallon.

TOBACCO, CIGARS AND CIGARETTES

Manufactured tobacco of all descriptions except cigarettes, per pound actual weight, thirty-five cents.

Cigarettes weighing not more than two and one-half pounds per thousand, four dollars per thousand. Weighing more than two and one-half pounds per thousand, five dollars per thousand.

Cigars, two dollars per thousand.

Canadian raw leaf tobacco, when sold for consumption, ten cents per pound.

SPECIAL CUSTOMS TARIFF TAXES

SCHEDULE A SPIRITS, WINE, TOBACCO

1. There shall be levied, collected and paid on the following goods, whether dutiable or not dutiable, when imported from any country, the additional duties of Customs hereinafter specified:—

- (a) Whisky, brandy, rum, gin and all other goods specified in Customs Tariff Items 156, 156b, per gallon of the strength of proof. \$9.00
- (b) Ale, beer, porter and stout. per gallon 38

EXPLANATION OF RATES OF DUTY

1. Rates of Duty are given in 3 columns; the first is the British Preferential Tariff, (see Note 11 following) the second is the most Favoured Nations rate, (see Note 2), and the third is the General Tariff (see Note 13). The rate of Duty is per cent. *ad valorem* except when otherwise specified. Where a single rate with 2 blanks is shown, (generally under Most Favoured Nations). example: —; 10%; —, the entry is an "extract" from the main item in the official Customs Tariff and is a special rate applying only to that column. When word "Free" is printed once only it applies to all tariff.

In addition to these rates the following taxes: Sales Tax 10% on duty paid value; and special Excise Taxes, beginning on page 712. See notes on pages 712-721.

Exemptions are shown against specific items.

MEANING OF TERMS USED

1. Unless the context otherwise requires:—

(a) "diameter" when applied to pipes and tubes means the actual inside diameter;

(b) "free", when applied to any goods in the tariff columns, in Schedule A, means that the goods may be imported and taken out of warehouse for consumption in Canada, without duty;

(c) "hot-rolled" or "cold rolled", when applied to shapes, sections, bars, rods, plates, sheets or strips of iron or steel, includes shapes, sections, bars, rods, plates, sheets or strips that have been annealed, tempered, pickled, limed or polished;

(d) "M. ft." means "one thousand feet board measure;"

(dd) "man made fibre" means a staple fibre or filament produced by manufacturing processes, wholly or in part of organic polymers, but does not include rubber;

(e) "n.o.p." means "not otherwise provided for;"

(f) "p.c." in any one of the Tariff Columns in Schedule "A" means "per cent. ad valorem;"

(g) "plate", when applied to iron or steel, means a flat-rolled product of any shape, (i) having a width of more than 8" but not more than 48", and a thickness of 0.23 in or more, or (ii) having a width of more than 48", and a thickness of 0.18 inch or more;

(h) "Proof," "proof spirit" or "proof spirits," means any spirit having the strength of proof by Sykes hydrometer, namely, spirit that at the temperature of fifty-one degrees Fahrenheit weighs exactly twelve-thirteenths of the weight of an equal measure of distilled water at the same temperature;

(i) "Rubber" includes synthetic rubber which may

be defined by regulations prescribed by the Minister.

(j) "sheet", when applied to iron or steel, means a flat rolled product of any shape, (i) having a width of more than 12" but not more than 48", and a thickness of 0.2299 inch or less, or (ii) having a width of more than 48 inches, and a thickness of 0.1799 inch or less;

(jj) "sliver" means fibres in a continuous strand, combed or not, not twisted and not exceeding 12 inches in length, and includes tops;

(k) "strip," when applied to iron or steel, means a flat-rolled product of any shape, (i) having a width of more than 8 inches but not more than 12 inches, and a thickness of 0.2299 inch or less, or (ii) having a width of 8 inches or less and a thickness of 0.2030 inch or less;

(l) "steel" means any metal or combination of metals containing 50 per cent or more, by weight, of iron; and

(m) A reference to a unit or standard measure of weight, capacity or extension means the Canadian unit or standard measure established by the Weights and Measures Act.

11. BRITISH PREFERENTIAL TARIFF

UNITED KINGDOM-CANADA TRADE AGREEMENT

1. The rates of customs duties, if any, set forth in Column 1, "British Preferential Tariff," shall apply to goods the produce or manufacture of the following British countries when conveyed without transshipment from a port of any British country enjoying the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff into a sea or river port of Canada:

United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern

Ireland; Union of South Africa; Australia; New Zealand; India; Pakistan; Ceylon; Eire; British West Indies, including Bahamas, Jamaica, Barbados, Trinidad and Tobago, Antigua, St. Christopher-Nevis, Dominica, Montserrat, Virgin Islands, Grenada, St. Vincent, St. Lucia, Turks and Caicos Islands; Ascension; Bermuda; British Guiana; British Honduras; British North Borneo; Brunei; Basutoland; Bechuanaland Protectorate; British Solomon Islands Protectorate; Cyprus; Channel Islands; Cayman Islands; Camerouns, British Sphere of the; Cook Islands; Fiji; Falkland Islands; Gold Coast; Gambia; Gilbert and Ellice Islands; Isle of Man; Kenya Colony and Protectorate; Malay States, Federated; Malay States, Unfederated; Johore, Kedah, Kelantan, Perlis and Trengganu; Malta; Mauritius and Dependencies thereof; Northern Rhodesia; Nyassaland Protectorate; Nigeria Colony and Protectorate; New Guinea; Norfolk Island; Nauru, Mandated Territory of; Papua; St. Helena; Southern Rhodesia; Sierra Leone; Straits Settlements; Seychelles; Sarawak; Somaliland Protectorate; Swaziland; Tanganyika Territory; Togoland, British Sphere of; Tonga or Friendly Islands; Uganda Protectorate; Western Samoa; Zanzibar.

Any other British Colony of Protectorate or Territory under British Trusteeship, admitted to the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff in Canada, in the manner hereinafter provided;

Provided, however, that goods entitled to the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff shall be accorded such benefits when such goods are shipped on a through bill of lading consigned to a consignee in a specified port in Canada when such goods are transferred at a port of a British colony or possession enjoying the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff, and conveyed without further transshipment into a sea or river port of Canada.

BRITISH CONTENT

Goods to enjoy the British Preferential Tariff are required to be 50 % Empire material and labour unless specifically varied as per list following:

Every manufactured article to be admitted under the British Preferential Tariff must be bona fide the manufacture of a British country entitled to the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff, and a substantial portion of the value of the manufactured article must have been produced by industry in one or more of such countries.

In respect of the under-mentioned commodities, the requirement of one-half British content is reduced to the proportion indicated in each case:

11a. TEN PER CENT ADDITIONAL DISCOUNT

The importer of goods entitled to the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff shall be entitled to a discount of ten per centum on the amount of duty computed under such Tariff, when such goods are conveyed without transshipment from a port of a country enjoying the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff into a sea or river port of Canada on importation and when such goods are shipped on a through bill of lading consigned to a consignee in a specified port in Canada, when such goods are transferred at a port of a British Colony or possession not enjoying the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff, and conveyed without further transshipment into a sea or river port of Canada

Provided, however, that this discount shall not apply to duties on any of the following articles, viz., wines, malt liquors, spirits, spirituous liquors, liquid medicines and articles containing alcohol; sugar, tobacco, cigars and cigarettes.

Provided further that this discount shall not apply in the case in which the duty does not exceed fifteen per centum *ad valorem*, or, in the case of a specific duty or a specific and *ad valorem* duty combined in which the computed rate does not exceed fifteen per centum *ad valorem*, or to goods admitted into Canada which have the benefit of reductions provided for in the Canada-West Indies Trade Agreement 1926

Note—The 10 % additional discount does not apply when the British preferential tariff is the same rate as Most-Favored-Nation tariff agreed to at Geneva.

Excise taxes or excise duties and customs duties shall be disregarded in estimating the market value of goods for the purposes of special duty when the goods are entitled to entry under the British Preferential Tariff or any other tariff.

11b. UNITED KINGDOM-CANADA TRADE AGREEMENT

This Agreement went into force on September 1st, 1937, assuring Great Britain various reductions which are embodied in the British Preferential Tariff column.

This Agreement also extends to goods from all the non-self-governing colonies and Protectorates, the mandated Territories of Togoland, under British mandate, the Camerouns, under British mandate, Tanganyika Territory and Palestine; with treatment not less favourable than that accorded to similar goods the growth, produce or manufactures of any foreign country.

WEST INDIES TRADE AGREEMENT ACT

By Order-in-Council (PC. 2715) passed on the 20th October, 1936, it is provided that goods, the growth, produce or manufacture of those British Colonies which were parties to the Agreement set out in the Schedule to the West Indies Trade Agreement Act, 1926, shall enjoy, effective on and after the 15th November, 1936, on importation into Canada, tariff treatment not less favorable than that accorded to like goods the produce or manufacture of any foreign country.

The provisions of the Order-in-Council are supplementary to, and do not affect in any manner the extension of the British Preferential Tariff to the colonies referred to, or the provisions of the West Indies Trade Agreement Act, 1926.

15. SPECIAL NOTES RE TREATIES, ETC.

AUSTRALIAN TRADE AGREEMENT

Under the Australian Trade Agreement Act of 1934. Goods set out in Schedule II. of the Act, the produce or manufacture of the Commonwealth of Australia when imported direct shall be admitted into Canada at the rates of duties as specifically shown in the following pages Schedule 'A' of the Custom Tariff starting on page 722.

By Order-in-Council, 29th September 1937, for so long as the Trade Agreement between Canada and Australia remains in force, goods the produce or manufacture of the Commonwealth of Australia shall enjoy, on importation into Canada, tariff treatment not less favourable than that accorded to like goods the produce or manufacture of any foreign country.

Note: The provisions of this Order-in-Council are supplementary to, and do not affect in any manner, the extension of the British Preferential Tariff to the Commonwealth of Australia, or the provisions of the Australian Trade Agreement, 1931.

In 1937 the benefits of this Trade Agreement were extended to Papua and Norfolk Island.

NEW ZEALAND TRADE AGREEMENT

Products mentioned in Schedule "A" the product of New Zealand, when imported direct, without transshipment, to Canada, shall be admitted at the rates of duty as are specifically shown in the following pages starting on page 722.

By Order-in-Council, 29th September 1937, goods the produce or manufacture of New Zealand shall enjoy, on importation into Canada, tariff treatment not less favourable than that accorded to like goods the produce or manufacture of any foreign country.

Note: The provisions of this Order-in-Council are supplementary to, and do not affect in any manner, the extension of the British Preferential tariff to New Zealand, or the provisions of the New Zealand Trade Agreement, 1932.

PROOF OF ORIGIN

4. Proof of origin, as prescribed by the Minister of National Revenue, shall be furnished with the bill of entry at the Customs House for goods admitted to entry under any of the Tariffs, and that the decision of the Minister of National Revenue shall be final as to the Tariff or Surtax applicable in any case to imported goods by reason of their origin.

Provided, that goods for which entry is claimed under the Most-Favored-Nation Tariff shall be bona fide the produce or manufacture of a country which has been admitted to the benefits of such Most Favored Nation Tariff;

Provided further that every manufactured article

to be admitted under the British Preferential Tariff shall be bona fide the manufacture of a British country entitled to the benefits of such British Preferential Tariff, and that a substantial portion of the value of the manufactured article has been produced by labor in one or more of such countries.

Note: See exceptions pages 714-717.

DUMPING CLAUSE

SPECIAL OR DUMPING DUTY

1. In the case of goods exported to Canada of a class or kind made or produced in Canada, if the export or actual selling price to an importer in Canada is less than the fair market value or the value for duty of the goods as determined under the provisions of the Customs Act, there shall, in addition to the duties otherwise established, be levied, collected and paid on such goods, on their importation into Canada, a special or dumping duty, equal to the difference between the said selling price of the goods for export and the said value for duty thereof; and such special or dumping duty shall be levied, collected and paid on such goods although not otherwise dutiable.

2. The special duty imposed by the preceding subsection shall in no case exceed fifty per cent ad valorem and the following goods shall be exempt from such duty:

(1) Goods of a class subject to duty under the Excise Act;

(2) Goods or classes of goods declared exempt by any order or regulation made by the Governor in Council.

Note—The following goods have been exempted under Order in Council, viz: common and colourless window glass,

3. Duties and taxes imposed in the country of export shall be disregarded in estimating the value for the purpose of the said special duty.

