My dear Mr. Secretary

Reference is made to War Department's Cable No. 99134 of February 1, 1950 to SCAP with regard to making available to the Maritime Commission the services of George Richard Lunn, GS-13 DAC and subsequent conversations between representatives of the Maritime Commission and the office of the Under Secretary of the Army. Upon receipt of the above mentioned cable SCAP advised Mr. Burger, Maritime Commission representative in Japan, that he was agreeable to the transfer of Mr. Lunn to the Maritime Commission. However, this course of action was considered undesirable in view of Mr. Lunn's permanent Civil Service classification involving questions of terminal leave, the retention of his services by the Maritime Commission and the question of transportation of Mr. Lunn, his family and effects subsequent to the termination of his services in Japan.

Accordingly, Mr. Burger presented an official request by letter to SCAP requesting reconsideration of his decision and permission to retain the services of Mr. Lunn on a reimbursable basis. Mr. Burger now advises us that this request has been approved but that SCAP desires confirmation from the Maritime Commission.

The purpose of this letter is to advise the Department of the Army that the Maritime Commission desires to have Mr. Lunn's services made available to it on a reimbursable detail from the Army for the period of time necessary as determined by the Maritime Commission to wind up legal affairs in connection with libel proceedings on certain Chinese vessels now in the ports of Japan. The Maritime Commission undertakes to reimburse the Department of the Army with respect to Mr. Lunn's present pay and allowances for the period during which he is on detail to the Commission.

Pursuant to SCAP's request to our Mr. Burger it would be appreciated if you would cable SCAP in regard to this request and understanding.

