Report Says Allies Will Allow Germany to Raise Big Loan

Loan to Come Before Indemnity Payments, It is Said; Italian Premier Says European Peoples Should Be Helped to Their Feet.

London, March 4.—The London Standard states to-day that the Allied Supreme Council has decided to allow Germany to launch an international loan because it is recognized that Germany ruined would mean a weak and dangerous spot in Europe.

The loan, the newspaper says, would take precedence over any indemnity payments Germany is called upon to make.

London, March 4.—Europe is in danger of permanently losing the position she held in the world before the outbreak of the world war, Premier Nitti of Italy declared in an interview with a representative of The Manchester Guardian printed to-day. He pointed out that Europe is no longer a creditor, but is on the debit side of the ledger.

Premier Refuses Increased Grant to City Schools As Taxpayers Are Hostile

Premier Oliver to-day told representatives of Victoria, Saanich, Oak Bay and Esquimalt School Boards asking for an increased per capita grant from the Provincial Government for their schools, that the trouble with the people of this Province is "that they are demanding a standard of living they are not willing to pay for and not able to pay for.

'I want you to get that in all its rawness,' the Premier added

"This Province has practicall the standpoint of borrowing money. I would sooner give up my position as Premier than throw British Columbia into bankrupteey."

Trustee J. L. Beckwith, who with Chairman Peter Riddell headed the delegation to the executive, said that the cost of running Victoria schools had increased so greatly that the Government grant, which was 41 per cent. ten years ago, now amounts to only 22 per cent. of the salaries paid by the city to teachers.

Money Demands increased.

"We know that our school population will be larger a year from now and we may be up against the necessity of putting up new buildings," he said. "Last year our school attendance was increased by 500.

"If it were good business for the Province to contribute 41 per cent. to us ten years ago, the Province today should contribute an equal percentage because there are other sources of revenue controlled by the Province to-day that the city controlled ten years ago and to-day the Government has the profit."

Vancouver, March 4.—A request to the Provincial Government for a referendum as to whether the Province of British' Columbia shall become bone dry or other wise will be made at the earliest opportune moment, according to a resolution adopted at the convention of the People's Prohibition Association of British Columbia, in session here.

An amendment that the subject should be referred to the executive committee was withdrawn after a long discussion, and the original resolution at earliest opportune moment." W. 



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TO MEET IN ITALY

London, March 4.—The Allied Supreme Council closed its London sessions last night after preparing the Turkish treaty and its economic conclusions in such manner that they may be completed by assistants. The treaty will be handed to the delegates of Turkey at Paris on March 22, it was announced.

It is possible that Premier Millerand will come to London next week to confer with the Foreign Ministers and Ambassadors on the Turkish treaty and on the contentions of Hungarians regarding their treaty. It is not expected that the economic conclusions of the conference will be made public before Saturday or Sunday.

The Supreme Council will assemble early in April at San Remo, Italy, where negotiations with the Jugo-Slavs will be resumed. The reason for selecting San Remo is that it was felt that Rome was too far distant and less suitable for conducting the negotiations with the Serbians.

New York, March 4.—Government agents were victorious in the first pitched battle to result here from enforcement of the prohibition law and yesterday triumphantly gave the Customs authorities 537 bottles of cognac seized aboard the Italian steamship Presidente Wilson. Beset on all sides by many members of the crew, who switched off lights far down in the ship's interior and smashed bottles by flinging pieces of iron, a half dozen men from the office of Thomas E. Rush, inspector of the port, finally carried the liquor off the ship.





PRESIDENT WOODWARD LAYS HIS CRITICS

Official "Come Back" With Telling Effect; Opponents Silent

The central feature of the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last night was the stirring defence offered President Woodward against the charges and criticisms levelled at him in his absence at the last session. Delegate Pagett started the proceed ings by outlining just what he had said at the meeting in question.

"I made an amendment to the effect that we should not bar any business agent," he stated, "but the Retail Clerks have listed their dele position—it was simply to get around the constitution." Delegate Morgan, who had precipitated the Woodward question last week, stated that he was simply seeking information and had brought no charges.

President Woodward then vacated the chair and made his answer to the whole affair.

Other Motives.

"I would like to intervene at this stage," he said. "The press reports somewhat surprised me. They convered the suspection that I did not retain the confidence of this council, and that I had no right to be here. "I am glad of the opportunity to clear up this business. Either I retain office with the full confidence of the council or I shall cease to act. I am convinced that the movers in last week's affair were not actuated entirely by consideration for the good of the council—I suspect that there were other and more personal motives behind it all.

"Advantage was taken of my absence, through illness, to question my standing. I put it to you, their motives were open to doubt. If they had been merely seeking information they could have applied directly to me for it. They should have made inquiries from me before blaring the thing abroad in the press.

"After inquiries had been made of me they could—if not satisfied—have addressed a communication to my local. I reiterate that their objective was not altogether the good of the Labor movement. I heard that they stated that they were 'going to bounce the two of them'—referring to Mr. Dakers and myself.

Mr. Woodward here quoted from a press cutting to that effect, but the allegation was denied by Morgan and others. The President then gave them the name of the man to whom had been attributed the statement, and asked him to explain.

Delegate Waugh then related the statement at the last meeting that

of them."
Delegate Varney claimed that he had at that session pointed out the absence of the president, and had based his statements on the Dakers side of the issue—as he understood that the latter was not working at his trade. Mr. Woodward here resumed his defence.

States His Case.

As his standing had been questioned, he was going to deal with that side of the issue first. He quoted communications from the Retail Clerks Union showing that he was not only a member in good standing, but a very valued member of that organization.

He related his work as a business agent for the Retail Clerks, and denied the allegation that he was only made honorary business agent to get around the constitution. He related his work as editor of the labor paper until it ceased operations, and told how he had often worked nearly every hour in the twenty-four at the labor movement in one capacity and another.

another.