4. 'Export price' or 'selling price' in this section means the exporter's price for the goods, exclusive of all charges thereon after their shipment from the place whence exported direct to Canada.

5. If at any time it appears to the satisfaction of the Minister that the payment of the special duty by this section provided for is being evaded by the shipment of goods on consignment without sale prior to such shipment, the Minister may in any case or class of cases authorize such action as is deemed necessary to collect on such goods or any of them the same special duty as if the goods had been sold to an importer in Canada prior to their shipment to Canada.

6. If at any time it appears to the satisfaction of

the Minister that any person owning or controlling or interested in a business in Canada and also in any other country, or any person carrying on a business in any other country and owning or controlling or interested in a business operating in Canada, and by reason thereof is enabled to import goods for further manufacture or assembling or for resale, and while complying with the legal requirements on importation disposes of such imported goods, whether in the form as imported or as further processed, assembled or manufactured, at prices below the duty paid value thereof as entered at Customs plus, or including all charges upon the goods after shipment from the place whence exported direct to Canada, including sales, distribution and advertising costs, and plus if any, the cost of processing, assembling or further manufacturing in Canada, the Minister may declare that goods of such class or kind were and are on importation subject to an additional special or dumping duty not exceeding fifty per cent and authorize such action as is deemed necessary for the collection thereof.

7. If the full amount of any special duty of Customs as herein provided has not been paid on goods imported, the Customs entry thereof shall be amended and the deficiency paid upon the demand of the Collector.

8. The Minister may make such regulations as are deemed necessary for carrying out the provisions of this section and for its enforcement.

9. For the purposes of this section, goods may be deemed to be of a class or kind not made or produced in Canada where similar goods of Canadian production are not offered for sale to the ordinary agencies of wholesale or retail distribution or are not offered to all purchasers on equal terms under like conditions, having regard to the custom and usage of trade.

10. For the purpose of this Act goods shall not be deemed to be of a class or kind made or produced in Canada unless so made or produced in substantial quantities; and the Governor in Council may provide that such quantities, to be substantial, shall be sufficient to supply a certain percentage of the normal Canadian consumption and may fix such percentages.

RAISING PRICES: REMOVAL OF DUTY.

In the event of the producers of goods in Canada increasing prices in consequence of the imposition of any duty under the provisions of this Act, the Governor in Council may reduce or remove such duty.

22. PREPAYMENT OF IMPORT DUTY BY CUSTOMS DUTY STAMPS ON ADVERTISING MATTER

The following regulations are established by the Honourable the Minister of National Revenue under the authority of Tariff Item 178a:—

1. Customs duty stamps for the prepayment of import duties on advertising matter, price lists and catalogues, and other advertising matter specified in Tariff Item 178 may be obtained in denominations of one, two, five and ten cents each on application to the Deputy Minister of Customs, Ottawa, Canada, each application to be accompanied by a remittance by Postal or Express Money Order or certified cheque payable to the Receiver General of Canada. Customs duty stamps may also be obtained on application to the Secretary, High Commissioner for Canada, The Canadian Building, Trafalgar Square, London, S.W.1, England. Customs duty stamps are redeemable at the discretion of the Department.

2. The Customs duty stamps are to be affixed on each piece of mail matter for the amount of duty payable on the same, and should be affixed in accordance with the postal regulations of the country of despatch; e.g., in United States on reverse side of the piece.

3. Mail matter bearing Customs duty stamps shall be transferred to the Customs after arrival in Canada and before delivery to the addressees, to be checked for the proper payment of duty and to have the Customs duty stamps thereon cancelled by marking same with the Customs "Duty Paid" stamp, Customs dating stamp, or other cancellation stamp.

4. Item 178a of the Customs Tariff as amended, provides: "On the goods specified in Item 178 and dutiable under part (11) of the item when forwarded to Canada by mail, duties may be prepaid by

Customs Revenue stamps under regulations by the Minister, at the rates specified in said item, except that on each separate package weighing not more than one ounce the duty shall be one cent under the British Preferential Tariff, two cents under the Intermediate Tariff and two cents under the General Tariff."

5. The articles specified in Tariff Item 178 are: Advertising pamphlets, advertising showcards, illustrated advertising periodicals; price books, catalogues and price lists; advertising almanacs and calendars; patent medicine or other advertising circulars, fly sheets or pamphlets; advertising chromos, chromotypes, oleographs or like work produced by any process other than hand painting or drawing, and having any advertisement or advertising matter printed, lithographed or stamped thereon, or attached thereto, including advertising hills, folders and posters, or other similar artistic work, lithographed, printed or stamped on paper or cardboard for business or advertisement purposes, n.o.p.

By Regulations under Tariff Item 178a, it is ordered that on advertising matter specified in Item 178 referred to in the preceding paragraph, when forwarded by mail, the Customs Duty may be prepaid by affixing Customs stamps thereon according to the following scales, viz:—

In no case shall the duty be less than 35%.

The above regulations do not apply to the following: Advertising matter entitled to the British Preferential tariff and relating to the products or services of such British countries, but not relating to Canadian products or services.

Printed advertising matter issued by railway systems in the British Empire (not including railway systems operating in Canada).

Advertising and printed matter in individual packages not exceeding \$1.00 in value and when not imported for sale or in a manner designed to evade payment of customs duties, when imported from a country entitled to the Most Favored Nation or British Preferential Tariff.

Bona-fide trade catalogues and price lists not

specially designed to advertise the sale of goods by any person in Canada when sent into Canada in single copies addressed to merchants therein, and not exceeding one copy to one merchant for his own use, but not for distribution.

The above items are free of customs duties when complying with the conditions mentioned.

The stamps are to be affixed on each package for the amount of the duty and in the case of packages mailed in the United States, these stamps should be affixed on the reverse side of the package.

FISH

Fish caught by fishermen in Canadian fishing vessels and the products thereof carried from the fisheries in such vessels, shall be admitted into Canada free of duty, under regulation by the Minister of Customs.

PROHIBITED GOODS

The importation into Canada of any goods enumerated described or referred to in Schedule "C" (See P. 813) is prohibited.

COMBINE CLAUSE

1. Whenever from or as a result of a judgment of the Supreme Court, or Exchequer Court of Canada, or of any superior court, or circuit, district or county court in Canada, it appears to the satisfaction of the Governor-in-Council, that with regard to any article of commerce there exists any conspiracy, combination, agreement or arrangement of any kind among manufacturers of such articles, or dealers therein to unduly promote the advantage of the manufacturers or dealers at the expense of the consumers, the Governor-in-Council may admit the article free of duty, or so reduce the duty thereon as to give to the public the benefit of reasonable competition in the article, if it appears to the Governor-in-Council that such disadvantage to the consumer is facilitated by the duties of Customs imposed on a like article.

MARKING OF IMPORTED GOODS

The Governor-in-Council may from time to time order imported goods to be marked so as to indicate the country of origin.

Under this provision, the following classes of goods imported into Canada, shall be thus marked or labelled in legible English or French words, and such markings shall be as nearly indelible or permanent as possible. viz.:-

Printed or lithographed matter of all kinds, including books and pictures.

Seals, tickets or labels, irrespective of dimensions when imported in packages or coverings or in strips, sheets or rolls, in quantities in excess of 100 units are subject to the general marking regulations and each seal, ticket or label is required to be marked

Seals, tickets or labels, exceeding one inch in their greatest dimension whether imported in packages or in strips, sheets or rolls, perforated or otherwise prepared for ready separation into single units, or intended to be used in such single units, must be marked with a satisfactory indication of the country of origin on each single unit. The above when not exceeding one inch, when imported in packages containing not more than 100 each, or in strips or rolls of not more than 100 units, may be marked with a satisfactory indication of the country of origin on the first package or on each strip or roll.

Decalcomania or dry transfers, not including ceramic or enamel transfer, are required to be marked with an indication of the country of origin as printed or lithographed matter. Such marking may be affixed on the back or carrier portion thereof, or on each sheet or roll, in the case of dry transfers, on the package in which such transfers are contained, when marking on the sheet or roll is impracticable.

Decalcomania transfers, imported for advertising and display, will be required to be marked with an indication of the country of origin on the face thereof as heretofore; marking on the back or carrier portion will not be accepted.

Decalcomania transfers known as toy transfers may be marked on each sheet, each book or package. Imported ceramic or enamel transfers are not required to be marked with an indication of the country of origin

Blind embossed or die stamped indication of the country of origin on printed or lithographed matter

imported into Canada will be acceptable as satisfactory provided the marking otherwise complies with the requirements, particularly as to location, legibility, permanency and wording.

Ordinary printed or lithographed paper or other coverings, wrappers or containers, used merely to cover or contain shipments of goods consigned to Canada, are not required to be marked with an indication of the country of origin.

Printed or lithographed containers imported to contain goods for export, and printed or lithographed labels, stickers or wrappers, imported to be attached to goods manufactured or produced in Canada for export trade, may be exempted from the provisions of Section 16 of the Customs Tariff Act, provided the importer signs a certificate on the face of each entry as follows:

"The containers, labels, stickers or wrappers, described on this entry are imported bona fide by the undersigned to contain or to be attached to goods for export, and will be exported with such goods."

Imported containers, labels or wrappers, printed or lithographed, intended to be filled with or used upon domestic products may be marked in such a manner as to indicate the origin of the goods in their condition as imported, for example: "Label printed by John Jones, New York," thereby avoiding an improper imputation of origin in respect of the Canadian manufactured goods with which such imported containers, labels or wrappers are used.

Printed or lithographed matter, imported in single copies, unbound, for the use of the importer and not for sale, for religious, philosophical, educational, scientific or literary purposes, or for the encouragement of the fine arts, may be delivered without being marked with an indication of the country of origin.

Books may be marked on the inside or outside of the front or back cover, the first or last page, or the title page.

Writing, marking or drawing pencils of all kinds pen holders of wood, fountain pens, and ball point pens.

Blind embossed or die-stamped indications of the country of origin on wooden or fibre lead pencils and penholders will only be accepted (1) on plain unpainted pencils and penholders without any other lettering thereon, when legible (2) on plain painted pencils and penholders without lettering thereon, when the combination of colours used in the die-stamping and on the pencil or penholder does not result in an indistinct or illegible indication, and (3) on pencils and penholders with lettering or other printed matter thereon, when the indication appears on the pencil or penholder in the same coloured lettering as the other printed matter. The indication on pencils must not be within one inch of an end which is or may be pointed.

Crayons or chalk, covered with wood, paper or other covering as a holder or for protection, are each required to be marked. Uncovered crayons or chalk may be marked on the first or immediate container.

Fountain pens, and pencils other than wooden or fibre lead pencils, may be marked with blind embossed or die-stamped indications of the country of origin in accordance with the general regulations, provided such marking otherwise complies with the requirements, particularly as to legibility, location, permanence and wording.

Empty paper or paper board folding or set up boxes or cartons, and empty plain or corrugated fibre or fibre board boxes, for use as containers.

Toilet paper in rolls or interfold packages.

Brushes of all kinds.

Tooth brushes and tooth brush handles.

Razor blades (safety type)

Razor blades may be marked by means of etching or die stamping.

Pen knives, jack knives, and pocket knives of all kinds; scissors and shears.

Table knives, forks and spoons, kitchen knives, kitchen tools and carving sets, of stainless steel, shall be marked on each piece by etching, die stamping or engraving.

Boots, shoes and slippers.

Boots, shoes and slippers may be marked on one or both of each pair

Ladies purses, in the form of handbags, not including bags made of beads, metal mesh or of a similar nature.

Artists' paint brushes.

Paper envelopes.

Paper envelopes are required to be marked on each envelope when imported in individual boxes containing more than 100 envelopes

Envelopes in quantities of 100 or less with country of origin showing on the box or wrapper may be regarded as satisfactory

Greeting cards imported in boxes or packages with envelopes in equal quantity to match, each greeting card shall be satisfactorily marked, envelopes not required to show the indication of country of origin.

Tableware and decorative household articles of semi-porcelain, white granite, iron stone, earthenware, stoneware or pottery.

Chinaware and porcelainware (not including sanitary or toiletware), decorated or undecorated, as follows:

(i) articles commonly used in connection with the serving of food or drink; or intended or designed for household use for ornamental or decorative purposes;

(ii) kitchenware and utensils;

(iii) heraldic and souvenir ware.

