

Harris' Earliest Pepper


The Harris' Earliest Pepper is something quite distinct in peppers. Not only is it the earliest variety, being earlier than Neapolitan, but it is also a better formed variety, exceedingly productive and of a good marketable size.

The plant growth of Harris' Earliest is distinctly dwarf, growing only from 12 to 18 inches in height, compact and bushy and so productive that we have counted a full dozen fruits on a single plant at one time.

The fruits are large for so early a variety, measuring from 3 to 4 inches in length by $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 inches in diameter. In form the peppers are quite similar to Bull Nose and having a thick flesh make ideal stuffing peppers. The fruits are so mild and sweet they can be readily eaten from the hand.

Because of its extreme earliness this variety is peculiarly adapted to the far North, and as a kitchen garden variety anywhere it has no equal.

The Perfecto Cantaloupes The Highest Type of the Rocky Ford Shipping Melons.

This recently introduced type of Rocky Ford melon has been developed by careful selection from Eden Gem, the object in view being a salmon, or orange-fleshed, melon.

The Perfecto is a melon of medium size, nearly round, without ribs and covered with a dense, hard gray netting. It has the smallest seed and seed cavity of any shipping melon, the seeds being so closely packed they will not loosen in shipping. The vines are wonderfully prolific and quite disease resistant, making crops where other Rocky Ford types fail.

The Perfectos have established themselves sufficiently to receive separate recognition in market reports and have invariably brought the *highest price in every market shipped to.* The one great advantage of the Perfectos over other Rocky Ford melons is that they *can be picked on a "full slip"*, or when ripe, and then reach any market in the U. We doubt if many seed growers are going to the extent practiced at Grass Lake in the betterment of their seed stocks of Sweet Corn.

"Mail Abduct Squeeze Abate Caballer," would mean mail at once five pounds Improved Hubbard Squash and two pounds All Head Early Cabbage. "Express Able Puffing freight Active Peak," would mean to express at once ten pounds Quaker Pie Pumpkin and ship by freight 250 pounds Little Marvel Peas. Where the same quantity is wanted of several items use the word ditto, thus: "Express Abide Raging ditto Radius Raccoon Rambling," which we would understand meant to express you at once eight pounds each of these Radishes: Sparkler White Tip, Rice's Saxa, Early Scarlet Turnip and Icicle.

Our customers will find this a very inexpensive way of wiring their orders, but we must caution them that care be taken in writing out the messages, as we cannot hold ourselves responsible for errors arising from incomplete messages or incorrect translation.
