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## UNITED STATES SUMMARY

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses corered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announce ments as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries ( 1949 edition of the Standard. Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifl cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Censús information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## COMPARISON OF 1954 CENSUS AND MONTHLY SURVEY RESUETS

The 1954 Census figures for total retail sales are within a fraction of one percent of the sales volume for 1954 as previously shown in the Census Bureau's December 1954 Monthly Retail Trade Report based on a probability sample. Several conceptual or definitional differences between the Census and the Monthly Report are involved in the difference in total sales wolume shown by these two sources. Among them are: (1) the inclusion in the Census of certain non-store types of establishments not in the scope of the Monthly Report, (2) the exclusion from the Census of Retail Trade of milk dealers (dairies) which are in the scope of the Monthly Report (data for 1954 milk dealers are included in the Census of Manufactures), and (3) the exclusion from the Census of non-employer establishments with less than $\$ 2,500$ sales during the year whereas the Monthly Report excludes only establishments with less than $\$ 500$ sales during the year.

Differences in sales totals for specific kinds-ofbusiness groups between the 1954 Census and the
factors including (1) the separate classification of non-store establishments in the Census, (2) differences in classification of leased departments, (3) sampling variability inherent in the sampling base of the Monthly Retail Trade Report, and (4) probably some differences in the kind-of-business classifications assigned to certain establishments in the two operations. From time to time additional information on the comparability of the two series will be developed and published.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

However, when these activities were conducted by separate business entities, each entity was treated as an establishment. Thus, a leased department in a department store was treated as a separate establishment and is included in these tabulations on the basis of its activities rather than as a part of the store within which it operates.
Sales
Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retall trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

Payroll, entire year
Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries,
during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with' commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods,
small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbla, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table 4 in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

## ORDER BLANK

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## ALABAMA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classifled in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from, retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classifled in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.
The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishnients (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are-classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classifled by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## ARIZONA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classiffed in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defned in the Standard Industrial Classifcation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classifled in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classiflcation (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classifled on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.
The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in nayroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishnents (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural commanities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classifled as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware; such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts- (1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multionit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics. and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

January 1956

Series: PR-1-4

## ARKANSAS

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).
Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifo cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classiffcation had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but $\begin{aligned} & \text { which had a sales volume under } \$ 500 \text { were eliminated }\end{aligned}$ from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN, FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will cónsist of three parts- (1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

December 1955
Series: PR-1-5

## CALIFORNIA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classifled in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).
Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classift cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data hare been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other $19 \tilde{5} 4$ Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not refiect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."
In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, 'ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, fioor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equip-

 ment DealersThis group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, fiorist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishinents.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

## COLORADO

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.
This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classith cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all bustness firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.
Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other-items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for -Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.
Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15
This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.
"Full workweek" employees
"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishnients (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classiffed as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling chothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmeties, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.
The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishinents.

# PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS 

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable: inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

December 1955

## CONNECTICUT

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classifled in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).
Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classiftcation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows :

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classifled in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classiflcation (for those cases for which BOASI classiflcation had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as deifned above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In ${ }^{\text {previous }}$ censuses, this group included dairies 'which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, fioor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classifled as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equip-

 ment DealersThis group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.
The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classifled by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classifled by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specifled trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE

## DELAWARE AND DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifcation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954 , i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classiflcation (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classitication was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.
In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the differeuce in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classifled on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. (dasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establíshments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."
In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes estallishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts- (1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## November 1955

## FLORIDA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses corered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.
This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).
Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifu. cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954 , i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study heing made to evaluate these differences will he included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not helieved to have materially affected the comparahility of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of estahlishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have heen retabulated on the hasis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be descrihed in suhsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single estahlishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.
The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by estahlishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Estahlishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated husinesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, fioor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assemble's data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## GEORGIA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawail. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.
This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See deflinition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifl cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, 1. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were malled to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were malled to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classifcation (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retall trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." $\mathbf{A}$ separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classifled on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

Sales
Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other sefvices to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Estabiishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay períod, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classiffcation System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales wats by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, filorist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by flling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin_for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for. geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a speciffed trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the $\mathbf{1 9 5 4}$ Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classifled by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

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# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## IDAHO

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classifled in the manufacturing industries. (See deflnition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifl cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1054, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, 1. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 . Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an indivldual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "compantes." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical locatlon at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of mercliandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from invest ments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.
The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by mánufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishnents (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods; apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

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## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## pUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## ILLINOIS

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses corered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifucation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classiflcation had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 eoncepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.
The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and ro ceipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retals trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dut, etc.

Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15
This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

Series: PR-1-14

## INDIANA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.
This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classifled in the manufacturing industries. (See deflnition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as deflned in the Standard Industrial Classift cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classifled in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.
The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with

the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufacturès.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the largef part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

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# PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS 

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

## Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classifled by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This serios assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## January 1956

## IOWA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.
This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).
Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classith cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Busiress figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

Sales
Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.
Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15
This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classifled as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares; hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artiffial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 flgures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## KANSAS

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.
This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifcation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classiflcation (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publicaticns will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."
In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classifled as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

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## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Sübject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

## KENTUCKY

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.
This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).
Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classiflcation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."
In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classifled as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equip-

 ment DealersThis group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS


#### Abstract

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.


## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

## LOUISIANA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classift cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussìon.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classiffeation.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in, the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness ciassifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.
The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

# PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS 

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metro politan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table $\mathbf{B}$ in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## MAINE

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, ''nited States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses corered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 19.54 were also conducted in P'uerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954 , i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classif. cation (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenne Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail tralle, although made up of a large number of establishinents, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948 , retail establishments which onerated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$$ from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations, (See "Retail Kind-of-13usiness Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of mercliandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose prinary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 195̃4. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses wiho devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classifled as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishinents.

# PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS 

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS


#### Abstract

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public, merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.


## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

## MARYLAND

The 1954 Census of Business along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).
Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the ontire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classiffcations, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal tazing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.
The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Estabhishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes. classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larget part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classifled by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

January 1956

## MASSACHUSETTS

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).
Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifl cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

Sales
Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retall trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e.g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.
Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15
This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid empioyees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

'Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classiflcation, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishnients (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that.the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classiffed as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles. for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classifled in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii howing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topies including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classifled by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

## MICHIGAN

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classiffed in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classift cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the, 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classitication was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.
Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishınents" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Wach report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sare of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usuaı trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishinents.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classiffed by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## MINNESOTA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See deflnition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifi. cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948 , retail establishments which operated- the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.
One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establisbments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.
Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers
This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, masic, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

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# PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS 

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts- (1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the nezt page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retall trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classifled by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954. for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business. District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and emaployment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classifled by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment. (Retail, Wholesale, and selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## MISSISSIPPI

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses corered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classift cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954 , i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted,

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classiffed as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" pstablishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale tráde, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

January 1956
Series: PR-1-25

## MISSOURI

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Mannfactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments ruciuded in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classift cation Mamual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954 , i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classifcation (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948 , retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classifed on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesse whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classifled as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builder's' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

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## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## pUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which willuetissined separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classifled by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1,954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

January 1956
Series: PR-1-26

## MONTANA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classifled in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifi cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954 , i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954 , $i$. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows :

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were elininated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.
One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will-be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

Sales
Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deductiou of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not refiect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This.group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

January 1956

## NEBRASKA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classift cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not zet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.
Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15
This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the. 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places; and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classifled as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classifled in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classifled by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## NEVADA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classifled in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).
Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifl cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954 , i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classiffed in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were malled to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classifcation (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classifled on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

Sales
Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classiflcations. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in seling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business nlaces called "garages" but deriving the large part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classifled in one of the major "store" type groups défined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for públic merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, resúlts for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts- (1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## NEW HAMPSHIRE

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classift cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954 , i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

Payroll, entire year
Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishnients (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larser part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware. such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass. electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or 1 roprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise rending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the $\mathbf{1 9 5 4}$ Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services)

## NEW JERSEY

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses corered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.
This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifi cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954 , i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classifled in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classiflcation (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948 , retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 19.54 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

Sales
Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, sucli as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automolile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

# PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS 

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

## NEW MEXICO

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifcation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classiffed in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments." rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classifled on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classiflcation.