Chinaware and porcelainware must be marked on each piece, except in instances where a lid or cover accompanies a pot, bowl or dish, in which case the lid or cover need not be marked where the pot, bowl or dish itself bears an indication of the country of origin.

An indication of the country of origin will not be accepted as complying with the requirements as to permanency if, although otherwise satisfactory, the marking has been accomplished by means of painting or stamping after the articles have been kiln-fired in the process of manufacture.

With respect to chinaware and porcelainware, the Department will accept the name of the country alone as a satisfactory indication of the country of origin, and will also accept the name of the manufacturing or producing firm accompanied by the country of origin, without the inclusion of the city or province in that country in which the manufacturer or pro-

ducer is located. In the case of chinaware and porcelainware, the words "Made in," "Produced in," or words of similar import are not required. (See also paragraph commencing "Any goods," etc., under "Prohibited Goods." p. 814.)

Articles wholly of porcelain for electrical use.

Articles of porcelain made for the purpose of being united with other materials so as to form a composite article, as well as small porcelain beads used by electricians, may be marked on the first covering or container in which imported.

Thermometers of all kinds, clocks and clock movements. Waxed paper in rolls or sheets, wrapped, banded, boxed, or packaged specially for household use.

Glazed and unglazed wall, hearth and floor tiles, and ceramic mosaic tiles shall each be marked by moulding, impressing or stamping, except that as regards ceramic mosaic tiles, imported for sale mounted for sale in blocks or sections on paper, marking is acceptable on the paper to which the tiles are affixed.

Packages containing fresh fruit, vegetables or honey are required to be marked with a label or stencil of suitable size in proportion to size of the packages. In the case of bags; stencilled, printed, interwoven or a suitable tag attached.

Imitation totem poles.

Stainless steel table knives, forks and spoons

Expansion watch bracelets

Cigarette and cigar lighters.

Vacuum bottles, carafes, flasks, jugs, jars and other thermostatic containers and refills or inserts for use therewith.

(a) When such vacuum bottles or other containers are being imported in the form of complete articles, the marking shall be accomplished by means of die stamping or other indelible impression on the metal or other container.

(b) In the case of refills or inserts imported separately, the marking shall be accomplished by etching with acid or indelible printing.

Corselettes, girdles, brassieres, lacing corsets and garter belts.

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Cotton sheets and pillowslips.
 Knitted garments, knitted underwear, socks stockings, knitted gloves, mitts and other knitted goods (except knitted fabric in the piece) when for sale to the ultimate consumer in the finished form in which imported.

Each knitted article must be marked by means of a printed or woven label, a ticket or a tag in legible English or French words, firmly attached to the article, or by a decalcomania transfer or stamp, in a location which will be apparent to the intending purchaser, and when imported in packages, boxes, envelopes or other containers, or banded, for sale in that manner to the ultimate consumer, the package, box, envelope or container or the band encircling the article must also be marked; socks, stockings, gloves and mitts imported joined in pairs may be marked on one or both of each pair.

Laminated glass, sheet and plate glass in sheets or panes, and common or colourless window glass. Imported glass of the class referred to will be required to be marked with an indication of the country of origin, in legible English or French words, on each package, covering, case or container in which imported.

Narrow woven or braided fabrics, containing rubber yarns, not exceeding 12 inches in width, and hoot and shoe laces.

Flashlight batteries or dry cells of all kinds. Each flashlight battery or dry cell shall have the name of the country of origin printed on the outer jacket.

Lithographed or Printed Metal Screw Caps, Lug Caps and Vacuum Caps for all types of containers, shall be marked on the outer surface.

Sterling silver and silver-plated spoons, bracelets, pins or brooches and enamelled emblems designed as souvenirs of Canada, its provinces, territories, cities, towns or other geographical locations. Each such article shall have the name of the country of origin die-stamped thereon.

Towels, Wash Cloths and Bath Mats, woven or knitted, to be marked by means of a printed or woven Label firmly attached to each article, and when imported in packages, boxes or other containers, or banded, for sale in that manner to the ultimate consumer, the package, box, or container, or the band encircling the article must also be marked.

Hats, Caps, Bonnets and Berets shall be marked by means of a woven or printed cloth label firmly sewn to the article of headwear so as to be apparent to the ultimate consumer.

Hats, Hoods and Shapes of Fur Felt, Wool Felt and Wool-and-Fur Felt shall be marked by means of a woven or printed cloth label firmly sewn to the article of headwear or by means of a transfer or stamp, such as is known to the trade as a Kaumagraph mark, that will withstand steam and heat to which the hat, hood or shape may be subjected in any process of manufacture after importation; in either case, the marking to be so placed as to be apparent to the ultimate consumer. This regulation does not apply to men's hats, hoods and shapes that, when being finished in Canada, will be lined.

Baseball gloves and mitts of leather shall be marked by being dye-stamped on the palm of the glove or mitt in letters of a contrasting colour not less than one-eighth of an inch in height.

Ribbons, bindings, tapes, gift ties, braids and trimmings, made wholly or chiefly of textile fibres,
 (a) When imported on cards, hobbins, reels, rolls, or similar centres, the marking shall be printed on the card, bobbin, reel, roll-end or similar centre.
 (b) When imported in hanks or skeins, the marking shall be printed on the clip band or wrapper.
 (c) When imported in and for sale to the ultimate consumer in packages, boxes, envelopes or other containers, the marking shall be printed on each package, box, envelope or container.

Candles shall be marked by means of a paper band except when imported in and for sale to the ultimate consumer in packages, boxes, or other

containers in which case the marking shall be printed on each package, box or container.

Wire insect screening shall be marked by printing along one edge at intervals spaced not more than 24 inches apart in letters of contrasting colour at least one-half inch in height.

Name or identification plates, identification cards, credit cards, of any material of which the diameter or any side exceeds one-half inch, imported in sheet form or otherwise, shall each be marked "Printed in . . ." on the face thereof in the same manner as any other wording is shown thereon.

Umbrellas shall be marked by means of a woven label at least one inch square, one edge of which shall be sewn into a seam of the umbrella.

Basket type sink strainers shall be marked by stamping or embossing on the top of the crumh cup lifter; when imported for sale to the ultimate purchaser in packages, boxes or other containers these shall also be marked.

Clothing, wearing apparel and garments of all kinds, wholly or substantially of textile fibres, shall be marked by means of a printed or woven label or a ticket firmly attached to the article, or by a decalcomania transfer or stamp in a location next to the brand name or size mark, which will be apparent to the intending purchaser; when imported in and for sale to the ultimate purchaser in packages, boxes, envelopes or other containers; or banded, the package, box, envelope, container or band must also be marked.

Electronic tubes of glass shall be marked by sand blasting; or etching electronic tubes of metal shall be marked by die stamping or engraving.

Copper tubing, imported in straight lengths, shall be marked by coloured printing ink at intervals spaced not more than 36 inches apart; except that soft temper tubing imported in coils, shall be marked either by coloured printing ink or by die stamping.

Toys, games, playthings and sports equipment; novelties, decorations and ornaments shall be marked in as permanent and conspicuous a manner as the nature of the goods will permit; when imported in and for sale to the ultimate purchaser in packages, boxes, envelopes or other containers, these shall also be marked.

Where, in the case of decorations and ornaments, marking on the article would not be practical, marking shall be acceptable merely on the box or package in which the decorations or ornaments are imported and are for sale to the ultimate purchaser.

Radio receivers, television receivers, radio-phonograph combinations, radio-television-phonograph combinations, phonographs, record players and tape recorders, shall be marked by moulding, die-stamping, embossing, lithographing, anodizing, silk screening, etching, decalcomania transfer, or by a firmly affixed label, so as to be apparent to the intending purchaser on reasonable examination of the article.

Sewing machines and sewing machine heads shall be marked by means of a decalcomania transfer, metal plate, or by etching, die-stamping or engraving in such a manner that it will be clearly visible when the machine is in operation.

Files and Rasps shall be marked by means of die-stamping on the blank or uncut portion of the file at the shoulder except in the case of round files which shall be marked on the tang.

Matches in boxes, folders or hooks shall be marked on the outside of the individual boxes, folders or books.

Electrical measuring devices, for panel mounting, designed to indicate alternating or direct current microamperes, milliampères or amperes, millivolts, volts or kilovolts, and such other variables as resistance, temperature, pressure, etc., which may be translated into direct or alternating current or voltage, shall be marked on the visible portion of the instrument scale. When imported for sale to the ultimate purchaser in packages, boxes, or other containers these shall also be marked. (Effective April 1, 1961.)

The articles are required to be reported on Form E-29, with full particulars such as description, value and the amount of duty and taxes properly payable thereon, for purposes of identification on report outwards under Customs supervision within six months. Form E-29 shall not be required, however, in respect of articles specified in this subsection brought in by a tourist arriving by highway who obtains a permit on Form E-50 for his automobile, in which case particulars of such articles as are exempt from deposit requirements shall be noted on the face of the E-50 permit.

Household furniture and other effects, brought in by a non-resident for the temporary equipment of a summer residence and to be exported within the season, and other unspecified articles, including revolvers and pistols, may be admitted after report on Form E-29, upon the Collector being furnished with a cash deposit of a sum equivalent to the duty and taxes payable thereon, the deposit to be subject to refund if the articles be identified and exported at the Customs port where reported inwards, or at another port, within eight months from time of entry.

DRAWBACK ON SHIPS' AND AIRCRAFT STORES

When consumable goods on which duties and/or taxes have been paid are delivered as ships' stores on board British and foreign warships, telegraph cable ships, transports owned, chartered or controlled by the British Admiralty, and ships proceeding on an ocean voyage outside of Canada, for use on board thereof, there may be allowed a drawback of ninety-nine per cent of the duties and/or taxes paid on the goods so delivered. Provided that the Minister of National Revenue shall define and limit the kind, quantity and class of goods which may be so delivered as ships' stores and that such stores or any part thereof shall not be relanded, sold or disposed of in Canada, without due entry and payment of duty and/or taxes.

When goods on which duties and/or taxes have been paid are used in the manufacture of ships'

furnishings or equipment or goods commonly known as ships' chandlery supplied to vessels hereunder described, or when imported ships' furnishings or equipment or goods commonly known as ships' chandlery are supplied to such vessels, viz:—

- (a) Plying on trans-oceanic routes;
- (b) Bound from a port on the Atlantic coast to a port on the Pacific coast and vice versa;
- (c) Regularly clearing for ports south of the line of the Tropic of Cancer; there may be allowed a drawback of ninety-nine per cent of the duties and/or taxes paid on the ships' furnishings, equipment or chandlery so delivered or on the imported goods used in the manufacture thereof.

When goods on which duties and/or taxes have been paid are used in repairing or reconstructing an ocean going vessel, clearing for a foreign port, there

may be allowed a drawback of ninety-nine per cent of the duties and/or taxes paid on the goods so used.

(1) The applicant for drawback shall be the person who has supplied such goods to the vessel or has done the repairs thereto or reconstruction thereof;

(2) The quantities of the goods so supplied or used and the amount of duties and/or taxes paid thereon, shall be ascertained;

(3) Notice, in form prescribed by the Minister of National Revenue, of intent to claim drawback shall be filed with the Collector of Customs and Excise

at the time when such goods are supplied to the vessel;

(4) Claims for drawback submitted on and after the 1st April, 1937, shall not be paid unless the Customs duties and/or taxes involved have been paid within three years of the supplying or use of the goods nor unless the claims as presented are filed within six months of the first clearance of the vessel thereafter.

The above regulations also apply to Aircraft.

DRAWBACK ON GOODS USED IN THE ORIGINAL CONSTRUCTION OF SHIPS OR VESSELS BUILT IN CANADA

When imported goods on which Customs duties have been paid are used in the original construction of,

(a) Ships or vessels having within themselves the power of independent navigation either by means of sails, steam or other motive power; or

(b) barges or scows built of iron or steel and measuring over one thousand tons gross tonnage; there may, subject to certain conditions, be allowed a drawback of 99% of the Customs duties paid thereon;

The claimant for drawback shall be in all cases the builder of the ship or vessel.

Duties must have been paid on the goods within three years of the date of filing the claim.