As to his eligibility, he had shown his good standing. Did being a business agent or editor anywhere in the world prevent a labor delegate from holding office? What was there to prevent him or make him ineligible for his position in all that he had stated? "Is Will Crooks debarred from his union because he is a member of the government in England," he asked them. Again was any man out of work to lose the card of his local?

Mr. Woodward here stated that he was now acting as a salesman, and the only union open to him is the Retail Clerks Union, which provided

Retail Clerks Union, which provided for such contingencies.

"I have worked here without salary for the last eighteen months, and only received some twenty dollars expenses during that time. I amentitled to a square deal. Therefore, I ask for the deletion of that clause." The clause referred to was the one under which the charges had been laid against the president.

After considerable discussion the clause was deleted and struck out, with only two discenters.

Delegate Dakers also outlined his standing with the Metal Trades Council.

The president's critics were silent when he concluded his defence, and he resumed the chair, apparently with the full confidence of the Council.

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TAX BYLAW LOST IN THE SHUFFLE?

Aldermen Were Going to Tax Underground Areas, But Matter Has Dragged

The civic authorities set out some months ago to levy a tax on all cellars which extend under the streets and on all openings through the sidewalks into cellars of business houses. But the by-law covering the subject appears to have got lost in the shuffle.

The by-law which, if passed would put this tax into effect, came before the Council for the first time on December 15, 1919. Ie was read a first and second time and was considered by the Council in committee. Then the aldermen were severely criticized by various dealers in the city who were much opposed to the inauguration of the new tax. Whether as a consequence of this or not is not known, but the by-law has never been considered again, although regularly on the agenda paper as "unfinished business."

The by-law would impose an annual tax of five cents per superficial square foot upon the owner of all property which comprised underground areas extending under the streets.

protection for the wapit of the Province, since permits to kill must be
secured. R. H. Pooley raised the
question of the limit on ducks, the
proposed samendment providing for
the elimination of the words "two
hundred and fifty.". Mr. Farris repiled that there was provision in the
game regulations for a bag limit of
150, and that the striking out of this
clause in the statute itself meant
further protection.

NO "STALLING" ALLOWED, WITNESSES ARE WARNED

The first hint so far unearthed by

the Legislative Sugar Investigating Committee that there may be a big secret cache of sugar in- Victoria, came out at yesterday afternoon's probe session when James W. Rogers, manager of Stevenson's, candy manufacturers, testified that during the serious sugar shortage in December "an individual offered me a ton of sugar."

Members of the committee crossexamined him closely to find out who the "individual" was, but Mr. Rogers firmly persisted that he did not know the man. The offer was made to him on the street. While he was talking to a number of men this "individual" came up to him and told him he could let him have a ton of sugar. Mr. Rogers could not remember the names of any of the men with him at the time or anything that would assist in identifying the "individual."

A Sugar Blind Pig?

"Do you know anything about blind pig sugar?" asked J. E. W. Thompson, M. P. P., of Grand Forks. "I suppose it was something like that," replied Mr. Rogers. "This individual said the price was in the neighborhood of seventeen cents a pound."

"He Would be a bootlegger or barrel-roller," suggested M. B. Jackson, K. C., M. P. P., chairman of the committee.

Not Anxious to Tell.

The committee encountered the first reluctance in any witnesses so far to give what information they could, when Hedley Craven, proprietor of the J. D. Matthews Candy Co., a Victoria concern, was sworn. He testified that his firm had used 38,009 pounds of sugar during 1919, all of wholesalers. A shortage of sugar developed in September when his supply was cut to twenty-five per cent.

The Committee asked Mr. Craven
To show how the sugar supply fell

supply was cut to twenty-five per cent.

The Committee asked Mr. Craven what his gross profit on candy was. He replied that he did not know and that it was pretty hard to figure it out.

The question was repeated, but still Mr. Craven could give nanswer.

Admits 50 Per Cent. Profit.

Chairman Jackson then explained that the object of finding out the profit candy men made was to discover the inducement there was to turn sugar from domestic and other uses to the manufacture of candy.

To this Mr. Craven declared that he did not see that his profit on candy had anything to do with the sugar inquiry, and he therefore did not feel himself called upon to answer.

The Chairman then declared that witnesses had nothing to fear from the committee, but the committee was out to get all the facts and probe to the bottom, and would stand for no stalling.

When the name of the Hamsterley Farm was called to inform the committee where that organization gets all its sugar for candy, Jams and other products, no one responded. The chairman declared that such action, after the manager of the Farm admitted over the telephone receiving the summons to attend, and heard if discussed in the office, was a case of contempt of court towards an official Legislative committee. He gave the Farm people another chance to appear Friday afternoon if serious trouble is to be avoided.

Mr. Frampton produced letters from the Federal Brokerage Co. of Seattle offering him South American granulated sugar in lots of from 5-000 to 10,000 bags for delivery in January and the same amount in February. He explained, however, that it was impossible to bring the sugar in because it would have to be sold above the controlled price.

Pay Not to Import Sugar.

Getting Only One-Fifth.

Charles William McAllister, manager of the Royal Dairy, testified that during 1919 his firm used 10,460 pounds of sugar mostly in the manufacturing of 15,000 to 17,000 gallons of ice cream.

Edward Cooper, manager of the Victoria Preserving Co., Ltd., testified that up until August his factory had been receiving sixty tons of sugar a month from the wholesalers. Since then he has been forced to get his supplies direct from the Refinery and had succeeded in getting only 17½ tons.

"We are getting only one-fifth of what we need now," Mr. Cooper said. He stated the sugar shortage was menacing the value of the fruit crop as jams could not be made.
