EISNER, PREMIER OF BAVARIA, IS REPORTED MURDERED IN MUNICH

Dispatch From That City to Amsterdam Says He Was Shot To-day by Ligut. Count Valley, Who Himself Was Wounded by Guard and Is Dying

London, Feb. 21.—Kurt Eisner, the Premier of Bavaria, was sh and killed this morning by Lieut. Count Arco Valley.

According to a Munich dispatch received in Amsterdam, the Count was wounded severely by a guard and is reported to be dying.

Basel, Feb. 21.—A reactionary insurrection broke out in Munich on Wednesday night, according to The Frankfort Zeitung. Demobilized Bavarian bluejackets attacked the Diet Building and occupied the telegraph office and police headquarters, but finally were dislodged by Government troops.

Prince Joachim of Prussia, sixth son of the former Kaiser, was arrested, it being reported that he apparently had some connection

with the movement. He had been staying in Munich under the name of Count Merz.

The Government has announced that it has taken the necessary measures to protect the Diet and punish the persons responsible for the uprising.

REVELS IN BERLIN TO BE BESTRICTED

Dancing Only on Certain Days; Rosa Luxembourg's Body Reported Found

Berlin, Feb. 20.—Via London, Feb. 21.—(Associated Press)—The carnival of dancing, wine-drinking and expensive night revels into which certain classes of the population of Berlin and other large cities of Germany have plunged since the signing of the armistice hereafter will be restricted by the police. Under a new order only dance halls that had permits before the war will be allowed to continue, and they will be limited to certain days of the week and to a certain number of hours in the evening.

The friyolous and profligate night life now prevailing has been criticized generally as being not only inconsistent with Germany's political position, but also unfavorably affecting public opinion abroad.

Body Found. Warsaw, Feb. 20.—Via London, Feb. 21.—(Associated Press.)—The Germans are reported not to be observing the previsions of the armistice agreement as to fighting in Posen, and it is said skirmishes have occurred at scattered points. The morale of the Germans is deciared to be low, as evidenced by the reported sale of a battery of artillery to a Polish Catholic priest, and price being 6,000 marks.

Col. Haller, the Polish Chief of Staff, announces there is military activity all along the Galician frontier. Attacks by Ukrainian troops have been repulsed in that region.

TEUTONS SENT AWAY FROM VERNON CAMP

GIFT OF LAND FOR WOUNDED SOLDIERS

New Westminster, Feb. 21.—A magnanimous offer of 102 acres of land in the municipality of Surrey, at White Rock, has been made by ex-Judge W. Norman Bole, of this city, to the Dominion Government to be used as a home for wounded soldiers.

The offer has been made through Mr. Bole's friend. Lieutenant-Colonel C. E. Doherty, who, as the British Columbia representative on the Dominion executive of the Great War Veterans' Association, will go to Ottawa shortly and who will take occasion at that time to bring the matter to the attention of the Government.

The land which Mr. Bole proposes to deed to the Government adjoins the town of Blaine, Wash. The trees on the property are only second growth, so they can be easily removed. The Great Northern Railway has a station close to the property and there are two trains daily to Vancouver and Seattle.

AMERICAN TROOPS IN CITY OF BERLIN

London, Feb. 21.—American troops have arrived in Berlin and been quartered in various hotels, says a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Copenhagen quoting The Extrabladet's correspondent.

The troops are said to belong to the "13th New York Regiment," and their duty will be the protection of expected transport of food.

RUSSIAN SITUATION DEBATED BY LORDS

Curzon Says Conference Proposal Was Made With Good Reason

London, Feb. 21.—Replying in the House of Lords to the comments of the Marquis of Lansdowns on the position in North Russia, Lord Curzon strongly condemned the suggestion that the British Government should open negotiations with the Boishevill over the head of the Archangel Government, while he contended there was good reason for the Princes' Island proposal, whether it succeeded or not.

The proposal to deal with Russia piecemeal would have calamitous results. The Boisheviki were trying to dispose of the provincial Governments one by one, and wanted to release the forces in the north so that they could sent them against Gen. Denikine, head of the Government at Ekaterinodar.

Lord Peel, representing the War Office, described the military situation in Russia. He said that the recent retirement on the Archangel front had been carried out with very little loss, either of men or material, while the enemy had suffered heavily.

There was no immediate anxiety regarding the safety of the forces there. Technical troops were needed for the distribution of food and other supplies, and steps were being taken to furnish them. If the Bolsheviki continued their aggression, it might be necessary to reinforce the Allied troops.

Lord Peel declared that there had been comparatively little sickness and few cases of frostbite among the Allied troops, who had the advantage of Sir Ernest Shackleton's experience in training men for Arctic weather.

SESSION OPENS AT OTTAWA.

Much that is important, and comparatively little that is controversial, may be found in the Speech from the Throne at the opening of the session of Parliament at Ottawa. So far at least as general principles are concerned, there can hardly be any serious disagreement with the pronnounced on behalf of the Government.