Sales
Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Olassification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not refiect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classiffed by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

## NEW YORK

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifl cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classiflcation (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied dlrectly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included ln the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remalning items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retall sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown ln this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for indivldual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each 'report in the Census was tabulated ln accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activlties were carrled on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classifled on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included $\ln$ that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other sepvices to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local. State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service recelpts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., recelved by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll ls reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item conslsts of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provislons of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use ln the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) ls in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS


#### Abstract

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts- (1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.


## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

## NORTH CAROLINA

The 1954 Census of Business along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries was taken under the provisions of Public Law 740-83rd Congress, approved August 31, 1954. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).
Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classif cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Erecutive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during

1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Olassification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.
In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant diifierence in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important diference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items gveraged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected itens and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classifled on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

Sales
Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

Payroll, entire year
Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL, KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishnents (as described below) is in conformance with

the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance. sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum protucts. Business places callerl "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equip-

 ment DealersThis group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, baint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home coustruction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general 1 ublic.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, fiorist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 195 + Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

# PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS 

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts- (1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of lárge metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

## Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## NORTH DAKOTA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.
This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).
Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classiflcation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954 , i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948 , retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ frons those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classifled as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in. this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts- (1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table $\mathbf{B}$ in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## OHIO

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.
This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).
Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classiflcation (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later pullications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussell below.

In 1948 , retail extablishment: which operated the entire year but which hat a sales volume mater \$0, $\$$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 19.54 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishonents with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activitles were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those rcceived from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. ( $a$ asoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturcr or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses wiho devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establisbmients (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builder's' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equibinent and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, or thopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise. warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

## OKLAHOMA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifcation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencles of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classiffcation had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was. by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes. classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## OREGON

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.
In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not beliered to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.
Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)
Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other itens of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total recelpts trom customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowhances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, lowever, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establislments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware. such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general jublic.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishnents primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

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## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERTES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issded as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services)

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## PENNSYLVANIA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See deflinition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classiflcation had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesse, who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishnients (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classiffication System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not refiect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the large part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store". type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

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# PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS 

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multinnit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specifc industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classifled by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

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# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE

## RHODE ISLAND

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification MIanual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifcation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchaudise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.
Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The trearment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."
In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes. classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

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# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE

## SOUTH CAROLINA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses corered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The descriptlon of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classlfication System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classift cation Manual, lssued under the auspices of the Bureau of tbe Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in tbe 1954 Census, includes establishments primarlly engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of buslness operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for thelr employees, establishments operated by agencles of the Federal Government on military posts, bospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, l. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. Tbe metbod oi obtalning Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retall trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were malled to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributlons Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and whicb were classlfied in tbe records of tbe Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partlally engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report for ms were mailed to all establishments whicb BOASI was unable to classify by kind of buslness prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classiflcation (for those cases for which BOASI classiflcation had not yet been establisbed, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classitication was determined by replles to questlons on tbe Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retall businesses other than those represented in the actlve FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of tbe total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the ontire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.
One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.
Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15 .

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Olassification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not refiect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classiffcations are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classiffed as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural commanities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Ceasus purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.
The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

## SOUTH DAKOTA

The 1954 Census of Buslness, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included $\ln$ retail trade in accordance wlth the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined ln the Standard Industrial Classiftcation Manual, lssued under the ausplces of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarlly engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for thelr employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census informatlon for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in thls part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were malled to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (l. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retall, wholesale, manufacturlng, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by klnd of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classiflcation (for those cases for whlch BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classitication was determined by replles to questlons on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the actlve FICA records of the Internal Revenue Servlce. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Informatlen was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retall trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study' being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishnients (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not refiect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includ as retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified. separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, fioor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

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## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classifled by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

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# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## TENNESSEE

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classifled in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).
Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifcation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classitication was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retall establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline'service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

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## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15; 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

## TEXAS

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.
This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classifled in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).
Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifl cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954 , i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of salos and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) pald during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the istandard Industrial Olassification Manual, as amended by che Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retall establishnients (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liauors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classiffed as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, resuits for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specifled trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

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# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## UTAH

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactured for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.
This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed shorld be classiffed in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classiflcation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade fleld was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classifled in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census resuits for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948 , retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ \overline{5} 00$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.
Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period eaded nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail" establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not refiect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies; roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, fiorist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

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## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

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## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## January 1956

## VERMONT

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.
This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).
Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classift cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954 , i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classiflcation (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.
In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.
The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it dces not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not refiect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will de issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade :

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

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## VIRGINIA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Buslness and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifl cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954 , i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classifled in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classifcation (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Servlce. Information for this group of establishments was furnlshed by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establlshments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND. 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.
In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retall trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a signifficant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retall Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted,

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to incluce total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.
The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service recelpts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Frull workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OP-BUSINESS CLASSIPICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this'group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, bailding materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and,glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance or' the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volnmes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

## WASHINGTON

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.
This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifi cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classifled in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BȮASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.
The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.
Payroll—workweek ended nearest Novemuer 15
This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.
"Full workweek" employees
"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businésses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."
In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classifled as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, fioor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.
The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

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## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## pUblication of rinal census results

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered $\eta$ a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as .etail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

November 1955

## WEST VIRGINIA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.
This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufaeturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classifled in the manufacturing industries. (See deflnition of Food Stores below).
Retail trade, as deflned in the Standard Industrial Classift cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classiflcation had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.
In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ \tilde{0} 00$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.
Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include recefpts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not refiect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954. Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two-service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

## WISCONSIN

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifl cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups 70, 72, 73, 75, 76, 78, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.
In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail. Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Olassification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classitication System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the largep part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

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## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table $\mathbf{B}$ in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## WYOMING

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, ['nited States Code, section 131. These 19: 4 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).

Retail trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifio cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954 , i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forins. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classitication was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant differelice in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.
One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Busimess Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with C'ensus Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defineu to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. (iasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll-workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were rejorted as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishmeuts (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes. classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

## PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts-(1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the rolumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for eack trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

## ALASKA

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classiffcation System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classified in the manufacturing industries. (See definition of Food Stores below).
Retall trade, as defined in the Standard Industrial Classifl cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Ezecutive Offce of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in seliing merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1054 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade fleld was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classified in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to ali establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classiffcation (for those cases for which BOASI classification had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classification was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.
In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.
Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality a re suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retail trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.
Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15
Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the spacified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used auto mobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census durposes. classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.

The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

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# PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS 

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts- (1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Bùsiness or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classifled by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).

# 1954 Census of Business RETAIL TRADE 

March 1956
Series: PR-1-52

## HAWAII

The 1954 Census of Business, along with the 1954 Censuses of Manufactures and Mineral Industries, was authorized by law under Title 13, United States Code, section 131. These 1954 Censuses covered businesses operated in the continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. . Separate Censuses of Business and Manufactures for 1954 were also conducted in Puerto Rico.

This report provides preliminary findings for that portion of the 1954 Census of Business which relates to retail trade. The preliminary figures are subject to revision in subsequent publications of the 1954 Census of Business. The description of these publications and forms for requesting announcements as well as ordering copies of the various preliminary reports are provided at the end of this report.

## KINDS OF RETAIL BUSINESS COVERED

This report covers all establishments included in retail trade in accordance with the principles of the Standard Industrial Classification System, as published in Volume II, Nonmanufacturing Industries (1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual), with the exception of milk dealers, which the Bureau of the Budget has agreed should be classifled in the manufacturing industries. (See deflnition of Food Steres below).

Retail trade, as deflned in the Standard Industrial Classift cation Manual, issued under the auspices of the Bureau of the Budget, Executive Office of the President, and as covered in the 1954 Census, includes establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise directly to personal, household, and farm users. Excluded from retail trade are places of business operated by institutions and open only to their own members or personnel, such as restaurants and bars operated by country clubs, school cafeterias, cafeterias operated by industrial plants for their employees, establishments operated by agencies of the Federal Government on military posts, hospitals, etc.

## METHOD OF ENUMERATION

For purposes of coverage in the 1954 Census of Business, retail establishments were divided into two categories-
those with any paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "employer" universe, and those with no paid employment during 1954, i. e., the "non-employer" universe. The method of obtaining Census information for these two groups was as follows:

## Enumeration of "Employers"

Information for establishments in this part of the retail trade field was obtained by means of a mail canvass. Report forms were mailed to all business firms included in the active records of the Internal Revenue Service as subject to payment of Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxes (i. e., employers of one or more persons) and which were classifled in the records of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance (BOASI) as wholly or partially engaged in retail, wholesale, manufacturing, mineral industries, and in major groups $70,72,73,75,76,78$, and 79 of the service portion of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual. In addition, report forms were mailed to all establishments which BOASI was unable to classify by kind of business prior to mailing of Census report forms. Each establishment was mailed a report form appropriate to its BOASI classification (for those cases for which BOASI classiflcation had not yet been established, a general purpose form was used) but its Census classiflcation was determined by replies to questions on the Census report form.