UNITED STATES LEASED BASES IN NEWFOUNDLAND

(a) Material, equipment, supplies or goods for use

in the construction, maintenance, operation or defence of the bases, consigned to, or destined for, the United States Authorities;

(b) Goods for use or consumption aboard United States public vessels of the Army, Navy, Coast Guard or Coast and Geodetic Surveys;

(c) Goods consigned to the United States Authorities for the use of institutions under Government control known as Post Exchanges, Ships' Service Stores, Commissary Stores or Service Clubs, or for sale thereat to members of the United States forces, or civilian employees of the United States being nationals of the United States and employed in connection with the bases, or members of their families resident with them and not engaged in any business or occupation in Newfoundland. Drawback of customs duties and taxes 99%.

DRAWBACK ON GOODS IMPORTED INTO CANADA AND EXPORTED THEREFROM

The following regulations have been established governing Customs and Excise drawback on goods imported into Canada and thereafter exported, effective on and from September 1, 1946.

When imported goods on which duties and/or taxes have been paid are exported from Canada, there may, subject to the following conditions, be allowed a drawback of ninety-nine per cent of the duties and/or taxes paid thereon:—

1. The drawback shall be paid to exporter of the goods.

2. Whole packages of goods as imported may be broken and part only thereof exported, but no use shall have been made in Canada of the goods exported;

3. The quantity and identification of such goods imported and exported and the amount of duties and/or taxes paid thereon shall be ascertained;

4. Claims for drawback submitted on and after September, 1, 1946, shall not cover goods exported for a period of more than twelve consecutive months and must be filed with the Collector and complete evidence attached thereto within a period of six months from the date of the last export entry covered by the claim. Such drawback claims shall not be paid unless the duties and/or taxes have been paid on the goods within three years of the date of exportation thereof, nor unless the entered value for duty of the goods exported, on which claim is made, is in the aggregate more than fifty dollars;

5. Claims for drawback shall be made under oath before a Collector, Justice of the Peace or Commissioner for taking Oaths, in such form as the Minister shall prescribe and shall, before payment, be verified to the satisfaction of the Minister, who may require, in any case, the production of such further evidence, in addition to the usual averments, as he deems necessary to establish the bona fides of the claim. Nothing in these regulations shall be deemed to alter or amend the law, or to affect any discretion vested in the Minister with respect to the payment or non-payment of drawbacks, and the Minister shall be the

sole judge as to whether any claim for drawback shall be paid in whole or in part.

6. Upon the exportation of goods entitled to drawback, export entries, in triplicate, in the usual form (with the words "subject to Drawback" marked on the face), shall be filed with the Collector at the port of exit from Canada, naming the conveyance by which and the country or place to which the goods are to be exported and fully describing the kind and quantity thereof and also the marks and numbers on the packages;

7. The following documents shall be delivered with the claim for drawback:—

(a) A copy of the import entry showing payment of duties and/or taxes on the goods imported and exported, on which drawback is claimed. If a copy of the import entry, however, has been furnished with a previous claim for drawback, it will be sufficient to "refer" to such copy and indicate the claim to which it was attached, without furnishing a further copy of the entry;

(b) A certified true copy of the export invoice;

(c) A copy of the export entry, duly numbered and certified by the Collector at the port of exit where the goods were entered for exportation from Canada;

(d) A certificate of importation, sale or transfer, in form prescribed by the Minister, when the claimant entitled to drawback is not the importer of the goods.

9. Drawback is not payable in respect of Customs penalties imposed on imported goods, nor in respect of goods referred to above which are returned to the country from whence imported.

SCHEDULE "C"

PROHIBITED GOODS

Books, printed paper, drawings, paintings, prints, photographs or representations of any kind of a reasonable or seditious, or of an immoral or indecent character.

Reprints of Canadian Copyrighted Works, and reprints of British Copyrighted Works which have been copyrighted in Canada.

Coin, base or counterfeit.

Oleomargarine butterine or other similar substi-

tutes for butter, and process butter or renovated butter.

Goods manufactured or produced wholly or in part by prison labour or which have been made within or in connection with any prison, jail or penitentiary; also goods similar in character to those produced in such institutions, when sold or offered for sale by any person, firm or corporation having a contract for the manufacture of such articles in such institutions or by any agent of such

person firm or corporation, or when such goods were originally purchased from or transferred by any such contractor. The Governor in Council may by regulation exempt any goods or class of goods to be further manufactured in Canada from the provisions of this item.

Metallic trading checks in circular form.

Any goods

- (a) in association with which there is used any description that is false in a material respect as to the geographical origin of the goods, or
- (b) the importation of which is prohibited by an order under section 51 of the Trade Marks Act.

Automobiles and motor vehicles (used or second hand), all kinds, manufactured previous to the calendar year in which importation into Canada is sought to be made. This item does not affect in any manner automobiles and motor vehicles imported under Tariff Items 702 and 705A, 706, 707 or 708 or under tourists' or travellers' vehicle permit; or forfeited or confiscated for any offence under the customs regulation; or left by bequest, or a bona fide settler on a first arrival, but not entitled to entry free of duty under Tariff Item 705A; or exempted from the provisions of this Item by a regulation of the Governor in Council in any particular case or class of cases.

Used or second-hand aeroplanes and aircraft of all kinds:

Provided that this item does not affect in any manner aeroplanes and aircraft:

(a) Imported under tariff item 707 and 708, or engaged solely in international traffic, or brought in by non-resident tourists for temporary use under permit issued by the Department of National Revenue.

(c) Forfeited or confiscated for any offence under the customs laws, the air regulations or the laws of any province of Canada.

(d) Imported by the Department of National Defence for military purposes or exempted from the provisions of this item by a regulation of the Governor in Council in any particular case or class of cases.

Posters and handbills depicting scenes of crime or of violence.

White phosphorus matches.

Common mongoose (*Herpestes griseus*) or mongoose of any kind;

Any bird of the starling family (*sturnidae*), except the European starling (*sturnis vulgaris*).

Any other non-game bird, except any of the following:—

(a) A domestic bird of a kind kept for food purposes.

(b) A bird intended solely for exhibition in a public zoological park;

(c) A bird intended solely to be kept in confinement in a cage or to be used for purposes of public entertainment.

Used or second-hand periodical publications:

Provided that this item does not affect in any manner periodical publications:

(a) Sent, gratis, to Canada for charitable purposes.

(b) Sent to persons in Canada as casual donations by friends abroad.

(c) Imported for personal or for institutional use, and not for resale.

(d) Imported by or for paper mills for use as stock in the manufacture of paper.

Used mattresses or materials therefrom:

Provided, that this item does not affect in any manner:

(a) Mattresses imported under Tariff Items 704, 705, 706, 707, 708, or under tourists' or travellers' vehicle permits.

(b) Materials from used or second-hand mattresses, when imported after having been cleaned and fumigated, under such regulations as the Minister may prescribe, accompanied by such certificates as he may designate.

Smoke screen apparatus for use on motor vehicles or on water borne craft of all kinds.

Aigrettes, egret plumes, or so called osprey plumes, and the feathers, quills, heads, wings, tails, skins, or parts of skins of wild birds, either raw or manufactured; but this provision shall not apply to:—

The feathers or plumes of ostriches,—

The plumes of the English pheasant and the Indian peacock,—

The plumage of wild birds of groups recognized as game birds in any Canadian game law, and for which an open season is provided thereunder.—

The plumage of birds imported alive, nor to specimens etc., imported under regulations of the Minister of National Revenue for any natural history or other museum, or for scientific or educational purposes.

Offensive weapons, as defined in the Criminal Code: This item does not affect in any manner:

(a) arms, implements or munitions of war, army, naval and air stores, and any articles deemed capable of being converted thereinto or made useful in the production thereof, imported under permit issued by the Minister of National Revenue pursuant to regulations made by the Governor in Council under section 279 of the Customs Act;

(b) firearms imported by a person who holds a permit in Form 42, Form 43 or Form 44, issued with respect thereto, under section 94 of the Criminal Code;

(c) shotguns and rifles of the standard or auto-loading type and military type rifles, imported for sporting use only;

(d) antique articles eligible for entry under tariff item 693 (i) or tariff item 693 (iii), and bonafide collectors' items, as determined by the Minister;

(e) arms, military stores and munitions of war eligible for entry under tariff item 708 or tariff item 708b; or

(f) arms, military stores, munitions of war or offensive weapons exempted from the provisions of this item by a regulation of the Governor in Council in any particular case or class of cases.

The following Items show the approximate value for duty on packages of their respective goods, when value of packages is not mentioned on the invoice presented for entry.

ADDENDA

A selection of abridged notes to aid Importers and animals, pure bred, for improvement of stock, to be duty free, must be imported under strict Customs regulations.
 British Preferential. To secure the British Preferential it is necessary to note that:—
 (1) A separate invoice must be furnished for preferential goods.
 (2) Invoice must have certificate as to origin of goods.
 (3) Goods must be packed separately or not mixed up with other goods.
 (4) Goods must come direct or have a through bill of lading.
 Cash discounts are not allowed for Customs purposes. The terms of the cash discount should be shown on the invoice but deduction of the amount, and without evidence that the discount has been earned, dumping duty will apply.
 Cattle for exhibition purposes over six months old entering Canada from the United States must have a veterinary certificate signed by a veterinary inspector of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry, stating that they have passed the tubercular test within the last six months, also an affidavit from the importer identifying the cattle entered. The importer is required to furnish a bond for security equal to the full value of the animals and articles entered, conditional upon the due exportation of the same, or the delivery to the Customs Collector the proper manifests for the transportation of the animals and articles in bond, or the payment of duty thereon, within three months from time of entry.
 Deer, in the carcass or parts thereof, when shot for sport, under provincial or territorial authority in Canada, by any person not domiciled in Canada, may be exported at the customs ports of Halifax, Yarmouth, McAdam Junction, Saint John, N.B., St. Stephen, Montreal, Quebec, Sherbrooke, Beebe Junction, St. Armand, Fort Erie, Brockville, Kingston, Ottawa, Port Arthur. Prescott, Niagara

others with limited experience in Customs business. Falls, Sarnia, Sault Ste. Marie, Toronto, Windsor, Ont., Emerson, Coutts, North Portal, Kingsgate, Waneta, B.C., White Horse, Y.T., all other customs ports and outports in Canada on the frontier of the United States, and such other ports as shall from time to time be designated by the Minister of National Revenue for the export of deer.
 An export entry in duplicate is required in respect of deer in the carcass or parts thereof shot under provincial or territorial authority and intended to be exported, and exportation may be permitted upon the exporter subscribing and attesting before a Collector of National Revenue or other officer of Customs a declaration to be annexed to said export entry.
 In cases where a non-resident sportsman desires to leave Canada before the game arrives at a Customs Port of Exit, the Export Entry and declaration may be made by such sportsman and left with the Collector of National Revenue at the Port of Exit for use when the game arrives at the said port.
 The exportation of deer in the carcass or parts thereof, being the property of a provincial government, may be permitted without the declaration provided in Section 4 hereof upon the Collector of National Revenue or other officer of Customs being furnished with a certificate signed by a duly authorized officer of the provincial government concerned to the effect that the deer or parts thereof proposed to be exported are the property of the provincial government.
 Any person who wishes to export any carcass or parts thereof of deer raised or bred upon his own land, or upon lands owned by a Company or association of persons of which he is a member, shall make affidavit upon the face of the export entry to the effect that the deer, the carcass or parts whereof is so entered for

exportation, was raised or bred upon his own lands or upon lands owned or held by a company or association of persons of which he is a member (describing the location of such lands, and naming the association or company holding the same).

Where in any province or territory the right to sell deer in the carcass or parts thereof is prohibited or restricted, the same shall not be exported if sold in contravention of such law.

Dogs, pure bred. To obtain free entry the importer must produce a certificate of purity of blood signed by the breeder. He must also make an affidavit that the dogs imported are the identical animals described on the certificate.

Exports of Prohibited Goods. Transportation companies and others concerned are advised that, except when specially authorized, shipments may not go forward from interior points to the frontier ports of exit unless the required export license or permit accompanies the shipping document.

Firearms and dangerous and offensive weapons, restrictions on importation of:—

"Note that a permit (which may be known as a Police Permit) in Form 76a and 76b is required by everyone to lawfully have upon his person elsewhere than in his dwelling house, etc., or to carry, concealed, a pistol, revolver, sheath knife, etc., or other dangerous or offensive weapon, and that a similar police permit is required by every alien to lawfully have in his possession *anywhere* any firearm, or ammunition therefor, or any offensive weapon.