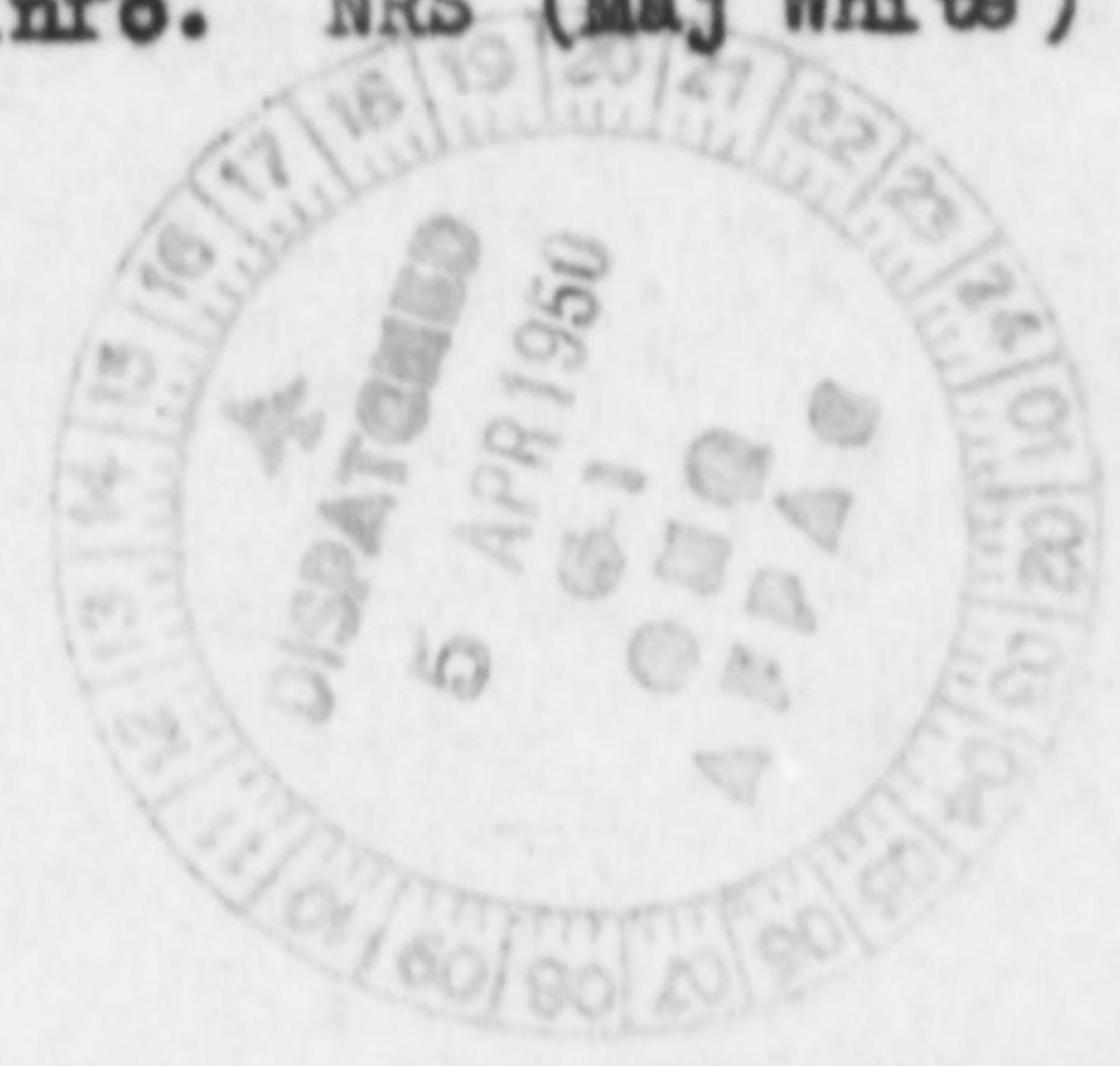

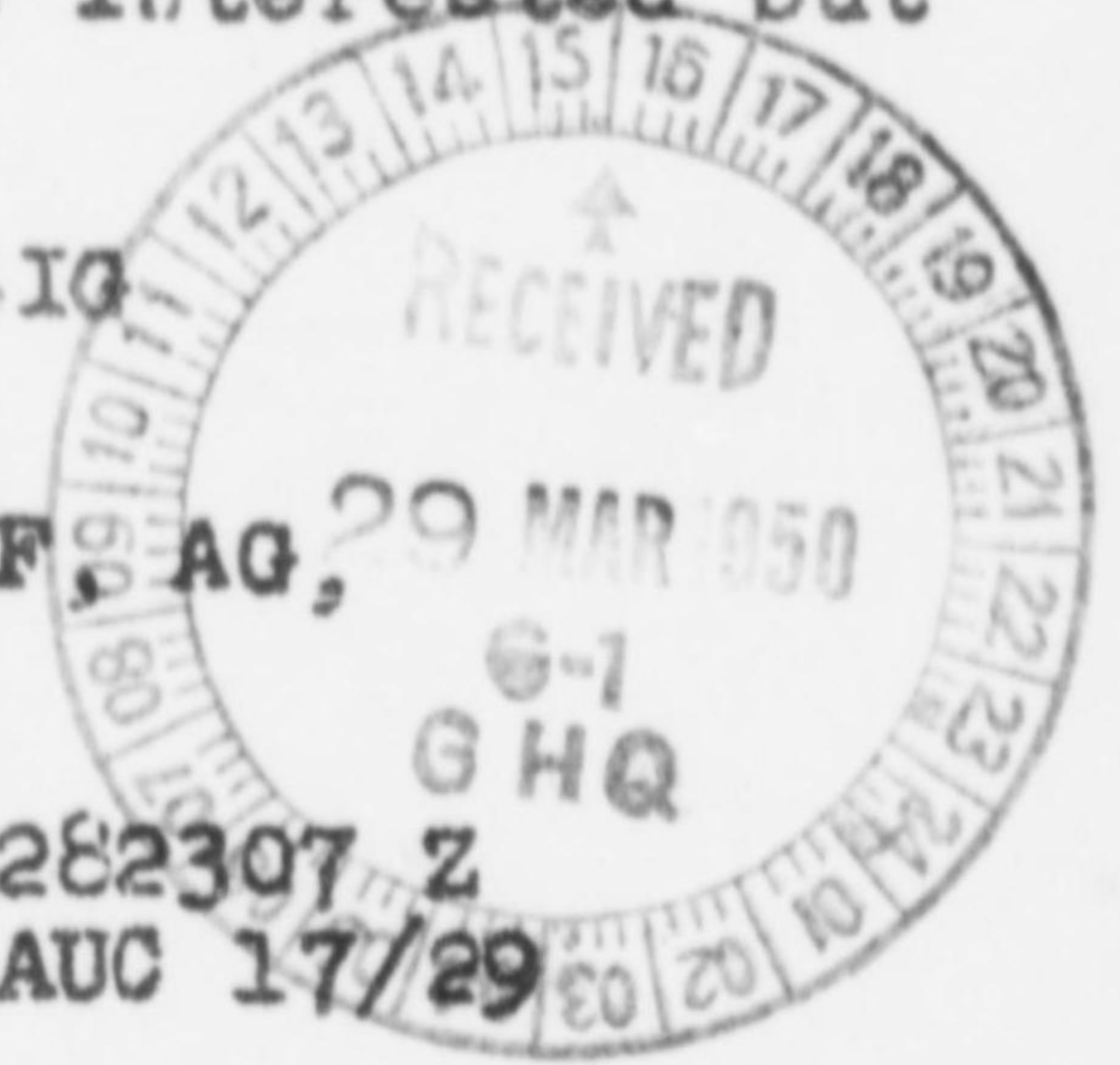

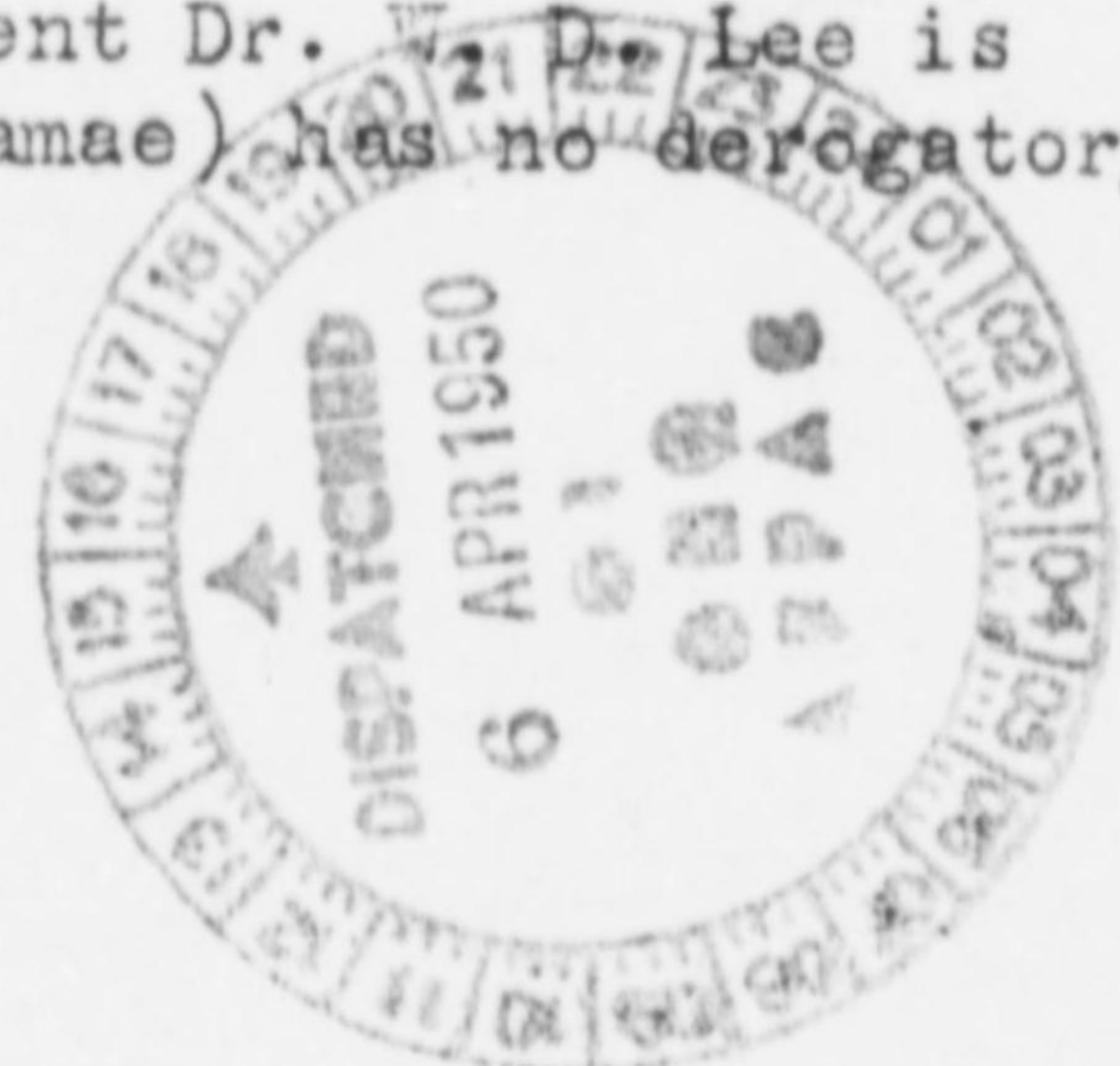

a. Dr Bennett is recognized as an outstanding international authority on soil conservation because of his accomplishments as Chief of Soil Conservation Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The alternate does not have national or international prestige, professional standing, or record of accomplishments comparable with Dr Bennett. Success of the Soil Conservation project is considered by NR to be dependent, to large extent, on the prestige and reputation of the visiting expert concerned. Since Dr Bennett cannot come to Japan, NR desires to cancel this project and establish a project for a high level agricultural leader concerned with broad programs in the United States.

