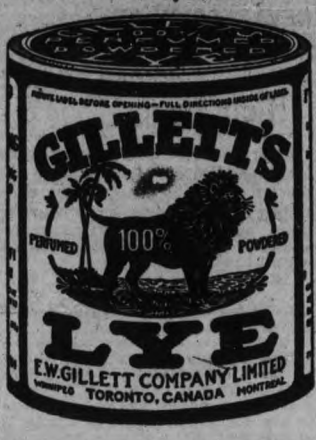

J. W. JONES SPEAKS ON ORIENTAL ISSUE

Presses Policy Advocated in Speeches Recently in Okanagan

THE ORIENTAL QUESTION

The Oriental question and the expansion of the government's irrigation policy were the outstanding features in a long address delivered in the legislature this afternoon by J. W. Jones, Conservative member for South Okanagan.

Mr. Jones was the first member of the House to take up the Oriental question, into which he delved most exhaustively. He spoke of the greatly increased wealth of the Japanese in this Province and their determined efforts to acquire property and control irrigation works.

THE SURPLUS

And while upon the matter of finances, let me speak of the finance minister's surplus," continued Mr. Jones. "A straw surplus, I should call it."

Mr. Jones proceeded to a review of the irrigation question, particularly as affecting the Okanagan Valley. He was glad to see, he said, that the Government was alive to the importance of this question.

ROADS

The speaker contended that roads appropriation was altogether too small. He also said compensation had been made with regard to a shortage.

SOLDIER SETTLEMENT

He touched briefly upon what he called mismanagement in connection with lands at Camps Merville and Lister and passed on to a discussion of the new soldier settlement at Kelowna, where the Christian Ranch has been purchased and subdivided.

ANOTHER WARD WOULD REMOVE W. H. PRICE

Ward Three Conservatives Join Others Throughout City in Demand

Efforts to remove W. H. Price, former director of the Conservative political machine here, from the re-organized party, are being continued by Conservative ward associations throughout the city. GREAT SCARCITY OF LABOR IN LUMBER CAMPS OF ISLAND

Demand for men to go up the Island to the small towns, logging camps and mining camps at higher and higher rates of pay is being made on the employment bureau of the Provincial Government.

Employers state to The Times that the opening of development work throughout the Island is being impeded by the difficulty in getting men out into these industries and keeping them there. To keep men at work, logging camps now supply their men with doughnuts and coffee in the middle of the morning and about 3.30 o'clock with afternoon tea, cakes and pastry delicacies.

Employment bureau officers say that every industry in Victoria is staffed to the limit.

During the last week the bureau has handled these cases:

Agricultural, placed 3; building and construction, placed 3; laboring (general), placed 10; lumbering and forestry, placed 3; metal trades, placed 8; shipping, placed 3; casual work, placed 20.

The report from the women's department of the Labor Bureau shows that there were 21 permanent placements made and 21 vacancies reported, 28 applicants being registered for work. In the casual department, 18 applications were made for work, 17 vacancies reported and 16 casual placements made.

UPLANDS RESIDENTS COMBINE TO FIGHT OAK BAY ASSESSMENT

Have Lost Privilege of Special Rate This Year

"Unaccustomed to bearing individual assessments on their property, thirteen residents of the Uplands have combined, hired legal talent and will fight the attempts of Oak Bay Municipality to make them pay taxes on the basis of regular assessment.

This is the first time residents and owners of property in the Uplands have been assessed individually. Until the end of last year the whole subdivision came under the agreement which then expired and which had given everybody who had invested there the privilege of the same low rates that were given to the development company. The new agreement, ratified at this year's municipal elections does not grant special consideration for the wealthy residents of the Uplands, although the company has the reduction on the property it has not yet sold.

Those who are working on the case say that the fight will likely be given to the district in which these valuations might be based.

The contest was to have opened last evening before the Court of Revision, but was postponed on Monday.

There were only five other complaints yesterday against Oak Bay assessments, some of them being from persons who objected to being given the wrong name. No reductions were granted.

J. A. SHANKS ASSAILS VICTORIA NEWSPAPERS

Shanks, who recently was defeated for a position on the aldermanic board, whose request for a position on the Library Commission was rejected by the aldermen, wrote to the City Council last night protesting against what he considered exaggerated press reports of the Council proceedings. The letter came as a complete surprise to the aldermen, whom Mr. Shanks roundly assailed at the recent city election.

The communication was received amid considerable merriment. Alderman Fullerton expressing sympathy with Mr. Shanks' views, and Mayor Porter remarking, "Yes, for once he's right."

JOHNS PLAN FOR MEAT INSPECTION IS PASSED AT LAST

After falling in many worthy battles on the question, Alderman Johns managed to get his amendment to the Health By-Law, providing for a more rigid inspection of meat, through the City Council last night. The amendment was somewhat changed to meet the wishes of the other aldermen, but in principle it is the same. Though

some of the aldermen professed to believe that it was an unworkable measure, the amendment, following a short discussion, passed without opposition. Last week its introduction caused a good deal of excitement in the Council when Alderman Dinnsdale opposed it strenuously.

Additional Nurse.—The proposal of the Victorian Order of Nurses that the city co-operate with that body in employing a nurse for city work was referred to the medical health officer and the Health Committee by the City Council last night.