An alien, though a bona fide sportsman and hunter, passing through Canada having in his possession any revolver or pistol is required to have a permit. Note—Automatic and semi-automatic pistols are prohibited importation.

Firearm Exports Prohibited. In respect of Arms, Ammunition, Implements or Munitions of war, may not be exported without Arms Export Permit issued by Foreign Exchange Control Board.

Flying. The Defence of Canada Regulations prohibit the navigation of all civil aircraft over Canada or Canadian waters, except under specific permission granted by or on behalf of the Minister of Transport.

Fowls, pure bred, must have a certificate of blood describing the breed and signed by the breeder.

Goods damaged in transit. Collectors may permit an importer to abandon to the Crown any whole package of goods damaged in transit, and be relieved of payment of duty thereon, if notice is given within 14 days.

Gold export:—Collectors of Customs must not permit the exportation of gold whether in the form of coin or bullion, except upon the production of a license issued by the Deputy Minister of Finance for each shipment, such license to state the value or the approximate weight in ounces of the gold comprising the shipment. Provided that no such license shall be issued to other than a Canadian chartered bank or the Bank of Canada.

Goods perishable and breakable. Collectors are permitted to make an allowance for all damage in excess of 15% as certified to by the appraiser on perishable and breakable goods such as fruit, crockery and glass. Customs must be notified within 3 days on perishable goods and 14 days on breakable goods. If full duty has been paid, refund would be allowed.

Horses, carriages and harness going into the United States by permit, may be re-admitted into Canada duty free if they are returned within the period specified on the permit without change of ownership. They must be reported outward in duplicate with such description as to be identified on return. Duty is to be paid on repairs, provided however, that the expense of compulsory repairs, rendered necessary as the result of an accident or other casualty, to enable the vehicle to continue the tour and return to Canada shall be exempt from duty and taxes.

Machinery and articles when exported for repairs may be re-admitted by payment of duty on the

repairs, only if returned within one year, provided further that application was made for outward entry and examination at Customs at time of export; provided the repairs cannot be made in Canada.

Meats:—All importations of potted, canned or preserved meats must be examined by an officer of the Department of Agriculture in addition to the certificate of purity that must accompany such goods. Pork, fresh or frozen, is prohibited importation except under license by the Minister of National Revenue.

Milk, Vegetable and Fruit Regulations: The containers of milk, vegetable and fruit products:—

(a) Are to be marked with the initials, the surname and the address of the packer;

(b) Must give a true description of the contents;

(c) Must show the firm No. assigned to the establishment and must correspond otherwise with the label on the container;

(d) Owners or managers of establishments shall supply to the Dairy and Cold Storage Commissioner duplicate copies of all labels, stencils or lithographed designs used in the establishments; no labels, stencils or lithographed designs shall be used unless they have been approved in writing by the said Commissioner. One copy shall be filed with the Dairy and Cold Storage Commissioner, the other copy to be retained by the owner or manager and shall be produced for the information of an inspector when required.

Perishable goods:—Arrangements have been made for the delivery of perishable goods prior to making the regular Customs entry. For this purpose, the importer may deposit with the Collector of Customs a bond or money sufficient to pay the duty and taxes, and the required entry must be completed within seventy-two hours. When arrangements have been made to deliver goods on this basis, the importer must present his invoice to the proper Customs Officer at the point of arrival, for checking purposes, and must be sure entry is made within the seventy-two hour period, otherwise the arrangement may be cancelled and the deposit seized. Perishable goods are considered to be fruits, vegetables, fish and such like goods that are subject to decay. Similar arrangements can be made for the delivery of newspapers and periodicals.

Poultry, Dressed:—No person shall import dressed poultry into Canada unless such poultry has been graded and packed and the boxes marked in accordance with the Regulation respecting the Grading and Marking of Dressed Poultry. No more than twelve birds shall be packed in any one box.

Perfecting entries. Sight entries must be perfected as well as entries on Form B1, on which duty is paid, pending production of certificate under Customs regulations for free entry of same, and for which a refund of duty is applied for. (See also Sight Entries on page 805.)

Pineapple, canned, grading below "Choice Quality" is prohibited except when imported in containers of not less than one half gallon capacity for re-manufacturing purposes.

Articles, when imported into Canada temporarily for repairs, adjustments or to be tested, may be admitted without duty or taxes; provided that the articles are such as can be satisfactorily identified and that a deposit or acceptable bond for double the amount of Customs duty and/or taxes be delivered to the Collector of Customs and Excise as security for the exportation of the articles under Customs supervision, or the due entry thereof for consumption, within six months from the date of importation.

Refund of Duty.—No refund of duty paid shall be allowed because of any alleged inferiority, or deficiency, or omission, unless reported to the collector within thirty days of the date of entry or delivery or landing, and the said goods have been examined by the said collector or by an appraiser or other proper officer of Customs, and the proper rate or amount of reduction certified by him after such examination.

Refund on goods returned not according to order must comply with the following conditions:—

- (1) Goods are to be identified by Customs.
- (2) In Customs custody within twelve months of date of entry.
- (3) Proof of export furnished.
- (4) Must be accompanied by export entry in triplicate.
- (5) Delivered under Customs supervision.
- (6) Copy of waybill signed by carrier, also copy of export entry duly certified to by Customs officer at port of exit must be annexed to refund claim.
- (7) Copy of purchase order.

Refund on goods damaged in transit, duty having been paid on the entire shipment according to the invoice, it will be necessary to bill the railway or inland carriers for the amount of the duty in addition to the value of the goods. It will then be up to the railway to produce a short landing certificate from the ocean carriers if the goods are from overseas, or a proof that the goods were lost or destroyed beyond the confines of Canada. When this proof is produced it must be attached to the refund claim.

Samples, Travellers'—(1) Imported samples (not Canadian produce or manufacture) such as are carried by commercial travellers intended solely for use in taking orders for similar merchandise and not for sale, together with the trunks and other packages containing same (except when of "no commercial value") are subject to ordinary duty and taxes at each time of importation, but not to special duty in addition thereto; provided, however, that the trunks in which samples are contained may be admitted free after payment of duty and taxes on first importation, if identified to the satisfaction of the Customs Officer.

- (2) Commercial travellers are required to deliver to the Customs Officer for entry purposes a properly certified invoice or a statement in detail, showing the price (wholesale) of each sample as sold for home consumption.
- (3) Cards, portfolios, pasteboard boxes or other coverings containing articles obviously for use only as samples to sell by and having no commercial value, may be admitted free of duty and taxes.

Special Regulations Respecting Samples from British Countries and from Most Favoured Nation Countries.

When such commercial travellers' samples are imported temporarily direct by non-residents of Canada from any British country or from any country entitled to most favoured nation treatment in tariff matters by Canada, they may be admitted upon deposit of a sum equivalent to the duty and taxes thereon, such deposit to be subject to refund on the exportation of samples under Customs supervision within twelve months from the date of Customs entry. The importer shall make and subscribe to a declaration on the face of the temporary entry that the goods described therein are bona fide samples for use only in taking orders for merchandise and are to be exported within twelve months.

When the samples are marked by a Customs Officer for identification and the temporary entry duly completed, the Collector may issue his permission for the release of the samples upon receiving the required deposit from the importer.

If all of the samples are not exported a deduction shall be made from the deposit equivalent to the duty and taxes payable on the samples not exported.

Samples admitted to temporary entry on deposit under the special regulations respecting samples from British and Most Favoured Nation Countries may be taken to the United States by the traveller and returned to Canada merely upon report at Customs at any time within twelve months from the date of the temporary entry. On their return the samples may be admitted without entry if, upon being

checked by a Customs Officer against the copy of the temporary entry and invoice in possession of the traveller, the officer is satisfied that the samples are those referred to in such temporary entry.

TEMPORARY ENTRY OF CIRCUSES AND OTHER AMUSEMENT DEVICES

The equipment comprising the attractions specified hereunder may be admitted upon payment of the following fees, in lieu of Customs and Excise duties and taxes, for each month or portion thereof while in Canada

SCHEDULE A

1. Goods comprising circuses, with or without menageries (but not including amusement riding devices, sideshows and concessions intended to operate outside of the circus or menagerie, for which a separate admission is charged),

- (a) moving in six or more railway cars or in twelve or more motor vehicles.....\$3,000
- (b) moving in less than six railway cars or less than twelve motor vehicles.....\$1,500

2. Goods comprising amusement riding devices of carnivals or midways, imported with a circus or otherwise,

- (a) for each device designed exclusively for children.....\$150
- (b) for each other device.....\$400

3. Goods comprising sideshows of carnivals or midways, imported with a circus or otherwise, for each sideshow.....\$200

4. Goods comprising concessions of carnivals or midways imported with a circus or otherwise, for each concession.....\$100

5. Goods comprising rodeos.....\$400

SCHEDULE B

1. Goods comprising amusement riding devices to be operated at fairs or exhibitions held by agricultural or other associations subsidized by the Department of Agriculture,

- (a) for each device designed exclusively for children.....\$50
- (b) for each other device.....\$100

2. Goods comprising sideshows to be operated at fairs or exhibitions held by agricultural or other associations subsidized by the Department of Agriculture, for each sideshow.....\$100

3. Goods comprising concessions to be operated at fairs or exhibitions held by agricultural or other associations subsidized by the Department of Agriculture, for each concession.....\$50

SCHEDULE C

1. Portable lighting units, and vehicles used in the transportation thereof, to be used to illuminate parks, grounds or other places in connection with sporting events.

- (a) when equipped with electric generators...\$200
- (b) when otherwise equipped.....\$100

2. Automobiles and motorcycles to be used in racing for prizes.

- (a) automobiles, each.....\$10
- (b) motorcycles, each.....\$ 5

No refund of the above fees upon exportation from Canada. For regulations in connection with the above see your local Collector of Customs and Excise.

Imported tickets, advertising matter, programs, books, consumables, and articles for sale or to be distributed gratis, are subject to the regular duty and sales tax. For further particulars consult Dept. of National Revenue, Ottawa.

Sight Entry—If the importer or the person authorized, makes a declaration before the collector or other proper officer, that he cannot, for want of full information, make perfect entry thereof, the collector or officer may cause such goods to be landed on a bill of sight, by the best description that can be given, and to be seen and examined by such person and at his expense, in the presence of the collector or other proper officer, and to be delivered to such person, on his depositing a sum of money sufficient to pay the duties thereon.

(2) If the importer does not complete a perfect entry within the time appointed by the collector, the money so deposited shall be taken and held as

duty accruing on such goods and a penalty equal to the amount deposited shall also be collected. Valuation for duty on goods not sold for home consumption may, usually, be determined by ascertaining the total cost of producing the goods in condition ready for market and adding thereto the usual profits made on sales of a similar line of goods. Exporters shall show the amount on the invoice, the facts as to the following:

- (1) Freight prepaid and charged.
- (2) Freight prepaid and not charged.

(3) Freight allowed to be deducted by the importer at settlement.

Waybills must show:—

- (1) Name and address of consignee.
- (2) Marks and number of packages.
- (3) Description of the goods contained in each package.
- (4) When goods are in bulk, the number of pieces bundles or bushels.
- (5) In case of agricultural instruments, number and description of each class of instruments.

CUSTOMS PROCEDURE, ETC.

EXPORTING TO THE UNITED STATES

The customs laws of the United States, governing the importation of goods, very materially differ from ours. They have no such thing as the manifesting system such as we have, and all merchandise is supposed to be entered at the first port of arrival. However, they have ports termed I.T. Ports (immediate transport ports) to which goods may be forwarded in bond, without appraisal at the frontier port. In this case the goods must be carefully marked "Forwarded in Bond."

Merchandise, in order to be entered under Immediate Transportation, without appraisal at the frontier, must be destined to a designated immediate transportation port, and *must* be billed via a port at which merchandise may be entered for transportation to another port without appraisal.

These ports through which goods must be billed and to which they must be consigned may be learned from the transportation company as the lists are too extensive to be given space here.

If goods are destined for a foreign country they are entirely under Transportation and Exportation entry in bond, in transit, for exportation from the seaboard port.

EXPORTING TO OTHER COUNTRIES

Exporters requiring information regarding invoice forms and Customs Regulations of other countries, applying to goods exported from Canada, should write to Department of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa.

GIFTS TO THOSE ON ACTIVE SERVICE

To be exported as gifts, addressed to members of the armed forces of the British Empire or their Allies, do not require a permit to export.