b. Mr Knox T. Hutchinson, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture, is an outstanding national figure who has broad training and technical experience in agriculture. He has been delegated primary responsibility in the United States Department of Agriculture for coordination of and leadership in the Soil Conservation program, Production Marketing Administration, Agricultural Research Administration, Personnel Administration, Commodity Credit Corporation, Rural Electrification Administration, and several other major programs. Mr Hutchinson exerts an important influence in the executive and legislative branches of the U. S. Government. NR believes that his first hand observations of Japan's agricultural problems and accomplishments under the Occupation will aid significantly in the development of a more favorable attitude in the U. S. Government toward the Occupation budget and agricultural programs in Japan. Further, his review of the various programs and his consultations with Japanese leaders and occupation officials responsible for developing and implementing agricultural programs should prove of great value in the continued progress of agricultural operations in Japan. 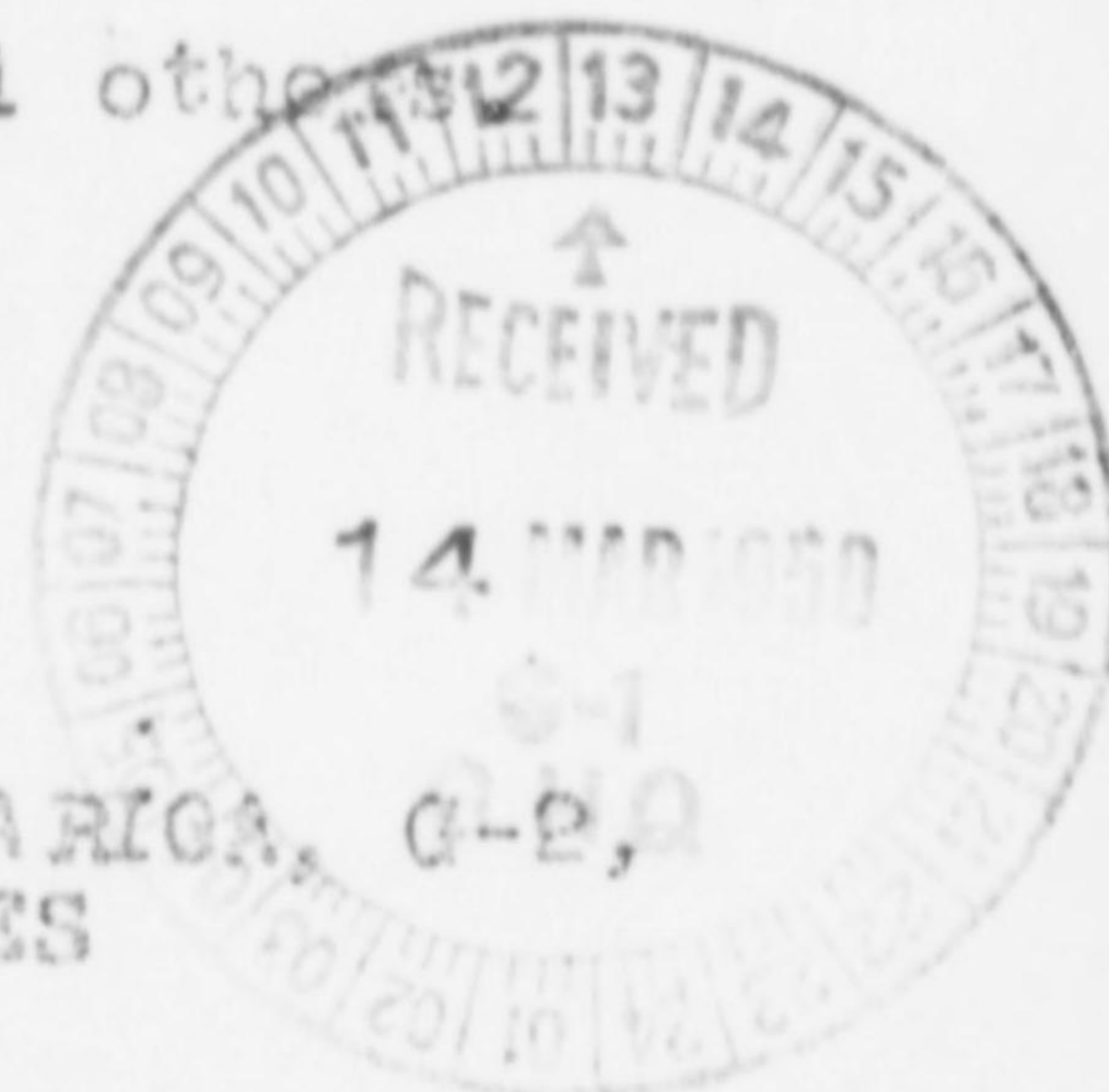

