Let Us Call A Halt

"Charity begins at home." In presenting this article the editor of the Pine Cone is not in any way desirous of antagonizing or under-estimating the good work heretofore accomplished by organizations in Carmel and elsewhere.

We do think, however, that certain facts and conditions are being lost sight of to which the attention of charity workers and charity givers should be directed.

Not since the Civil War have the prices of food and wearing apparel reached the heights now prevailing. Our people are in the midst of conditions which demand the strictest economy to make both ends meet. Many now are denying themselves and their families objects sorely needed.

Winter is upon us. What are the poor and distressed of the United States, of California, of San Francisco, going to do?

Wages do not begin to keep pace with soaring prices of food and clothing.

Stop sending money and food and clothing to Europe. Let England and Germany and France take care of their own needy and those peoples they have made dependent.

We are not discouraging giving. If you have money to give, give it with the distinct condition that it is to be used to alleviate the distress of our own people.

Let us ask Congress to place an embargo on foodstuffs and munitions. Without either the war cannot go on.

Carmel Fire Fighters Save Much Property

Shortly before six o'clock on Saturday evening the community was startled by a vigorous and prolonged fire alarm.

The new Basham cottage on Carmelo avenue was in flames. Every member of the Fire Department and a number of willing assistants responded promptly.

The burning building was situated in the midst of a veritable jungle of dry brush and weeds, and was entirely destroyed.

The fact that a number of other buildings were not laid in ruins may be attributed to the effective work and foresight of the fire department.

The cause of the fire is not known, but is thought to have resulted from an exploding can of shellac.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Basham were in the house several times during the day. It had been their intention to move into the place on Sunday.

The loss is partly covered by insurance. Walter Basham, while playing a stream on the embers, remarked, "Well boys, it's all in a life-time; look at the fine concrete foundation I have left."

"We Are Elected"

Candidates for the presidency of
the United States would be more
than human if they did not feel
unusual concern in those hours of
uncertainty intervening between
the closing of the polls and the an-
nouncement of the result. This,
of course, is equally true of the
families of the candidates.

Many interesting stories are told
of the manner in which news of de-
feat or of victory was received in
the homes of men who have been
standard bearers of their parties.
In the earlier years of the republic,
of course, it required days, and
sometimes weeks, to get all the re-
turns; but the telegraph changed
all this, and it has often happened
that the result was definitely known
to the victor or the vanquished be-
fore his ordinary bedtime.

Perhaps one of the most charac-
teristic of the Lincoln anecdotes
may be revived with timeliness.
On the night of his first election
the little "frame" home of the
Lincolns in Springfield, Ill., was
thronged with eager neighbors
and friends. Reports for awhile
came in early and favorably. Then
they were less promising. Mrs.
Lincoln had been by her husband's
side all day. He now insisted
that she retire. The crowd dwindle-
d. Then came the news that
New York was safe. Then the
news that Lincoln had carried the
country. The rest of the story will
be better told by the great man
himself.

"When there was no longer any
doubt, or reason for doubt, I went
up to my bedroom and found my
wife asleep. I gently touched her
shoulder and said, 'Mary!' She
made no answer. I spoke again a
little louder, saying, 'Mary! Mary!
we are elected!' "—The Christian
Science Monitor.

ORDINANCE NO. 1

AN ORDINANCE for fixing the time and place for holding meetings and establishing the procedure for calling special meetings of Board of Trustees.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Monterey County, State of California, do ordain as follows:

Sec. 1. The Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Monterey County, State of California, shall hold regular meetings on the first Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7:30 p. m. of said day.

Sec. 2. Regular meetings may be adjourned to a date specified in the order of adjournment, and when so adjourned such adjourned meeting shall be a regular meeting for all purposes.

Sec. 3. Special meetings of said board may be held at any other time upon at least three hours notice by the President or the City Clerk, or by any three members of the Board; such notice to be in writing and signed by the persons calling such meeting. Recital in the minutes of said Board of the fact of giving such notice, upon being approved at a subsequent meeting of said Board, shall be conclusive evidence that such notice was duly given and such meeting duly called and held.

Sec. 4. The place for all meetings of said Board in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea is hereby fixed at such place as may be indicated by a conspicuous sign reading: "City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Board of Trustees, Regular meeting date first Tuesday of each month." In event of change of meeting place or change of date of regular meeting, the above sign to be displayed for not less than one week at new place of meeting, or one week before change of date with new date inscribed thereon, also notice inserted in local paper of such changes.

PROVIDED, That any regular or special meeting, when once so assembled, may adjourn to continue its deliberations in any other place in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, the time and place of holding such adjourned meeting to be specified in the motion to adjourn, and the recital of such motion in the minutes of said Board, upon being approved at a subsequent meeting thereof, shall be conclusive evidence that such adjourned meeting was duly and regularly called, noticed and held.
