Let us ask Congress to place an embargo on foodstuffs and munitions. Without either the war cannot go on.

#### "We Are Elected"

Candidates for the presidency of the United States would be more than human if they did not feel unusual concern in those hours of nucertainty intervening between the closing of the polls and the announcement of the result. This, of course, is equally true of the families of the candidates.

Many interesting stories are told of the manner in which news of defeat or of victory was received in the homes of men who have been standard bearers of their parties. In the earlier years of the republic, of course, it required days, and sometimes weeks, to get all the returns; but the telegraph changed all this, and it has often happened that the result was definitely known to the victor or the vanquished before his ordinary bedtime.

Perhaps one of the most characteristic of the Lincoln anecdotes may be revived with timeliness. On the night of his first election the little "frame" home of the Lincolns in Springfield, Ill., was thronged with eager neighbors and friends. Reports for awhile came in early and favorably. Then they were less promising. Mrs. Lincoln had been by her husband's side all day. He now insisted that she retire. The crowd dwindled. Then came the news that New York was safe. Then the news that Lincoln had carried the country. The rest of the story will be better told by the great man himself

"When there was no longer any doubt, or reason for doubt, I went up to my bedroom and found my wife asleep. I gently touched her shoulder and said, 'Mary 1' She' made no answer. I spoke again a little louder, saying, 'Mary ! Mary ! we are elected ! "-The Christian Science Monitor.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 1

AN ORDINANCE for fixing the time and place for holding meetings and establishing the procedure for ca ing special meetings of Board of Trustees,

The Board of Trustees of the City of Carme by the Bea, Monterey County, State of California, do ordain as fullows:

SEC. 1. The Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Monterey County, State of California, shall hold regular meetings on the first Tuesday of each month, at the hour o' 7:30 p. m. of said

SEC. 2. Regular meetings may be adjourned to a date specified in the order of adjournment, and when so adjourned such adjourned meeting shall be a regular meet-

ing for all purposes. SEC 3. Special meetings of said board may be held at any other time upon at least three hours notice by the President or the City Clerk, or by any three members of the Board; such notice to be in writing and signed by the persons calling such meeting. Recital in the Oith of said Board of the fact of giving such motice, upon being approved at a subsequent meeting of said Poard, shall be conclusive evidence that such notice was duly given and such meeting duly called and held.

SEC. 4. The place for all meetings of said Board in the City of Carmel-by the Sea is hereby fixed at such place as may be indicated by a conspicuous sign reading; "City of Carmel-by-the Sea, Board of Trustees, Regular meeting date first Tuesday of each mouth." In event of change of meeting place or change of date of regular meeting, the above sign to be displayed for not less than one week at new place of meeting, or one week before change of date with new date inscribed thereon, also notice inserted in local paper of such changes.