GOODS TO BE RETURNED TO THE U.S.

Merchants finding it necessary to return goods not according to order and wishing to obtain refund of duty will be required to make out four different forms to accompany the way bill when goods are shipped back. If shipment is over \$100.00 the forms are as follow:

1. "Foreign Owner's Oath" or "Oath of American Manufacture."
2. American Consular Certificate.
3. Export papers in triplicate.
4. One certified copy of Customs Incoming Manifest.

Where shipment is under \$100.00 the American Consular Certificate and Incoming Manifest are not required.

The intending consignee must send to the U.S. shipper for an affidavit on a prescribed form, mentioned above as the Oath of American Manufacture, declaring the goods to be of United States origin or manufacture, in order that the goods when returned may pass the U.S. Customs without duty.

When this affidavit is received it must be attached to the way bill by the transportation agent here and forwarded along with the goods. This will enable the United States Customs Officer at the frontier to recognize the goods as home manufacture and have them forwarded on to destination without duty. The original U.S. shipper may secure these forms at his Customs, but a better way is for the intending consignee to secure a copy from the local express agent here and forward same to the U.S. firm with all necessary explanation as to line of procedure and thus avoid possible delay.

The American Consular Certificate forms must be

obtained from the nearest American Consul, who will send blank forms in triplicate. These must be filled in as required and returned to the American Consul with his fee, when he will return one copy to the intending consignee, who will attach same to way bill with other documents mentioned.

Export entry, procurable from Customs Department, must be made out by consignee in triplicate and attached to way bill together with the Foreign Owner's Oath, Consular Certificate and Incoming Manifest. One copy will remain on file at the port of exit, the second copy goes to the Customs Department and the third copy will be returned by the Customs officer at the Canadian port of exit to the merchant who returned the goods. He will then attach it to the refund of duty claim along with a copy of the way bill as a guarantee that the goods have been returned.

Goods must be in Customs custody within 12 months of date of importation.

CURRENCY CERTIFICATE OF INVOICE

Importers should, when ordering goods from Britain or any foreign country, instruct the exporter or salesman to always give the value of the goods in the home consumption column of the invoice and to show the same in the currency of the country of export.

Internal taxes should be definitely stated.

The exporter should also be very carefully instructed to place on the invoice the currency certificate.

GOODS SHORT LANDED

In the case of goods duty paid and short received, delivery of same upon subsequent arrival can be obtained, without payment of duty anew, only when the following regulations are observed:—

(a) Notice of the short receipt of goods must be given to the collector in writing within thirty days of entry.

(b) If the goods have been omitted from the shipment, a declaration to that effect must be produced from the exporter.

(c) If a portion of the consignment has been delayed in transit by the carriers, a declaration to this effect will be required from the latter.

(d) No portion of a consignment of goods, duty-paid, in respect of which a short shipment occurs, is to be disposed of by the importer until the appraiser has had an opportunity of checking over the goods.

SETTLERS' EFFECTS ENTRY

Settlers' effects are admitted duty free, if actually owned abroad by the settler for at least six months before his removal to Canada, and subject to regulations prescribed by the Minister.

Provided that any dutiable article entered as settlers' effects may not be so entered unless brought by the settler on his first arrival, and shall not be sold or otherwise disposed of without payment of duty until after twelve months' actual use in Canada.

Settlers' effects, viz:—Machines and implements for agricultural purposes, moved by mechanical power, and motor vehicles valued at not more than \$2500 and boats for fishing purposes, if actually owned abroad by the settler for at least six months before his removal to Canada, are free subject to regulations prescribed by the Minister of National Revenue.

Provided that in respect to motor vehicles valued in excess of \$2500 duty shall be payable only on the amount in excess of \$2500.

Provided further that the said machines, vehicles, implements and boats may not be so entered unless brought by the settler on his first arrival, and shall not be sold or otherwise disposed of without payment of duty until after twelve months' actual use in Canada.

TEMPORARY ENTRY OF AUTOMOBILE AND PERSONAL BAGGAGE OF NON-RESIDENTS

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Non-Residents' Automobile and Baggage Regulations.

2. In these Regulations,

- (a) "non-resident" means a person who makes his home and is ordinarily present in a place outside Canada;
- (b) "automobile" includes a motorcycle, motor-bicycle, motor scooter and any other motor vehicle ordinarily used to carry passengers and any trailer attached thereto, but does not include a motor bus, taxicab or other vehicle operated in the business of carrying passengers for compensation; and
- (c) "personal baggage" means the articles mentioned in the Schedule hereto that accompany a non-resident and are solely for his personal use.

IMPORTATION OF AUTOMOBILES

3. (1) Every non-resident wishing to enter an automobile into Canada free of duty and taxes shall apply to a Collector at the frontier port of entry for a Traveller's Vehicle Permit for the automobile.

(2) Where the applicant satisfies the Collector

- (a) that he is a non-resident of Canada,
- (b) that he is the owner of the automobile, a member of the owner's immediate family, or has the owner's authority to use the automobile, and
- (c) that the automobile will be used solely by the applicant or his passengers and will not be used to transport persons or goods for hire or reward or to transport goods for sale,

the Collector shall issue a Traveller's Vehicle Permit (form E.50) to the applicant.

(3) Subject to subsection (4), a Traveller's Vehicle Permit shall be valid for a period not exceeding six months from date of issuance.

(4) In the case of a non-resident who is in Canada solely for health or pleasure purposes, a Collector may renew a Traveller's Vehicle Permit for a further period not exceeding six months, and the Deputy Minister may direct that the permit be further renewed for such period and upon such terms and conditions as he sees fit.

4. Where an automobile is to be exported from Canada, within 48 hours of its importation, and through the same Customs port at which it was imported, the Collector may, instead of issuing a Traveller's Vehicle Permit, accept the registration card for the automobile and keep the same until the automobile is exported.

5. (1) An automobile equipped with a two-way radio or mobile telephone may be imported into Canada if

- (a) the driver produces to the Collector a permit to use the radio or telephone in Canada issued by the Director of Telecommunications, Department of Transport, Ottawa, or
- (b) the radio or telephone is placed under Customs seal so that it may not be used.

(2) Where a two-way radio or mobile telephone is placed under seal, the seal shall not be removed until the automobile is exported.

(3) Where an automobile has a two-way radio or mobile telephone, the Collector shall endorse the permit accordingly.

6. Where an automobile imported into Canada pursuant to these regulations requires to be repaired in Canada, the person to whom a Traveller's Vehicle Permit has been issued for the automobile may import such replacement parts as are required to be installed in the automobile, free of duty and taxes, if

- (a) he completes Temporary Admission Permit (form E.29) in respect of the parts,
- (b) any parts which are replaced by parts imported pursuant to this section are exported from Canada or abandoned to the Crown pursuant to section 77 of the Customs Act, and

- (c) he surrenders the Temporary Admission Permit to the Collector on the exportation of the automobile.

IMPORTATION OF PERSONAL BAGGAGE

7. (1) Every non-resident wishing to enter personal baggage into Canada free of duty and taxes shall apply to a Collector at the frontier port of entry for a Temporary Admission Permit for his personal baggage.

(2) Where the baggage is imported with an automobile it may be recorded on the Traveller's Vehicle Permit (form E.50).

(3) Subject to subsection (4) a Temporary Admission Permit shall be valid for a period not exceeding six months from the date of issuance.

(4) In the case of a non-resident who is in Canada solely for health or pleasure purposes, a Collector may renew a Temporary Admission Permit for a further period not exceeding six months, and the Deputy Minister may direct that the permit may be further renewed for such period and upon such terms and conditions as he sees fit.

IMPORTATIONS BY NON-RESIDENTS STUDYING AT INSTITUTIONS OF LEARNING

8. (1) Notwithstanding anything in these regulations, where the applicant satisfies the Collector that he is a non-resident entering Canada to study at an institution of learning, the Collector shall issue

- (a) a Traveller's Vehicle Permit for the applicant's automobile and,
- (b) a Temporary Admission Permit for the applicant's personal baggage and for the personal baggage of his wife and children where they are also to reside in Canada temporarily.

(2) A Traveller's Vehicle Permit and a Temporary Admission Permit issued under this section shall be valid for a period of six months.

(3) Notwithstanding subsection (2) a Collector on application to him by a holder of a Traveller's Vehicle Permit or Temporary Admission Permit issued under this section, may from time to time renew such permits for a period not exceeding six months beyond the date of each renewal.

(4) All goods imported into Canada under this section shall be re-exported from Canada under Customs supervision not later than one month after the date of completion of the non-resident's studies.

SCHEDULE

Where in this Schedule a quantity of an item is not specified, a reasonable quantity of the item shall be considered personal baggage.

Alcoholic Liquor—40 ounces per adult person.

Ammunition—50 rounds per person.

Boats, portable.

Cameras, still and motion picture.

Camping equipment.

Canoes

Cigarettes—200 per person.

Cigars—50 per person.

Film, photographic, black and white or colour, still and motion picture—6 rolls per person.

Flashhulhs—12 per person.

Foodstuffs—quantities sufficient for not more than two days' consumption per person.

Furniture, household.

Gasoline—quantity sufficient for 300 miles travel by automobile.

Instruments, musical.

Motors, outboard.

Mowers, lawn.

Pets.

Radios.

Rifles, standard or auto-loading and military type for sporting use.

Shotguns, standard or auto-loading for sporting use

Sporting equipment.

Tape recorders.

Television sets.

Tobacco, manufactured—2 pounds per person.

Typewriters.

COMMERCIAL VEHICLES

TRANSPORTATION OF PASSENGERS, AND OF GOODS IMPORTED IN BOND

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Commercial Motor Vehicle (Customs) Regulations.

2. In these Regulations,

- (a) "Commercial motor vehicle" means any automobile, truck, tractor or other motor vehicle or machine used alone or in combination with a trailer or semi-trailer in the commercial carriage of passengers or goods and driven, propelled, drawn or carried by mechanical power;
- (b) "Deputy Minister" means the Deputy Minister of National Revenue for Customs and Excise;
- (c) "general permit" means a permit issued pursuant to section 4;
- (d) "prescribed" means prescribed by the Deputy Minister;
- (e) "single trip permit" means a permit issued pursuant to section 5; and
- (f) "warehouse" means any place approved by the Deputy Minister in which imported goods may be deposited, kept or secured without payment of Customs duty and sales and excise taxes.

3. Subject to these Regulations, no person shall transport goods in bond by commercial motor vehicle in Canada except under the authority of a general or single trip permit.

4. The Deputy Minister may, upon application to him in the prescribed form and on presentation to him of a bond of a guarantee company, whose bonds are approved by the Department of Finance, or other security acceptable to him and in such amount as he may determine, issue a general permit to the person so applying to transport goods in bond and upon such terms and conditions as the Deputy Minister may prescribe.

5. A Collector of Customs and Excise may, upon application to him in the prescribed form and on presentation of a bond of a guarantee company, whose bonds are approved by the Department of Finance, or other security acceptable to him and in such amount as he may determine, issue a single trip permit to the person so applying to transport goods in bond on one trip only between the places specified therein and upon such terms and conditions as the Collector may prescribe.

6. Every owner or lessee of a commercial motor vehicle on which customs duty and sales and excise taxes have been paid or that was purchased in Canada, who has been granted a general permit to transport goods in bond and who is using his vehicle for the carriage of domestic or duty-paid goods from one place to another in Canada, shall, at his own expense, display on both sides of his vehicle in conspicuous letters the words "Canada Customs Bonded Carrier".

7. Every owner or lessee of a commercial motor vehicle on which customs duty and sales and excise taxes have not been paid or that was not purchased in Canada shall obtain a commercial motor vehicle permit (form E 50B) from a Collector of Customs and Excise subject to the vehicle being exported within the time limit indicated on the said permit.

8. (1) Notwithstanding section 3, every person to whom a commercial motor vehicle permit (form E 50B) has been issued may

- (a) carry passengers or goods across the Canada-United States international boundary between a place in the United States and a place in Canada and
- (b) enter Canada and proceed to a pre-determined place in this country to obtain goods for export to the United States.

(2) Nevertheless, no person to whom a commercial motor vehicle permit (form E 50B) has been issued shall load passengers or goods at one place in Canada for discharge at another place in Canada or deliver at more than one place in Canada goods that have been cleared at Customs.