From this, however, it does not follow that Federal politics will be lacking in interest during the next few months. There are acute differences of opinion lying just beneath the surface, and there is bitter personal feeling among those who once were friends. This personal element, also, is liable to be more in evidence than it would have been if Sir Wilfrid Laurier had been spared for a while longer. The removal of his influence will allow the display of temperamental acidities which otherwise might have been kept under control.

The measures over which keen discussion may be anticipated are those relating to the franchise and the raising of revenue. Everybody will concede that the Government must have money, and lots of it, but there will be a divergence of view as to the best method of getting it. This is an issue on which there will have to be skilful handling of the two sections of the Unionists, but everything seems to show that they will manage to reach a

compromise moderately acceptable to both.

On the franchise issue, displays of verbal fireworks are "indicated." Many politicians are unable to mention the War Times Election Act in language fit for reproduction. This law was only for the duration of the war, and modifications are to be made at the present session, but there is a dis-tinet hint of firmness in the statement that the new statute will contain "such provisions as are neces-sary, having regard to existing conditions."

This probably foreshadows the insertion of a clause to keep draft-evaders off the voters' list for a period of years. Such an enactment will not meet with favor in the Province of Quebec. There will also presumably be a clause continuing to a greater or less extent the restrictions on the voting privileges of aliens. As to this latter, there is a pretty widespread sentiment that the restricneed not be too severe, now that the nation is no longer in danger.

is no longer in danger.

The constructive legislation outlined is very sweeping. It is of such a character as will have a permanent and important effect on Canada's future. There will be bills to provide vocational training, to create a Department of Public Health, to promote better housing conditions and for dealing with the liquor traffic. This last topic, though its discussion is often an occasion for the display of bad temper, is non-political in most of its aspects, since prohibitionists and moderates of all shades are to be found in both parties.

Also there is to be laid before Parliament a comprehensive scheme, embodied in several bills, for

prehensive scheme, embodied in several bills, for looking after the returned soldier, together with the injured and the dependents of the dead, and for getting the country's industries back to a peace basis. This, of course, is the important problem on which everything else hinges. Thus far, in the handling of it by all the Governments of Canada, there has been displayed more of good will than of practical wisdom. The Dominion executive has had plenty of time to think it over and to consult all whose advice may be considered worth having. What is wanted now is results.

In one respect the Speech from the Throne is not as specific as might be considered desirable. It might with advantage have gone into more detail as to what are the intentions of the Government with regard to labor legislation and the amelioration of social conditions generally. It is all very well to promise "measures designed to promot the welfare and prosperity of the new era," but a good many people would like to know just how this is to be done-and how soon.

THE ATTORNEY-GENERAL'S STATEMENT.

Farris in the Legislature yesterday afternoon should have wounded the feelings of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company. Disposing of such a contingency as belonging to the realms of doubtful possibilities, it is safe to say that the Attorney-General was not attempting to create a wrong impression. On the other hand, he was adhering strictly to the facts. His reply was directed to an inquiry of Mr. Bowser as to what course the Government intended to follow to protect the rights of claimants arising out of the loss of the ill-

rights of claimants arising out of the loss of the ill-fated Sophia's crew.

The Attorney-General stated clearly that all claims presented to date had been paid and that the Government had instructed eminent counsel in the person of S. S. Taylor, K. C., to fight the case brought by the Company. He intends that instruction to cover the case on behalf of the Province and the claims affected, and he will take the case to the Highest Court if such a course should prove necessary.

Our contemporary suggests that the claims were only paid after the preliminary hearing of the test case in Vancouver on Wednesday last. We are informed that there was no preliminary hearing and that there is no test case. It should be noted, however, that the Company has brought an action in the regular way against the Workmen's Compensation Board challenging its jurisdiction to make the payments in question. But the suggestion that this action is a friendly case merely for the purpose of testing the constitutional question Mr. Farris declares to be without foundation. Not so many years ago this suggestion would have been denounced as calculated to raise the cost of construction; but no such objection will now be advanced. The idea that the workingman may be exploited and his services secured at the lowest possible figure is no longer considered applicable to anything with which the Government is concerned.

The real objection to the Newcastle member proposed amendment is that it is quite unneces-sary. The law already provides fully for the con-tingency he has in mind. Every contract made by the British Columbia Government contains a fair

the British Columbia Government contains a fair wage clause as a matter of course, and there is an officer whose particular duty it is to see that the clause is carried out. Memory does not recall any case in which there has been complaint of recent years on this score in connection with any provincial public works.

CONSOLIDATED CHURCH **NEED OF THE PRESENT**

Former Victoria Pastor Points to Problem of Rural Church Life

"The consolidated church, as well as the consolidated school, is one of the needs of rural life," writes the Rev. F. N. Stapleford, M.A., formerly of this city, in The Christian Guardian, in an article on the problems of the rural church and congregation. "Fewer churches and larger churches will not only release the minister from the exactions of officials who are petty and small, but will give him a constituency large enough to call out his energies and talents of leadership. Small churches mean not only inadequate salaries, but a countryside criss-crossed with denominational differences and jealousies, which prove an exasperat.

with denominational differences and jealousies, which prove an exasperating barrier to effective community leadership.