## Enumeration of "Non-Employers"

This group was defined to include retail businesses other than those represented in the active FICA records of the Internal Revenue Service. Information for this group of establishments was furnished by the Internal Revenue Service and was derived from the 1954 tax returns. Information was compiled from only one-half of these cases and Census results for this group were established by multiplying such findings by two. The "non-employer" segment of retail trade, although made up of a large number of establishments, accounted for less than ten percent of the total retail trade volume.

## COMPARISON OF 1948 AND 1954 CENSUSES

The two Censuses differed in certain respects, thereby affecting to some extent comparability of data. The results of a study being made to evaluate these differences will be included in later publications of the 1954 Census. The more important differences are discussed below.

In 1948, retail establishments which operated the entire year but which had a sales volume under $\$ 500$ were eliminated from the statistics of the Census. In the 1954 Census, any retail establishment without paid employment and which reported a sales volume of less than $\$ 2,500$ was eliminated regardless of whether or not it operated the entire year. Because establishments of this size account for only an insignificant part of the retail trade volume, the difference in cut-off is not believed to have materially affected the comparability of sales of the two Censuses. However, there may have been a significant difference in the count of establishments, as in the 1948 Census it is estimated that there were about 100,000 establishments with less than this sales volume. The difference in size cut-off between the two Censuses is complicated by the change in price levels which occurred in this period.

One other important difference in the two Censuses is in the treatment of sales and excise taxes levied directly on the consumer. In the 1948 Census of Business such taxes were not included in the total sales and receipts of retail establishments, but they were included in the 1954 Census. The effect of this change, however, is believed to be small as most State sales taxes exempted sales of food, and for remaining items averaged about two percent; the Federal excise taxes, while a higher percentage, were limited to selected items and did not constitute an appreciable fraction of total retail sales.

Because of conceptual changes in some classifications, the 1948 Retail Trade data have been retabulated on the basis of the 1954 concepts. As a result, the 1948 data shown in this and other 1954 Census of Business publications will differ from those in the previously published 1948 Census tabulations. (See "Retail Kind-of-Business Classification," for a more detailed discussion.)

Other differences will be described in subsequent Census publications.

## CENSUS DISCLOSURE RULES

In accordance with Census Law any data which would disclose the operations of an individual establishment or business organization are not published. The number of establishments in a kind of business is not considered a disclosure by these rules, so that this item is shown in instances where other items of information for the same kind of business or locality are suppressed.

## EXPLANATION OF TERMS

## Establishments

Census of Business figures represent a summary of reports for individual "establishments" rather than "companies." A separate report was obtained for each location where business was conducted, including each location of multiunit organizations. Each report in the Census was tabulated in accordance with the physical location at which the business was conducted.

Where two or more activities were carried on at a single establishment, the entire establishment was classified on the basis of its major activity and all data for it included in that classification.

## Sales

Sales are defined to include total receipts from customers during 1954, after deduction of refunds or allowances for merchandise returned by customers. Sales include receipts from repairs and from other services to customers, as well as the sale of merchandise, but exclude amounts other than those received from customers, such as income from investments, rental of real estate, etc. They include the amount of local and State sales taxes or Federal excise taxes which are collected by the store directly from customers, and paid directly by the store to a local, State, or Federal taxing agency. Gasoline, liquor, tobacco, and other excise taxes which are paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler and passed along to the retailer also are included.

The sales figures, therefore, represent total sales and receipts of all establishments primarily engaged in retall trade. They do not include retail sales made by manufacturers, wholesalers, service establishments, and other businesses whose primary activity is other than retail trade. They do, however, include receipts other than from the sale of merchandise at retail (e. g., service receipts, sales to industrial users, sales to other retailers, etc.) by establishments primarily engaged in retail trade.