1. Reference is made to:

a. Check sheet from NR to G-1, NR 230.31 (13 Dec 49)AD, subj: Visiting Expert Program for FY 1950, 13 December 1949, inclosing NR list of experts and consultants for FY 1950.

b. The following item is extracted from NR list of experts and consultants for FY 1950, inclosed to check sheet par 1a above: "Priority 7; Agriculture Division of NR; Personnel Requested, Plant Pathologist (Dr J. J. Christensen, Division of Botany and Plant Pathology, College of Agriculture, University of Minnesota, St Paul, Minnesota); length of term required 2 or 3 months; Estimated salary \$4,500;....."

2. Efforts to add a plant pathologist to the regular NR staff have been successful since the visiting expert pathologist project was submitted, ref par 1b above. The new staff member will arrive in Japan approximately 20 Feb 1950. Assured service from this regular staff member has altered significantly the former indispensable nature of the project for a visiting expert plant pathologist.

3. Lt Col Arthur W. Hodges is in charge of the Visiting Expert Program, Office of the Undersecretary, DA. Mr T. E. Ritchie, Deputy Chief, Agriculture Division, NR was on TDY to Washington during December 1949 and part of January 1950. Lt Col Hodges informed Mr Ritchie on 22 December 1949 that recruitment of the visiting expert plant pathologist had not advanced to a stage that would preclude cancellation, and that a firm stage of negotiation for the project was not expected for several weeks.

4. The soil scientist employed to complete the classification of the soils of Japan unexpectedly resigned effective 15 March 1950 to accept employment in the Ryukyus. The loss of this employee leaves an important unit of work uncompleted but in a semi-final stage nearing completion. NR considers that the remaining part of this project can be finished by a visiting expert consultant in about 90 days without recruiting another soil scientist as a regular staff member.

5. As part of the program to provide technical assistance to Japanese agriculture, the comprehensive classification of the soils of Japan was started in December 1945. The classification is essential for planning broad land-use policies, maximizing agricultural production and expediting the land development program. Land classification is a basic element of technical assistance programs in agriculture now in operation, or planned, for other countries of the world by the United Nations Organization, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations and the United States Government.

6. More than eight man years of highly trained technical American personnel have been used in making the soils classification of Japan. Since 30 April 1949 only one soil scientist has been assigned to NR, and the unit of work was scheduled for completion by 30 June 1950. With the resignation of this employee arrangements must be made to complete this valuable unit of work and to prevent loss of the investment to date.

7. Soil classification is a highly specialized technical matter. Competent agricultural scientists other than soil specialists are unable to do soil classification work. Consequently, the present project cannot be completed by temporary transfer of NR personnel from other duties.

8. One of the several soils specialists who worked previously on the problem in Japan could complete the work with a maximum degree of efficiency. Two highly qualified individuals from the group are:

a. Dr W. S. Ligon, Regional Soil Scientist, BPISAE, USDA, New Sprankle Building, Knoxville, Tennessee.

b. Dr W. D. Lee, Professor of Soil Science, College of Agriculture, University of North Carolina, Raleigh, North Carolina.

7. NR requests that a message or messages be dispatched to DA requesting that:

a. Recruitment be cancelled for the visiting expert plant pathologist if the current status of recruitment will permit cancellation.

b. GHQ, FEC, be advised whether or not cancellation was accomplished.

c. If cancellation is feasible, substitute for the cancelled project a new project, visiting expert soil scientist, and recruit, in the order named, Dr W. S. Ligon, or Dr W. D. Lee.

1 1. In accordance with your oral instruction to me on 15 December 1949, I am submitting herewith a proposed letter from General MacArthur to the Under Secretary of the Army (Incl 1).

2. The letter sets forth the subordinate position in the Japanese economy occupied by farmers prior to and during World War II. It details the abuses to which the great majority of this group were subjected. The letter calls attention to the policies and programs initiated under the direction of the Supreme Commander to eliminate these abuses, but points out the serious and urgent agricultural problems that remain to be solved if the welfare of the farm population, fundamental to the development of a peaceful democracy and the basic interests of the Occupation, is to be secured.

3. The letter requests an Agricultural Policy Mission to visit Japan at the earliest possible date to study the agricultural problems outlined above and make detailed recommendations to the Supreme Commander. The group would consist of approximately six persons and be of stature similar to the Dodge and Shoup missions, with the leader being appointed by the President of the United States.