9. Notwithstanding section 8, non-duty-paid foreign vehicles employed in the international carriage of passengers and goods may

- (a) discharge at different places in Canada on the inward journey
 - (i) passengers travelling directly from the place of embarkation in the United States to their destination in Canada and
 - (ii) goods of a nature that, in the opinion of the Deputy Minister, cannot be readily transferred to other motor vehicles; and

- (b) load at different places in Canada, on the outward journey, passengers and domestic goods carried directly, from the place of loading to a place in a foreign country.

10. The owner or lessee of every commercial motor vehicle used in the carriage of passengers or goods in transit through the United States and on which customs duty and sales and excise taxes have been paid or that was purchased in Canada and exported temporarily, shall obtain a permit (form E 6.) for that vehicle from a Collector of Customs and Excise.

11. It is a condition of the issuance of every permit pursuant to these Regulations that the owner or lessee of the commercial motor vehicle in respect of which a permit is issued is responsible for the safe-keeping of all goods carried in bond in his vehicle and is liable for all customs duty and sales and excise taxes payable thereon.

12. Nothing in these Regulations shall be deemed to authorize an owner or lessee of a commercial motor vehicle to operate on Canadian or United States highways without the proper motor vehicle licence required by the Provincial authority in Canada or the State authority in the United States.

13. Where it is established to the satisfaction of the Deputy Minister that the owner or lessee of a commercial motor vehicle has violated any regulation, the Deputy Minister may suspend or revoke the general permit of the owner or lessee of that vehicle.

TRANSPORTATION OF IN BOND GOODS IN CANADA

14. Motor vehicle operators desiring to become bonded carriers for the transportation of in bond goods in Canada shall make application for a general permit, on form E 21 to the Department of National Revenue, Customs and Excise Division.

15. The applicant shall be required to file with the Department a general bond of an approved guarantee company in the prescribed form, or other form of security acceptable to the Deputy Minister, in an amount which shall be calculated on the basis of \$1,000 per vehicle but no bond so entered into shall be for less than \$3,000 nor exceed \$25,000. (For bonding purposes a tractor, trailer or semi-trailer is each considered as one vehicle.) Such bond shall remain in full force, virtue, and effect unless revoked by the Department for cause, or the Surety may at any time give sixty (60) days' prior written notice of cancellation to the Department.

16. The Collector at a Customs port may issue a single trip permit to an owner or lessee who occasionally transports goods in bond, if

(1) he applies to the Collector on form E 22 which is obtainable from the Collector; and

(2) he files with the Collector a bond in the prescribed form, entered into between such person and the Department in an amount determined by the Collector, which shall not be for less than \$1,000 nor exceed \$10,000.

17. Owners or lessees of commercial motor vehicles which have been manufactured or duty and tax paid in Canada may transport goods in bond under general or single trip permit;

(1) between suffrance and/or bonded warehouses within a port area.

(2) from a frontier port to a highway suffrance warehouse.

(3) from a highway suffrance warehouse to another highway suffrance warehouse.

(4) from a highway suffrance warehouse to a railway, steamship or airlines suffrance warehouse for furtherance by rail, water or air to another port.

(5) from a railway, steamship or airlines suffrance warehouse to a highway suffrance warehouse at another port.

(6) from a railway, steamship or airlines suffrance warehouse at one port to a railway, steamship or airlines suffrance warehouse at another port for export.

(7) from a railway, steamship or airlines suffrance warehouse at one port to a railway, steamship or airlines suffrance warehouse at another port for entry provided that the goods are transported under appropriate rail, steamship, or air billing and manifest. NOTE: Customs manifests for goods transported pursuant to subsection (7) are to be issued in the name of the respective railway, steamship or airline company which will be held responsible for delivery of the goods to Customs at destination.

Under no circumstances are customs documents issued in respect to these movements to be in the name of a highway carrier.

(8) in transit through Canada.

(9) from any customs warehouse for export.

18. Owners or lessees of commercial motor vehicles which have not been duty and tax paid may transport goods in bond under general or single trip permit;

(1) in transit from a point in the United States to another point therein or to a customs port in Canada for transshipment to vehicles, railway cars, vessels or aircraft for export. Transshipment must be made under customs supervision directly from the inbound vehicle to a vehicle, railway car, vessel or aircraft operated by the second carrier or into a sufferance warehouse approved by the Department.

(2) from a frontier port to a highway sufferance warehouse subject to the provisions of section 8 (2) of these regulations.

(3) from any customs warehouse for export.

19. Notwithstanding the provisions of sections 17 and 18, the following articles may be manifested on any interior port for clearance if entry is not made at the frontier.

(1) Articles entitled to entry as settlers effects on form B 4 or under tariff items 701, 703c and 706.

(2) Articles eligible for entry under the Regulations Respecting Temporary Entry of Articles for Special Use.

20. Goods transported by operators of motor vehicles which are not authorized to carry in bond goods in Canada, shall be duly entered at Customs at the frontier port of arrival, otherwise they must be forwarded by a bonded carrier to the customs port of clearance.

GENERAL

21. Goods arriving in Canada in bonded vehicles or in compartments therein, deemed secure by the Collector of Customs and Excise at the frontier port of arrival, shall be sealed with Canadian Customs seals at the expense of the parties accommodated and may be permitted to be transported in bond to an approved highway sufferance warehouse under these regulations without unloading for examination. Goods which the Collector considers cannot be sealed securely shall be checked against the manifest, and shall be unloaded for this purpose at the expense of the carrier, if, in the Collector's opinion, a satisfactory check cannot otherwise be made.

22. Where motor vehicles which cannot be sealed arrive at a frontier port with large pieces of machinery or other items of weight and size that cannot be unloaded without the loss of considerable time and labour, but which can be readily checked as to identity on the vehicle, the Collector may permit the load to go forward in bond without seals.

23. Where the nature of the goods or the type of vehicle used does not permit of the merchandise being placed under seal, or unreasonable time and labour would be involved in unloading and checking the goods, or for any other reason, the Collector may, at his discretion, permit the load to be moved in bond under the convoy of a customs officer, at the expense of the party accommodated.

24. Bonded carriers transporting in bond goods from a frontier port of entry to a highway sufferance warehouse may discharge part cargoes at any approved highway sufferance warehouse en route to final destination provided that the goods are discharged from the motor vehicle during regular warehouse hours under the supervision of a customs officer who will reseal the vehicle.

25. A list of the various established highway sufferance warehouses will be found in Customs Memorandum D9.

26. (1) Canadian manufactured or duty-paid bonded highway vehicles need not be sealed for movements in Canada when the shipments have been checked against the manifest and the in bond goods may be forwarded in these vehicles with domestic or duty-paid goods.

(2) Less than truckload shipments which have been checked at the frontier or interior port of lading may be transhipped at various carriers' terminals to other carriers if manifested by the original bonded carrier on port of destination. In such case, the carrier preparing the manifest is held responsible for delivery

of the goods to Customs, failing this, for the duty and taxes applicable thereto.

27. Goods ex-vessel may be permitted to go forward unchecked in unsealed vehicles to a highway sufferance warehouse where the physical check of the contents will be conducted. The carrier will be held responsible for producing these goods to Customs and Short Landed Certificates are not to be issued in respect to this particular type of movement.

28. (1) In bond goods for export and transported in a motor vehicle which is not secured by a customs seal shall be checked against the manifest by a customs officer at the frontier port of exit.

(2) A carrier who has been issued a general or single trip permit may, in addition to the original load taken for export from a warehouse, pick up additional goods for export from warehouses at other customs ports en route to the frontier port of exit.

29. In respect to vehicles identified in accordance with the provisions of section 6, the onus is on the operators to submit to the RCM Police or Customs, when requested, evidence that the equipment is duty and tax paid. The symbols "Canada Customs Bonded Carrier" are to be displayed in legible characters on both sides of trucks, tractors, trailers, semi-trailers and boxes. Chassis or bogie units may, if necessary, have a tag or plate of sufficient size affixed thereto for this purpose.

30. Any change in the number of vehicles which serves to increase the fleet must be reported to the Department immediately. Where a transportation company has furnished a maximum bond of \$25,000 no such report is necessary.

31. Vehicles operating pursuant to the provisions of sections 8 and 9 of these regulations will be issued Commercial Vehicle Permit form E 5)B at the time of arrival at the frontier port of entry and the permit must be surrendered at the port of exit. A separate permit will be issued for the tractor, trailer, semi-trailer, chassis and/or bogie and box.

32. (1) In the event that an accident or other emergency, occurs in the course of transporting goods in bond, which requires that customs seals be broken, the driver of the motor vehicle shall report the accident or emergency forthwith by telephone, telegraph or other expeditious means to the Collector at the nearest customs port, or, if a Collector cannot be located, to the RCM Police, and shall request the attendance of an officer.

(2) In such case the supervising officer shall endorse the customs manifest(s) carried by the driver with particulars of the accident or emergency and details of the loss or damage to the goods in bond.

(3) Any goods in bond, which, as a result of the accident or emergency, cannot be forwarded immediately, shall be stored in accordance with directions of the Collector.

(4) Notwithstanding subsection (1) goods carried in unsealed vehicles may be transferred to another vehicle without benefit of supervision.

(5) Any person requiring the attendance of an officer under this section shall pay the special service charges prescribed by the Special Service Regulations.

33. Canadian manufactured or duty-paid vehicles engaged in commercial operations which are exported temporarily are to be documented on permit form E 60.

34. Permit form E 60 shall be used to cover vehicles employed in the transportation of goods in transit through the United States and, if necessary, separate forms E 60 may be issued to cover tractors and semi-trailers; trailers conveying the goods in transit may be detached from the tractors which originally moved them out of Canada and attached to other Canadian tractors in the United States, provided that the trailer and tractor units are documented by separate forms E 60; the use of non-duty-paid tractors for the purpose of hauling trailers moving goods in transit through the United States for any part of the journey is prohibited, and any violation of this regulation shall result in the privilege of transportation of goods in transit being denied the offending carrier. In the event that accessories are installed on duty and tax paid vehicles, the permit E 60 must be surrendered on the vehicle's return to Canada and be replaced by a new permit.

35. In the case of accident or other emergency while en route through United States territory, the driver shall report the circumstances to the nearest

United States Customs Officer or State Police, and shall request the United States official to endorse a copy of the manifest indicating the nature and circumstances of the accident or emergency. When the goods finally reach the Canadian Border they shall be checked in detail at the expense of the operator.

36. The transportation of bonded goods from a surffrage warehouse to an examining warehouse for appraisal and examination shall be performed by a carrier under contract to the Department and such carrier shall not be required to be bonded under these regulations.

37. Customs seals, serially numbered, are available on requisition, for use at all customs offices and shall be used wherever seals are applied and a charge of 25 cents made for each truck, trailer or semi-trailer, irrespective of the number of seals used to close the various openings on each vehicle. The charge shall be collected from the parties accommodated at the time of sealing, except where monthly settlements are made by trucking companies engaged in scheduled operations.

38. (1) Vehicles engaged in in transit operations through Canada which have been secured with Yellow Ball In Transit Seals by U.S. Customs officers at United States ports of exit shall be permitted to proceed in transit through Canada without further sealing or examination of this cargo.

(2) Vehicles engaged in in transit operations through the United States are to be secured with Green Ball In Transit Seals applied by Canadian Customs officers at the port of exit from Canada.

39. A vehicle equipped with a two-way radio installation or mobile telephone may be permitted entry into Canada under vehicle permit, provided that the applicant for the permit produces a written authorization signed by the Controller of Telecommunications, Department of Transport, Ottawa, authorizing him to use the equipment in Canada; where such authorization is not produced, the vehicle may be permitted to proceed only after the installation has been placed under customs seal in such a manner as to prevent its operation in Canada; on report outwards the seal will be removed by the customs officers, but should the seal be found to have been broken or removed, the vehicle will be subject to seizure; the fact that the vehicle is equipped with a two-way radio or mobile telephone installation shall be noted on the permit form.

40. (1) A tractor which has not been duty and tax paid in Canada cannot be used to haul a trailer which it did not originally bring into Canada for furtherance to an inland point.

(2) Repair parts and tires imported for installation on trucks carrying in bond goods in transit through Canada are subject to duty and taxes upon importation without consideration for refund, and the defective parts must be exported to the United States failing which they are subject to duty and taxes.

41. In the case where a Canadian vehicle abroad requires repairs or the necessity of accessories being added to the vehicle, the provisions of the regulations in respect to the Repair or Addition to Canadian Goods Abroad, are to apply.