## Payroll, entire year

Payroll includes all forms of compensation (salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, and payments in kind) paid during the year to all employees. For corporations, it includes amounts paid to officers and executives; it does not include compensation of proprietors or of partners of unincorporated businesses. Included in payroll are the value of payments in kind, such as free meals, lodgings, etc., received by employees from their employers but not amounts received by employees as tips, etc. Payroll is reported before deductions for Social Security, income tax, insurance dues, etc.

## Payroll—workweek ended nearest November 15

This item consists of payroll, as defined above, which was paid to persons on the payroll in the pay period ended nearest November 15, 1954. Establishments whose payroll period was other than a week were requested to adjust the figures to a weekly basis.

## Paid employees-workweek ended nearest November 15

Paid employees consist of the number of employees, including salaried officers and executives of corporations, who were on the payroll for the workweek ended nearest November 15.

## "Full workweek" employees

"Full workweek" employees includes employees, whether regular or seasonal who, for the specified pay period, were paid for working at least the number of hours typically worked in a week by employees of the reporting establishment. All other employees paid during that workweek were reported as part-workweek employees.

## Proprietors of unincorporated businesses

Includes owners or partners of unincorporated businesses who devoted the major portion of their time to the operation of the business.

## RETAIL KIND-OF-BUSINESS CLASSIFICATION

Each retail establishment was assigned a kind-of-business classification, in accordance with the provisions of the 1949 edition of the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, as amended by the Bureau of the Budget for use in the 1954 Census of Business. The treatment of "non-store" retail establishments (as described below) is in conformance with
the amended Standard Industrial Classification System. It should be noted that the latest (1949) published edition of the manual does not reflect this change. Note that kind-ofbusiness classifications are not interchangeable with commodity classifications. Food stores, for instance, sell commodities other than food, while food is sold in other kinds of stores than food stores.

## Food Stores

The food group includes retail establishments primarily engaged in selling food for home preparation and consumption. Establishments primarily engaged in selling prepared food and drinks for consumption on their own premises are classified as eating and drinking places, and stores primarily engaged in selling packaged beers and liquors are classified separately as "Liquor Stores."

In previous censuses, this group included dairies which processed and bottled milk and cream if the major portion of their sales was by route delivery to the homes of consumers. Such establishments are now included in the Census of Manufactures.

## Eating, Drinking Places

Eating places are establishments selling prepared foods and drinks for consumption on their own premises. Establishments primarily engaged in selling drinks such as beer, ale, wine, or other alcoholic beverages for consumption on their own premises are classified as drinking places.

## General Merchandise Group

This group includes stores usually selling a combination of two or more of the following merchandise lines: Dry goods, apparel and accessories, furniture and home furnishings, small wares, hardware, and food. Among the kinds of business included in this group are those commonly known as department stores, variety ( $5-10$, etc.) stores, and general stores. The general stores are usually located in rural communities and sell a general line of merchandise of which food is usually the most important line.

## Apparel, Accessories Stores

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling clothing, shoes, hats, underwear, and related articles for personal wear and adornment.

## Furniture, Home Furnishings, Appliance Dealers

This group includes stores primarily engaged in selling goods used for furnishing the home, such as furniture, floor coverings, draperies, glass and chinaware, domestic stoves, refrigerators, and other household electrical and gas appliances, including radio and TV sets.

## Automotive Group

This group includes dealers selling new and used automobiles, new parts and accessories, aircraft, motorboats, motorcyles, and automobile trailers. Establishments primarily selling trucks and motorized industrial equipment are, for Census purposes, classified as wholesale establishments.

## Gasoline Service Stations

Gasoline service stations include establishments primarily engaged in selling gasoline and other automotive petroleum products. Business places called "garages" but deriving the larger part of receipts from gasoline and oil sales are included. Gasoline service stations also sell tires and tubes, other automobile accessories, and sometimes lunches, candy, tobacco, and groceries.

## Lumber, Building Materials, Hardware, Farm Equipment Dealers

This group includes establishments selling lumber, building materials, and basic lines of hardware, such as tools, builders' hardware, paint and glass, electrical supplies, roofing materials, and other equipment and supplies for home construction. The group also includes farm equipment dealers. Establishments in this group sell to contractors as well as to the general public.

## Drug Stores, Proprietary Stores

These stores are classified on the basis of their usual trade designation rather than the merchandise lines handled. They sell prescriptions, drugs, or proprietary medicines in combination with lines such as cosmetics, toiletries, tobacco, magazines and books, and novelty merchandise.

