OPENING HALTED; FIND ERRORS

Proposed Improvement Can't Proceed, Is Decision of City Attorney Shaw

A BANDONMENT of the present proceedings for the opening of Patterson avenue, under way for the past year or more, was ordered at the meeting of the City Council last night when Hartley Shaw, city attorney, filed a written opinion in which he states, in effect, errors in the resolution of intention are sufficient to invalidate the proposed improvement.

The city attorney stated that the defects involved matters of surveying rather than of law.

"The opinion of the city attorney is received with great regret by the council," said Councilman Dwight W. Stephenson.

The estimate was made last night that if the proposed improvement is again started, it will take several years to complete it, owing to the fact that all of the steps taken in the past year or more are lost.

The opinion of the city attorney follows in full:

"When I took office as city attorney one of the first things I had to do was to begin an action for the opening of Patterson avenue. After this action had been brought and service had been had upon the defendants one of them filed an analso that the description of the assessment district was void on acthan of law, and after considering went into the matter carefully with number of defects in the description. ELKS' BUILDING **ABOUT READY**

Local Lodge Home Now One of Completeness; About \$9000 Is Expended

The remodeling of the third floor of the Glendale Elks' club building on Colorado boulevard, which has been in progress two months, is now practically completed, and the entire eleven additional rooms will be ready for occupancy within the next few days. When the remainder of the furniture and carpets, which will arrive here tomorrow, are installed the local lodge will be able to boast of the best designed and elegantly arranged and furnished club house in the state. The building, which is one of Glendale's real beauty spots, has already been called the "most beautiful secret order edifice in Southern California."

The recent improvements, which have been in charge of the regular building committee and the lodge officers, have been put in on the "separate contract" plan. Sub-contractors were engaged to install various jobs, which were finished by day labor, and not by contract.

Cost About \$9,000

The alterations and additions have been made at an approximate cost of \$9,000, according to Willis M. Kimball, secretary of the order. This includes the total cost of labor, materials and furnishings for each of the eleven rooms. Six of these rooms front on Colorado boulevard, while the other five face Elk avenue.

When completed the stairway and halls will be lined with clear flax carpet, which is the kind that is used in all large theatres and hotels. More than 150 feet of this carpet will be

The rooms, which are large and airy, will each contain a heavy rug flush to the walls, a double bed, writing table, chiffonier, straight chair and a rocking chair. The furniture is of mahogany finish, the chairs being finished in leather.

In addition to the rooms already mentioned a large double room has been added on the southern extension of the building. This apartment has both a south and east exposure and will be used as the janitor's







Will Be 250 Feet High

The committee that has charge of the building of the monument wishes to carry out the same idea as symbolized to the Statue of Liberty which greets the ships sailing into New York harbor.

The monument will stand by itself on a strip of land projecting into the Pacific Coast League sea. It will be 250 feet high and will be in the shape of an obelisk sur-mounted by a light. It will be hollow and a staircase will lead up into it from the land side. Above the more up to August 2: doorway will be eight bronze plates depicting scenes of the various army and navy units in battle. Above this will be engraved the American eagle and on the reverse side of the monu ment facing the sea, the arms o France. On each side of the huge obelisk will be sculpted figures representative of France greeting the American soldiers.

War Veterans to Aid

The sculptor, Bartholome, will di rect the work in co-operation with M. Ventre, the architect who erected the monument over the famous Bay onet Trench at Verdun. Under their joint direction the work will be executed by young sculptors and artists who fought in the war, and each The plaster cast will be exhibited at the Paris Spring Salon in March.

The cost of the monument will b approximately 8,000,000 francs. Th French government has contributed 1,000,000 francs, while over 400, 000 francs had been turned in by subscription before the drive had actually opened. Contributions came unsolicited from all over the coun try, even from the devastated regions of the Ardenaes, the Vosges, the Aisne and the Marne, where the people wished to show their gratitude to their American comrades. Some subscriptions were also received from parts of Algeria.
