Since Hostilities Commenced 49 British Have Been Killed and 490 Wounded.

## No Particulars Yet Received Regarding General Yule's Movements in Natal.

London, Oct. 25.—The British casual-tics since the beginning of hostilities, ac-cording to war office returns, reach 507, 18 officers having been killed and 55 wounded, and 76 men killed and 435 wounded, There are 13 unaccounted for. The report of heavy losses sent from Reitfontein came as an unpleasant sur-prise, as Gen.