4. The ideas, conclusions and recommendations contained in the proposed letter have been discussed in detail with Mr. W. I. Ladejinsky, U. S. Department of Agriculture, who in turn has discussed them with General Fox, you and with General MacArthur. As you know, General MacArthur has requested Mr. Ladejinsky to assist in the solution of these problems. Mr. Ladejinsky believes that our approach to the problem through the selection of an outstanding mission charged with the formulation of a comprehensive long range agricultural policy for Japan is the one most likely to achieve its objective. Mr. Ladejinsky is anxious to assist in the organization of such a mission in the United States and feels that General MacArthur's interests would be served best by the designation of a senior agricultural economist from the academic field as chairman of the mission, following the highly successful pattern established by the Shoup mission.

5. Recommend that the attached letter (Incl 1) be signed by General MacArthur and dispatched to the Under Secretary of the Army.

Dear Mr. Voorhees:

As you know, Japanese agriculture has been one of my primary concerns during the past four years. This emphasis has been in recognition of the importance of agriculture to a country short in natural resources and subjected to intense population pressures, and where one half of the people depend on farming for a livelihood. The essential orientation of my policy in respect to agriculture has been toward reforms deriving from the basic authority contained in the Potsdam Declaration, combined with emergency measures to curb inflation and meet the food crisis. In my efforts to find a solution for Japan's difficult land tenure problem, as well as for some of the farm problems which arose from wartime and postwar dislocations, I have achieved substantial gains. Not only has the economic and social position of the great majority of the Japanese farmers shown a marked improvement, but also in the process the Communist influence in rural Japan has been virtually eliminated. It is fair to say, therefore, that I have provided and successfully tested a pattern that could very well apply to most of the poverty-stricken and restless peasant countries in southeast Asia, where the task of containing Communism is urgent.

Despite these achievements, a number of serious and urgent agricultural problems remain to be dealt with by the Japanese Government

if the farmers are to weather the present dangerous economic trends, and become a middle of the road, politically sound, stabilizing influence in Japan's economy.

Prior to and during World War II Japanese farmers occupied a subordinate position in the country's economic and social hierarchy. The majority were subjected to numerous abuses, including an inequitable land tenancy system, exorbitant rents, high taxes and usurious interest rates. These abuses, together with domination of agriculture by bureaucratic and commercial and industrial interests, multiplied the difficulties of Japanese farmers in attaining a level of economic security comparable to that enjoyed by the remainder of the population. Unlike the farm economy in the United States, Japanese agriculture did not provide an important market for industrial products. Its welfare was secondary to that of other segments of the economy. Despite increased industrial activity and vast expansion of foreign trade prior to 1940, those who earned their livelihood from the land did not share to any substantial degree in the improved standard of living that resulted from the higher national income.

My agricultural policies have been directed toward the elimination of these ancient wrongs. I laid out the broad objectives of a long range agricultural program at the beginning of the Occupation in a memorandum to the Japanese Government, in December 1945, on agricultural reform. Some of the objectives presented there have been in large part realized. Farm tenancy has been materially reduced and newly established owner cultivators have been freed from heavy rent burdens.

Nearly 90 percent of the farmers in Japan today own the land they cultivate. Government dominated agricultural associations have been dissolved and in their place are new agricultural cooperative associations founded on internationally recognized cooperative principles. Government crop collections have been placed on a more representative basis with farmers participating in quota allocations through elected committees. The compulsory government crop insurance system has been revised. Action on other objectives, however, including access to long and short term farm credit at reasonable interest rates and stabilization of the prices of agricultural products, has been deferred pending the achievement of greater equilibrium in the country's economy.

Now the agricultural situation is changing rapidly. Inflation is levelling off. Food supplies have increased sharply, aided by imports and unusually good crop years. Price and distribution controls on vegetables already have been removed. Further relaxation of food controls may be expected as the supply situation improves with the recovery of the agricultural economy in southeast Asia. These measures, while beneficial to the nation's economy as a whole, pose serious policy problems in the fields of agricultural production, prices and marketing. The adverse effect of food imports on farm prices is assuming increasing importance. Farmers are finding it more difficult to obtain the funds necessary for production operations. The transition from rigid controls to a free market situation is bringing to the fore fundamental difficulties affecting all segments of agriculture.

Now that the nation as a whole has achieved a fair amount of economic stability, the time has come for the development of an integrated,

long range policy on agriculture. This policy should be the result of careful study of all pertinent factors, including agricultural production, controls, marketing, prices, imports, credit, taxes, insurance, land use, and organization and management. The matter is so important and complex as to require the highest degree of technical skill and experience. In this connection the Japanese Government needs and would appreciate American assistance. I would like, therefore, to invite to Japan a mission of outstanding United States agricultural economists to study the problems outlined above and make detailed recommendations to me for a long range coordinated agricultural program, just as has been done so well in the field of finance by Mr. Dodge and in the field of taxation by Dr. Shoup.