## Other Retail Stores

This group consists of establishments primarily engaged in selling, at retail, specialized lines of merchandise such as jewelry, liquor, feed, farm and garden supplies, books, sporting goods, gifts, novelties, souvenirs, music, cameras, photographic supplies, orthopedic supplies and artificial limbs, pets, hobby equipment, toys, religious goods, and monuments and tombstones. Greenhouses and nurseries are not within scope of the Census, however, florist shops are included.

## Nonstore Retailers

In the 1954 Census, for the first time, the "nonstore" type of retail establishment has been classified on the basis of its method of selling and isolated from the "store" type. Nonstore retail establishments, like the "store" type of establishment, are primarily engaged in the selling of merchandise to personal, household, or farm users. However, the "nonstore" type is distinguished by the fact that the customer does not make his purchases at the establishment site. Instead, the purchase is made at the customer's home, at the site of another business establishment, or by mail order.
The three types of retail establishments in which customer purchases are made in this manner are door-to-door distributors, operators of merchandise vending machines, and mail-order houses. In the 1948 and prior Censuses, these establishments were classified in one of the major "store" type groups defined above, on the basis of commodities handled. The 1948 figures shown in this report have been revised to make them comparable with the 1954 figures with respect to the "nonstore" establishments.

# PUBLICATION PLAN FOR THE 1954 CENSUS OF BUSINESS 

## PUBLICATION OF FINAL CENSUS RESULTS

The 1954 Census of Business consists of three major trade segments-retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades. The final results of the 1954 Census are to be released in the form of separate bulletin series for each of these trade segments; a separate bulletin will be prepared for public merchandise warehouses. The above bulletin series do not cover Puerto Rico, results for which will be issued separately.

The 1954 Business Census bulletin series for retail trade, wholesale trade, and selected service trades will consist of three parts- (1) Area Bulletins, (2) Subject Bulletins, and (3) Trade Bulletins. Another series of bulletins relating to the Central Business Districts of large metropolitan centers will also be issued.

Subsequent to the issuance of final bulletins, findings of the 1954 Census will be consolidated and issued as Census volumes. Announcements concerning the bulletin series and the volumes may be obtained by filling out the form on the next page.

## THE RETAIL TRADE BULLETIN SERIES

Following are brief descriptions of the bulletin series for retail trade:

## Area Bulletins

A separate bulletin for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii showing data classified by kind of business of the establishments, on number of establishments, sales for the year, payroll for the year, payroll and number of employees for the payroll period nearest November 15, 1954, for total and for full workweek employees, and number of proprietors. These data are provided for the State, for each standard metropolitan area, for each large county, and for each large city; in addition, data for less detailed kind-of-business groupings (such as shown in Table B in this preliminary release) are shown for each city and town of 2,500 or more inhabitants.

## Subject Bulletins

This series provides data on a variety of topics including credit sales and accounts receivable; inventories; legal form of organization; single and multiunit organizations; and also basic Census data classified by sales-size of establishment, employment-size of establishment, and the city-size of the place in which the establishment is located. The data in the subject series are shown for the United States as a whole and frequently for geographic divisions, standard metropolitan areas, and States.

## Trade Bulletins

This series assembles data for a particular trade or group of related trades. The data for the most part are assembled from the Area and Subject Bulletins. The trades covered in a specified trade bulletin are not limited to those in a specific industry division such as Retail Trade but may include trades in any of the industry divisions covered by the 1954 Census of Business or the 1954 Census of Manufactures.

## Central Business District Bulletins

Basic Census data-number of establishments, sales, payroll and employment-will be summarized for the Central Business District of each of a number of large metropolitan centers. The bulletins will show these data, classified by kinds of business, for the Central Business District, the central city, the central city exclusive of the Central Business District, the standard metropolitan area, and the standard metropolitan area exclusive of the Central Business District. Although these bulletins are designed primarily to present information for retail kinds of business, they will also include data for two service busi-nesses-hotels and motion picture theatres.

## CENSUS VOLUMES

Following the issuance of the final Census Area and Subject Bulletins, these bulletins will be combined and issued as 1954 Census volumes. Separate volumes for area statistics and for subject statistics will be issued for each trade segment (Retail, Wholesale, and Selected Services).
