If the court finds for acquittal the finding is at once announced in open court, and "Guilty" is not announced, but may always be presumed from the fact that the prisoner will again be brought before the court to make any statement he may desire in mitigation of punishment, and to have evidence as to character taken. The reason for this seeming anomaly is that while the proceedings in the case of an acquittal require no confirmation, the verdict and sentence of the court, when an offender has been found guilty, are not valid until they have been confirmed by properly constituted authority.

The opinions of the junior members of the court are the first taken. This, of course, is to prevent any nadue exercise of authority by the president or senior members. At the same time the president may request an officer to reconsider an obviously absurd or illegal sentence, though he has no absolute power to make a member after his vote once it has been given.

Courts-martial are rarely called upon to give judgment upon intricate legal oncetions. As a rule the evidence is simple and conclusive, and acquittals are the exception, not the rule; but it must not be supposed that this implies that the prisoner does not have a fair trial. On the contrary, he does, and in many cases a fairer one than in a civilian court, where the issues are often obscured by contending counsel, and where the law rather than justice is often the main point.—London Express.

THEY FAIL AS CRIMINALS.

"Of every ten professional criminals, maid an inspector of police to a representative of Cassell's Saturday Journal, "probably not more than one reforms, four remain criminals to the end, and the remaining five retire from the profession disheartened or disgusted.

"This is a curious phase of criminal life of which little is known and leas has been published, that hundreds of men fall out of the ranks of professional criminals simply because they have not the heart or skill to continue in them. To be a successful criminal requires, in a way, as special gifts as to become a successful lawyer or doctor, and it is only the man who has an aptitude for the 'profession' who can succeed in it. "Fully half the men who adopt a criminal life are failured and fall out of the ranks. If many cases they lack the necessary courage and resource and fail to make a living at the game; and in many other cases they are dogged by such persistent bad luck that they are always falling into our hands, and a series of terms of imprisonment takes all the heart out of them.

"What becomes of the failure? Well, they go to swell the ranks of trampsfand loafers. A man who may be a bunglin beggar. The smaller risk gives him the necessary confidence, and he wheedles where he could not steal.

"Still, 'once a criminal always a criminal' is a fairly true saying. These men hanker after the old career, and their greatest heroes are the men who have succeeded where they failed. They follow the career of the daring criminal as keenly as a retired prize-fighter will watch the doings of a Corbett or a Fitz simmons, and they are never tired of -living over the old life and picturing what might have been if the fates had been kinder.

"These men disappear from our prisons, but they are criminals still, and do infinite harm by coaching the young ones in the arts they understand but could not put into successful practice."

CROMWELL AS A FAMILY MAN. Soldier-Statesman's Devotion to His Wifecand Children

The Soldier-Statesman's Devotion to His Wife and Children.

The opening pages of the last instalicent of Mr. Morely's Life of Cromwell, in the October Century, deal with the Protector's personal traits, and show his fendness for his family.

There is no sign that the wonderful fortunes, that had befallen Cromwell in the seventeen years since he quitted his woodside, his fields and flocks, had altered the soundness of his nature. Large affairs had made his vision broader; power had hardened his grasp; manifold necessities of men and things had taught him lessons of reserve, compliance, suppleness and silence; great station brought out new dignity of carriage. But the foundations were unchanged. Time never choked the springs of affection in him, the true refreshment of every careworn life. In his family he was as tender and as solicitous in the hour of his glory as he had been in the distant days at St. Ives and Ely. Henry Cromwell, an active soldier, an administrator of constituous judgment and tact, and a nolitician with sense and acuteness, had been commander-in-chief in Ireland since 1655, and his father thought well enough of him in 1657, though still hardly thirty, to make him lord deputy in succession to Fleetwood. 

More Pure

Jack Hayes, formerly of the Louvre saloon, lies at the Jubileb hospital in a serious condition as the result of a rash attempt to take his life through a dose of rat poison.

It appears that early this morning after indulging himself in intoxicants, Hayes went to the London hotel and attempted to gain entrance to his wife's room. She had evidently heard of his intentions, for when he arrived there she had gone. He their turned his attention, to another apartment to which he believed his wife had fied.

He thumped on the door, and in order to convince him that his wife was not there the occupant of the room opened the door and allowed him to see. He immediately entered and throwing himself on the bed refused to move. The woman left the apartment, but returned a few minutes subsequently, having heard Hayes crying out. It appeared that during her absence he had mixed a quantity of rat poison with some water and taken st. Then realizing what he had done he called for help.