I would welcome the arrival of the group at an early date, but in no event should it be delayed beyond 1 July 1950. The summer months might be most practicable because of the probable connection of at least a part of the staff with college faculties. The mission should consist of about six persons headed by a man of outstanding experience and reputation in the field of farm economics. I have in mind such a person as Dr. Edwin G. Nourse, Vice President, Brookings Institute; Dr. W. I. Myers, Dean of the College of Agriculture, Cornell University; Dr. John D. Black, Professor of Agricultural Economics at Harvard University; or Dr. Theodore W. Schultz, Chairman of the Department of Economics, University of Chicago - men whose reputation and prestige would assure maximum utilization by the Japanese Government of the recommendations submitted. I suggest that the leader of the group

be appointed by the President of the United States. Serving with him should be specialists in agricultural marketing, prices, credit, and land use. Because of his broad background and experience in Japanese agricultural problems, I would like specifically for Mr. W. I. Lad-jinsky of the United States Department of Agriculture to be one of those selected. The head of the mission should have the widest latitude in selection of other specialists for the group.

The welfare of Japan's farm population is fundamental to the full development of a peaceful democracy, and therefore to the basic interests of the Occupation. That welfare is not fully secure at present. It may be secured if a positive, long range program is worked out and carried through.

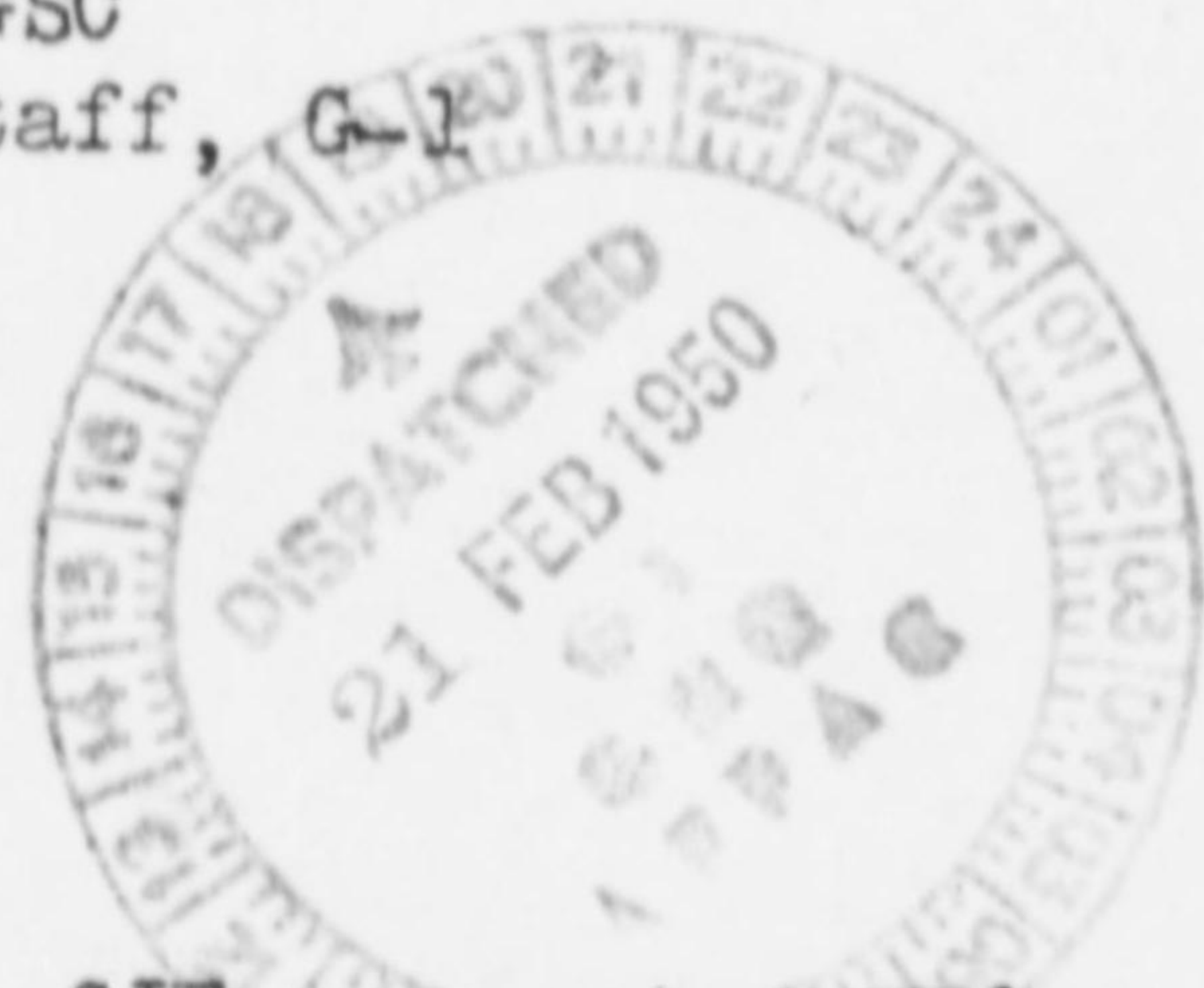

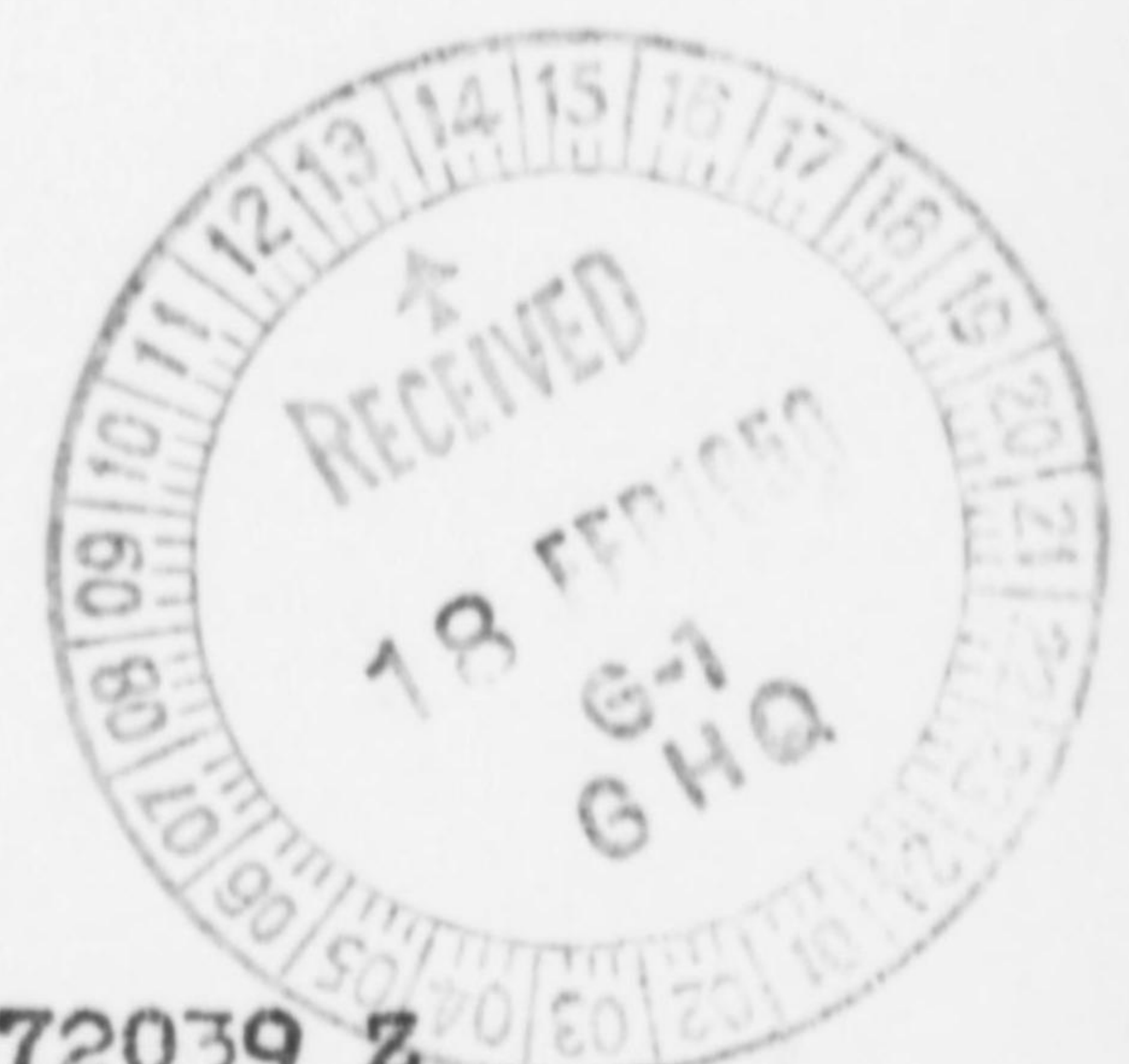