42. All manifests are to be prepared by the transportation company before they are submitted to the Collector of Customs and Excise. Advice Note Manifest forms A 8A are obtainable from the Department or a Collector of Customs and Excise, for a nominal charge. Other forms of highway manifests are issued by the Department free of charge.

43. Transportation companies may, if they so desire, utilize private printing of their own form A 8A Advice Note Manifests. Printings of this form must conform with the specimen parts annexed hereto.

44. The form A 8A manifest is to consist of six (6) part carbon interleaved or No Carbon Required paper pasted sets 8 x 5½ inches, with all parts perforated at the stub. The name of the transportation company is to be printed at the top of each copy. Waybill numbers and dates, if required, may be shown in the upper left hand corner or in the blank space at the bottom of the form provided for the use of the carrier. All other space is reserved for information required by Customs.

45. An advice note manifest is to be prepared in detail by the carrier for each separate shipment. The

manifest shall state; the name and address of the importer or consignee and the consignor, the actual number of packages carried, i.e., complete shipment "10 cartons" or in the case of part shipments "6 cartons—part lot of 10", a description of the goods, the weight of the goods, the amount of the carrier's charges and whether the charges are "advance, prepaid or collect". These charges are not required to be shown on the copies designated "Freight Delivery Receipt" and "Warehouse Keepers Checking Record".

AIRCRAFT FOR HEALTH OR PLEASURE PURPOSES

IMPORTED TEMPORARILY BY NON-RESIDENTS FOR HEALTH OR PLEASURE PURPOSES

1. *Advance Notice of Arrival.* Prior to departure from a foreign airport, the owner or pilot of the aircraft, or other responsible persons, shall give advance notice of date and approximate time of arrival to the Collector of Customs and Excise at the airport of arrival by means of telephone, telegraph or mail. Advance notice of arrival, however, shall not be required where the first point of landing in Canada is an airport at which the "Communications-Operations Plan" for customs flight notification of aircraft from the United States into Canada is in effect. The names of such airports are published by the Civil Aeronautics Administration of the United States and by the Department of Transport in Canada.

2. *Reporting at Customs.* (1) The first landing of an aircraft arriving in Canada from a foreign country shall be made at an airport designated by the Department as a customs airport, at which the pilot of the aircraft shall report to the proper officer of Customs and complete the prescribed form. This report will constitute an inward and outward report except as provided for in sub-section 3. In the event of a forced landing in Canada prior to making his report to Customs at a customs airport, the pilot is to report the circumstances as soon as possible to the nearest Collector of Customs or to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

(2) Provided he is satisfied that the aircraft will be used by a non-resident for purpose of health or pleasure only and not for trade or profit the customs officer shall issue a cruising permit on the prescribed form to the owner or pilot for a period not exceeding three months. A company owned aircraft or aircraft rented from an airline, flying club or rental agency may also be issued a permit provided such aircraft will be used solely for purposes of health or pleasure.

(3) Once the pilot is in possession of a valid permit, further reporting at Customs will not be necessary either prior to or at time of departure unless articles were documented on a temporary permit at time of arrival in Canada or unless other goods which require documentary control are being carried on the outward flight. In this event report outward must be filed with Customs at actual time of departure from Canada.

EXPORTED TEMPORARILY BY CANADIAN RESIDENTS FOR HEALTH OR PLEASURE PURPOSES

3. *Reporting at Customs.* (1) Aircraft owned or operated by Canadian residents and being used for health or pleasure purposes when proceeding to points outside of Canada need not report outward at Customs at time of departure unless goods are being carried which require documentary control or unless documentation on form Y 38 is desired for goods which will require identification upon return to Canada. On the return flight to Canada the first landing shall be made at a customs airport at which the pilot shall report to the proper officer of Customs and complete a combined inward and outward report, or an inward report only if an outward report was filed at time of departure.

(2) Prior to departure from a foreign airport, the owner or pilot of the aircraft, or other responsible persons, shall give advance notice of date and approximate time of arrival to the Collector of Customs and Excise at the airport of arrival by means of telephone telegraph or mail. Advance notice of arrival, however, shall not be required where the first point of landing in Canada is an airport at which the "Communications-Operations Plan" for customs flight notification of aircraft from the United States into Canada is in effect. The names of such airports are

published by the Civil Aeronautics Administration of the United States and by the Department of Transport in Canada.

TOURISTS' OUTFITS

1. Articles of a character ordinarily classified as Tourists' or Sportsmen's equipment, imported into Canada by non-resident visitors, for temporary use, are admissible without payment of duty and taxes upon report on Temporary Admission Report, Form E-29, or, if no cash deposit is required, included on Form E-50 (Travellers' Vehicle Permit).

2. This authority for free entry is conditional on the imported articles being (a) imported for the tourist's personal use, (b) actually in the tourist's possession at the time of his arrival in Canada, and (c) reported to Canadian Customs for identification on report outwards, within six months from the date of entry, the Permit being surrendered at that time.

3. The concessions ordinarily granted to bona-fide tourists are extended to the personal effects of non-resident students entering Canada for the purpose of attending institutions of learning, the condition being, however, that exportation shall be effected, under Customs supervision, immediately after the conclusion of the school term or course.

4. For the purposes of ready reference, the conditions of entry of the various articles ordinarily included in Tourists' Outfits are given below:

Firearms. (a) Non-British subjects importing firearms must immediately register them with the local Police authorities, in order that they may legally possess them in Canada.

Dogs. (b) Under regulations of the Canadian Department of Agriculture all dogs for entry into Canada from the United States of America shall be accompanied by a certificate in one of the following forms:

(1) A certificate signed or endorsed by a Veterinary Inspector of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry certifying that the dog has been inspected and found free from any symptoms of contagious disease; that the dog has not been exposed to the infection of rabies and that no case of rabies has occurred within a radius of fifty miles of the place in which the dog has been kept for a period of six months immediately prior to date of being enroute to Canada.

(ii) A certificate signed by a licensed Veterinarian of Canada or the United States certifying that the dog has been vaccinated against rabies within a period of six months of the date of entry

Other regulations provide for dogs passing through Canada under certain conditions without certificate.

This certificate must be shown to the Canadian Customs officer at each time of entry of the dog into Canada.

TRAVELLERS' BAGGAGE

Travellers' baggage, under such regulations as the Minister may prescribe. Free

Goods entitled to entry under this tariff item shall be exempt from all imposts, notwithstanding the provisions of this Act or any other Act.

(1) Goods valued at not more than one hundred dollars included in the baggage accompanying residents of Canada returning from abroad after an absence from Canada of not less than forty-eight hours and acquired by them for personal or household use or as souvenirs or gifts, but not bought on commission or as an accommodation for other persons or for sale, under such regulations as the Minister may prescribe. Free

A resident of Canada shall not be entitled to the exemption herein granted within a period of four months from the date of the last exemption allowed, nor shall the exemption be allowed on alcoholic beverages in excess of one quart, or on tobacco in excess of fifty cigars, two hundred cigarettes and 2 lb. of manufactured tobacco.

(2) Effective on and after July 1, 1958, in addition to the exemption provided for in part (1) of this item, a resident of Canada returning from a point beyond the continental limits of North America after an absence from Canada of not less than fourteen days may elect to avail himself of the following special exemption:

Goods valued at not more than two hundred dollars (not including alcoholic beverages, cigars, cigarettes or manufactured tobacco), acquired in overseas countries by residents of Canada during an absence from Canada of not less than fourteen days and acquired by them for personal or household use or as souvenirs or gifts, but not bought on commission or as an accommodation for other persons or for sale, under such regulations as the Minister may prescribe. Free

All goods admitted under the foregoing special exemption shall be declared by the resident at the time of his return to Canada, and any person who has availed himself of the special exemption is not entitled to any further

exemption under item 703b within a period of twelve months from the date the last special exemption was allowed.

Goods entitled to entry under this tariff item shall be exempt from all imposts, notwithstanding the provisions of this Act or any other Act.

Goods (not including alcoholic beverages, cigars, cigarettes or manufactured tobacco) imported.

- (1) by members of the Canadian Forces or by employees of the Canadian Government after an absence from Canada of not less than one year, or
- (2) by former residents of Canada returning to Canada to resume residence therein after

having been residents of another country for a period of not less than one year, and acquired by them for personal or household use and actually owned abroad by them for at least six months before their return to Canada, under such regulations as the Minister may prescribe

Free
Goods entitled to entry under this tariff item shall be exempt from all imposts, notwithstanding the provisions of this Act or any other Act.

Any goods imported under this tariff item which are sold or otherwise disposed of within twelve months after importation are subject to the duties and taxes otherwise prescribed.

REGULATIONS GOVERNING TEMPORARY ADMISSION OF ARTICLES FOR SPECIAL USE

1. (a) The Department has authorized the use of Temporary Admission Report Form E-29, under which certain specified articles may be permitted entry without payment of duty and taxes. Provision is made on the Form for a computation of the amount of duty and taxes properly payable, and a cash deposit of an amount equal to that sum is to be supplied, unless otherwise stipulated. The E-29 must be surrendered by the holder and exportation must be made within six months from the date of entry (unless otherwise provided for), and any cash deposit which may have been furnished will then be subject to refund, otherwise it will be taken to account as duty and taxes. The goods must be identified by a Customs Officer prior to exportation.

(b) Although the furnishing of a deposit may be required by the regulations, any Collector of Customs may, in his discretion, waive its collection if the imported articles entered under Form E-29, are to be used within the limits of his own port, under such precautions or provisions as he may consider necessary to secure the due exportation thereof immediately after such use.

Free as "Travellers' Baggage".

(b) Canadian theatrical companies or individual Canadian actors performing in such companies, on rental or to be exported after temporary use in Canada, and used costumes brought in by promoters, actor managers or directors entering Canada with one or more costumes for use in the presentation of amateur or other performances for charitable or other institutions, and to be exported after such temporary use:

Subject to ordinary provisions of Customs Tariff, provided that \$2 per costume be the minimum amount of duty and taxes to which such costumes should be liable.

10. Stage Properties: Theatrical scenery and stage properties (including trained animals), owned or leased and imported by foreign producing companies or by proprietors of foreign vaudeville acts, to be used in Canada by regular performers thereof and not by any other person, or for sale or rental in Canada:

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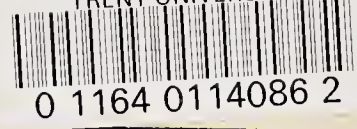
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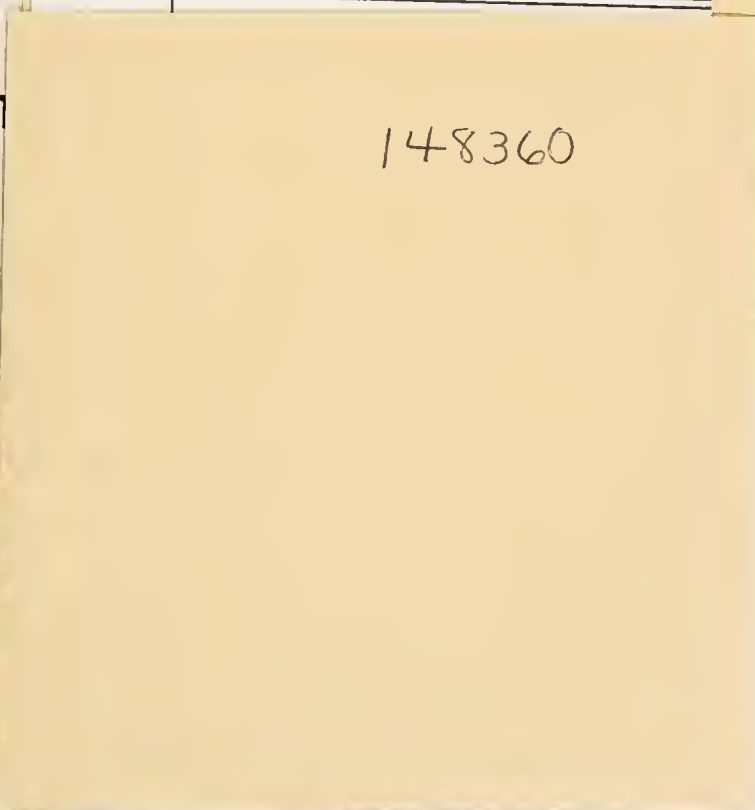
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
