Montreal Feb. 10.—L. A. Lapointe, member of the House of Commons for the St. James division on Montreal, died on Saturday.

The set James division on Montreal, died on Saturday. Louis Audet Lapointe was born at Contrecoeur, County of Vercheres, Quebec, May 16, 1860, a son of Louis Audet Lapointe and his wife, Mar-guerite Adeas Dupre, both French-Canadians. Educated at Masson College, Terrebonne, Varennes Col-lege, and the Montreal Business Con-lege, he married Miss Leocadie Azilda Lamoureux, of Montreal, in July, 1879. There are two sons. Mrs. Lapointe died in 1885.-Mr. Lapointe was elected to the Hoüse of Commons as a Liberal at the general election of 1911 and in the contest of 1917 was re-elected by acclamation. In 1916 he was an un-successful candidate for the mayor-alty of Montreal, being defeated by Mayor Martin. Hé was vice-president of the Can-adian Union of Municipalities in 1907 and was elected president in 1908.