A proper social training for the minister is, of course, another necessary prerequisite for the transformation of the rural church to meet modern conditions. Of what use is it for a minister to preach on Sunday unless he knows how, through the week, to locate and remove those sources of moral contagion which poison a countryside? Every minister should have some knowledge of the technique of dealing with the dependant, defective and lelinquent classes.

"More adequate remuneration for ministers, fewer and larger churches, and a definite social programme, which deals not only with the larger community movements, for better recreation facilities, increased means of intercommunication, a more efficient education system, a wider diffusion of general culture, but also takes in those complicated social problems of the unstanding service. All of this is but a more complex way of saying that the Church must socialize fisself, and thus come nearer to the purpose and programme of Him who came to found, not a sect, but a kingdom; not a divisive something to keep apart the hearts of men, but a broad and a warm brotherhood which would fuse all into one faith, one Lord, one baptism for the redemption of the world, and the convention cities. Legislature, the Hon, J. D. MacLean, Minister of Education; introduced a Bill providing for the superannuation of all civil servants. To
provide a fund for this purpose 4
per cent. of the annual salary of the
members of the service is deducted
and paid into a Consolidated Revenue Fund with interest added at
the current rates.

The compulsory retiring age is sixty-five years, and the voluntary age of retirement is sixty years. If mentally or physically unfit for service a civil fervant may retire before reaching the age of sixty. Payments are made to the beneficiaries to the full amount paid-in, and a like amount added by the Government, the civil servant drawing his interest during the period of his or her payments.



SHIPYARD INQUIRY AGAIN IN SESSION

Before the inquiry proceeded Mr. E. V. Young, representing the Metal Trades Employers' Association, made a statement which purported to show that his organization had not attempted in any way to block the inquiry. On the other hand everything had been done in its power to facilitate matters so far as the employers had any connection with the inquiry. He reviewed the steps taken by the organization up until Thursday when it was arranged that a joint application be made to Ottawa to secure a commission to go into Clause 15 of the Robertson Agreement. He claimed that there was no dispute as far as the employers were concerned for they had put the Macdonald awards into effect so far as the Robertson Agreement was concerned. He noted that Mr. Nightscales wanted a blanket investigation of the whole Robertson Agreement.



SALVAGE WORK ON JANET CARRUTHERS **MENACE TO CLAMS**

An attempt to float the British auxiliary schooner Janet Carruthers, ashore at the entrance to Grays Harbor, by dumping her fuel oil supply overboard, was prevented by State Fish Commissioner L. H. Darwin, who held that the oil would menace the supply of clams on adjacent beaches.

Mr. Darwin wired Jack Winslew, game commissioner of Grays Harbor county, to notify the salvage crew of the stranded ship that arrest and prosecution would follow if they dumped the oil overboard. The warden was instructed to stay on the job and see that the mandate was not ignored.

The best clam beds in the state of Washington extend for several miles on either side of the spot where the vessel was driven ashore, with the loss of six lives, a few weeks ago. The canning of the bivalves has developed into a considerable industry, giving employment to hundreds of workers during the canning season.



PALACE OF VERSAILLES A GORGEOUS LANDMARK

re William I, of Germany Many Years Ago Was Proclaimed Emperor of the German Federation-Where Kaiser Wilhelm Hoped to Be

Walk Toward Palaca
Versailles attracts thousands of visitors; in fact, most of the tourists who visit Paris also want to see Versailles. The best way to approach to the Palace is indicated in an article on The Romantle History of Versailles. By Eibert F. Baldwin, which appeared in a recent issue of The Outlook. Mr. Baldwin says one may go to Versailles by train, sireet car of motor car, while many peoples prefer to walk, but he thinks it is a pity to approach the Palace from the Paris side and from the city of Versailles, because the enormhous building seen from that side looks stiff and pompous and has no proper environment. If one has the aesthetic instinct and a sense of perspective, it is far better to take the train out to Saint-Cyr or Ballly, says, this writer, and walk back through twentrable forests which transport one to the time when Louis XIII. (1610 to 1843) hunted in these very twoods. PROHIBITION IN **MEXICO PLANNED**

President Considering Scheme Submitted by National Board of Health

Mexico City, Feb. 21.—President Carranza is considering a plan submitted by the National Board of Health for the enactment of legislation that would gradually result in the complete abolition of the alcoholic liquor traffic in Mexico. He recently signed a decree increasing from twenty-five to fifty percent the tax on pulque and other alcoholic beverages in Mexico City.

The constitution, according to the officials of the Board of Health, gives that body power to dictate health regulations that will result in the abolition of the liquor traffic. The Board's programme as submitted to the President provides for an elaborate campaign to suppress the liquor traffic gradually, High duties, early closing hours for sations, temperance lectures, organization of temperance societies and various other means would be resorted to before the prohibitory regulations became effective.

WOODEN STEAMSHIP CHAMPLAIN LAUNCHED AT VANCOUVER TO-DAY

Vancouver, Feb. 21.—The wooden steamer Champlain, first of five 1,500-ton vessels being built for the French Government, was succussfully launched this morning from the Northern Construction Company's yards, False Creek. The Champlain's keel was laid last September. Four of the vessels are well under way and the second will take the water in about two weeks.
